THREE DIE AS PICKUP OVERTURNS NEAR HERE

An overturned pickup spilled over occupants and resulted in the death of three last Friday afternoon. The accident occurred about mid-afternoon up the Big Spring highway about six miles. Dead in a matter of hours were Mrs. Amelia Trevino, about 70; Mrs. Julia Rodriguez, 60 and Gloria Rodriguez, 19. All were from Wolfforth, Texas except Mrs. Julia Rodriguez and Gloria, who were residents of San Antonio. Seriously hurt in the accident were Mr. and Mrs. Juan Trevino, both of Wolfforth.

The five were taken to the Sterling County Hospital by a Lowe ambulance. The elderly Mrs. Trevino died about the time she was gotten to the hospital. The other two died a little later. They had serious internal and external injuries.

A Lubbock Funeral Home was in charge of the arrangements for the interment. Lowe took the injured couple to a Lubbock hospital on Tuesday of this week. Wolfforth is a town near Lubbock.

Garland Cannon Going to Director Job in Bangkok

Dr. Garland Cannon, valedictorian in the graduating class of 1941, is going to Bangkok, Thailand, on a two-year assignment for the U.S. State Department. He has been in Washington since late May being briefed for the job.

Among other things he is studying the language so he will be able to converse with the natives there. His wife and two daughters are here waiting a phone call telling them when to meet Cannon at Los Angeles.

Cannon's most recent job has been with the English department of the University of California at Berkeley.

His work at Bangkok has been outlined to include director of courses at the Bi-National Center, instructor of graduate students, and final authority on approval of exchange students.

The trip sounds like great adventure for the family, consisting of Mrs. Cannon, the former Sallie Patricia Richardson of Dallas, and two daughters, Margaret, 8, and Patricia, 3. Their overseas luggage is ready for them at Los Angeles, their tickets by airplane have been purchased, and all that remains is for them to get to Los Angeles when Daddy Cannon phones. They are guests here of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Cannon, Sr.

Dr. Cannon was a lad who took to books from the time he started to school. It was easy for him to stay on the honor roll in high school and later in college. He majored in English literature, getting his B. A. degree and doctorate from the University of Texas and his master's from Stanford University. He got his Ph. D. two years ago.

His first job out of Texas U. was as instructor at Allen Academy at Bryan. He has taught one year at the University of California, one year at the University of Michigan, three years at the University of Hawaii, and at the University of Texas two years.

At 31, he has had three years in the Marines, his service including the Philippines, Leyte and occupation duty at Tsing-Tau.

He has had research articles published, has done private editing of manuscript for a friend and has done a stint as office secretary for Senator Dorsey Hardeman of San Angelo. In fact, he was in that capacity when he met Miss Richardson, serving in the same capacity for Rep. Dallas Blankenship.

They were married Feb. 14, 1947. Cannon had been discharged from the Marines only a year and 10 days before.

Mrs. Cannon looks forward to studying art while in Thailand. The family will have a large residence while overseas, five servants, and will be expected to make of their home something of a social center.

Their trip out over a distance of some 8,000 miles will include stops at Honolulu, Wake Island, Tokyo and Hong Kong.

And when they finish their contract, they will be permitted to return through Europe. As for a job when he gets back, Cannon has offers from the Ford Foundation and the University of Michigan.

The parents, here since 1938, are experiencing the thrill of success for their son. They anticipate no difficulty in his adjusting to the language of Thailand, citing that when he was doing post-graduate work in German, he mastered it alone without instruction in the regular class and passed his examinations with flying colors. Green, Foster, and Copeland Winners in Contested Races

In the local contested races, W. O. (Bill) Green was returned to the sheriff-tax assessor-collector's office by a vote of 294 to 181 over his opponent Ralph Davis. County Commissioner of Precinct No. 1, R. T. Foster beat T. H. Harzke 202 to 141, and C. J. Copeland won the Precinct 3 Commissioner's race over T. H. Humble 38 to 21.

Sterling County elected Precinct chairmen as follows: J. S. Cole—Precinct No. 1; Reynolds Foster, Precinct No. 2; W. H. Owens, Precinct No. 3 and Ross Foster, Precinct No. 4. Jack Douthit was renamed County Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee.

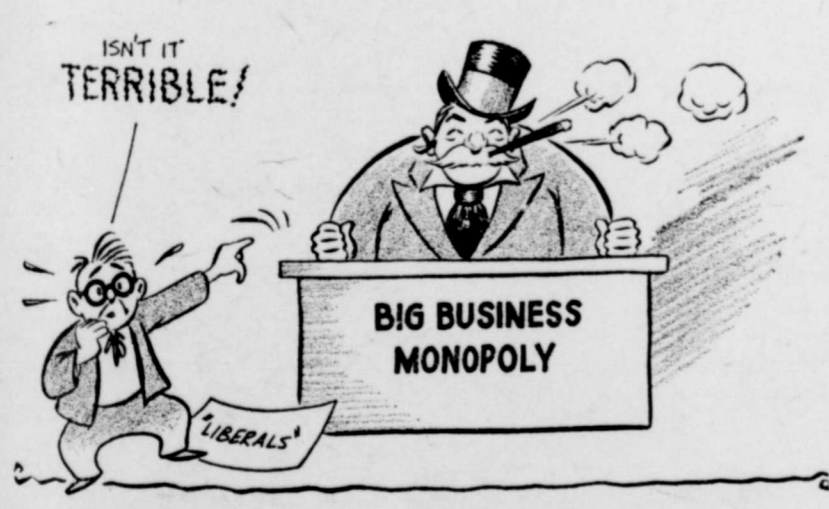
Sterling Democrats favored the three propositions on the ballot, voting 308 to 95 against the mixing of white and negro children in the public schools. For strengthening the laws on intermarriage of negroes and whites the vote was in favor by a vote of 327 to 82. On interposition, Sterling Democrats said "we're in favor of it" 281 to 74.

Old Cairo Attracts Drove Of Visitors To Modern Skyline

Cairo, capital of Egypt and metropolis of the Bible Lands, is an eight square mile city of 2,100,000 people, the largest in Africa and the Arab World. It is surrounded on all sides by sand but watered by the River Nile, which brings life to its magnificent gardens and palm groves. Ancient Cairo—the name means "victorious"—dates back more than 1,300 years to the time of the Arab conquest of the Mediterranean world under the banner of Islam.

As a tourist center Cairo attracts thousands of visitors a year who come to see the Pyramids, the beautiful mosques, the Tut-Ank-Amen treasures at the Egyptian Museum, and to shop in Cairo's famous Musky bazaar. There are modern hotels to house about 3,000 persons, and with the completion of the new Sheppard's Hotel and the Nile Hilton Hotel, now under construction, hotel accommodations will be considerably increased. Cairo has some sixteen museums and palaces to visit, more than eighty important mosques and Arab monuments and a score of Christian churches and monasteries, dating back to the early days of Christianity.

Three major Egyptian Universities with an enrollment of more than 35,000 students are located in Cairo and there are many other colleges and technical schools, including the American University of Cairo. Cairo has an Academy of Oriental Music, a Society of Arts, which has frequent showings of modern painting and sculpture and an Opera House. The winter season brings to Cairo annually an Italian Opera Company, a ballet and the Comedie Francaise from Paris.

Cairo is a city of beautiful squares, spacious parks and a cool, tree-shaded drive along the Nile, where tall masted feluccas skim the waters in stately silence, their huge sails billowing in the breeze. Cairo's Zoo has many rare animals and its tropical gardens many exotic plants and flowers. Town planning is one of the projects of the New Egypt and a long range plan for Cairo is well under way. Traffic is being regulated, parking areas provided, and many streets resurfaced. Two large produce markets are planned to expedite the delivery of foodstuffs and to provide for their refrigeration.

Cairo's distinguishing landmark is the Citadel, which overlooks the city from one of the ridges of the Mokattam Hills. It was first built by the Crusader hero, Saladin. On its broad plaza is the Mohammed Ali Mosque, its great dome and tall minarets rising skyward, a contemporary symbol of Egypt's antiquity.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held November 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1: That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:
"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations; providing for the necessary election and form of ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamations and publications.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected

for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held on November 13, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age, who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may waive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; providing that the State shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing and the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

"Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this State for at least one (1) year continuously immedi-

ately preceding the application and who have resided in the State for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for any permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely State supported institution; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds to any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of Federal funds; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1956, at which election there shall be printed on the ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap."

"AGAINST the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance not to exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap."

Sec. 3. PROCLAMATION. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for an election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held November 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9
proposing an Amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a subsection thereto to be known as Section 11a and to read as follows:

"Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time of commission of the offense and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the guilt of the accused, be denied bail pending trial, by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the order denying bail shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused; provided, further, that the right of appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals of this State is expressly accorded to the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court, judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11
proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against the Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Dead Sea Scrolls Themselves Stated To Be Displayed in Palestine Museum

An added attraction for tourists who will be visiting the Biblical sites in Jordan in the coming months will be the display of the Dead Sea scrolls themselves.

The Tourism Department of the Government of Jordan, in cooperation with the Department of Antiquities, is setting up plans to exhibit those ancient documents in the Palestine Archaeological Museum in Arab Jerusalem.

Thus, visitors to the Bible Lands will have an opportunity to see the scrolls—copper, bronze, and parchment as well—which have been discovered in the Khirbet Qumran caves in the northwest corner of the Dead Sea in the territory of Jordan.

Plans are underway to set up a special section in the Museum so that tourists will have an opportunity to inspect these historical treasures, a Tourist department spokesman said.

Hence, those who will be visiting the holy sites in Jordan will see not only the very places where Christ founded his monotheistic faith but also the ancient manuscripts with their descriptions of the founding of those faiths.

The recent joint announcement of the scrolls by the University of Manchester in England and the Department of Antiquities in Amman indicate that the history of the first century before Christ may be rewritten in the light of information contained on two scrolls—made either of copper or bronze. The work of deciphering these scrolls has been going on for several months in Manchester. The ancient texts outline instructions on where to find buried treasure.

Work on deciphering other scrolls has been progressing simultaneously in the Museum in Jerusalem. Just as soon as these transcriptions are completed, those scrolls, too, will be out on display.

Summer Pastry Ideas

By JANE ASHLEY

Here is a recipe for wonderful, tender pastry that can be made quickly and easily into perfectly shaped tart and pie shells. Use it in preparing a wide assortment of mouth watering summer desserts for your family and friends.

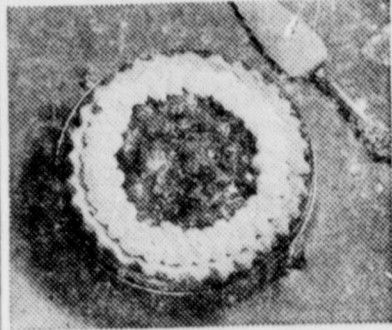


No-Roll Pastry Tart Shells
 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 2 teaspoons sugar
 1 1/4 teaspoons salt
 3/4 cup Mazola Oil
 3 tablespoons milk

Sift dry ingredients into medium bowl. Combine salad oil and milk in measuring cup. Whip with fork and pour all at once over flour mixture. Mix with fork until completely dampened. Divide pastry into 8 medium tart pans. Press evenly and firmly with fingers to line bottom of pan; then press dough up to line sides and partly cover rim. Be sure dough is pressed to uniform thickness. To flute, pinch dough lightly with fingers. Do not use a high fluted edge. Prick bottom and sides. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool; then remove carefully before filling. Fill shells with prepared pie filling mix, preserves, or sweetened fresh fruit, topped with whipped cream.

For Single Crust—8 or 9-inch Pastry Shell: Use 1 1/2 cups flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons sugar, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup salad oil and 2 tablespoons cold milk. Sift dry ingredients directly into pie pan. Com-

bine ingredients and press dough into pan as directed for No-Roll Tart Shells. Prick entire surface of pastry; bake in hot oven (425° F.) 12 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool before filling.



Fresh Strawberry Pie

1 quart strawberries
 3/4 cup sugar
 4 tablespoons corn starch
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1/2 cup water
 1 baked 9-inch No-Roll Pastry Shell
 3/4 cup heavy cream, whipped

Wash, drain and hull strawberries, cut in half. Combine sugar, corn starch and salt in top of double boiler. Gradually add water, mixing until smooth. Add one half of the strawberries. Place over boiling water and cook, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens (about 5 minutes). Cover and continue cooking 10 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat; cool. Fold in remaining strawberries. Pour into baked pie shell. Chill. Just before serving top with whipped cream, sweetened to taste. Garnish with strawberries. *If berries are not juicy, use 3/4 cup water.

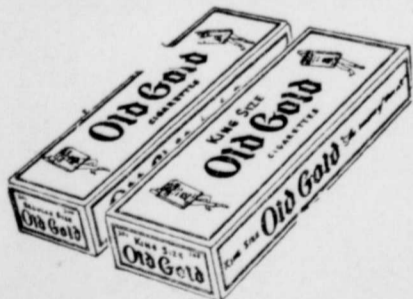

BIBLICAL TREASURE TROVE

Dead Sea Scrolls Produce Clues to Hoard in Jordan

The recent discovery of clues to a fabulous treasure trove reputedly buried on the West Bank of the Kingdom of Jordan, one of the Bible Lands, as deciphered from the celebrated Dead Sea Scrolls has intensified interest in travel to the Middle East.

The clues were taken from two copper scrolls found in caves on the western shore of the Dead Sea in 1952, among many uncovered by Bedouins since 1947. The scrolls were engraved by members of the Essenes, an ascetic Hebrew sect, nearly 2,000 years ago and shed considerable light on life in the Holy Land about the time of Christ.

As revealed by American, British and Jordanian authorities, the copper scrolls refer to 60 hoards of gold, silver and other valuables once buried in the Jerusalem-Hebron-Nablus area. If the treasure were unearthed, it would include 200 tons of precious metals valued at more than \$200,000,000 at current prices.

Dr. G. Lankester Harding, Jordan Director of Antiquities, announced in the capital at Amman that the clues, written in ancient Hebrew, were translated as follows:

"In the cistern which is below the rampart, on the east side, in a place hollowed out of rock, six hundred bars of silver."

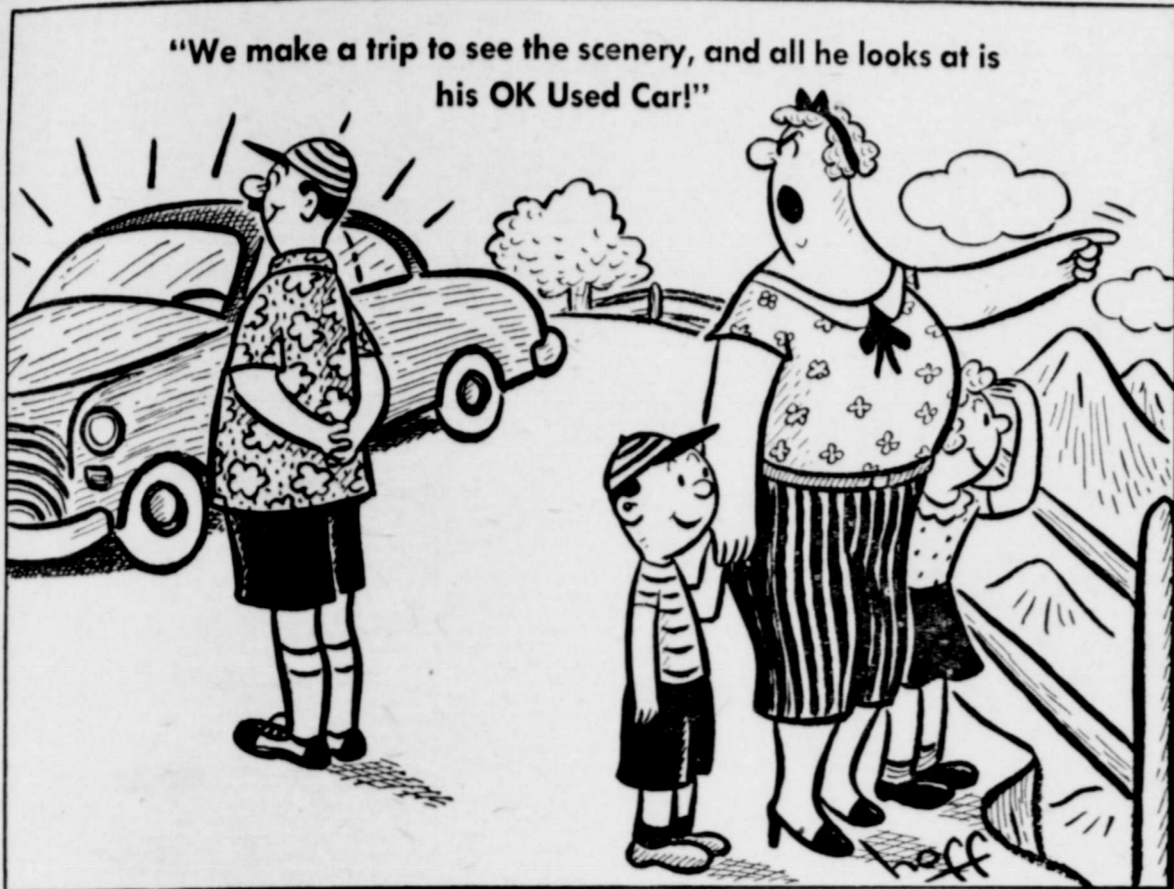
"Close by, below the southern corner of the portico at Zadok's Tomb, and underneath the pilaster in the exedras, a vessel of incense in pine wood and a vessel of incense in cassia wood."

"In the pit nearby, towards the north, near the grove in a hole opening to the north, there is a copy of this book with explanations, measurements and all details."

"This Book" Sought

While archaeologists are sceptical that the treasure will ever be found due to changes in the topography of the soil since the first century A.D., they are speculating as to the existence of "this book" and wondering if its discovery would lead to the treasure hoard.

Treasure hunters fascinated by these clues as well as the Holy places of Christianity may journey to Arab Jerusalem from New York via Egypt or Lebanon. Pan American Airways, Trans World Airlines and several foreign air lines provide daily service to Cairo or Beirut in 30-odd hours.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at An Election To Be Held on November 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...

As a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State...

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section to Article VII of the Constitution...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 51 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

Section 17. In lieu of the State ad valorem tax on any one hundred dollar (\$100) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

which said Five Cent (5¢) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution...

Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping, or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements to the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas at College Station...

Section 19. That Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding after Section 11 thereof a new section to be designated Section 11a...

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate...

Section 2. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding after Section 49-b thereof a new section to be designated Section 49-c...

Section 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to the amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue a proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

poration. Provided, however, the portion of the Veterans' Land Fund not immediately invested in the purchase of lands may be invested in short term United States bonds or obligations until such funds are needed for the purchase of lands...

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, in cash, and shall be a part of the Veterans' Land Fund...

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America...

"All monies received and which have been received under the Constitutional Amendment as World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, may be included within this program by legislative Act, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now provided by law, or as may hereafter be provided by law...

"All monies received and which have been received under the Constitutional Amendment as World War II, and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945, may be included within this program by legislative Act, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds of the sale of the bonds provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that such monies may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1959, the monies received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the purchase of additional bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the bonds be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law...

"If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said amendment and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith...

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands available for the purchase of such lands hereinafter stated, situated in this State, (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System; (c) owned by the Texas Prison System; (d) owned by any person, firm, or corporation...

Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and for interest on deferred payments on land purchased with the proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans, as herein provided, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds of the sale of the bonds provided for herein, for a period ending December 1, 1959; provided, however, that such monies may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. "This amendment shall become effective on and after January 1, 1957."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-B OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS TO CHANGE THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE VETERANS' LAND BOARD TO INCLUDE THE VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945, SUCH FUNDS SHALL BE EXPENDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH INSTRUCTIONS AND REQUIREMENTS THAT MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW."
