#### City, County Receive Quarter **Mixed Drink Share Rebates**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Tuesday that the more than one and a quarter billion dollars worth of mixed drinks Texans bought during 1981 netted \$125 million in tax revenue for state and local governments last year.

Bullock made the obser vation in returning more than \$10 million in local share rebates of the 10 percent gross receipts tax on mixed drinks to 383 Texas cities and 209 countfor the fourth quarter of

Bailey County received \$426.64 and the City of Muleshoe received \$541.94

#### **Cotton Trading Slows** And Demand Weakens

Trading slowed and demand weakened in Lubbock's spot cotton market during the week ended February 25, according to Mack Bennett, Area Director for USDA's Marketing

Services Office at Lubbock. Growers continued to enter cotton into Commodity Credit's Loan program. An estimated 1.2 million bales of High Plains cotton had entered as Form A. Form G or seed cotton by mid-week. Equity bids ranged from \$4.00 to \$8.00 per bale but no trading was

reported, Bennett said.

U. S. textile mills used

an average of 19,000 running bales of cotton per day during January, up from 15,800 per day in December. Mills used 379,400 bales during the month of January bringing the August - January total to 2,576,000 or about 46 percent of the estimated 5.8 million net weight bales to be used during the 1981 - 82 season.

Homesteads must meet the following qualifications (1) the home must be owned by the person (s) claiming the exemption; (2) the home must be designed or adapted for human residence; (3) the home must actually be used as a residence; and (4) the home must be occupied as the principal residence of an owner who qualified for

the exemption. A residence homestead is a structure, together with the land and improvements, which are used for residential purposes.

Mobile homes, if they meet the qualifications, can be claimed as homesteads even if they are on leased land.

"A taxpayer can still qualify for the exemptions even if a portion of his residence is used for other purposes, such as a business in the home," Jones said. "Additionally, homeowner will not lose the exemption if he temporarily moves away, provided that he INTENDS TO RETURN and does not claim a homestead else-

#### Cotton Council Objects To Weather Ban

The National Cotton Council has raised a strong objection to the National Weather Service's proposed elimination of its agricultural weather program in fiscal 1983.

The proposal is included in the agency's budget recommendatiions now being considered by a House Science and Technology subcommittee chaired by Rep. James H. Scheuer (D-N.Y.).

Council Presient Edward Breihan of Lubbock, Texas, in a letter to the subcommittee chairman this week, described the program as "highly valuable" to farmers as well as consumers.

"It saves farmers hundreds of millions of dollars each year," Breihan stated, "and also means untold additional savings to consumers in terms of increased production lowerprices."

Breihan cited a 1978 study which showed that the availability of timely weather information meant a potential 16 percent savings in cotton-growing costs in Mississippi. In 19-81, he noted, this amounted to nearly \$57 million in savings for only one crop in

#### Scanning Social Security

If you receive Social Security disability checks, remember that these payments can be made only for as long as your medical condition is considered to be disabling under the law. Under a change in the law, most disability cases will be reviewed periodically to make sure requirements are still met.

Some beneficiaries who want to try to work even through still disabled are aided by certain provisions in the law. One allows full benefits to be paid during a nine month trial work period. Another allows many impairment-related work expenses to be deducted from earnings. Also Medicare can continue for up to three years if benefits stop due to work, and payments can quickly be restarted if the work attempt fails within a year after the last benefit check.

If you are a disabled beneficiary whose case comes up for review, you may be asked for information about your condition or for help in getting a recent medical report. Or you may be asked to take a special examination or test at Government expense. It is important that you co-

operate fully if contacted. After the review has been completed, you will receive a written notice of the decision made in your case. If your payments will end, you will first have an opportunity to submit, within ten days, any new information or evidence you feel should be considered. You also have a right to request, within 60 days after receiving a notice you disagree with, a formal reconsideration. You can find out more about this at any Social

#### Brown To Award Cotton Bale On Ag-Day

AUSTIN-If you would like to have a bale of cotton all your own (or the possible \$240 it's worth), Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown will be giving one away March 18 as part of the state's observance of Agriculture

Brown is the state chairman of Agriculture Day, a nationwide recognition of the contribution of agriculture to the U.S. economy. The theme for this state is "Agriculture--It's Your Heartbeat, Texas."

The Lamesa Cotton Growers Association is donating the 480-pound bale. The average price of cotton today, depending on grade, is about 50 cents per pound.

"Persons interested in becoming instant cotton farmers will have to do some work. They are required to write a postcard full of

reasons why agriculture is important to Texas," Brown

"The Lamesa growers will get the bale to the Capitol, but the winner will be responsible for transporting it from there, storing it and finding a buyer," Brown said.

"The winner will be facing the same challenge that farmers have now in finding the buyer with the best price. We'll give some suggestions, but the owner will handle all of the negotiations for sale."





#### 'Cliffhanger' Announced By Six Flags Over Texas

The world's first total freefall ride, the Texas Cliffhanger, will debut late this spring at Six Flags Over Texas.

The Arlington theme park's general manager, Ray Williams, said the towering, 2.1 million dollar ride will give thrillseekers "the same falling sensation they would feel if they stepped of the top of a nine-story building."

Williams said the ride has no precedent in the industry. "Even our loop coaster," he said, "had 'ancestors' that were built around the turn of the century, but there's nothing in amusement ride history which resembles the Texas Cliffhanger."

Williams, who recently rode the prototype model of the ride at the Intamin AG factory near Geneva, Switzerland, said, "The sensation is unlike anvthing developed up to now. There's no way to compare

Williams said the computer safety systems engineered into the ride are "state of art" devices.

He said 103 electronic sensors send messages to the computer during each ride cycle.

Some of the sensors detect the ride's speed. Others give the computer information on the exact location of each gondola.

"If the computer isn't satisfied with the ride's operation, it will temporarily close it down," liams commented.

Williams said the ride is currently on its way. by ship from Europe to Texas. Foundations for the 110ton structure have already been poured.

After construction is completed, extensive tests will be conducted before the ride is opened to the

public in late April. The Texas Cliffhanger will occupy a site on the edge of Six Flags' Boom-





#### Springtime Brings Poison Hazards For Children

Children are loving active creatures, unfortunately they can also eat and drink peculiar things. "We see children eating plants, medicines, cleaning agents as well as soap, bugs and all sorts of other things," said Michael Ellis, Director of the Texas State Poison Center.

In 1981 the Poison Center received some 21,000 poisoning calls. "About 75 percent of these inquiries are about children under five years old," Ellis noted. "Many of the accidental ingestions by children are of little consequence, but some can be lifethreatening. Liquid furniture polishes, lamp oil, gasoline and other oil-based products can kill with as little as one sip."

Springtime can be a particularly bad time of the year. "Blooming plants, fertilizers, plant foods, insecticides, and gasoline ingestions become almost epidemic this time of year,"said Ellis, "along with the numerous house-



and before May 1. School districts grant a \$5,000 general homestead exemption to all qualified homeowners. A \$10,000 school homestead exemption is offered to citizens 65 years or older and to disabled persons.

An advantage associated with the over 65 exemption is that senior citizens receive a "tax freeze or tax ceiling" on the school taxes they are assessed in the first year of qualification. Although the assessed valuation of their homesteads are free to fluctuate with the market, the school taxes will not increase.

An exception to this would be the addition of an improvement, excluding repairs or general maintenance. In that case, the value of the new improvement would be taxes at the current rate and added to the previous tax ceiling to create a new ceiling.

Counties offer a \$3,000 general homestead exemption to all taxpayers. This exemption can be granted only on the portion of the county tax levied for farmto -market roads/flood

Many taxing units, in addition, may offer the new local-option homestead exemption based on a percentage of the home's value. Due to a constitutional amendment passed in last November's general election, any taxing unit may exempt UP TO 40 and percent of the value of all homesteads. No matter the percentages, the exemption must be at least \$5,000 and this exemption is granted at the option of each taxing unit's governing body.

However, as of this writing, the The Journal has no knowledge of any new homestead exemption being offered in addition to the original homestead exemption in the Bailey County Appraisal District.

#### Indennity Rates Adopted On Brucellosis

New indemnity rates for animals slaughtered because of brucellosis have been adopted by the Texas **Animal Health Commission** on an emergency basis.

They are: grade beef \$50 compared to \$62 for the previous rate; grade dairy \$250, compared to \$368 for the previous rate; purebred \$500; this compares to an average rate of \$744 for the previous rate.

The indemnity rates are paid with federal funds; no state money is involved. These changes will allow the savings in the federal indemnity rates to be used in other phases of the Texas brucellosis program.

Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Aniaml Health Commission explained the emergency changes have become nec essary so that the fee basis testing program and first point testing programs can be continued at their present financial levels. He said the Commission is seeking to make this rule change permanent.



The agency requested \$611.5 million in construction funds -- an increase of \$137.2 million above the current budget. Emphasis will be on six major modernization and replacement projects, eight projects to correct fire and safety code deficiencies. four additional nursing home units and the Albu-

querque medical center. The agency plans to open new national cemeteries during fiscal 1983 at Indiantown Gap, Pennsylvania, and at Quantico, Virginia. The budget also seeks funds for further development at Fort Snelling National Cemetery in

Minnesota. Overall VA employment will increase by 955 during the fiscal year to a total of 218,420. Department of Medicine and Surgery employees will increase by 1,167 and Department of Veterans Benefits employment will decline by 218 persons, reflecting the decrease in GI Bill education

The budget also proposes other savings of about \$26 million by means of legislative changes.

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
