

There have been several calls ately on how to control the white rub in lawns. The grub, the larae of the May beetle is familiar o all with his white body and rown head.

Feeding on the roots and tender inderground parts of plants and rass the grub is quite destructive n lawns and flower beds in the early spring. Signs of grub damage are dead spots in the lawn which may appear quite suddenly small section of the dead grass is ifted up with a shove!, the grub can usually be found.

There are two types of control measures that can be used on the grub. Either a spray or a dust can e used; actually the dust is the easier to use. Use either wettable chlordane, dieldrin, aldrin or hep- THURSDAY, APRIL 4 achlor. Of these, the chlordane and dieldrin are usually the easiest to purchase and do a good job. Use at east ten ounces of 40% chlordane or four ounces of 25% dieldrin per 1000 square feet of lawn space. Water the lawn thoroughly after applying the dust so that the dust will be carried down in a solution the grubs.

If you prefer a spray, the same materials may be used by mixing with water. They should be applied at the rate of 25 gallons of pray per 1000 square feet. The pray should be mixed according to the directions on the container. One application of either dust or spray should be sufficient to control an infestation of grubs.

Chlorosis is a disease that affects many plants in this area. ome early plants such as roses are already showing the effects of chlorosis. Actually it is the result of an deficiency in the soil. The iron may be in the soil but it may not be available to the plants. This condiion is usually found in a soil which is high in calcium, which the soil in this area is. The calcium and the phosphorus lock up the iron and an acid condition Mrs. James Kelly Is must be caused if the iron is to beme available to the plants

One of the best methods to bring about an acid condition of the soil is by the use of iron sulphate as it is commonly known. Treatment consists of punching holes about two feet deep around the plant. The holes should be about one half inch in diameter and can easily be made with a crowbar or any type of bar that makes a hole. Holes should be located far enough away from the plant that they will not hit a root. Fill the hole completely with the copperas. One or two treatments a year are usually suf-

ficient . A spray can be made by mixing one-fourth teaspoon of the copperas with a gallon of water. One teaspoonful of glue should be added as a sticking agent. Spray the plants late in the evening. This method does not last as long as the one using the hole and copper-

For a number of years chlordane was the recognized insecticide to use on roaches. In the last year or two, a strain of roaches resistant to chlordane has been found. To control such insects, malathion is recommended. In order to keep the roaches from becoming resistant to chlordane it might be wise to use chlordane one time and malathion the next. The roach would not be able to build up a resistane if the insecticides were changed occasion-

CAPITOL HILL continues to buzz another one of the 13 major aphalf billon dollar reduction from budget estimates. It was a 51/2-billion dollar bill.

That makes 5 out of the 13 already acted upon, and the total cuts up to now amount to \$798,500,-The \$35 billion defense oppropriation and the four and a half billion foreign aid bills will be acted upon a little later.

Thus, it now looks like the eventual reductions may run anywhere from two to five billion.

SPEAKING of the money bill acted upon last week, it included an item of \$95 million for subsidizing public housing obligations that are outstanding. That serves as a good reminder of what it means for chickens to come home to roost. As a result of the Congressover the protest of many of usyear in and year out authorizing more of these projects to be built at taxpayers' expense, we are called upon to pay more and more each year on the amortized obligations. And the amount increases each year as new projects are built and more obligations are added.

ORIGINALLY JUSTIFIED by ponsors as a way of providing housing for low-income and welfare families, Uncle Sam has now built about a half million units. making the Government the biggest of all landlords. Tenants pay only a fraction of the actual rental value of the public housing apartments they occupy.

Getting away from the original concept of helping the needy, it has projects are now occupied by famseveral thousand earning dollars annually. In debate last week, I cited an example of this: A housing project in Pittsburg is occupied 80% by steelworkers who while American taxpayers are, in effect, paying a sizeable part of their rent bills for them each week. We have registered vigorous protest against this kind of business.




