

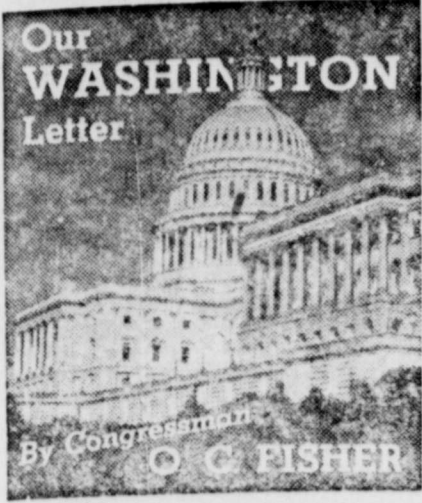

**Our WASHINGTON Letter**

CENTENNIALS ARE fashionable this year. There are eight counties in our district that celebrate the 100th birthday in 1956. They are Bandera, Brown, Kerr, Lampasas, Llano, McCullough, San Saba and Uvalde. It will be a year of rejoicing in the achievements of the pioneers of a passing era in American history. It has been an era of frontiers, of Indian wars, of log houses, churches in the wilderness, of new towns, the coming of railroads with the passing of the stage coach. All those things and more.

It reminds us of Solomon's admonition: "Remove not the ancient landmarks which thy fathers have set." We need to sip again at the fountain of inspiration which results from the vision, sacrifices, spirit of adventure and accomplishment, all associated with the pioneering on the western frontier. This year is indeed a year of tribute to the trail blazers, who built the bridges and roads that we enjoy today.

RECENT GUESTS have included Dr. C. M. French of San Angelo; Kelly Owen, Judge Warden Terry, Harry Shapiro and Louis Crump, all from San Saba; Wendell Mayes of Brownwood; Mr. and Mrs. John Hunnicutt of Del Rio; U. S. Marshall Hobart McDowell of San Angelo; and Judge Ralph Yarborough of Austin. Judge Yarborough was here to attend the wedding of his son.

The San Saba group, headed by County Judge Terry, came up to appear before the appropriations committee in behalf of funds to initiate a re-survey on the upper Colorado River and tributaries.

It will be recalled that back in 1944 the Army Engineers made a report of a survey that had been made, and recommended two dams on the Colorado and one on the San Saba—about 15 miles above the city of San Saba. But after reaching Washington, it was returned to the District Engineer for further processing. That required a new survey of the entire watershed. And due to continued shortage of funds for survey and planning works, the District office has not been able to re-do the survey.

We are now pleading for additional funds which will make the re-survey possible. Many streams and watersheds in southwest Texas must have the attention of the Corps of Engineers before dams can be considered. It is imperative that more planning and engineering be accomplished just as soon as possible.

### LEO AGAIN!

Well, the erstwhile flour salesman, governor, and senator, is back in the running. Now he's an insurance man, in fact, owner of his own company, the W. Lee O'Daniel Insurance Company.

Golly. And he needs some more customers before the state insurance commission folds up his company because he has so few policyholders.

I happened to be Wm. McCraw's county campaign manager in Irion County in 1938 when Leo came out and won the governor's race hands down. Because "there ain't gonna be no run-off" boys.

Remember?

Well, Pappy, got all but about 100 votes over in Irion County. My man McCraw got 38, Ernest Thompson got a little more than that and Old Tom Hunter, the perennial race maker got 4 or 5. Pappy got all the rest.

Yessir!

When our man, McCraw, spoke in San Angelo in front of the courthouse, Judge Sutton hired the Ballinger high school band to come and we had a parade and band concert.

The crowd was fair until the talk by Bill McCraw began and then it dwindled away. Not more than a hundred or so heard him through.

But when the Light Crust Doughboys with Pappy and the little old flour barrels hit Angelo, traffic was roped off for two or three blocks and that wasn't enough room to hold the crowd. He was going to get every one over 65 that top pension amount. Yessir!

The "ain't gonna be no run-off, boys." Sho' nuff!

The next year Pappy was going about over the state meeting all the senators to get a program lined up before the legislature convened. He was coming to Senator Penrose Metcalfe's for a session and a dinner at the Metcalfe home. Penrose met Leo in Fort Stockton and they started for Angelo and a dinner at the Metcalfe home. He was not scheduled to stop any where along the way. I happened to be the justice of the peace in Mertzon. We made up with the sheriff John Boyd to stop Pappy and Penrose and have some fun. We got a new horse hobble at Cravens Hardware Store and stopped the two cars. The sheriff had a complaint to arrest Pappy on charges of ignoring the town of Mertzon by not stopping—in spite of the fact that Mertzon had given him an overwhelming majority of its votes for governor the year before.

We held a mock trial in the middle of the street and I fined him a 5-minute talk to the school kids up at the school. That sure did tickle Pappy. He got up in the back of a pickup (the kids were marched out side for his speech) and talked over 30 minutes to the "boys and girls." Mrs. O'Daniel was in a Highway Patrol car following Penrose and Leo. She was charming to the crowd and took numerous pictures of the trial and the talk up at the school.

I fined Senator Metcalfe \$10 for associating with such a character as O'Daniel. Everybody had fun. Most of you might recall that Uncle Bill Kellis, wrote a piece on O'Daniel named "The Book of Leo." It was widely reprinted by the big state papers. In fact I first saw it in an Austin daily. It was clever. It was short in comparison to the "Book of Jim" and was never published in book form.

Leo managed to make money out of a race—whereas it usually nearly breaks a man to run for state office. He had his little flour barrels that were passed out and the big baker—Hugh Roy Cullen of Houston, the man that gives away millions by the fistfuls to Houston colleges and hospitals. So maybe Pappy will come out all right this time.

But I don't think he will ever be governor again.

## Old Jerusalem Is the Scene of World's Greatest Galaxy of Christian Shrines

The Kingdom of Jordan boasts in and around Arab Jerusalem what is perhaps the greatest collection of religious, historical and cultural shrines in the world. The Old City has been sacred for centuries to the three monotheistic faiths, Christianity, Islam and Judaism. Outstanding to most pilgrims is the Holy Sepulchre, the legendary church of Christ's resurrection and the most revered site in Christendom. Of hardly less interest is the 7th Century Dome of the Rock, a Moslem shrine from which Mohammed is reported to have ascended into Heaven.

Among other notable sights are the Via Dolorosa, or Way of the Cross, along which Christ is believed to have walked to Calvary; the Garden Tomb, which many Protestants prefer to regard as his last resting place; the Tomb of the Virgin Mary; the magnificent Church of All Nations and the adjacent Garden of Gethsemane; and the immortal Mount of Olives, the place of the Master's ascension.

As one leaves Jerusalem the Bible unfolds before him every foot of the way. Within a short drive are little Bethany, traditional home of Mary, Martha and Lazarus; Bethlehem, of song and story with its Church of the Nativity and Shepherd's Fields; Jericho, which some archaeologists believe to be the world's oldest city, the Jordan River and its relics of Christ's baptism by St. John; and the Dead Sea, the lowest spot on earth.

The most pleasant time to visit Jordan is in spring when the hills and valleys are carpeted with Biblical flowers or in the fall when the tang of a New England autumn is in the air.

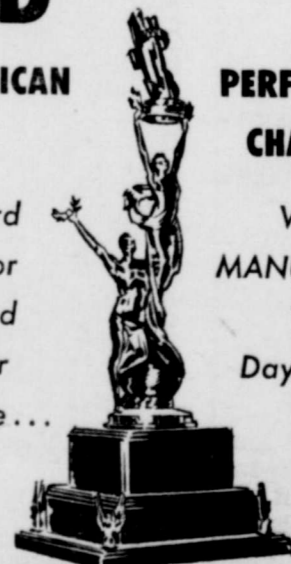

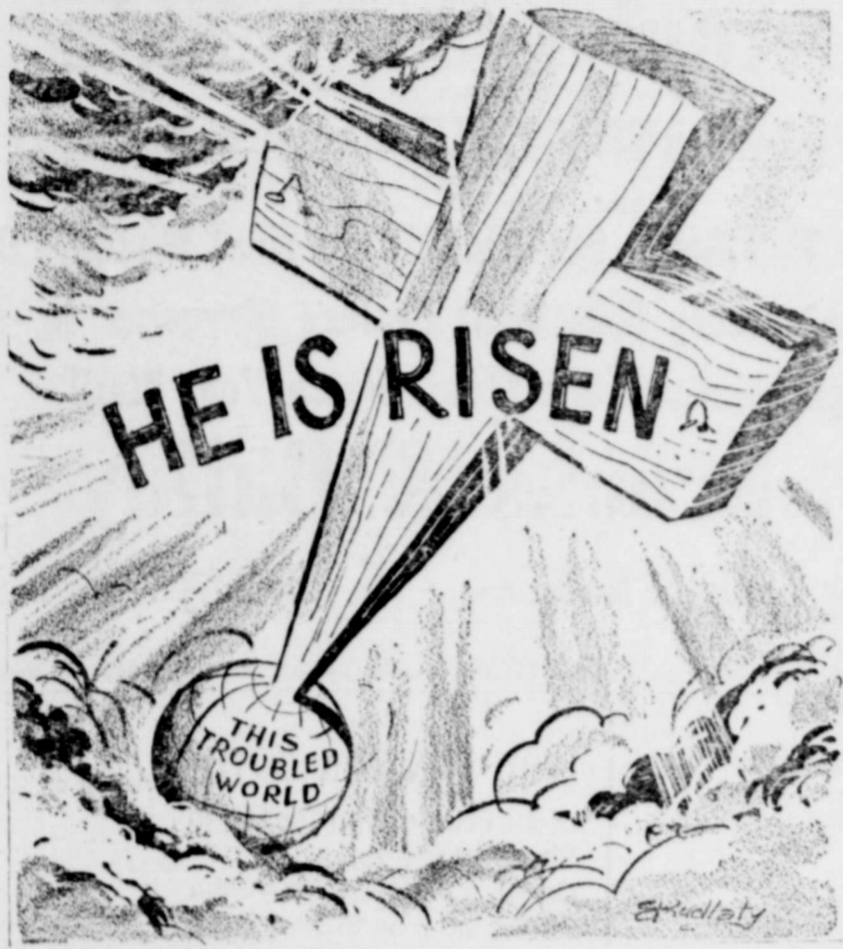

**Bible Comment:**

**Soul's Easter Has Special Meaning**

**E**ASTER in the soul is often something different—something more—than Easter in the churches.

Everything we celebrate in connection with the life, death and Resurrection of Jesus is not to be limited to one day or season, but should be extended to every day and every season.

On Easter Sunday many churches that ordinarily have a single service conduct two services to accommodate the crowds. The following Sunday, the crowds may be even less than usual.

What lies back of this discrepancy? Is the attendance a recognition of the Resurrection of Jesus and a rejoicing in the supreme event? Or is Easter attendance often a custom?

The name "Easter" has its origin in a pagan festival of spring. For some, perhaps, the joy of Easter is little more than a pagan bow to the advent of springtime after the grimness of winter.

Even for many of the sincerely religious there is a difference between the celebration of the Resurrection of Jesus as a far-off event in history and the celebration of the fact of an ever-present and living Christ.

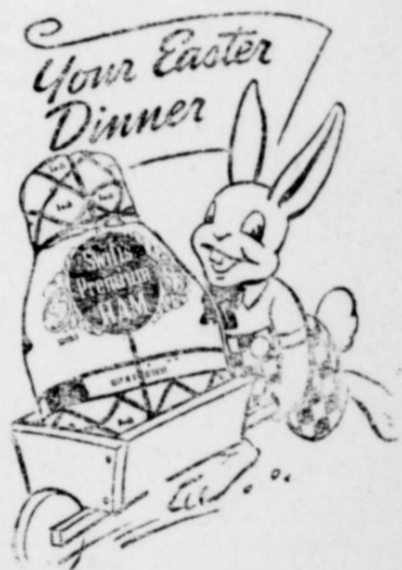
