

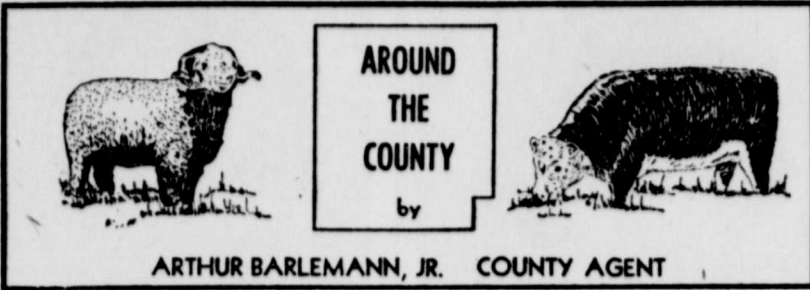

San Angelo rang down the curtain on the spring stock show circuit for 1957. It may have been the last outdoor show and rodeo that will be put on in San Angelo as well. Officials are hopeful that the new coliseum will be ready for use in time for the 1958 show. If the show is going to continue to operate and be a success, a coliseum is a necessity. The weather was fairly kind to them this year; only one dust storm was offered and that one was on Wednesday, actually a day prior to the opening of the show.

The show started a sale this year for a limited number of animals from each class. Happily enough the sale was a success. The top three steers from each class were sold. In the lamb department, the first eight animals in each class were sold. Prices were very good on the lambs while the steers could have had a little more offered on them. All animals were sold by the head or "dollar off." This that the seller got the per head bid and also the packer bid as well. Owners of the animals that were auctioned off received no prize money however.

The champion steer brought \$1,000.00. The champion finewool lamb brought \$500 while the champion crossbred lamb sold for \$400.

Packer bids on the lambs were as follows: Lightweight lambs, under 110 pounds, \$21 per hundred; Medium weight lambs, 110 to 125 pounds, \$19.90; and Heavyweight lambs, over 125 pounds, \$18.40. Earlier in the week the sifted lambs had been bought for \$19.50 on the feeders and \$20.80 on the packers.

Sterling County 4-H Club members did very well considering the competition. Over 900 lambs were entered in the show before the sifting and classification committee began work. Of the 28 Sterling County 4-H Club lambs in the show, seven received ribbons. Three placed high enough to be eligible for the sale.

Placings and classes in which Sterling 4-H clubbers placed were as follows: Heavyweight finewool lambs, over 125 pounds, third—LeRuth Reed, fifth—Jerry Payne, thirteenth—Mitzi Davis. Lightweight finewool lambs, under 110 pounds, seventeenth—LeRuth Reed. Heavyweight crossbred lambs, over 125 pounds, tenth—Cecilia McDonald, twentieth—Don McDonald. Lightweight crossbred lambs, under 110 pounds—fourth Don McDonald.

In the auction sale on Saturday morning LeRuth, Jerry and Don were allowed to sell their lambs individually since they had placed better than eighth in their class. Each of their lambs sold for \$100. LeRuth's was bought by Hemphill-Wells, Jerry's by Joe Blakeny Wool Warehouse and Don's by M System Grocers. The remainder of the lambs which were owned by the mentioned club owners in addition to Reynolds Lee Foster, Mitzi Davis, David Drennan, Freddie Fields, Carolyn Payne, Kenneth Fincher, Clayton Stewart, Cecilia McDonald and Jamie Kay Fields were sold on the packer bids quoted earlier.

Wool production in Texas in 1956 was estimated at 42,653,000 pounds or six per cent lower than the 1955 production of 45,137,000 pounds. Average fleece weight for the state was the same as 1955—8.1 lbs. However this is an increase of .4 pound over the ten year average of 7.7 lbs. for the ten years 1945-1954. Average price for Texas wool for the period April 1956 to January 1957 was 44 cents per pound or one cent better than the season previous.

The average fleece weight of 8.1 pounds for Texas is an improvement over previous years but it still falls short of the United States average of 8.52 lbs. This indicates that improvement is being made in our flocks but that there is also room left for more improvement if we hope to come up to the national average of which we are .42 lb. short for the last year. The average price nationwide was 42.6 cents which is 1.4 cents less than received for the Texas crop. This indicates that preparation of Texas wool for

FFA Boys Show 36 Lambs at San Angelo

Sterling City FFA members exhibited 36 fat lambs and three registered ewes at the San Angelo Fat Stock Show last week.

Members exhibiting fat lambs were Tony Allen, Bill Davis, Wayland Drennan, Calvin Gaston, Robert Quintana, Alfred Chapple, Jodie Emery, Wayne Drennan, W. G. Fincher, Lynn Glass, David Grunty, Lewis Petmecky and Wilbur Stone. Tony Allen exhibited 3 registered Rambouillet ewes.

Jodie Emery placed 13th with a heavyweight finewool lamb; W. G. Fincher placed 9th with a heavy crossbred lamb and Bill Davis placed 16th with a medium weight crossbred lamb.

The Livestock Judging Team entered the contest held in conjunction with the San Angelo Fat Stock Show on Saturday, March 9. Team members were Marvin and Melvin Foster Jodie Emery and Bill Davis. Scores were given for the first five place teams. We did not get into that category. The total team score was 1461 points out of a possible 1800. The first place team had a score of 1522 points, and the fifth place team had a score of 1476, just 15 points ahead of us.

On an individual basis, Melvin Foster was the high scoring team member with 498 out of a possible 600. Marvin stood second with 487; Bill Davis third with 476 and Jodie Emery scored 462. In beef cattle Melvin scored 270 out of a possible 300, just six points below the top individual in the contest. Bill was our high man in the sheep judging with 242 out of a possible 300 points.

The boys are progressing nicely in their judging work, and while they may not come home with the first place banner, we feel that they will come close to winning a contest, and even more important, will learn to evaluate livestock on a basis of sound judgment for use in later years.

A little more care at the shearing pen, in bagging the wool, sorting out the short fleeces and the tags will all continue to help. To increase the average fleece weight, more work is going to be necessary in the fall when the bucks are turned in. Careful selection of the right type of ewe will help raise the average fleec weight. Selection of we lambs for the replacement flock will be the big factor here. The best bucks in the world, if used on inferior ewes, will add little to the lamb crop.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



FOR THE SECOND time in two months the House last week gave solid backing to this country's warning against the threatened take-over of the oil-rich strategic Mid-East. The whopping vote also served as an answer to the protest leveled at the Resolution by Russia's Khrushchov and Red China's Chou. Observers see this move as a declaration of war on Communism in all areas.

CHANCES FOR CUTS in the budget seem to improve by the day. Last week President Eisenhower did the unusual thing of suggesting that the Congress should see about some trimming of his own \$71.8 billion budget and the House Appropriations committee fired back a request that the President be more specific.

Then, the House G.O.P. Policy Committee, in an attempt to grab away some of the thunder from the Democrats, called for a substantial cut. That is a good sign because it adds to the tempo of the case for budget-cutting.

The question is—where should the ax fall?

First, upwards of a billion can be saved by scuttling the proposed federal school construction aid bill. The mammoth highway construction program, which is largely self-financing, can easily be trimmed a bit. Two or three billion can be whacked from foreign aid. The expensive and unnecessary public housing program can be eliminated. And so on. I shall support all of these moves. We should be able to reduce the budget by from three to five billion dollars.

FORMER VICE PRESIDENT John Nance Garner, in a featured interview in the U.S. News & World Report, plugged for reduced spending. That stand, coming from one of America's foremost authorities on common sense financing, should help us in our current economy drive.

CAPERTON ATTENDS CAR DEALERS PLANNING MEETING

R. T. Caperton returned last week end from Dallas where he acted as spokesman for fellow dealers of his zone at a meeting of the Chevrolet Dealer Planning Committee.

Caperton was elected to the committee by Chevrolet dealers of his district under a nationwide program which the country's leading automobile and truck producer pioneered in the industry in 1937. REVENGE!

Producers for A Free Market

The Headlight, of Horton, Kansas reports that "production of beef cattle in the United States has increased and improved every year since cattle numbers took an upward turn in 1949."

Production of other kinds of livestock has also been running at very high levels. New records have been set both in overall meat output, and in per capita consumption.

Livestock is not the only agricultural crop which has shown major production gains. But it differs in one very fundamental respect from some of the others. It is not subjected to government controls, and it is not subsidized. So all the mountains of meat produced go into the channels of consumption. They do not go into government storage, at an enormous cost to the taxpayers.

Meat, in other words, moves in a free market, which is subject to the natural law of supply and demand and nothing else. Prices and production quotas are not arbitrarily fixed by fallible human beings. Livestock prices, naturally have not always satisfied the producers, any more than meat prices have always satisfied consumers. But over the years this free market automatically sees to it that a fair price balance is maintained, and that producers and consumers get the best deal possible.

Most important of all in the long run, producers for the free market keep their independence and their power of decision. They aren't forever subject to the unpredictable winds of politics.

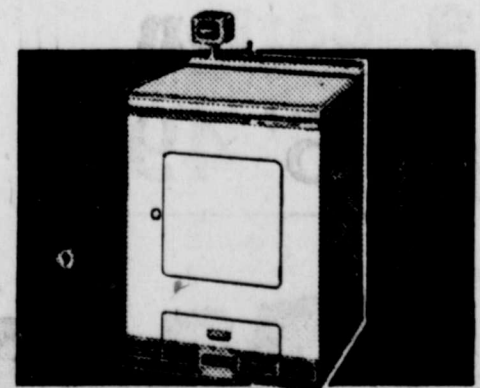

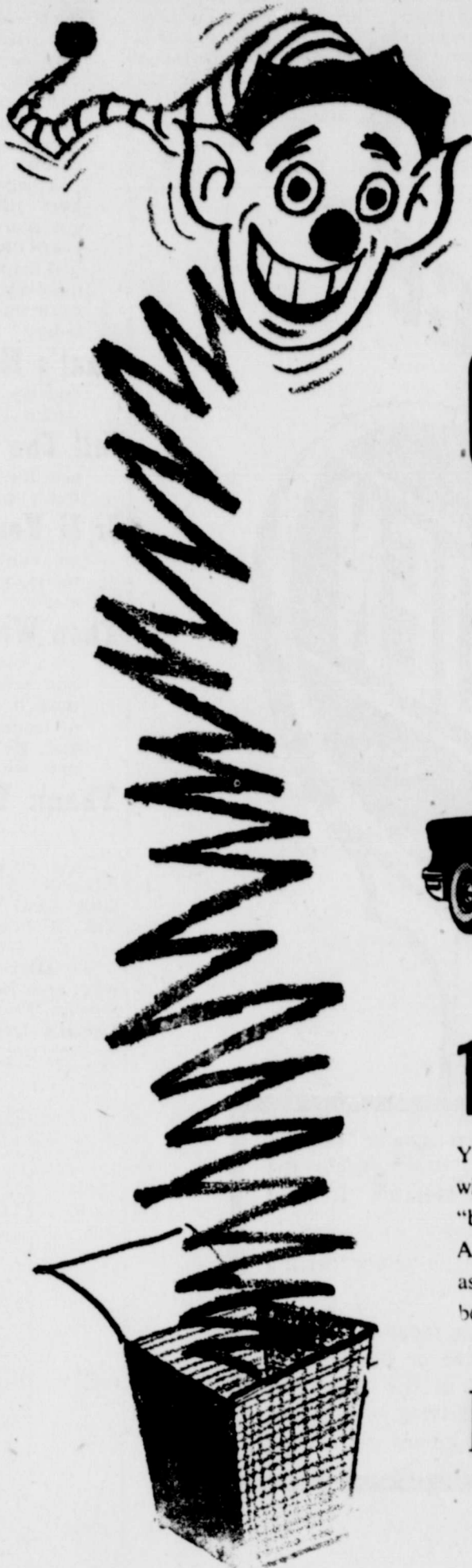

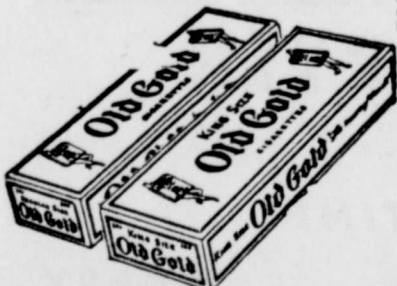
