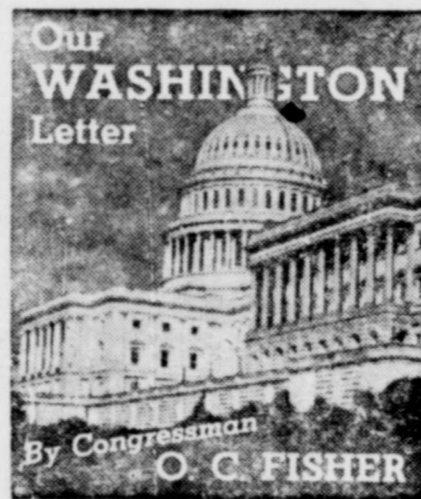
The night of June 28 was set as the time for installation of new officers and a ladies night affair.

IMPORTANT BILLS to watch are those dealing with the Supreme Court novel "Pre-emption Doctrine." The Court now holds that if the Congress enacts a law on a subject also dealt with in State laws the latter are nullified. Under that theory, state sedition laws, labor relations laws, etc., are automatically quashed by laws on such topics enacted by Congress, even though the federal laws do not so state such to be the intention of Congress.

Pending bills simply provide that if Congress intends to nullify state laws it should say so and not have its intent presumed by the Courts; preserving, however, the supreme authority of Federal Courts, in case of conflict between State and Federal laws.

HEARINGS ON these bills have been held in both House and Senate, but committees are dragging their feet on reporting them for floor action.

Americans for Democratic Action (ADA) and other left-wing groups bitterly oppose this proposal, as indeed they do all efforts to restrict the encroachment of the Federal government upon state's rights.

AMONG GUESTS last week were the members of the Miles High School graduating class, with sponsor—the Dawson Colemans, W.A. Smith and Mrs. Dona Kellemeier, all of Miles. Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Masterson of San Angelo came by en route to the Rotary convention in Atlantic City. In Washington for a two-week refresher was Brents E. Kenley, formerly of San Angelo but now living in Midland. He is a Navy Research Specialist, in the Reserves, and will likely soon become a full Commander.

A MAJOR remodeling job on the front of the U.S. Capitol has just been authorized. Long a subject of lively controversy, it now looks like the east front of the Capitol will be extended about 36 feet into the Capitol Plaza. Actually, in 1863 when the last major work was done on the building, the architect drew plans to correct what he called an "architectural error" and also to provide more space inside. The Civil War held up the job. In 1904 one bunch of architects called for a 36-foot extension another for 12 feet.

Nothing came of that, and the controversy simmered until the mid-30's, when the House failed to go along with the Senate on a proposed expansion. The same thing occurred in 1949. But this year agreement has been reached and it looks like the 90-year tussle is about to be settled.

Robbery Suspects Get Change of Venue

Could Not Get Jury Here Monday

Judge Joe L. Mays, judge of the 51st district court here, moved the trials of the three Sterling City bank robbery suspects to Odessa as it seemed impossible to get a jury here Monday.

The three men charged with the bank robbery are Charles Peeples, Percy Allen Warren and Wallace Ray (Pete) Moulton. The three men had court appointed attorneys here Monday, and the district judge at Odessa has appointed attorneys in Odessa to defend them there.

The three men were charged with armed robbery of the bank here on May 2 following a thrilling chase that ended in four hours after the robbery took place. They have been confined to jail under \$15,000 bond since arraignment.

A jury panel of 72 had been summoned here Monday for the trials. Practically all of the prospective jurors were either disqualified or rejected by the defense attorney for Peeples. Most jurors had opinions already as to the men's guilt. Some were not acceptable to the defense. So the judge realized that a jury would be impossible to get in Sterling County.

Only one juror was acceptable—Mrs. Henry Bauer—out of the total venire.

The trials of the men have been tentatively set for June 25 in the Ector County trial. The case is in the 70th district court there.

College Women Can Get WAC Commissions

Time is growing short for young women to make application for the WAC Officer Training Class commencing August 23. Applications must be in for processing by July 1.

Direct commissions in the Women's Army Corps as 2nd Lieutenants are available to college graduates between the ages of 20 and 28, and those between the ages of 28 to 33 who have experience in a civilian field may receive commissions as 1st Lieutenants.

A 20-week training and orientation course is given to acquaint newly commissioned officers with the operations of the Army and the fundamentals of military life. After training, assignments will be to one of 140 jobs in many diversified career fields. WACs who have special abilities or training which the Army can use may be assigned the tasks utilizing their talents.

While in the service, WAC officers receive good pay, \$10,000 life insurance policy, uniform allowance, a chance to travel, valuable training, opportunity for promotions and liberal retirement benefits.

College women who are interested in an executive career in the Army are urged to make application now for attendance at the August 23rd class. For this class, July 1st is the deadline. Quick action will be given these applications by the WAC Officer Selection Board, Washington, D. C.

Arab Legion Celebrated As Colorful Small Army

One of the most colorful, as well as the most courageous and well disciplined small armies of the world, is the Arab Legion, which began its career in Amman, Jordan, in 1920, one of the Bible Lands, at the end of the First World War.

The Arab Legion wears khaki uniforms, with headdress to distinguish the various corps. The regular army wears red and white checked kaffiah held with a black agal and the silver insignia of the Legion. The cavalry wears lemon yellow kaffiah, and the camel corps the red and white checked kaffiah, and scarlet belts, scarlet ornamental cords and sometimes crimson capes. They ride beautiful creamed colored camels and patrol the desert from Amman to Aqaba.

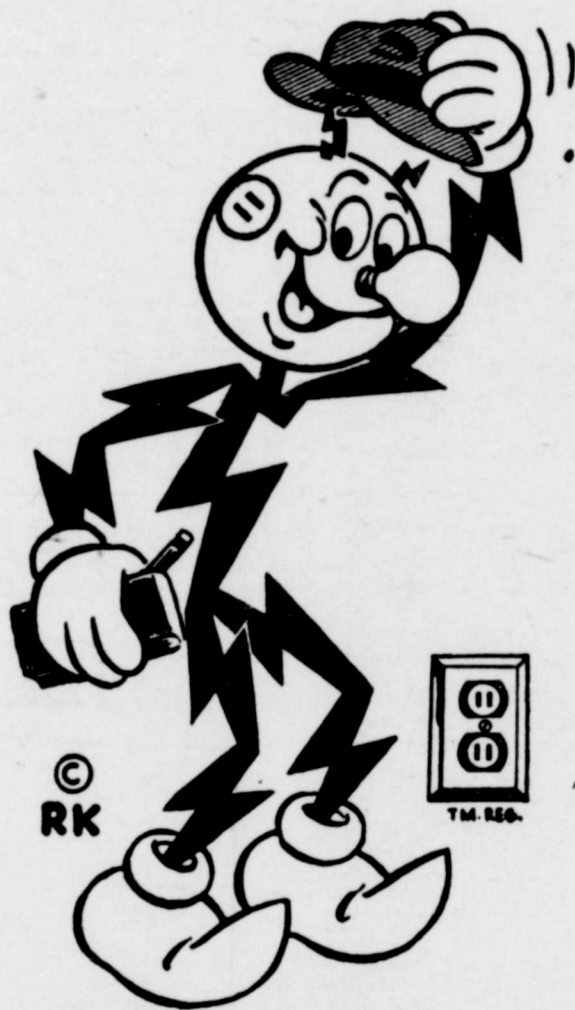

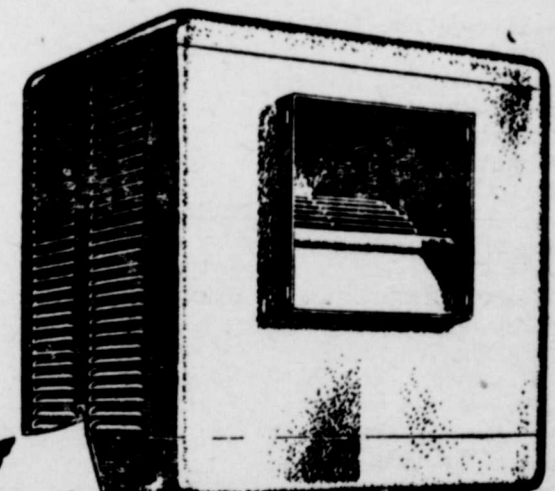

COMMUNITY CENTER RULES AND REGULATIONS OUTLINED BY COMMITTEE

The Community Center committee, set up by the Lions Club and given authority to do so, have set up the rules and regulations governing the operation of the center and such rules will be posted and adhered to by all who are concerned—such as users of the center and the hostess, etc.

The rules and regulations are as follows:

1. All persons who wish to use Center will make appointment with follows:
2. Center will be open for use Monday through Saturday. In event any church desires use of Center on Sunday, Hostess will not be responsible for supervision or cleaning that day.
3. In event more than one engagement in Community Center in one day or night, the parties involved in the first occasion will be held responsible in helping clean up Center, getting ready for second party. (There will be at least 2 hours between engagements—for clean-up.)
4. All parties, meetings, etc., must be properly chaperoned, and in no case will meetings be held later than 12 o'clock at night.
5. In event there is a conflict in use of Center for two parties, the priority will go to any young people's gathering provided they have planned the occasion and spoken for the Center on or about the same day.
6. There will be no use of intoxicating beverages on or about the premises, and any damage resulting from any party will be paid for by that group before leaving.

7. Appointments will be kept in a register, showing date, time, sponsor and intended use. Same information will be written on calendar inside entrance, and any conflict in dates will be the responsibility of the hostess.

8. Use of Center for dancing classes, etc., is encouraged, but if some group schedules a party that conflicts with these classes, the priority will go to the group planning a party.

9. The kitchen is a part of the Community Center and will be used by all when needed, but must be left in good order before the party or meeting adjourns.

10. Any complaint concerning use of center will be turned in to the committee.

11. All requests for use of Center will be made by an adult sponsor, who will be present at meeting or party.

12. Hostess will live in building and will be present in the building during all parties and meetings, or will have an adult representative in his or her place, if absent.

13. All rules and regulations are subject to revision and change, but must be brought to the attention of the Lion's Club Committee for their revision and change.

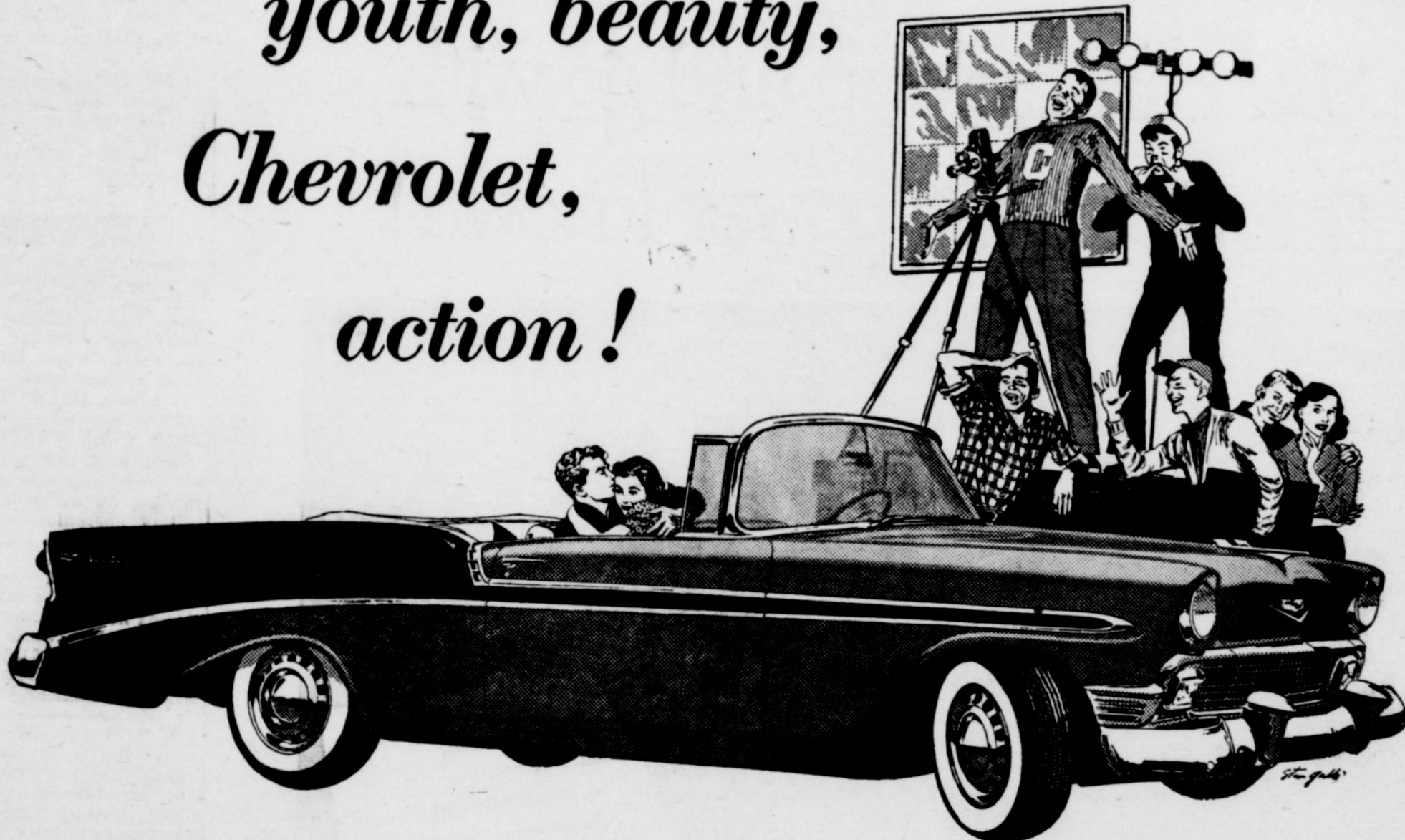

Instant Cream Snacks—Quick and Good!

Congenial friends on chilly afternoons truly enjoy getting together for a steaming cup of coffee. Late afternoon is a wonderful time for a really relaxed visit. However, keep refreshments light so they will not interfere with the dinner hour.

Today, we are not catering to the guests with a sweet tooth. Instead we have selected some "quick snacks" that were created for people who prefer cheese and meat flavors. Hot snacks are so good with coffee or tea and this basic recipe may be employed with many variations.

When instant powdered cream is used "quick snacks" can be made in a matter of minutes. This product which provides the new way "to cream" your coffee, is equally as good in modern recipes. We are giving a recipe for

"quick snacks" and we suggest that you divide the dough in half—vary one batch with 1/4 cup grated sharp cheese and the other batch with two tablespoons deviled ham. And this is the basic dough.

Quick Snacks

- 1/4 cup instant cream
 - 1/2 cup margarine or butter, softened
 - 3/4 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- Mix ingredients together with fork or pastry blender. Roll into 1-inch balls. Place on baking sheet and bake in a hot oven (450° F.) about 6 minutes. Makes 2 1/2 dozen snacks.

If desired, mixture may be chilled in refrigerator several hours, rolled on floured board, about 1/4-inch thick, then cut with 1-inch cutter.

Little League -- Summer Athletic Program Plans

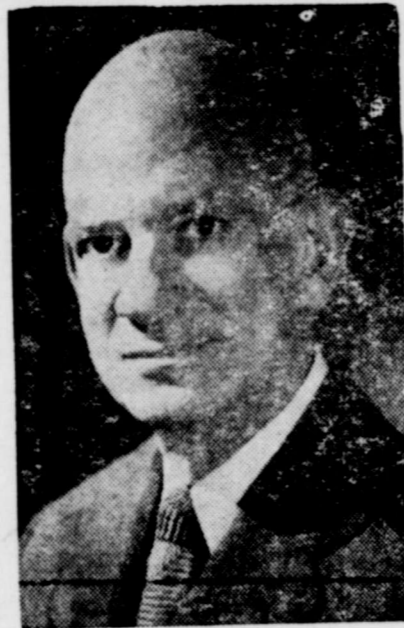

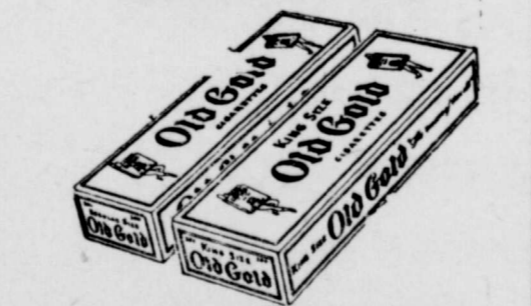
