LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK BY TED GOULDY



FALL CATTLE MOVEMENT UNDER WAY EARLY?

FORT WORTH—Numbers of cattle and calves being moved in the Southwest indicate that the Fall movement is underway from 30 to 90 days ahead of normal shipping dates, in the opinion of many observers at Fort Worth this week.

Rail car movements of cattle out of principal grass areas lend strength to this belief, and the runs at Fort Worth's Stockyards in the past few weeks have been well ahead of the same interval last year.

The situation is not limited to Texas alone. Conditions in the Flint Hills of Kansas and the Osage of Oklahoma recently have led to some early movement out of these sections. Unless conditions change abruptly the general exodus from those areas will be under way at least a month ahead of normal shipping dates.

Dry conditions are blamed for the situation and all observers agree that to avert serious price breaks the livestock producers will have to stay in close touch and avoid excessive bunching of shipments.

One important meeting along this line will be held in Fort Worth this week when representatives of the market agencies and others on the market will get together and try to work out means of cooperation in spreading receipts out through the week so that excessive price breaks can be avoided.

**LIGHTER RAINS BRINGS
STABLE CATTLE PRICES**

Monday the 12 major markets reported about 33,000 less cattle and calves than a week earlier. The result was a stiffening of prices on most kinds. At Fort Worth good fed cattle were stronger, and grassy slaughter steers, yearlings and heifers were steady.

Cows were steady to strong, with some sales of strong weight canners and cutters 25 to 50 cents above the low close of last week. Bulls were also steady to 25 cents or more higher, some of the medium weights selling to better advantage.

Slaughter calves were generally steady, and stocker and feeders sold at firm prices. Higher grade stockers were quite active and in too small supply to fill the needs.

Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings \$16.50-21.00; quotable well above \$22. Plain and medium butcher cattle \$10 to \$16.50. Fat cows drew \$8.50 to \$11, and canners and cutters sold from \$6 to \$8.50, a few shelly canners below \$6. Strong weight cutters sold to \$8.75 and \$9. Bulls returned \$8 to \$12.50. Good and choice slaughter calves \$14 to \$17, with baby beefs \$17 to \$18.50 weighing around 575 pounds and upwards. Lower grade killing calves \$8 to \$14. Stocker steer calves \$15 to \$19 and steer yearlings mostly \$17 downward. Heifer mates in stocker flesh sold \$2 to \$3 under steers.

**LAMBS CLOSE WEAK TO
\$1.00 LOWER, TOP \$21.00**

At Fort Worth Monday the offering of sheep and lambs was again largely medium and lower grades and prices were about steady on all classes, except slaughter lambs. Killing types of lambs sold weak to \$1 lower and good and choice kinds topped at \$19 to \$21. Cull to medium lambs sold mostly from \$12 to \$18, with some light culls downward to \$8 that weighed around 35 or 40 pounds or less. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$12 to \$15.50, and were considered quotable above that in load lots closely sorted.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$4.50 to \$5.25, and some old wethers drew \$8 to \$12.50.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at An Election To Be Held on November 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1
 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State and/or school districts, and shall in no one (1) year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any public school, college or university supported wholly or partly by the State, or in such other securities of this State; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State; and provided that a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other State pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas; and provided that the pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas

as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one preceding his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendment To Be Voted on at An Election To Be Held on November 13, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38
 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who are more than eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age and who are permanently and totally disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, who are residents of the State of Texas, except that the individuals who are receiving aid for the permanently and totally disabled may not, during the same period of time, receive Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, or be resident in any completely State supported institution; providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for the permanently and totally disabled individuals; providing that the amount paid to any individual may not exceed Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds and may never exceed the amount paid to that individual from Federal funds; providing that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year; providing for the necessary proclamation, publication and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-b which shall read as follows:

Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicap and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this State for at least one (1) year continuously immediately

preceding the application and who have resided in the State for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely State supported institution; and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds to any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of Federal funds; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for individuals who are permanently and totally disabled as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of the State of Texas on the second Tuesday in November, 1956, at which election there shall be printed on the ballot the following clause:

"FOR the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance to needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely State supported institution, and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap."

AGAINST the Amendment giving the Legislature the power to provide for assistance to needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely State supported institution, and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds for each needy individual, eighteen (18) years of age or older, who is a resident of the State of Texas and who is permanently and totally disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap."

Sec. 3. PROCLAMATION. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for an election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments To Be Voted on at an Election To Be Held November 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital in this State, who has been twice convicted of a felony; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication hereof.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be designated as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2

proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate...

Section 2. The Secretary of State, and all other appointed officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: "I, _____ do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly or indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward to secure my appointment or the confirmation thereof. So help me God."

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Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and for interest on deferred payments on land purchased with the proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans, as hereinafter provided, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sale of the bonds provided for herein, for a period ending December 31, 1957; provided, however, that so much of such monies as may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 31, 1956, all monies received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said additional bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

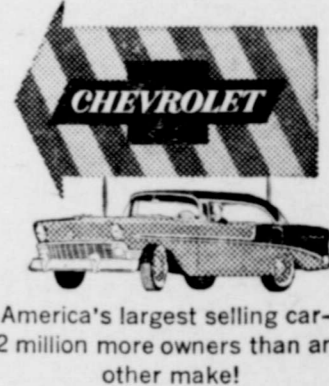
Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; increasing the Veterans' Land Fund by \$100,000,000; said fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans of World War II and to Texas veterans of service in the Armed Forces of the United States of America subsequent to 1945. Such funds shall be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Section 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

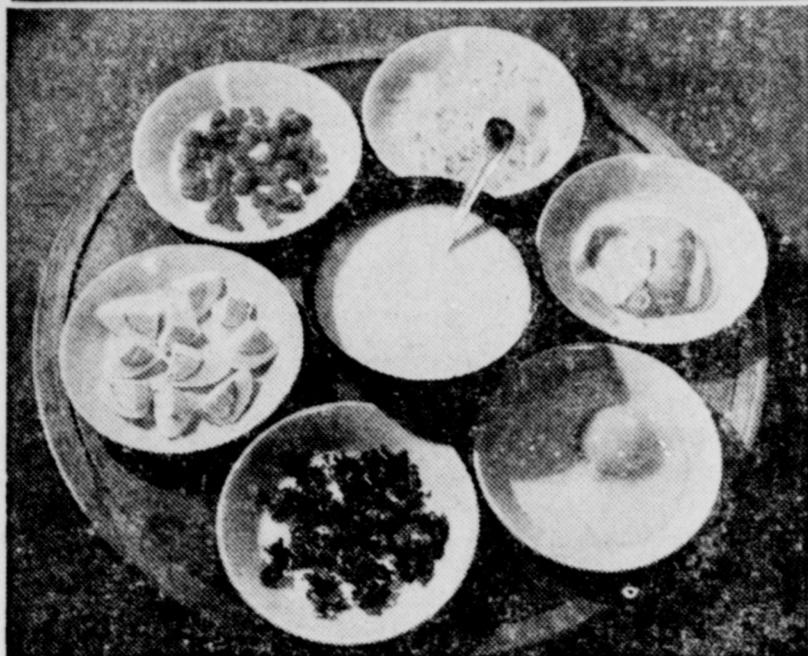

Delicious White Sauce Made With Instant Cream



By BETTY BARCLAY

A basic white sauce can be varied in so many ways to give simple dishes an added flair. When this sauce is made with instant cream it is so easy-to-make that it should quickly become a household favorite. The recipe we are giving today has three versions in thickness: thin, medium or thick sauce. For casserole dishes we suggest the sauce be made in the medium version—and here are a few suggestions for varying a plain white sauce.

With a ham casserole use mustard as a seasoning. Try a cup of grated sharp yellow cheese with 1/4 teaspoon of Worcestershire Sauce for macaroni, spaghetti or noodles. Stir an egg in the sauce for sea-food dishes. The addition

of pimento, parsley or hard-cooked egg makes a perfect garnish for vegetables.

And now for the instant cream white sauce that never lumps.

Instant Cream White Sauce
4 tablespoons instant cream
Flour (see quantity needed below*)

1/2 teaspoon salt
1 cup water
1 tablespoon butter or margarine

*For thin sauce: use 1 tablespoon flour; medium sauce: 2 tablespoons flour; thick sauce: 3 tablespoons flour.

Method: Mix instant cream, flour, salt in saucepan. Add water. Cook and stir until mixture boils and is thickened. Add butter. Makes 1 cup sauce.

Wide Roof Overhang Helps Houses Beat Summer Heat

Architects and builders throughout the country recognize the value of a wide roof overhang in combatting summer heat in the home.

An overhang of sufficient width shades walls and windows in mid-summer when the sun is highest and hottest.

Because maximum protection from mid-summer heat is important to the entire family, the value of a wide roof overhang is worth remembering if you are planning to buy, build or remodel a home.

Equally important weapons in the battle against summer heat are:

1. Ventilation. A roof should be pitched high enough to permit installation of louvers in the gable ends. The louvers allow hot air to escape and help keep air circulating freely above the living areas of the house.

2. Insulation. Properly-installed insulation in the attic is an effective barrier against summer heat coming into living areas below. In winter, insulation helps keep heat inside.

Tricks With Color

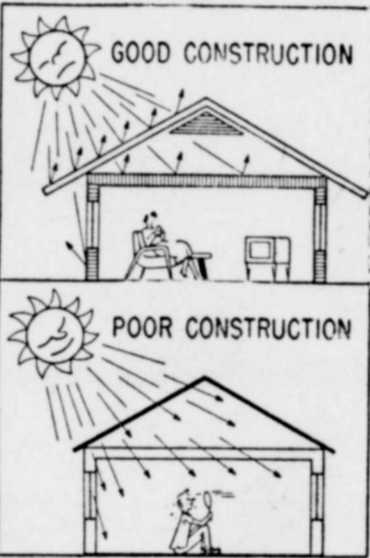
Many leading architects recommend combining wide roof overhangs with light colored asphalt shingles to combat summer heat as well as to make small houses look larger and more dramatic.

Specialists in color styling point out that a roof of lighter and brighter color draws the eye upward, making a low house appear taller. In much the same way, a dark colored roof has the effect of making a tall house look lower.

Asphalt shingles come in a broad range of colors, light and dark. Many architects and home remodelers use the roof as the "color key," choosing the roof color first and selecting the trim paint in a related shade.

Attic Needs Insulation

To gain the full advantages of roof overhangs and light colored asphalt shingles in combatting

heat, the attic should be fully-insulated. In most homes, this can be a project for a husband-and-wife team.

If they want to use the attic for living space, they can install mineral wool batts or blankets, stapling them between the rafters under the roof up to and across the "collar joists." These are the overhead beams in most attics which tie the rafters together. This method of installation leaves an open space above the attic ceiling, permitting air to circulate freely.

Attics too small for expansion, or which the home-owner doesn't need except for storage, can be insulated with mineral wool in the floor. If the floor joints are open, the husband-and-wife team can install batts or blankets. If flooring has been laid, it's more economical to have the wool blown in pneumatically.
