Eagles Beat Forsan 53 To 34 Last Friday

PLAY CRISTOVAL HERE TONIGHT

The Sterling City Eagles overcame the Forsan Buffaloes 51-34 last Friday night there to hurdle possibly the last major obstacle in the race for district champs.

The Eagles play Cristoval here tonight at 8 and go to Mertzon for a tangle with the Hornets. That is the final game of the district play.

Should the Eagles win the next two games they will have the conference sacked up in a big way—in fact one more win will do the job.

At Forsan, Coach Young's boys got in the lead early and kept it throughout the four quarters.

Bill Young racked up 24 points; Wilbur Stone made 12; Lynn Glass accounted for 8 and Jim McWhorter 7 points.

Ronnie Howard was Forsan's leading point-maker with 14. Travis Schafer got 13 and Pat Brunson 7.

Wilbur Stone and Marvin Foster received injuries in the game. Marvin had to have some fluid drained off one of his knees here in the hospital as a result of his knee injury. His knee injury will keep him out of the next game or two.

Eaglets Finish Season With Win Over Forsan Tuesday Night

The Sterling City Junior High boys went to Forsan Tuesday night to play the final game of this year's series with the Forsan juniors. They returned with a victory of 19-6.

Worst Industrial Fires Doubled Loss Last Year

There were 78 large loss (over \$250,000 each) industrial fires in the United States and Canada during 1955 that took the lives of 22 persons, injured 181 and added up to \$76,578,000 in waste dollars. The loss is more than twice the \$36,144,500 caused by the 75 industrial large loss fires in 1954.

The annual study of such fires by the National Fire Protection Association tells a tragic—though interesting—story.

It emphasizes the fact that a majority of the "big" fires were small starting fires that grew out of control because there were no means of limiting horizontal fire spread.

And in most of the multi-storied buildings damaged or destroyed in last year's "big" fires, unprotected vertical openings aided fire spread; most common among these were open elevator shafts and stairways not enclosed.

Grand Jury Indicts Three Monday

The grand jury indicted three persons here Monday morning and presumably finished their work at an early hour. Two of the men indicted, William Jackson Smith and Robert Ray Jackson, both 26 and both of Denton, were indicted on a charge of burglarizing the Walraven Station here last July 12. Both men pleaded guilty and received two years in the penitentiary after waiving the statutory waiting period between indictment and trial. Cliff Tupper of San Angelo acted as court-appointed attorney for the two men.

The grand jury also indicted one other person—Orbery Glenn Walker of Carleton. He was charged with second offense drunk driving.

District attorney Aubrey Stokes said Walker was arrested near here September 21 by Highway Patrolmen Jim Cantrell and H. A. Anthony. Walker previously was convicted on charge of drunk driving in Eastland County September 21, 1954.

Criminal trials that might come up for trial will be tried in the court here beginning November 19, it was said.

Monday To Be Holiday In Sterling City

Monday, November 12, will be observed in Sterling City by the merchants as one of the regularly observed holidays. The bank, post office and stores will all close for the double holiday. Formerly called Armistice Day, the day is now known as Veteran's Day and some towns and cities observe it as a holiday, and some do not.

Sterling Goes for Ike 223 to 150 Tuesday

Sterling County voters repeated the 52 voting and again gave Dwight D. Eisenhower a majority of 3 to 2 over his Democratic opponent, Adlai Stevenson. In 1952 Sterling went for Eisenhower 277 to 158 for Adlai, about two to one.

Aside from the presidential race, Sterling voters stayed in the Democratic column, giving large votes to Democratic nominees. For instance, Price Daniel, Democratic nominee for governor, got 280 votes to 24 for the Republican—Bryant and 75 for W. Lee O'Daniel as a write-in.

Sterling Countians gave all the proposed eight amendments a majority except one. The one giving the University of Texas regents power to invest the school's permanent fund in common stocks and bonds, etc. was turned down by the voters here 131 to 124. The teacher retirement amendment was given approval of 269 to 54 by the voters.

Statewide all eight amendments carried. Texas went for Ike in a bigger way than in 1952 and Price Daniel got the governors chair by a large majority.

SOIL BANK PAYMENTS ARE TO BE COUNTED AS INCOME BY SOCIAL SECURITY

Payments of two types to farmers under the "soil bank" crop reduction plans are counted as net earnings in computing earnings for social security insurance benefit payments, and payments of a third type may be counted under certain conditions, according to Floyd B. Ellington, district manager of the Social Security Administration in San Angelo, who said many inquiries had been received on this subject.

The soil bank payments to be counted as net earnings by self-employed farm operators are those made under the "acreage reserve" program and the annual payments for land placed in the "conservation reserve", Ellington said. "These payments replace income which the farmer reasonably could have expected if his land had been kept in normal crop use."

A third type of soil bank payment is the conservation-reserve reimbursement payment. These are payments made by the Federal Government to pay part of the cost of carrying out the conservation practices and making improvements on the conservation reserve. They are included in figuring the farmers' net earnings only if the expenditures are deductible as business expenses for income tax purposes.

A landlord who owns a farm and participates materially in the production or management of production of farm commodities gets social security credit for his share of the soil bank payments just as the farm operator does, Ellington pointed out. For a farm owner who receives rental income but who takes no part in the actual operation of the farm, neither the soil bank payments nor the other rental income counts toward social security benefits.

GRAIN FED STEERS SLOW; OTHER CATTLE, CALVES STRONGER

FORT WORTH—When a cattle feeder dreams these days, he usually envisions nightmares that include tidal waves of hogs, a hurricane of turkeys, and when he turns to flee he runs into a wall of broiler chickens that seems about to topple over on him.

As meat production reaches its high tide this fall the record crop of turkeys and heavy broiler output all over the nation have put an added volume of meat before the consumer and in the near future are the holidays, Thanksgiving and Christmas, which always develop chaotic conditions in the meat trade as fowl, game and other competitive foods disrupt the regular family fare.

Despite a sharp drop cattle receipts around the major market circle Monday fed cattle were attracting lower bids from most national packers, and improvement in prices was limited to cows, bulls, and slaughter calves. These classes were strong to 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday as rains in much of the territory curtailed supplies. Stockers and feeders held steady to strong.

Comparative prices: Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings and steers \$17 to \$23.50, a few prime to \$25. Common and medium butcher steers and yearlings \$11.00—16.50; Fat cows \$10.00—13.00; canners and cutters \$7.00—10.00; bulls \$9.00—12.50; good and choice slaughter calves \$15.00—19.50; cull, common and medium \$8.00—14.50. Stocker steer calves \$19.00 down; steer yearlings \$17.50 down. Stocker cows \$7.00—10.00.

HOGS OPEN HIGHER AS SUPPLY LIGHTER IN CORNBELT

Swine receipts around the major marketing circle Monday were about 20 percent below the same day a week earlier, and this was worth about 50 cents per hundred to Texas hogmen. Top hogs at Fort Worth scored \$15.75, and the less desirable weights and kinds sold from \$13 to \$15.50. Sows were also stronger getting mostly \$14 to \$14.50.

Cornbelt points reported a considerable drop in receipts, and this amounted to about 26,000 hogs.

SHEEP AND LAMBS FULLY STEADY TO STRONG AT FORT WORTH

Rainy weather in a good deal of the territory held receipts to a fraction of most recent sessions at Fort Worth Monday and prices were steady to strong kinds considered in the sheep division.

Good and choice slaughter lambs sold from \$18 to \$20, and cull, common and medium offerings sold from \$10 to \$17. Stocker and feeder lambs were reported from \$13 to \$16, however, choice feeders were quoted to \$17 and above. Slaughter ewes sold from \$5 to \$5.75. Other grades and classes were scarce.

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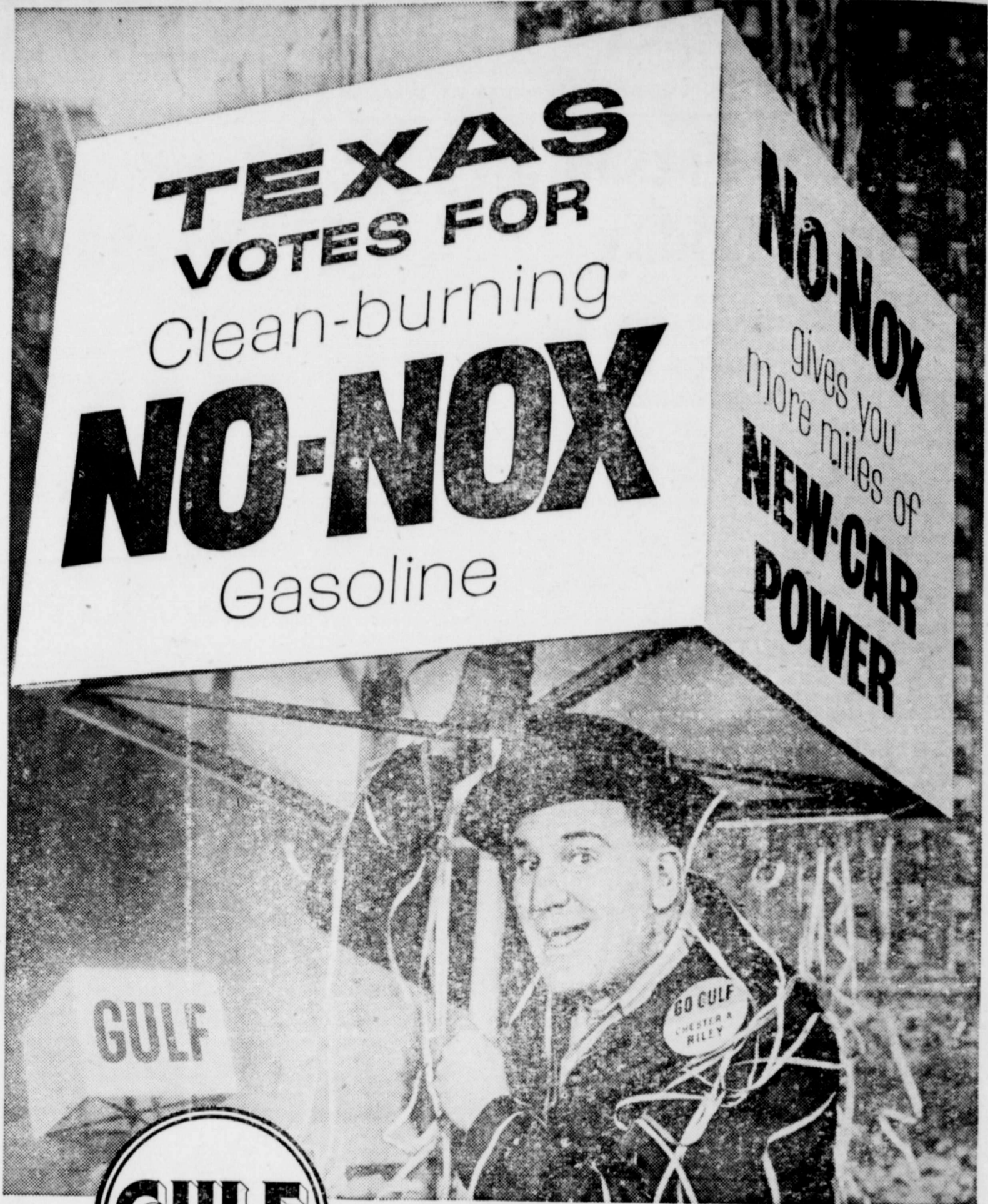

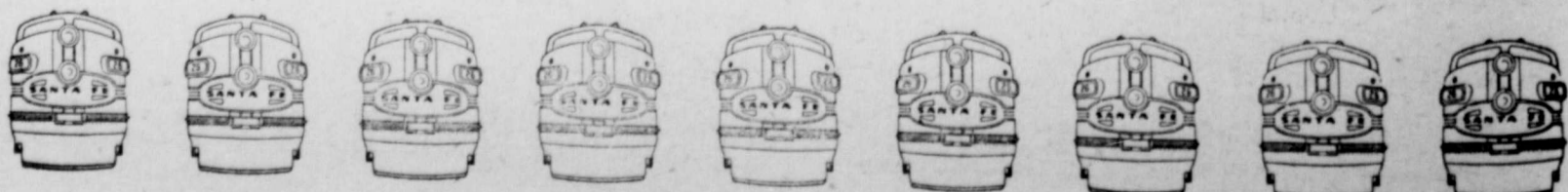

(The Krak can also be visited in a long day's trip from Beirut or Damascus.) A real storybook castle, the Krak has a moat and drawbridge, towers, turrets, a massive keep, chapels and walls from which there is a sweeping view in all directions of the rolling Syrian plains. From Tripoli visits can also be made to Safita, which now houses a Greek Orthodox Church, and to Chastel Rouge. Tripoli has a castle of its own, high on a hill overlooking green orange groves and the harbor.

Castles of the South can be visited from Beirut, Lebanon, as a base city. In half a day you can visit the Sidon Sea Castle, which juts out into the Mediterranean and is reached by a rock causeway, and Beaufort Castle on a craggy mountaintop guarding inland passes and overlooking the distant sea. At Byblos, a thirty-minute drive from Beirut, there is also a small Crusader Castle standing amid Phoenician and Roman ruins. 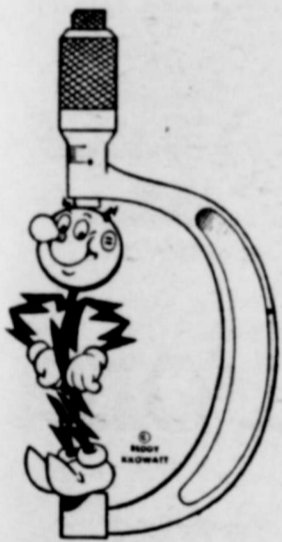
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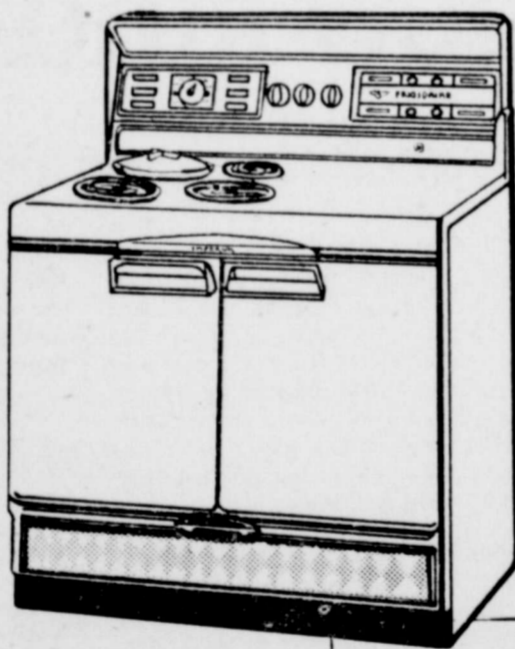

Crusader Castles Are Great Sights Of Bible Lands

Among the Bible Lands most fascinating attractions are some thirty Crusader Castles which dot the countryside from the northern borders of Syria as far south as the Gulf of Aqaba in Jordan. Built by the Crusaders in two hundred years of tireless activity (1097-1291 A.D.), these castles sometimes stand on almost inaccessible mountain peaks 6,000 feet high, sometimes are lapped at their foundations by the waves of the Mediterranean.

Crusader Castles once guarded the pilgrimage route to the Holy Places of Jerusalem, defending mountain passes and the coastal plains from the Moslems, offering hospitality and succor to pilgrims and sheltering neighboring villages when wars threatened the countryside. The most famous castle-builders of the period were the Knights Templars and Knights Hospitalers, two powerful monastic orders of the 12th and 13th centuries. The base city for the northern castles is Latakia, Syria's seaport on the Mediterranean. From here Sahyoun Castle can be visited in a half-day trip. It is distinguished by its dramatic rock-needle which once supported a drawbridge across a rock-cut channel 90 feet deep and 60 feet wide. In a day both the Castle of Markab, on a basalt mountain ridge overlooking the Mediterranean, and the Templars Castle and Crusader Church of Tartus can be visited. The Crusader Church, which is Gothic and very beautiful, should not be missed.

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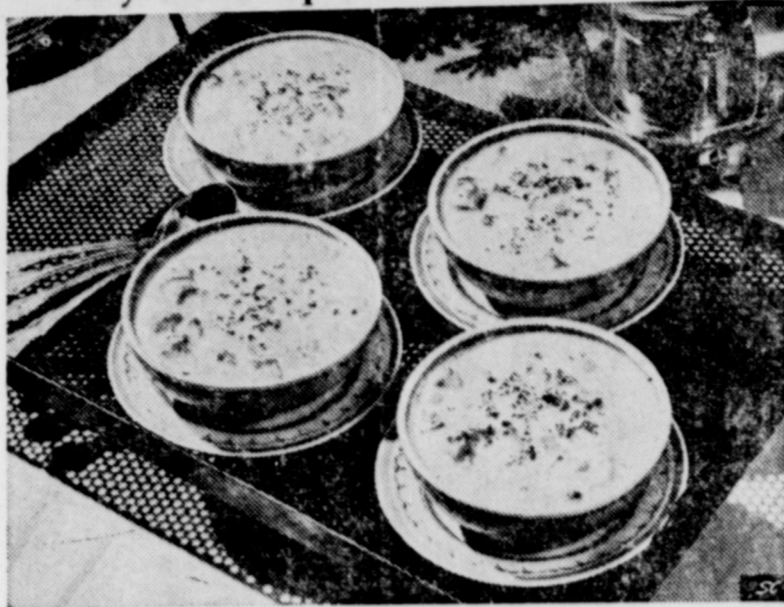

| Dash of cayenne | 1 cup coarsely chopped oysters (1-1/4 cups whole oysters) |

2 tablespoons butter

Combine quick-cooking tapioca, salt, paprika, cayenne, onion, milk, and cream in top of double boiler. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook 10 to 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Add oysters and butter and mix. Keep over hot water 15 to 20 minutes, to heat thoroughly and blend flavors. Serve in cups or bowls. Garnish with chopped parsley or a dash of paprika, if desired. Makes about 5 cups, or 4 to 6 servings.

Note: If a thinner bisque is desired, add additional milk or light cream.

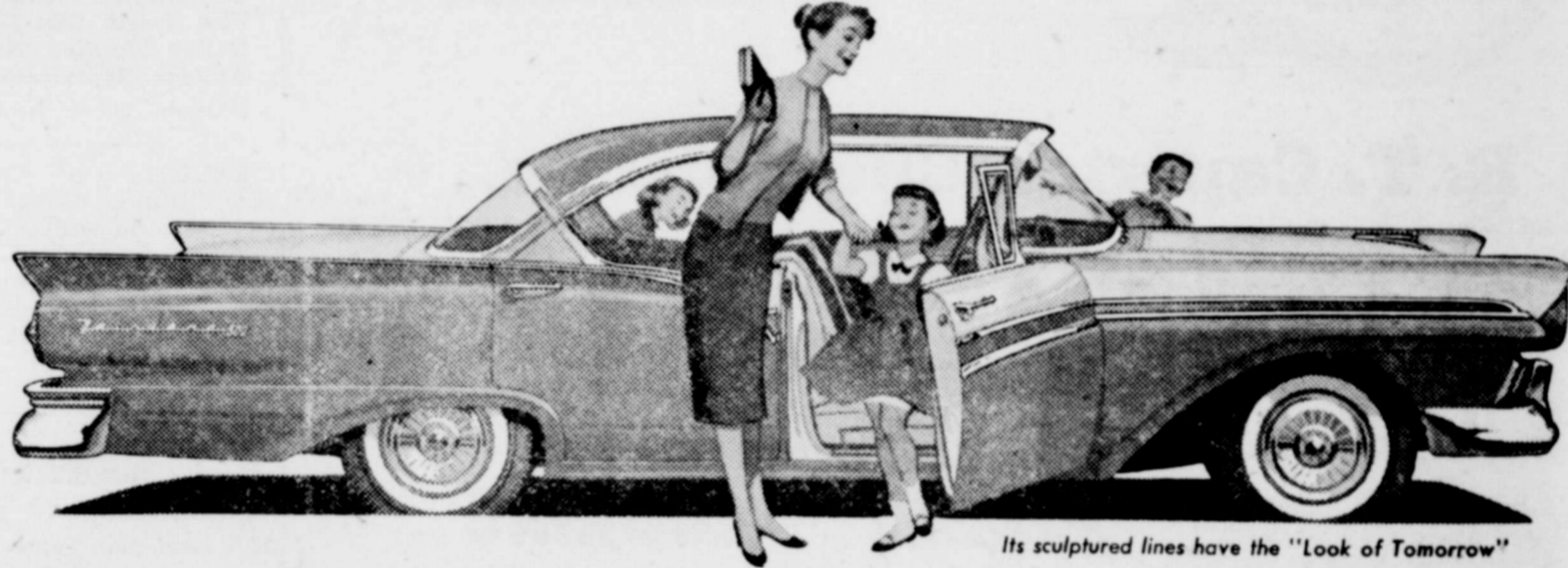

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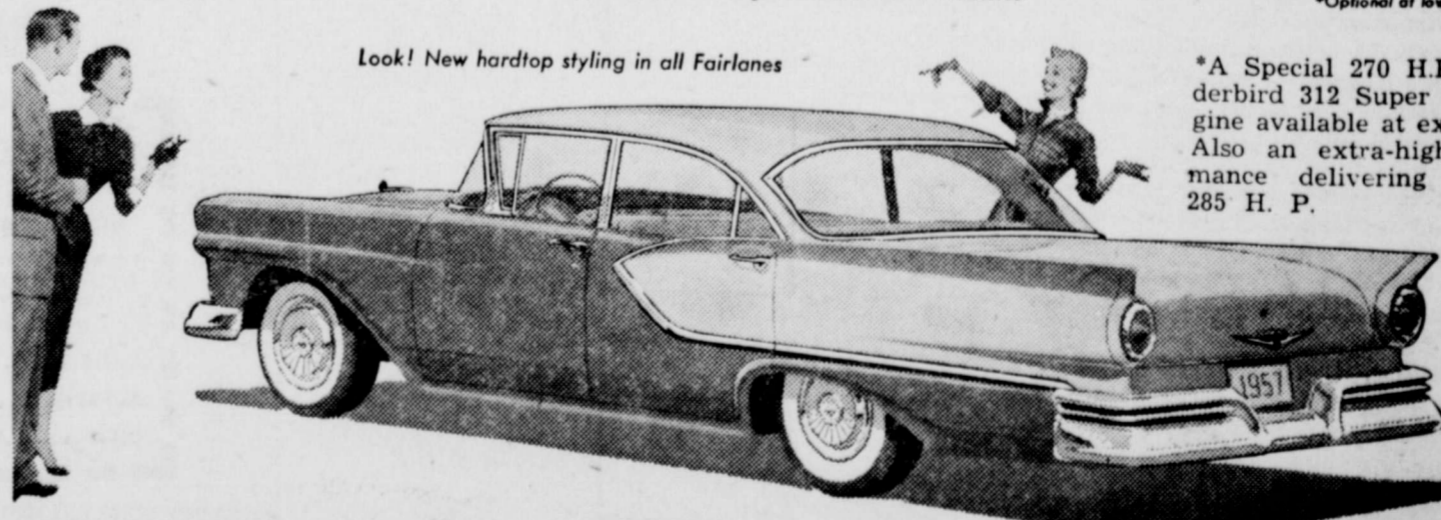

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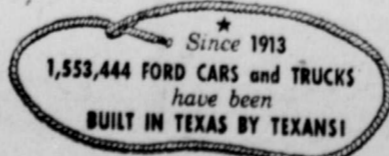
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
