# Public Service Announcement From 

## Bailey County Appraisal and State Property Tax Board

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tox freeze associated with the ' 10,000 homestead exemption, said Dale Jones, chief appraiser for the Bailey County Appraisol District.

According to a low passed by the Special Session of the 67th legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which

Application must be mode with Dale Jones before April 1, 1982. To qualify for their tax limitaiton, on Jonuary 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

## Be 65 years or older

Use that home as his principal residence
The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief oppraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 approisol records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should hove poid in 1979 , had he been granted the ${ }^{~} 5,000$ general homestead exemption and the ${ }^{~} 10,000$ over- 65 homestead exemption. No refunds of toxes poid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981

For 1982, the taxpayer's amount of homestead taxes poid may not exceed the amount of toxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the

7th Girls In Soil Compaction Will Farwell Meet Reduce Crop Production

Soil compaction can act
as an unseen enemy to as an unseen enemy to
farmers and reduce crop farmers and reduce crop production. Commonly
called "hardpan", compacted soil can literally "choke off" plant roots so that they're unable to get water or nutrients. "Probably the most evident plant sympton of compacted soil is a shallow root system," says Dr. Ed Colburn, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas
A\&M University
System. "Plant roots may be unable to penetrate a severely compacted soil and may grow horizontally, resulting in what some farmers call 'crow foot' in such crops as cotton that have a tap root."

Along with stunting plant roots, soil compaction may affect seed germination, seedling emergence and other phases of
crop growth and produc. crop growth and
tion, says Colburn. tion, says Colburn.
Poor stands, poor plant growth, discolored plant leaves and premature wilting may signal problems
due to compacted soil, due to compacted soil,
notes the agronomist. However, many of these same symptoms can also
be due to dry weather. be due to dry weather, other factors.
"Excessive soil compacion also reduces water penetration and increases run-off and soil erosion," adds Colburn. "Water standing in a field may signal a soil compaction
problem since water infil. problem since water infilration is slow in a hardpan "Thea. "The best way to iden-

Officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, have fixed April 21 as the date for the 25 -county cotton producer organization's annual Center. The exact time of the meeting will be anounced later.
According to PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, central topic of the meeting will be the industry as "HVI," the acronym for High Volume Instrumentation. "Interest in HVI among producers, Instrumentation. "Interest in textor among producers, growing by leaps and bounds," Johnson notes,
"which we think makes it a very timely topic for our annual membership meeting."
HVI discussion among High Plains producers in recent months, Johnson continues, has been stimulated further by widespread dissatisfaction with manual classing results on much of the 1981 crop. "And one of the issues to be faced at our meeting of the complaints producers have against traditional classing methods."
Speakers for the annual PCG gathering have not aspects of HVI.

discuss USDA's position with regard to converting discuss USDA's position with regard to converting

"However there is always the question of whether the market pricing system will properly reward producers for providing additional quality information," he says, "and this is another concerm we will be asking our speakers to address.
