

At 8:00 that evening the first of five night performances will be unveiled in the all steel arena at Midland Fair Park.



Pimientos Add Zest To Chicken Casserole



Chicken with rice is an always welcome stand-by, but it's zesty red pimientos that lend standout flavor to this easy-do casserole. Layers of rice, chicken, and pimientos are baked to tantalizing goodness in a delicious milk and wine sauce, topped with scarlet pimiento cut-outs.

Casseroles are here to stay, and this one is a luncheon or supper dish that's easy as pie to make and taste tempting down to the very last forkful.

Pimiento-Chicken-Rice Casserole

- 1 can or jar (4 oz.) whole
- pimientos 1 lb. chicken (breasts or
- thighs), salted. 2 cups cooked rice 1/2 cup butter or margarine

Sauce

- 2 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk
- % cup California sherry 1 teaspoon salt

Put the salted chicken in a baking dish. Melt the butter or margarine, pour it over the chicken, and bake for 45 minutes at 350°, turning once. Remove the chicken from the drippings, and make sauce by adding the flour, milk, and salt to them; then pour in the sherry. Strip the chicken from the bones, and cut half the pimientos into strips. In a casserole make a layer of rice, one of chicken, and one of pimiento strips. Repeat the rice and chicken layers, and top with pretty pimiento shapes cut from the remaining pimientos. Pour the sauce over all and bake in a 350° oven for about 25 minutes This casserole will make 3 to servings.
