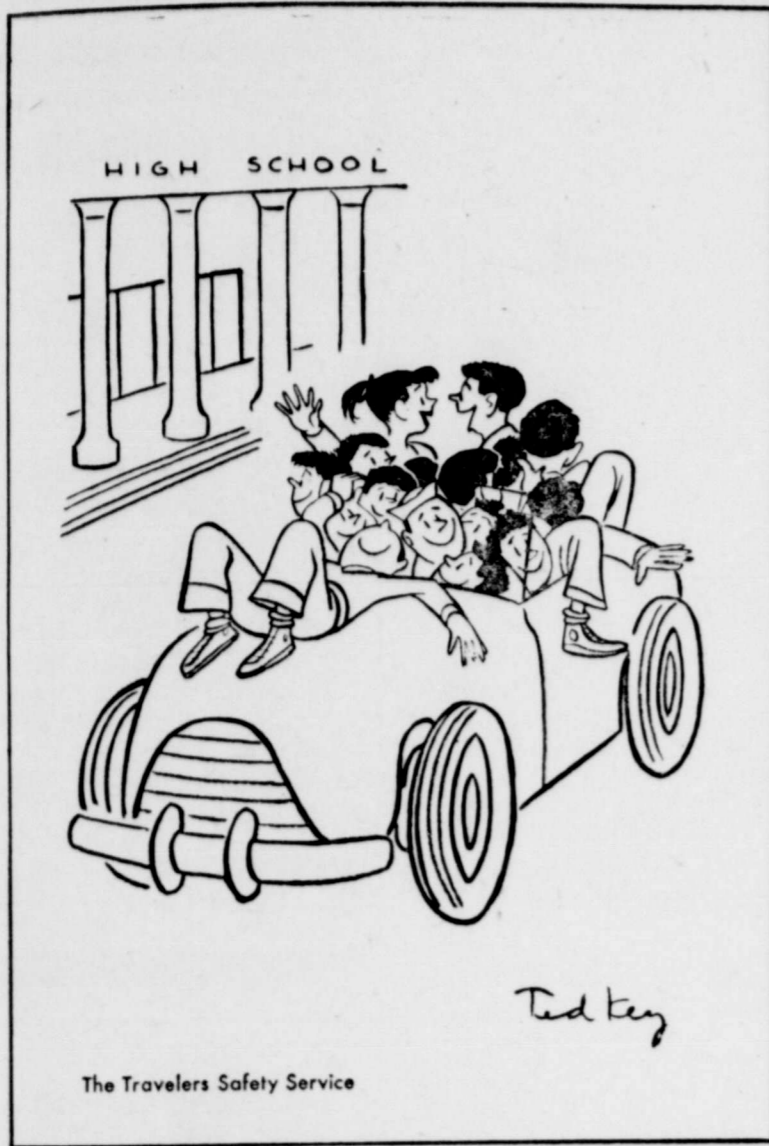

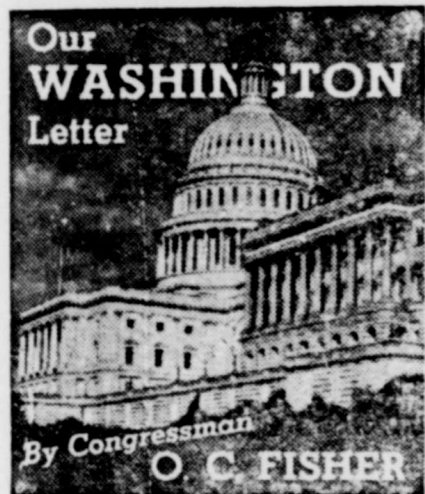

GOING DOWN THE homestretch, the House last week tackled the annual foreign aid bill, insisted on a \$1 billion cut, and postponed final action until early this week. The target date for adjournment has been set at July 10 by the leadership, but if history repeats it will probably go another week or so.

The big conventions coming up in August account for this interest in early adjournment this year. There's a lot of top-level maneuvering by the party chiefs. The Democrats, for example, say they'll take a full week for pre-convention work on the civil rights plank, alone. You can bet the Republicans will spend plenty of time on that issue, too. Both sides this year are trying to out-do the other in attempts to snare the Negro vote.

With some straws indicating some of the colored clan scampering over to the Republican camp, the Republicans are really getting excited about it. Just like old times. And that makes the Democrats very unhappy because they've had that minority bloc pretty well sewed up since FDR and Eleanor pulled them over. Democratic big-wigs count heavily on Eleanor to do it again.

IN THE MEANTIME, here in Congress the battle goes in—the battle, that is, over who can out-promise the other. The GOP jumped ahead a few paces with a civil rights bill never before equalled, while the Democratic counterparts complain the Republicans have jumped on something the Democrats were thinking about all the time!

A pre-view of that major battle for colored votes took place in the presidential primaries. With both Stevenson and Kefauver trying to outdo the other in promises, excuses, and re-assurances, it became ludicrous in California where two-thirds of all their talk centered on that subject. But then came the Nation's two best Negro vote-getters, namely, Eleanor and Helen Gahagan Douglas, both rallying to Stevenson's side in a major flare for the favor of the million colored people in California. And that turned the trick.

## LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



### CATTLE RUN BIGGEST SINCE OCTOBER, 1955

FORT WORTH—The number of cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday was the largest at this market since October, 1955, and prices reflected strength despite the larger numbers.

Both slaughter and stocker interests apparently needed numbers and prices were fully steady to strong, with spots 25 cents or more higher.

Comparative prices: Slaughter steers and yearlings of good and choice grades cashed at \$16.50—21.00; and common and medium sores \$10.00—16.00. Butcher and beef cows sold from \$10.50 to \$13.50, load lots of cows at \$13 from the Pitchfork Land & Cattle Co., King County; a load at \$13.50 from the C. T. White Ranch, McCulloch County; and a load of choice young cows including some heiferish kinds at \$13.50 to \$14.50, those at the higher figure weighing 1,078 pounds from Halsell Ranch, Clay County. Cannors and cutters \$7 to \$10.50. Bulls \$10.00—14.00.

Good and choice stocker steer calves cashed at \$17.00—21.50 and lower grades sold from \$13.00—16.00; stocker steer yearlings \$13.00—18.00; replacement cows \$8.00—12.50.

### LAMBS WEAK, MEDIUMS OFF AROUND \$1.00

The slaughter lamb trade was around 50 cents to \$1 per hundred lower with the larger end of the dip on the medium to fairly good slaughter lambs at Fort Worth Monday. Stockers and feeders and older sheep sold steady to 50 cents lower.

Comparative prices included: Good and choice Spring lambs \$18.00—24.00; cull to medium Springers \$12.00—17.00; stocker and feeder Spring lambs \$14.00—16.50; shorn old crop fat lambs \$16.50—20.00, strictly choice lots quotable higher; cull to medium clippers 9.00—16.00. Stocker yearling lambs \$14.00 down; old ewes \$4.00—5.00; old wethers \$12.50 down. Breeding ewes scarce.

### HOGS HIGHER TOP AT YEAR'S BEST \$17.25

Choice meat type hogs topped at \$17 to \$17.25 at Fort Worth Monday, equalling the season's best price for them. Less attractive types and weights cashed at \$11 to \$16, and sows sold from \$10 to \$13.50, a few choice lightweight to \$14. Stags sold around \$5 to \$8.

**College Women Can Get WAC Commissions**

Time is growing short for young women to make application for the WAC Officer Training Class commencing August 23. Applications must be in for processing by July 1.

Direct commissions in the Women's Army Corps as 2nd Lieutenants are available to college graduates between the ages of 20 and 28, and those between the ages of 28 to 33 who have experience in a civilian field may receive commissions as 1st Lieutenants.

A 20-week training and orientation course is given to acquaint newly commissioned officers with the operations of the Army and the fundamentals of military life. After training, assignments will be to one of 140 jobs in many diversified career fields. WACs who have spec-

ial abilities or training which the Army can use may be assigned the tasks utilizing their talents.

While in the service, WAC officers receive good pay, \$10,000 life insurance policy, uniform allowance, a chance to travel, valuable training, opportunity for promotions and liberal retirement benefits.

College women who are interested in an executive career in the Army are urged to make application now for attendance at the August 23rd class. For this class, July 1st is the deadline. Quick action will be given these applications by the WAC Officer Selection Board, Washington, D. C.
