

STOCKER COWS AND PAIRS FIND STRONG MARKET

In the special sale of stocker cows and pairs at Fort Worth last week the total of over 1,900 head included 1,258 which went back to some 350 aged cows and fat heifers BREEZES FROM A went into packer channels.

Most of the pairs ranged from \$140 to \$165, with a few as high as \$190 to \$200. Some sold by the pound and others by the head. Typical of the strong rates for the better kinds was the shipment of 17 pairs consigned by Ray Boothe of Sweetwater which sold withthe cows at \$17 and the calves at \$29.

Buyers from all over the South and Southwest were represented and most of the cattle went back to Texas pastures. Many of the visitors expressed surprise at the number of very thin cows which appeared in the offering despite the improved conditions in many sections of the Southwest this spring.

Next of these special sales will also be for all breeds, all ages, and will be held on May 10. It is expected this event will attract a the new ones. good many yearlings, as was the case a year earlier. 

SPEAKING OF UPSTREAM projects, a group of water conservationists from our district came to Washington last week for an appearance before the appropriations committee that handles funds for this type of works. They included O. B. Harkey of San Saba, chairman of the Mid Colorado Association of Soil Conservation Districts; Joe Russell of Menard, J. W. Vance of Coleman, and Edsel Malmstrom of Melvin-all members of the board of supervisors of the Middle Colorado area. In addition, Dick Winters of Brady, chairman of the Brady Creek Watershed Association Association, was on hand.

The report from this group covered conservation works in the five million acres covered by the Middle Colorado Watershed, and the progress that has been made there during the past year.

Among the upstream flood prevention projects discussed were Deep Creek in McCullough, Brady Creek, Upper San Saba River project, Lower San Saba project, Mukewater Creek in Coleman and Brown Counties, Jim Ned Creek in Coleman, and Clear Creek in Brown.

It was a comprehensive report on a wast water and soil conservation undertaking, and was well received by the Committee.

OTHER GUESTS have included H. N. (Red) Smith, State Soil Conservationist of Temple, here for a few months on special assignment; Dr. Knowles Ryerson, Dean of Agriculture of the University of California, a personal friend of mine; Tanner Freeman of San Antonio.

SCHOOL OUT MONDAY FOR EASTER HOLIDAY


The Sterling City School wil be out for the Easter holidays on next Monday, April 22. Classes will resume usual study on Tuesday, it was announced.

"white charger," comwith a team of white-"knights," may some day plete come to your rescue if you are trapped under debris after an attack or natural disaster.




