The Rev. L. D. (Happy) Hardt, 67, father of Mrs. L. S. Dubberly, died Thursday morning of last week at the Mason Memorial Hospital in Mason.

Funeral services were held last Friday in Art Methodist Church of Mason, where the Rev. Mr. Hardt had been pastor for the last two and one-half years. Burial was in Castell Cemetery.

The Rev. Mr. Hardt was born Feb. 6, 1889 in Yancey, Tex. He had been a minister in the Southwest Conference since 1921. During that time he served as superintendent of the Bexar County Training School for Boys between 1947 and 1949.

Survivors include his wife, the former Lydia Vetter; a son, Oliver Hardt of San Antonio; three daughters, Mrs. L. S. Dubberly of Ster-

ling City, Mrs. W. R. Miller of Ft. Worth, and Mrs. N. L. Davenport of Boatman, Okla.; a sister, Miss Alice Hardt of Fredericksburg; four brothers, the Rev. D. G. Hardt of Centerpoint, A. J. Hardt of Hondo, Dr. H. B. Hardt of Fort Worth and the Rev. C. T. Hardt of Alice; and eight grandchildren.

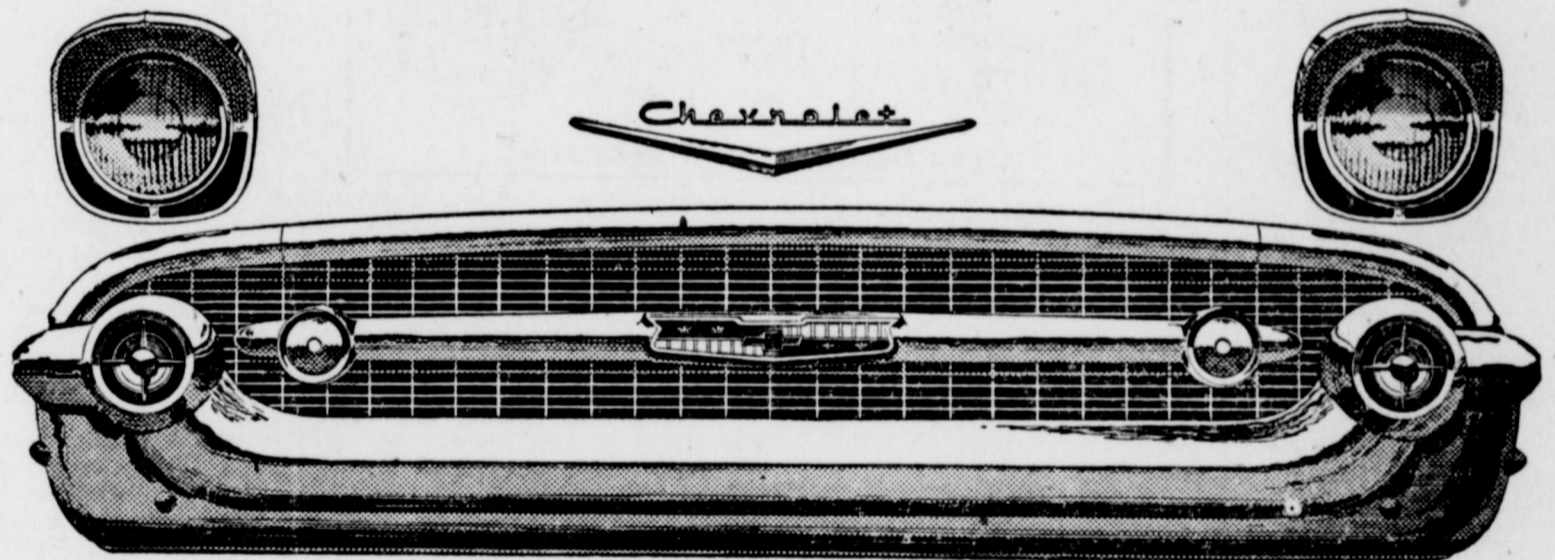

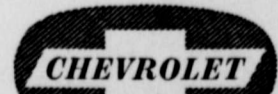

NOTICE OF ELECTION

The State of Texas: County of Sterling: City of Sterling City: To the resident, qualified electors of the City of Sterling City, Texas, who own taxable property in said city and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Sterling City, Texas, on the 26 day of January, 1957, on the propositions and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the City Council of the City of Sterling City on the 7 day of January, 1957, calling said election, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION

Calling an election on the question of the issuance of \$80,000 waterworks system revenue bonds; and \$80,000 waterworks system tax bonds.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of the said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned:

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas:

1. That an election be held in said City of Sterling City, Texas, on the 26 day of January, 1957, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION NO. 1

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$80,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five and One-Half (5½%) per cent per annum, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System for said City, to be issued in accordance with and secured in the manner provided in Articles 1111-1118, both inclusive, of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, as amended, each bond to be conditioned that the holder thereof shall never have the right to demand payment of said obligation out of funds raised or to be raised by taxation, secured by a pledge of the net revenues from the operation of said Waterworks System.'

PROPOSITION NO. 2

'Shall the City Council of the City of Sterling City, Texas, be authorized to issue the bonds of said City in the amount of \$80,000.00, maturing serially in such installments as may be fixed by the City Council, the maximum maturity date being not more than Thirty Five (35) years from their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed Five and One-Half (5½%) per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest as it accrues and principal as it matures on said issue of bonds, for the purpose of constructing a Waterworks System for said City, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.'

2. That said election shall be held at the Sterling County Courthouse, within said City, and the following named persons are hereby appointed directors of said election:

P. R. Brown, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Taylor Garrett, Assistant Judge,

Mrs. W.L. Martin, Clerk, Mrs. C. T. Williams, Clerk.

3. The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended, including the provisions of Article 704, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, and only legally qualified electors who own taxable property in the City and

who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be qualified to vote.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 'FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS'

'AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM REVENUE BONDS'

PROPOSITION NO. 2 'FOR THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM TAX BONDS'

'AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF WATERWORKS SYSTEM TAX BONDS'

Concerning each of the above propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or black pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice shall be given in accordance with Article 704, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended by Chapter 382, passed at the First Called Session of the Forty Fourth Legislature, supra. The Mayor is authorized and directed to have a copy of said notice posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within said City not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for holding said election. He shall also cause said notice to be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Article 704, as amended, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the laws governing general elections.

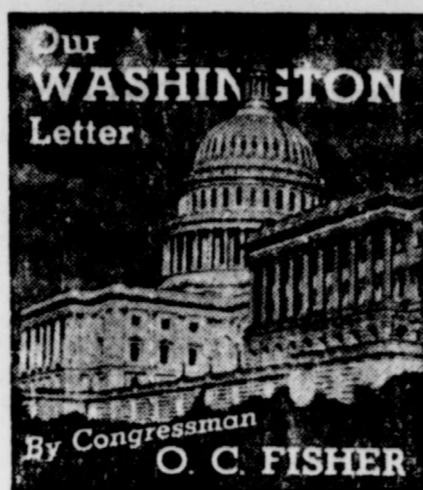

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THE NEW CONGRESS, amid world tensions and political dust-settling, got off to the usual start last week. The House was organized in an atmosphere marked by harmony, while over in the Senate a group of political-minded Senators went through the motion of trying to attract negro votes by hankering for a change in rules that would clear the track for some vote-catching civil rights bills. They were soundly licked but their purpose was served.

In fact, I don't know what these chronic, professional civil righters would do for an issue at election time if their bills should be enacted. Just like some professional labor leaders who use the Taft-Hartley Act to keep union drives stirred up to a fever pitch. On at least two occasions in the past 7 years amendments to Taft-Hartley were cleared for passage, designed to water down the alleged harshness of that law, only to be blocked by labor leaders who apparently did not want to lose a good talking point in the law as it is.

THE PRESIDENT'S address on Saturday was the first time in modern history that a President has appeared before a joint session of the Congress preceding his annual State-of-the-Union message. Calling for an expression from Congress giving him as Commander-in-Chief authority to use troops, if need be, to prevent Russian aggression in the Middle East, the President was well received.

I plan to vote in favor of the resolution when it comes up for action in the House. The main point now is that favorable action will show American strength and unity to the Russians and add to the president's prestige in world conferences and negotiations that will

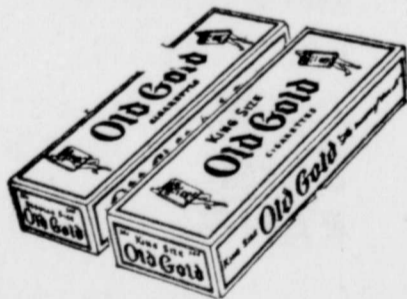
