AROUND THE COUNTY

Saturday April 27 is the day for the tenth annual Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association Sale in Brownwood. The sale itself starts at 10:00 a.m. Saturday in the Brown County show barns on the Brady highway.

This sale, the only all-breed sale in Texas, was formerly held in Temple and Georgetown. There will be 250 Rambouillet, Delaine, Columbia and Corriedale rams offered for sale. Seventy-five Hampshire, Suffolk, Shropshire, Southdown, and Montadale ewes will be offered. These sheep are all registered and represent the best of their breed in the state. Stud selection and sitting will be done on Friday. Fred Rose of Del Rio and Clyde Thate of Burkett will sift and select the studs in the Rambouillet division. Dr. T. D. Watkins of the Animal Husbandry Department at A&M will work the medium wool breeds and George Johanson of Brady will work the Delaines.

A wool improvement and shearing demonstration will be put on by Billy Kidd of Menard, Extension Sheep and Wool Specialist, and John Galloway, county agent of Brown County.

L. F. and Clinton Hodges will offer eight rams and three ewes for sale. The sheep they are offering are lambs and yearlings.

This is a good opportunity to find some good sheep regardless of the breed you want. These are all good quality sheep and are all breeder owned.

Saturday is also the day that about 600 4-H Club members are expected to take part in the District 4-H Club contests in San Angelo. These contests are staged each year to select the team from each of the twelve districts in the state that will compete at A&M College in June in the state contests. Two districts, all of West Texas, will be represented in San Angelo. District 7 which is the district that Sterling County is in and District 6, far West Texas, have staged their contests together for several years now through the cooperation of San Angelo Junior College.

Sterling County 4-H Clubs will be represented by a grass judging team. Members have not been selected yet but those working for the team are Lee Douthit, Cecilia McDonald, LeRuth Reed, David Durham, Reynolds Lee Foster, Barbara Durham, Barbara Clark and David Foster. In June a wool judging team will enter the state contest to be held in San Angelo.

The unsettled weather of the last week has brought varying amounts of rain to the county. On Thursday

of last week, Sterling City recorded a quarter inch. Parts of the divide recorded one inch—that reported by Jim Bob Clark made him so happy he was buying coffee Friday morning—while C. J. Copeland had only .3 inch. The North Concho was on a 13 foot rise due to an inch and better in the Bill and Lee Reed country reported Chesley McDonald. During the past week (up to Wednesday morning) more rain had fallen but amounts again varied considerably. However nearly every part of the county has received some rain and things could perk up with more follow-up on the part of the rain.

During the Easter weekend we visited friends in Tyler where they are actually hurting from too much rain. During a 36 hour period Friday night through Sunday morning we saw it rain a little over six inches. They were perfectly willing to share it with us as they have not been able to plant or get in the fields for weeks due to the rain. Rainfall thus far this year has totaled just a little better than 20 inches. The area around Corsicana was flooded by several creeks. Hundreds of acres were under water and livestock was being moved to high ground. In the blackland area between Hillsboro and Corsicana, farmers were parking their cars on the road and walking to the house due to the mud. Fields were soggy-wet and run-off waters were filling creeks and rivers. They have good crops of oats in the fields if they don't lose them. The area from Brownwood east is green with the oats, grass and weeds. Cattle and cheep are fat.

Some have and some don't. Right now they have the moisture and we don't. They are having floods and we have dust storms. It's too bad there can't be a happy medium—we could use their excess rain.

## Named to TCU Student Congress

Fort Worth—David Lawrence Glass, a graduate student from Sterling City, will represent the Graduate School in the Texas Christian University Student Congress next year.

## More Than 100 Peace Officers at FBI Conference Here Tuesday

J. T. DAVIS HOST AT LUNCH

More than 100 peace officers here Tuesday heard Federal Bureau of Investigation men and West Texas officials discuss law enforcement and fleeing criminals in an annual FBI sponsored conference.

W. A. Murphy, special agent in charge of the Dallas FBI office, headed the conference, which took up various phases of law enforcement and laws applying to fleeing criminals.

Included were discussions of the unlawful flight to avoid prosecution, statutes and extradition laws. In addition to FBI representatives, four West Texas officers spoke.

They included Tom Green County Sheriff Cecil Turner, Eldon Mahon, Colorado City district attorney; R. B. Weir of Austin, Department of Public Safety identification bureau; and Jake Sharpe, DPS radio chief dispatcher in San Angelo.

Ed Dorris, San Angelo FBI agent, said similar conferences are being sponsored by the FBI in the northern and eastern districts of the State.

J. T. Davis, president of the First National Bank here, was host at lunch for the officers. Davis told the officials the lunch was his thanks for the speedy apprehension of three men who robbed the bank here in May, 1956.

The three bank robbers were captured a few hours after the robbery in a pasture near Water Valley.

The dinner consisted of fried chicken and gravy, beans, potato salad, hot rolls, tea or coffee and individual apple pies topped with whipped cream. The Rev. L. S. Dubberly gave the invocation.

Law enforcement officers attending the Tuesday session were from about 50 West Texas counties.

## NICE RAINS AID STERLING AREA

On Thursday night of last week nice rains fell in Sterling County. Fall ranged from .69 inch here in town to more than an inch west and south of town. The fall put the North Concho River on about a 12-foot rise here in town.

On Monday night of this week upwards of .75 inch fell over the county, adding to range benefits.

All of Texas except the western portion has had more than normal rainfall for the year and the drought is considered broken in the big half of the state—north, central, east and south Texas. A lot more moisture is needed here in West Texas before any real drought relief is felt. The mere fact that most of the state is getting above normal rains helps the weather picture for the entire state, however.

There will be a meeting of the Ground Observer Corps here in the community center May 24 at 7:30 p.m. Such was announced by Ancel Reed, new post supervisor, this week. 


PRESIDENT EISENHOWER, following House prodding, came up with a \$2 billion suggestion for cuts. That's in addition to what the House has done thus far. So the outlook brightens, and despite the stubborn opposition, coming in the main from liberal Democrats, aided and abetted by such liberal columnists as Drew Pearson, it now looks like we will be able to trim the budget estimates by as much as \$5 billion—again assuming the Senate will go along with us.


Formula for Socialism

### Lilliputian Desserts

Did you ever serve a bite-size dessert? Try it sometimes if you want to get yourself a reputation for being a hep hostess. Tiny delicacies are particularly appreciated after a heavy meal when a full size dessert might be too much, but a sweet is needed for satisfaction. Don't make the mistake, however, of letting guests see them or sample them before dinner or none will be left. These tiny bites are made of pastry, fruit-filled and deep fried.

Canned applesauce, jams and frozen pineapple chunks all make perfect fillings. But Crisco Kitchens says the most unexpected, and the one which will cause the most comment, is made of fresh strawberries that have been left in curacao or orange juice for a few minutes before being folded into the pastry and cooked. Only one strawberry is used for each bite.

Here's the foolproof pastry recipe used by good cooks all over the country. It will make about 12 of these small desserts.



#### PASTRY

(Makes 12 4" pastry squares)

- 2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 1/2 cup Crisco
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 tablespoons water

With two knives or a pastry blender cut Crisco into flour and salt until the mixture is uniform and fine like corn meal. Add water, a tablespoon at a time, tossing with a fork all the while. With hands work pastry into a ball. Do not be afraid of overworking dough.


Divide pastry in half and roll in an oblong shape about 8 x 12 inches. Pastry will be slightly less than 1/8 inch thick. Cut into 4-inch squares.

#### Strawberry Bites:

Dip strawberries in curacao or orange juice. Then place one berry in center of 4-inch pastry. Moisten edges of pastry and pinch together around berry with points of pastry forming a peak at top like a chocolate cream. Fry in deep Crisco heated to 365°F. for about 3-4 minutes or until flaky brown. Lift out of kettle with a slotted spoon and drain on absorbent paper. Coat with fine sugar.



3-1/2 teaspoons double acting baking powder  
1 teaspoon salt  
2/3 cup Crisco  
3/4 cup milk

Blend thoroughly by hand or mixer (medium speed) for two minutes. Add:  
3 eggs  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 cup maraschino cherries (dropped)  
1 cup chopped walnuts

Blend by hand or mixer (medium speed) for two minutes. Pour into 3 9" layer pans (1-1/2" deep) which have been lined or rubbed with Crisco and dusted lightly with flour. Behind The 8 Ball

Right now we'd take a little water out here.
