## Free Chest X-Rays Here Next Week

Two Days, Feb. 27-28

All residents of Sterling County may have a free chest X-Ray on the afternoon of February 27 or the morning of February 28—at the Sterling Motor Company showroom.

Of course, the object of the chest X-Rays is to discover any hidden sign of tuberculosis. Other troubles, such as lung cancer or enlarged hearts, sometimes show up in the films, giving the person his first knowledge of such condition.

The X-Rays are sponsored by the Noratadata Club locally and are under the supervision of the unit from the State Department of Health. This will make the third time the unit has been in Sterling City in the last few years, and it is hoped to make it an annual affair. T.B. could eventually be controlled or stamped out in Texas if all citizens would have regular X-Rays and follow-up treatment.

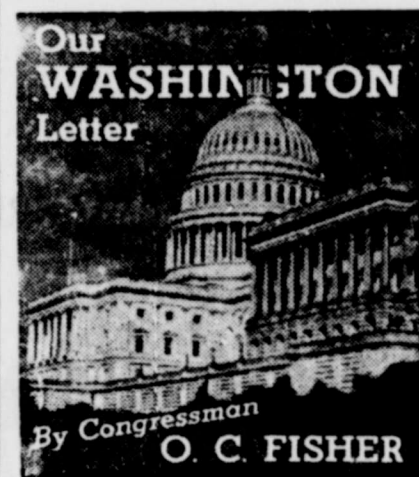

## GOOD RAINS FALL

Good rains have been falling for about a week, giving hopes to the parched ranchers and farmers of West Texas for a rainy year. The rains have all fallen slowly, fallen over most of Texas, and have done more good than the gauged amount indicates. The fall here in town has been between .60 and one inch, and in areas south of town more than two inches have been recorded. The rains, coupled with those earlier, have made grass and weeds green up the country side and indications are that more is yet to come.

More rain has fallen in February in parts of West Texas than has ever before been recorded. As a rule, February is not a rainy month and hopes are high for a bumper year—as regards rain—in 1957.

The comparatively mild winter, and the damp rainy weather, has put the soil in good shape and the prospects are looking up for some feedstuff showing up soon. Just in time for those lambing in the next few weeks. With stock numbers at a low ebb, and many pastures deferred—practically—the country could make a good showing if enough of the rains keep coming.



A LIVELY RUNNING BATTLE is developing in the House between free spenders and the budget-cutters, as hearings get underway on the big money bills. Faced with the biggest peace-time budget in history (\$71.8 billion), pruning knives are being sharpened and it now looks like anywhere from two to four billion dollars may be whacked off by the session's end.

There is a good reason for a substantial cut. The budget is too high. A healthy public reaction to the proposed total outlay is indicated on Capitol Hill. Letters are pouring in, they say, from every nook and corner of the land. Most of them write "I don't know just where to do it, but it must be reduced."

There are several soft spots in the budget. Foreign economic aid can be whacked. Public housing can be eliminated. Highway construction can be reduced. School construction assistance can be foregone. The number of Federal employees can be scaled down. Etc. And these economies and others can be had without damaging necessary services and essential spending.

With enough public support, those of us who are determined to trim the budget may get the required votes to accomplish that objective.

JUDGE ROY BEAN of Law-West-of-the-Pecos fame got back in the news the other day when an elert editor down in Vicksburg pictured him as a forerunner of modern day Supreme Court antics. The analogy appears to be both timely and plausible.

Restrained by neither laws nor precedents, the late Langtry Justice made and changed his own laws as whims dictated and as conditions required. And those are prime characteristics of the modern-day Supreme Court, the editor reminds.

Bean, said the Vicksburg wirtler, was the greatest judicial usurper in American history "until the present U.S. Supreme Court and its immediate forebears came into existence."

Yes, concluded the Editor. Roy Bean was the forerunner, the prototype—the first great judicial usurper in American history. And he made it pay.

### \$145,000 for Roads and Right-of-Way Expense

A bond election, calling for the issuance of \$145,000 in county tax bonds, will be held here Saturday, February 23. Voting will be at the usual five boxes over the county.

The court is calling for the bond issue to use for right-of-way expenses, construction, improvements and maintenance of farm-to-market, or lateral roads and bridges.

The sinking fund to pay off the bonds will come from the old farm-to-market tax voted by citizens on July 31, 1951. No raise in the tax structure is contemplated, it was said.

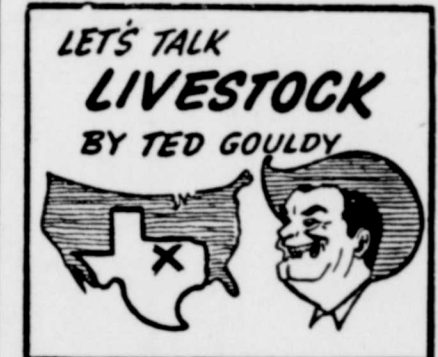
The court, in a letter to the residents, say that it is their intention to issue only the amount of the bonds as actually needed and they hope for a rate of interest not to exceed 3 1/2%.

Residents are eligible who have a poll tax or exemption, and who have property on the county tax rolls.

Voting boxes will be at the court house, Roy Foster's ranch house, Tom Humble's ranch house, Billy Ralph Bynum's ranch house and the N. H. Reed ranch house.

### REPLACEMENT CATTLE ADVANCE ON GOOD NEWS

FORT WORTH—After a week-end of study of the cattle population figures released late last week, coupled with reports of rain across Texas, the people who buy stockers and feeders donned their rose-colored glasses at Fort Worth Monday. Their optimism carried replacement cattle and calves into new high ground and upset packer strategy which included lower prices.

Feeder interests went after fleshy to fat steers and yearlings with the opening siren, and strong to 50 cents higher prices prevailed, with some feeder cattle 50 cents to \$1 ahead of last week. The surge carried slaughter calves along to strong to 50 cents higher prices.

Packers, out on the early rounds offering lower bids, had to pay strong to 50 cents higher prices for fat cattle or face a shutout. Cows also sold on a stronger basis in view of aggressive small packer and shipper demand. Bulls were steady.

### TWO PERCENT FEWER CATTLE IN THE COUNTRY

The most bullish news of the season was contained in the Crop Reporting Board's estimate of 2% fewer cattle on farms in the United States, as of January 1. The USDA in announcing the estimate also pointed out that swine numbers were off 5% compared with a year earlier, milk cow numbers were down 1% and at the lowest levels since 1929. Sheep and lambs were also estimated 2% under a year earlier.

Cattlemen, long critical of the effects of high cattle population estimates, were happy with the figures which revealed 95,166,000 head on farms and ranches down 1,638,000 from last year and the smallest estimate since 1953.

Thirteen Western states were estimated to have 26,370,000 stock sheep, 5% less than a year ago, and the decline was credited to Texas and South Dakota. Texas sheep numbers estimated at 4,374,000, were down 14%.

Hogs on farms January 1 were estimated at 52,207,000 head, down 5% from a year earlier. Cornbelt (Continued on Back Page)

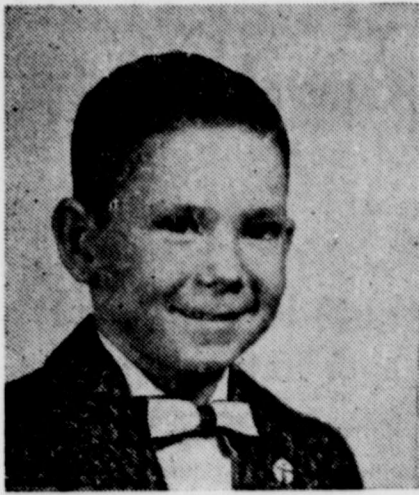

Now is the time to prune your old peach, pear, and plum trees. Trees that are from one to three years of age should be pruned whenever a branch appears at the wrong place even though it be during the growing season but older trees should be pruned during the dormant season and it is not too

late to do that right now. In the case of young trees, those from one to three years of age, it amounts to shaping the tree or training the growth. Branches that appear in places that would cause weak crotches or would interfere with the cultivation of the trees should be removed as soon as they appear.

Pecan trees are not pruned like fruit trees. The only time growth is removed from pecans is when the branches which are coming out would interfere with the cultivation of the tree, spraying, or present a hazard in case of ice storms or overloading. Otherwise the trees are allowed to retain their growth. Pruning stimulates growth and makes for a better balanced tree that is easier to spray or harvest the fruit.

Uncle giveth and uncle taketh away. We read a lot in the papers and magazines about how much the government is giving the farmer but we see very little about how much the government takes from the farmer or rancher. In terms of working hours, the average man on land works one

fourth of the time for the government according to the Tax Foundation. Using the theoretical 48 hour work week, the foundation found that it took twelve hours of work to pay the taxes. The only category that required more time was the family food bill. It took an average of thirteen hours of work to pay the family food bill, seven hours labor to pay the clothing bills, five hours to pay for the family auto and supplies, five hours for household operations, three hours for house furnishings, and there was three hours left for other expenses.

The auction sale of fat lambs, steers, and hogs at San Antonio showed an increase in the average prices paid to the boys and girls in spite of the drouth. Average price for lambs was 50½ cents and for steers the average was 48c. The four champion lambs, finewool, cross, crossbred, and Southdown each sold for \$1000 and the champion steer went for \$7500. These prices were not records, especially in the steer department but the money was spread out down the line better than is usual in a show sale.

Don McDonald sold his 50th place finewool lamb of the boys show for 42c a pound. There were 299 lambs in the finewool class so 50th place is pretty good.

Cecilia McDonald sold her sixth place finewool cross of the open show for 42c a pound also.

Jamie Kay and Freddie Fields sold two lambs through the packer sale for \$20.35 per hundred. The market on lambs that day was quoted at from \$17.50 to \$18.00 on San Antonio's Union Stockyards so all those who sold lambs in the packer sale on the high bid of \$20.35 received a premium of about \$2.50 per hundred.

The auction sales of breeding cattle however reflected the drouth in all sales. Herefords, Polled Herefords, Santa Gertrudis, and Brangus sale averages were all low and there was quite a bit of disappointment expressed by some. However, all the cattle were sold and none were withdrawn as has been the case in some sales. As long as the ranges remain in the present state there is going to be a smaller and smaller demand for breeding cattle and sales will continue to drop. Good general rains will reverse the condition in time.

As an example of how not to make money on a ranch, here's what actually happened to two hill country ranchers. Last year one of these men paid \$675 for a bull (Hereford) at the San Antonio sale of the Texas Hereford Association. He went out of the cattle business due to the drouth and turned strictly to goats. Having no need for the bull he consigned him to the San Antonio sale this year hoping to get some of his money back. A neighbor bought the bull for \$175 so the loss on the bull alone was \$500 not counting the feed he had put into the animal. These men are both ranchers depending on the ranch for a living and not a hobby, but a few deals like this will cause both the rancher and the banker to wonder what he's doing and why he's doing it.

(12 North Cenentral States) reveals a decline of 7% while Iowa, the No. 1 swine state, was off 12% from last year.

**FAT LAMBS CLIMB 50 CENTS AT FORT WORTH**

Trade was active and prices strong at Fort Worth as light supplies of sheep and lambs arrived and reports of beneficial rains in the big sheep country were coming in. Fat lambs were as much as 50 cents higher in spots, as all grades and classes cleared early at strong prices.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$16.50 to \$19, both woolled lambs and some fancy shorn lambs with Fall pelts at the top. Most of the shorn lambs with No. 1 or Fall shorn pelt, sold from \$18.50 down; No. 2 pelt lambs cashed at \$18 down; and No. 3 grades sold from \$17.50 downward. More recently shorn types sold from \$16.50 down.

Cull to medium lambs cashed at \$12 to \$16.50. Stocker and feeder lambs sold from \$16 to \$18.50, woolled feeders at the higher figure, and shorn feeders at \$18 downward when carrying No. 1 or Fall shorn pelts. Yearling muttons sold from \$16 down; and old muttons sold from \$12 down. Slaughter ewes cashed at \$6 to \$8. Old bucks sold from \$5 to \$6.

**HOGS OPEN STEADY; ON TOP PRICE OF \$17.00-17.25**

Hogs continued to move in a narrow range at Fort Worth Monday and choice hogs topped at \$17 and \$17.25. Lighter weights and medium grades cashed at \$15 to \$16.50, and some pigs sold from \$15 down. Sows cashed at \$14.50 to \$15.50. Stags cashed at \$8 to \$11.

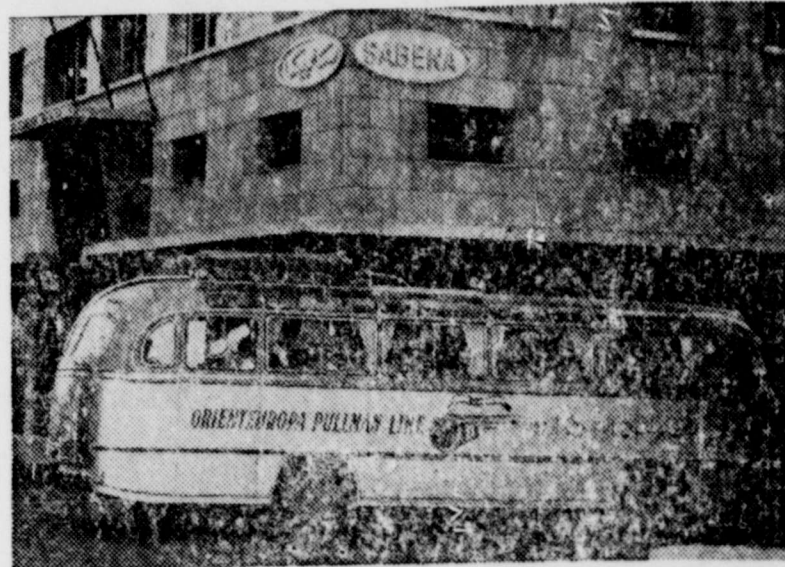

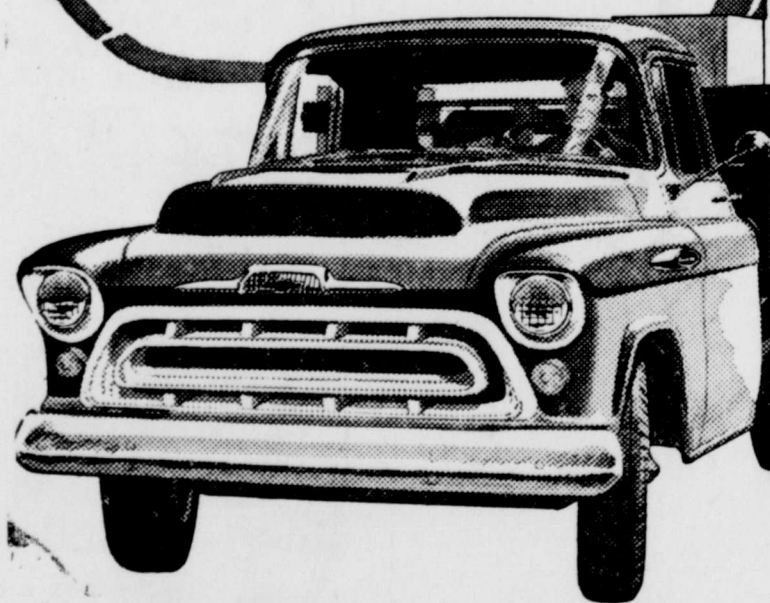

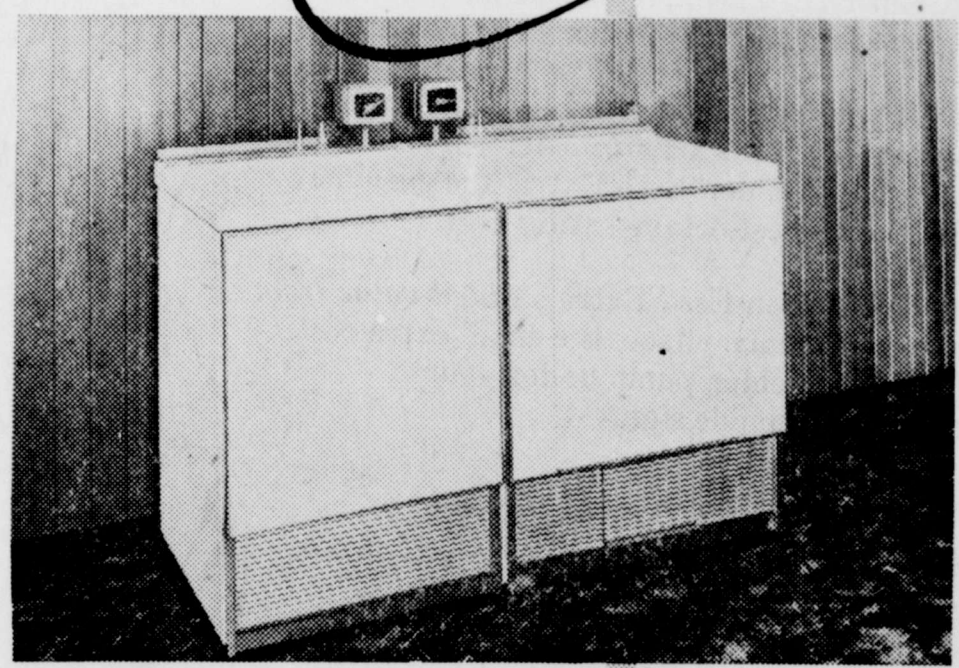
