GOOD RAINS HELP RANGE PICTURE

Good rains last week have brightened the range picture for Sterling County. Although falling in varying amounts over the county each week, the rains have been general and all parts of the county are greening up fast.

For about a week or so rains have been hitting some or all parts of the county regularly up until Monday of this week.

The north and west parts of the county benefitted most from the earlier rains. Perry Matthews got 3½ inches last Friday and Saturday. Here in town we registered almost an inch. Sunday morning early the east part of the county had good rains, and early Monday morning moisture fell in varying amounts. We got .30 here in town.

The North Concho River has been on a number of rises during the past two weeks, filling up the North Concho Lake near San Angelo with a record amount of water. It holds more than 64,000 acre feet of water at the early week report.

Rains have fallen to be of most benefit here for the most part. No serious flooding has happened and the small rains have revived the rangelands in the best way possible. Last Friday about dark, heavy rains fell in the canyon, and was accompanied by large hail (big as baseballs, it was said), and did some damage in a small area. Rains in the oil field portion of north Sterling County, has damaged the oil companies roads somewhat.

Wimodausis Club Has Last Meeting of Year

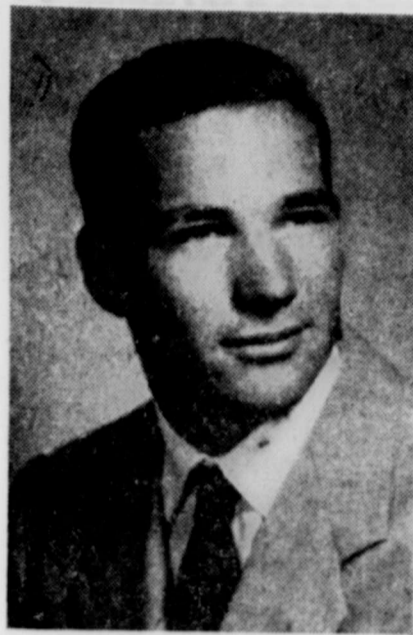

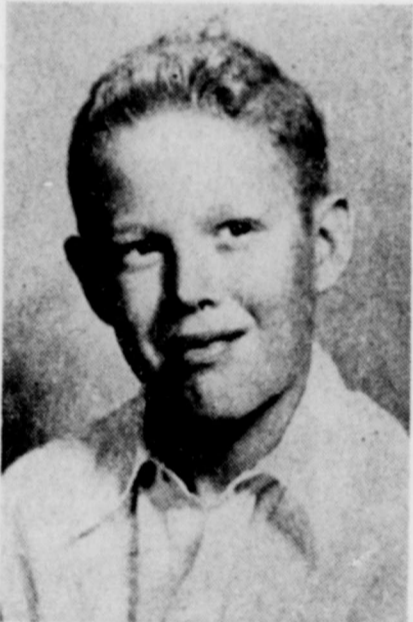

All children are urged to get their bicycles equipped during the summer, study the pamphlets that Mr. Perry passed out at school three weeks ago and practice signals during the summer vacation.

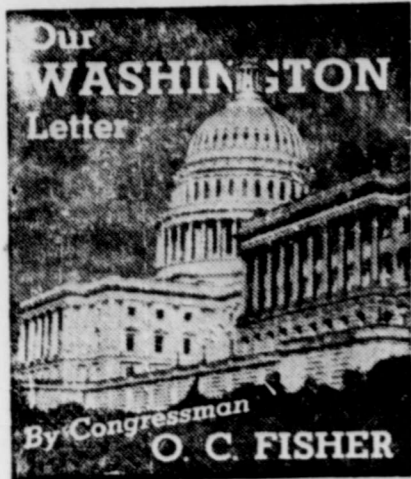

MORE AND MORE people in the 21st district are becoming dubious about the need and extent of foreign aid, or the way it is being handled.

The ration at present runs about 3½-to-1 against the program, whereas in a similar poll taken 3 years ago the opinion stood about 5-to-3 for it.

Many of the answers indicate a willingness to go along with absolute essentials, including technical aid and proper loans, but are convinced (and I think properly) that entirely too much wasteful spending is involved in the way it is being handled.

OTHER PREDOMINANT VIEW-points, disclosed in the tabulations—recently completed—show that increases in postal rates are favored by a 54 to 39 ratio, with almost universal disapproval of privileges now enjoyed by advertising and junk mail.

If the folks in our district could have their way, pending civil rights legislation would be buried by a ratio of 77 to 12; Alaska and Hawaii would be admitted to statehood; there would be no closed shops; the budget would be cut; we would achieve a balanced budget before undertaking tax reduction; the soil bank—by a close margin—would be discarded soon; and also by a narrow margin opinion would favor no extension of the Federal wage and hour law to cover local retail establishments and services.

By a 10-to-1 vote, opinion is against any relaxing of our restrictions on immigration, and by nearly 2½-to-1 the people do not want any part of Federal aid for local school construction.

WITH AROUND 12,000 returns of the questionnaire received and tabulated, the job is just about over. It has been a pleasant undertaking and the cooperation of the people has been most gratifying. By cutting corners I was able to get this job done at a personal cost to me of only \$500. I am still reading the comments on the returns, all of which are interesting and helpful. They add greatly to the success of the project.

is the main element. Some years the insect is not serious enough to warrant control measures but these years are few and far between.

First indication of the bearer will usually be the pearly or blueish eggs on the tip of the little brown nuts. These eggs are about half the size of a pinhead and can easily be found by inspection of the tiny brown nuts.

Control consists of spraying with 3 pounds of 50% wettable DDT in 100 gallons of water. To this should be added six pounds of wettable sulphur for control of the mite and 2 pounds of zinc sulphate (36%) for rosette control.

AROUND THE COUNTY

4H Club members who intend to go to district camp are reminded that they are to notify me before Saturday, May 18, if they are going. I have to turn in the names of the people going on that date so that the people in charge of the camp will know how many to prepare for.

The camp will be held at Camp Stewart in Kerr County on May 29, 30 and 31. Club members will participate in groups in various activities at the camp. Recreation such as swimming will be one of these; club members will have to have their parents permission before they are allowed to swim. Qualified lifeguards will be on duty at all times.

This is the first year that girls have been included in this camp; prior to this year they have held a separate camp. Chaperones at the camp will be adult leaders, county

agents and home demonstration agents.

High school graduation is here and it always brings up problems for the graduate. The main one is this question that every high school senior answers in one way or another: Should I go to college or should I go to work? It is a question to which every boy and girl should give serious thought since it is their life's future they are planning.

Here are some facts on the monetary value of a college education as a result of college graduates as compared to non-college people. These are the result of a survey that Pennsylvania State College of Agriculture made.

The fact that a boy has finished high school is worth \$40 per day for life; he may expect to earn

\$33,000 more during his lifetime as a result. This does not mean that he will step out and get a job that pays \$40 a day; it means that his lifetime earning capacity will be increased that much. As a result of his high school graduation he will be able to get better jobs that will earn him that much more.

He may expect to earn \$72,000 more during his lifetime as a result of graduation from college. The boy who invests \$4,000 in a college education may reasonably expect a cash return of 18 times or \$18 for every dollar spent in getting that education. This, any banker will tell you, is a mighty good return on your money. Each of the 1,000 days spent in the four years of college is worth \$72 to the graduate. This again is the result of the increased lifetime earning capacity.

Though these figures are for a boy; we could expect them to be quite similar for a girl. The college graduate, boy or girl, has a wider field of vocations and professions to choose from than does the non-college boy or girl. Many of the fields in agriculture, engineering, medicine, teaching, and business administration are closed to the non-college trained person. The boy or girl contemplating

going to college should choose their college from those that are recognized as having strong courses in their chosen field. For those undecided on their major course of study many colleges offer a general course of study for the first two years. After this, the major field of study is pursued.

Wayne Lowry is growing out a herd bull. He has the bull in town on feed and is growing him out for use on his place in the Panhandle. Wayne has weighed the bull every 30 days and has kept a record of his gain. During the last 30 days the bull gained 103 pounds or an average daily gain of 3.4 pounds which is pretty good. He got the bull calf from the herd of Virgil Brownfield.

Thus far we have been unable to find any signs of the pecan nut casebearer or pecan borer as it is sometimes called. We have been checking trees around town and in the country as well but have found no eggs or other evidence. As soon as we find eggs we will pass the word along.

The bearer can ruin the entire crop early in the season if unchecked. Control is not hard; time

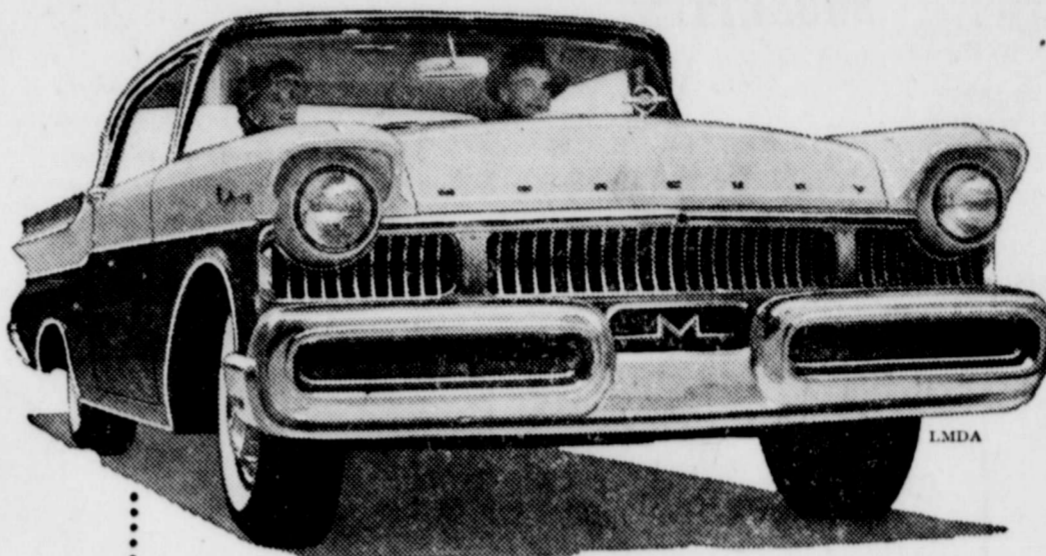

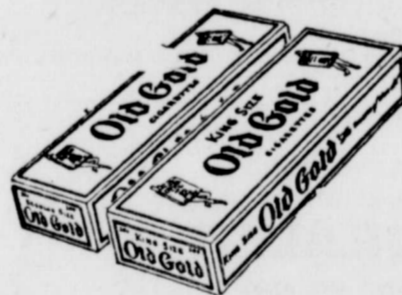
