FED STEERS SHARPLY LOWER; COWS GENERALLY STEADY

FORT WORTH—Movement of cattle and calves was again of moderate proportions at Fort Worth Monday, but Northern markets and the Cornbelt reported heavy runs of cattle and hogs and fat cattle weakened. At Fort Worth slaughter steers and yearlings were weak to \$1 lower. Cows and bulls ruled steady with last week's close. Calves were about steady, with high grades and culls firm, and the between grades weak.

Comparative prices; Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$17.00—20.00; odd head higher; common and medium \$10.00—16.50; fat cows \$9.00—11.00 and canners and cutters \$6.00—9.50. Bulls \$9.00—12.00; odds to \$12.50. Good and choice slaughter calves \$15.00—17.00; cull, common and medium \$8.00—14.00. Stocker steer calves \$19.50 down; stocker steer yearlings \$18.00 down; stocker cows \$8.00—12.75, latter price for springer cows and a few with baby calves, the cows averaged 930 lbs. at \$12.75, the calves about 100 lbs., brought \$20.

HOG TOP \$14.00—14.25 AT FORT WORTH MONDAY
Another day of more than 100,000 hogs was chalked up by the 12 major markets Monday. At Fort Worth prices were steady to 25 cents lower on butchers and packing sows. Top hogs sold for \$14.00—14.25; and sows at \$11.00—13.50.

SLAUGHTER LAMBS 50c LOWER; OTHER CLASSES STEADY

Good and choice fat lambs drew \$17 to \$17.50 at Fort Worth Monday, and cull to medium kinds drew \$10 to \$16. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$14 to \$16. Fat yearlings drew \$16 down. Old wethers drew \$7 to \$12. Slaughter ewes sold for \$5 to \$6.

open as usual Friday for buying and selling livestock. BIG MEAT PRODUCTION PREDICTED NEXT YEAR

Copies of the report of the feed survey committee of the American Feed Manufacturers Ass'n received in Fort Worth last week called for continued high level feeding and meat production.

The committee of experts from agricultural colleges all over the country included such authorities as Dean Barlow, Oklahoma A&M and Dr. I. W. Rupel of Texas A&M.

They predicted cattle population and feeding about the same next year as in this one. This Fall's pig crop was 11½% above a year ago, and a one per cent gain in 1956 Spring pigs was seen. Broiler production next year will be up 6%. Turkey production will be up 5%. Milk production will be up slightly and dairy cow population up 1%. Sheep production will continue to rise, especially because of more farm flocks. Laying hens will average 3% lower than this year. Period covered by these findings is October 1, 1955—September 30, 1956.

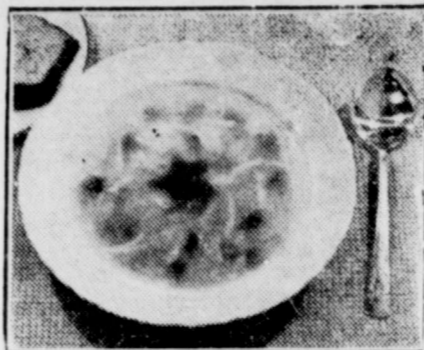

It's a dandy time of year to serve chicken or turkey soup. Stewing hens are cheap, turkeys are plentiful, and the most delicious soup can be made from the leftovers and frame. Bony pieces of chicken can also be bought at budget prices, so soup is a natural.

To make it the center of attraction, however, dress it up with sparks of color by cutting different shapes from festive-looking red pimientos. Keep a can or jar of pimientos on the pantry shelf to give star billing to many a plain dish.

Homemade Chicken or Turkey Soup

with Pimiento Cut-outs
Chicken or turkey bones
Chicken or turkey leftovers
Pimientos from a 4-oz. can or jar
Noodles or rice

Cover the bones with water and simmer them—slowly—to extract all the essence. Remove the bones, add the leftover pieces of meat, the noodles or rice, and heat. Gently drop in the garnish of bright, rosy-red pimiento pieces or cut-outs; and play up the fact that soup is the star of the meal by placing a fat pimiento star in the center of each bowlful. Children will love the colorful bits of red floating in the soup, and everyone will enjoy the piquant flavor. Watch the spoons fly!

Note: Pimiento garnishes added to canned soup will give it a party-planned look and taste.

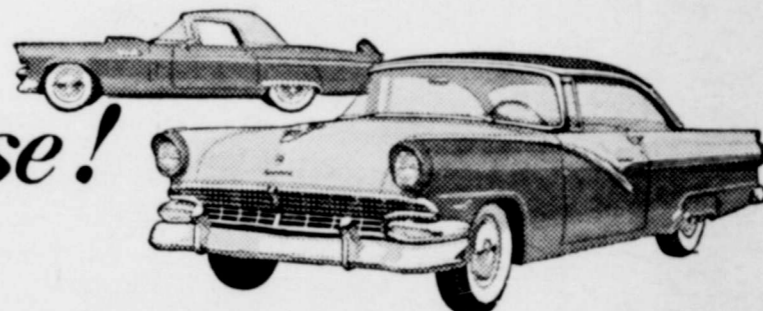

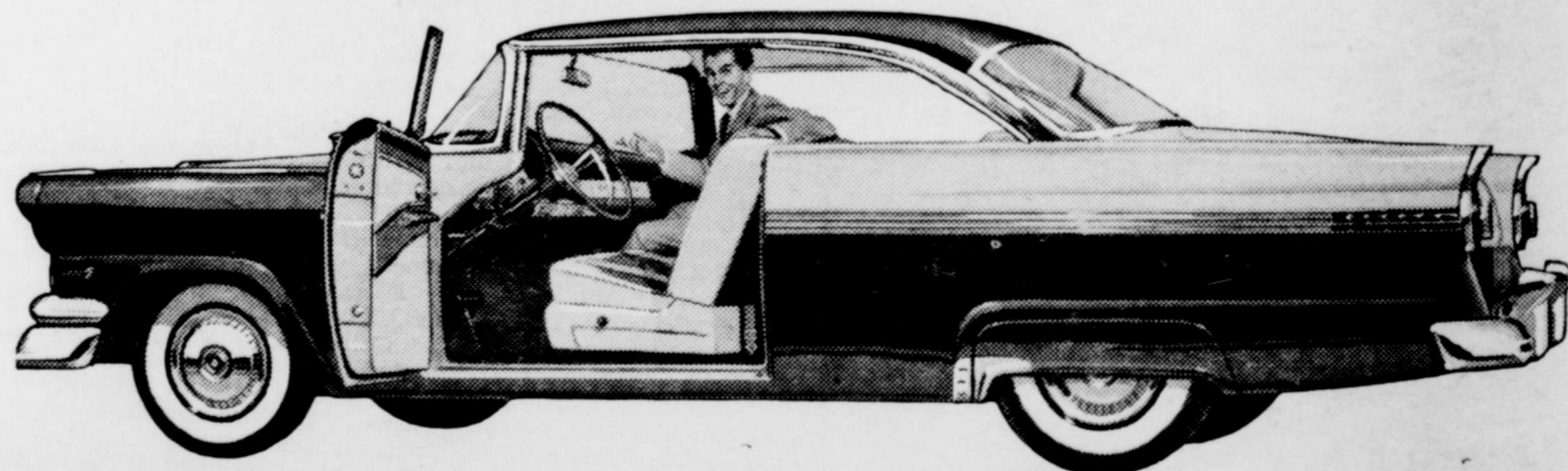

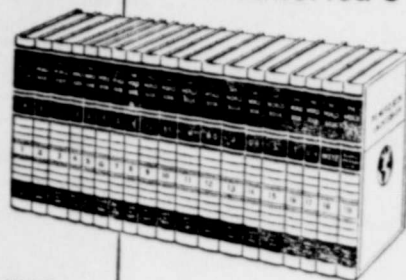

people pass—you'd better stick to the old methods."

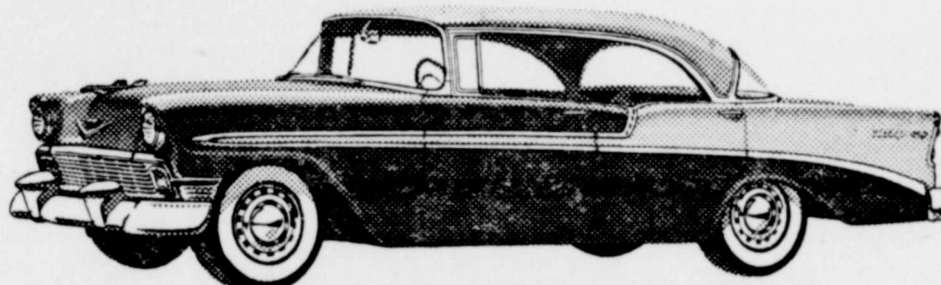

Daily Luncheon Companions

While daddy is at work, mother and little Sally are having lunch together. And mother knows how much it adds to the fun of this daily occasion if dessert is something both of them will enjoy. So, more often than not, she makes "Junket" Rennet-Custard. Made with rennet powder and fresh milk, it's light, it's smooth, healthful, and delicious too.

Today, mother and Sally are enjoying their favorite raspberry rennet-custard. Sally's is plain, mother's is dressed up with strips of pound cake and whipped cream. There are 2 more dishes in the refrigerator—one for Billy's after-school snack, the other for dad's late evening snack. The whole family will get their share of nourishment today from this easy-to-make dessert.

Rennet powder comes in a variety of wonderful flavors—vanilla, chocolate, maple, and 4 fruit flavors—lemon, orange, strawberry and rasp-

berry. Any one can be used to make this family treat. Here's the easy recipe:

Raspberry Trifle

- 1 slice pound cake
- 2 cups milk, not canned
- 1 package raspberry rennet powder
- Whipped cream

Set out 3 dessert dishes and a custard cup for baby. Cut pound cake in strips 2"x1"x1/2". Put 2 strips in each dessert dish. Warm milk slowly until lukewarm, stirring constantly. Test a drop on the inside of your wrist frequently. When it feels comfortably warm (110° F.) not hot, remove at once from heat. Stir in entire contents of package raspberry rennet powder at one time. Mix until powder is dissolved—not over one minute. Pour at once, while still liquid, into glasses. Do not disturb while milk sets—about 10 minutes. Chill. Serve baby's dessert plain. Top with whipped cream for adults.

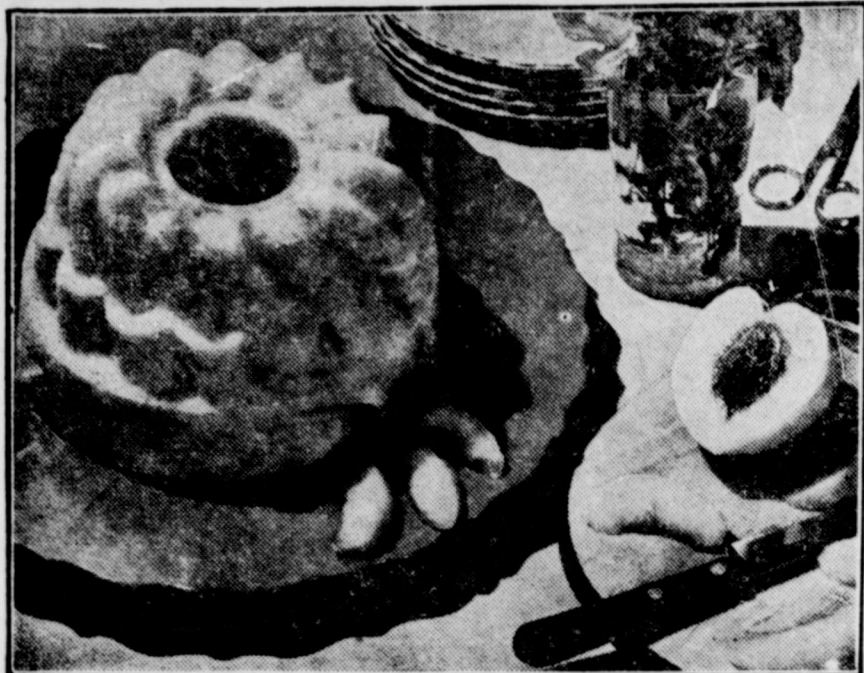
