Good Rains Continue

Good rains fell in Sterling County last Friday night. Rainfall here in town was .95 but ranged up to almost two inches in parts of the county. Beginning about six-thirty in town, it rained hard for over half an hour, amounting to .75 of an inch. Later on that night, it got around to running up the total to practically an inch.

It is getting to be a regular affair for rain to fall here on Friday afternoon or night. The ranges are greening up and hopes are high for an end to the long drought.

GOOD RAIN THURSDAY MORNING OF THIS WEEK

A good rain fell Thursday morning of this week about 7:30 here in town, and over the county. The fall was between .75 and an inch in town and ranged up to 1.50 out in sections of the county. Some hail fell in southern portions of the county. The North Concho River got up and Bodecaw draw flowed fairly wide through town.

District Court Here This Week

District Judge Joe L. Mays handed down two prison sentences here Monday in 51st District Court on two pleas of guilty.

Candelario Sanchez, 25, of San Angelo was assessed a two-year penitentiary term after pleading guilty to a charge of burglarizing Brock's Grocery and Market here in 1955.

Farley D. Smith, Amarillo, was given five years in prison after he entered a plea of guilty to a charge of swindling. District Attorney Justin A. Keever said Smith was selling hospitalization insurance without being a representative of an insurance company.

The jury found for the defendant in the case styled W. Y. Bengé, Jr. vs. the W. Y. Bengé, Sr. Estate.

Court is over here for the time being. The jurors will not be expected to report again unless notified, it was said.

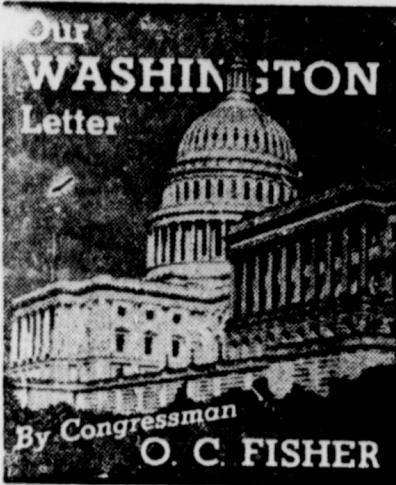
Martinez was taken to Gatesville Tuesday by deputy sheriff Jake Martin and Highway Patrolman Cantrell.

THAT LAMPASAS FLOOD was headline news in Washington last week. Although I was already scheduled to testify before the House appropriations committee to urge funds for survey work on the rivers in our district the Lampasas tragedy struck only two days before I testified. It was used as an example to prove how vulnerable our area is to flash floods.

THE ARMY MOVED fast. Operating out of Ft. Hood, men and equipment were dispatched to the disaster scene and according to all reports did an outstanding relief job at Lampasas. I telephoned Secretary of the Army Brucker on Monday morning who in turn contacted Ft. Hood. But the Army was already moving to the emergency scene.

OUTLOOK FOR SURVEY work by the Corps of Engineers to determine the feasibility of flood prevention dams on our turbulent streams, is brightened by this grim reminder of what can happen. The same fate that struck Lampasas could, with a similar cloudburst, befall a dozen other towns in our area. I reminded the appropriations committee of this constant danger.

A HOUSING BILL passed the House last week. It allows lower FHA down payments for home-buyers and is designed to prime the supply of mortgage credit for the lagging homebuilding industry. Overall, the measure is somewhat inflationary and may turn out to be expensive for Uncle Sam. But it will stimulate more building.

A money saving amendment which I offered, approved by a vote of 144-to-78, will, if approved by the Senate, restrict new public housing projects to areas where the need results from slum clearance and the like.

Each of the public housing apartments which the government builds costs the taxpayers more than \$20,000, when all costs are added. Already around a half million of them have been built. If limited to tenants dislocated by slum clearance projects, there will be very few of them built in the future because under present policy most of them are erected in places that have little if any relationship to slum clearance. Therefore, if my amendment should be kept in the law, the savings to the taxpayers in the future will run into the hundreds of millions.

SOCIAL SECURITY FOR DISABLED WORKERS OVER 50

Social security benefit payments to qualified disabled workers, age 50 or over, will begin in August, 1957 for July.

This marks another important milestone in the progress of the Federal Old Age and Survivors Insurance program, according to Floyd B. Ellington, District Manager of the Social Security office at San Angelo, Texas. Originally designed to provide protection against loss of income due to the twin risks of retirement or death, Social Security will now provide protection against the risk of total and permanent disability.

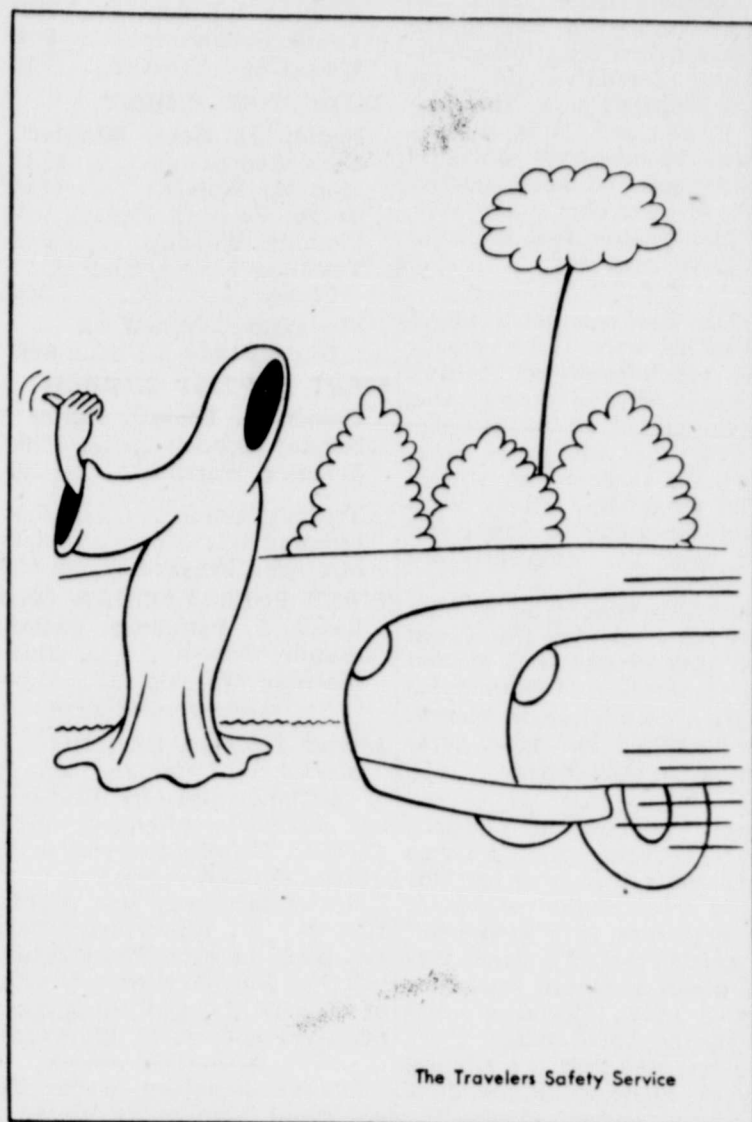
The disability payments will be made to persons who are unable to work because of a severe disability, which has existed for at least six months and is expected to continue indefinitely. Ellington pointed out that the applicants must have worked at least 5 years out of the 10 years before the disability began and 1½ years out of the 3 years before that date.

Anyone who meets the above requirements is urged to visit his Social Security District Office and make application, if he has not already done so.

Dr. Turner, vet, will vaccinate dogs or cats for rabies for a fee of \$2.50. Barleman said that the vet would be on duty from 2:00 till 6:00 p.m.

Talk of spraying the town for fly control and mosquitos took up some time. Cost of such project was discussed and it was hoped that some of the other study clubs in town would join in and help pay for the spraying throughout the summer.

It is planned to buy a mixture of insecticides and fog the town regularly and cover water holes with old station used oil.

It was assumed that the spray material might cost well over a hundred dollars and the work of fogging would be quite reasonable.

Vet To Vaccinate Pets For Rabies Here Monday

Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian from Water Valley, will vaccinate dogs and cats for rabies on Monday. He will be here during the hours of 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on the west side of the courthouse according to Arthur Barleman, Jr., county agent. Dr. Turner will also be able to give dogs distemper shots where the owner desires it.

Cost of the rabies shot will be \$2.50 and the distemper shot will cost \$10.00. The distemper shot affords the dog a permanent lifetime immunity while the rabies shot is good for one year only.

Dogs and cats which were vaccinated last December will not have to be vaccinated at this time. Animals which were given the shots last May should have the shots now. All dogs five months old and over should be given the shots.

Pet owners are urged to give their pets the benefit of the protection that the shot affords the animal to say nothing of the protection that it gives the owner. Where children play with the pets it is even more important.

* Thus far Sterling City has been fortunate enough to escape the serious outbreaks of rabies that some of our neighbors have had. In a good many of these places, rabies is still prevalent and people are taking the shots as a result of exposure to a rabid animal. The shots are painful and costly but a great many of them could be eliminated if all pets were vaccinated.

County Agent's Column

Sterling County has been declared a Modified Accredited Area under the tuberculosis testing program of the State Livestock Sanitary Commission according to information I received last week. This means that cattle can be shipped without having a veterinarian test them for tuberculosis.

Under the regulations of the testing program, at least 10 percent of the cattle in the county must be tested and found tuberculosis free. Testing in Sterling County was done last November by Dr. Hymes of the commission. Dan Ritter acted as a guide and helped the vet with his testing. Cattle from a number of herds in various parts of the county were tested during the time that the vet was in the county.

The certificate designating Sterling County as a Modified Accredited Area was received last week and is on display in the county agent's office.

North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

May 26 to June 2 is National Soil Conservation Stewardship week. Your local churches and Soil Conservation District have joined together to emphasize our responsibility as a steward of our God-given heritage—the productive soil. Our daily living depends upon the productivity of our soil. It is our responsibility to conserve and use wisely each acre of land. Attend the church of your choice and hear the rewarding sermon that the local ministers have prepared.

Alive Cole has completed about 2,000 feet of net wire water spreaders on his ranch south of Sterling City. One net wire diversion was tied onto the end of an earthen terrace. It will catch the water as it empties out of terrace and spread it over the rangeland. Others were used to hold up water in draws and spread it over the adjacent bare areas.

Alive has also done a lot of pitting on his ranch. During the recent rains, the pits caught and soaked up a lot of water that otherwise would have been lost to runoff. On areas he pitted last year, grass is beginning to take hold.

Moisture penetration checks made by Soil Conservation Service technicians show that we have fair moisture on most of the rangeland. With the beginning of a good year, deferred grazing will pay good dividends. If given a chance the better grasses will grow, increase and spread over the bare areas.

Many grass seedlings are coming up this year. These small seedlings need to be protected during the growing season to let them become well established before grazing. The best way to protect these young seedlings is to give them complete rest during the growing season—now through October.

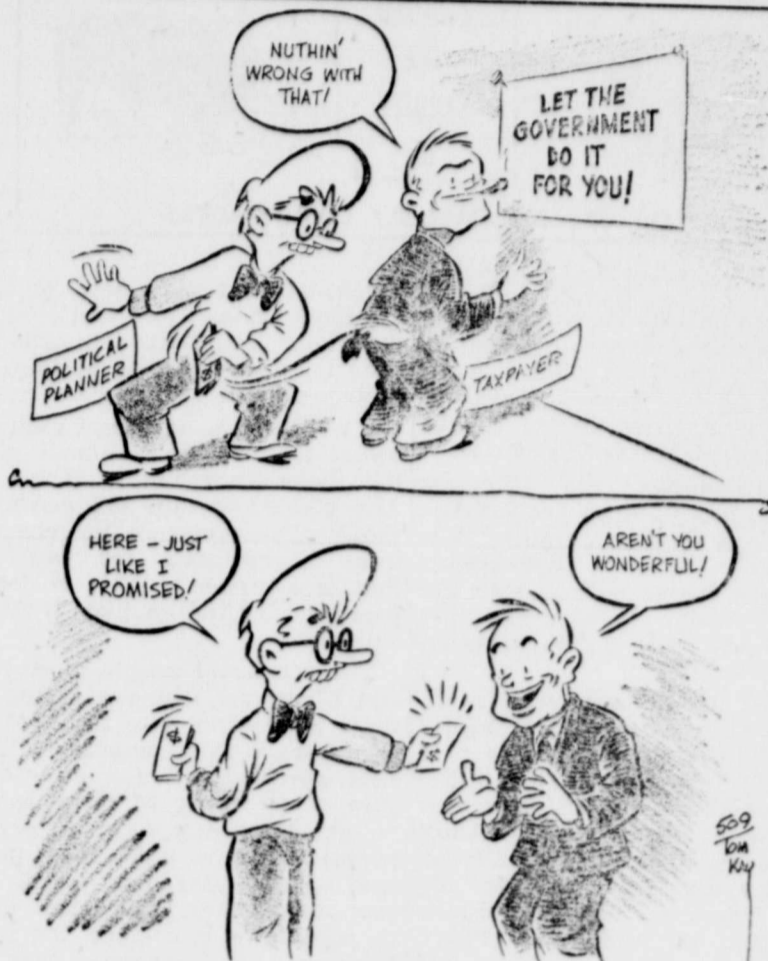

New electronic methods keep constant check on all freight cars moving over Santa Fe rails

New electronic wonders are contributing to precision railroading on the Santa Fe.

Take freight car locating, for instance. With our Red Ball service, we can "put the finger" any time on any one of many thousands of freight cars moving over the 13,150 miles of Santa Fe rails every day.

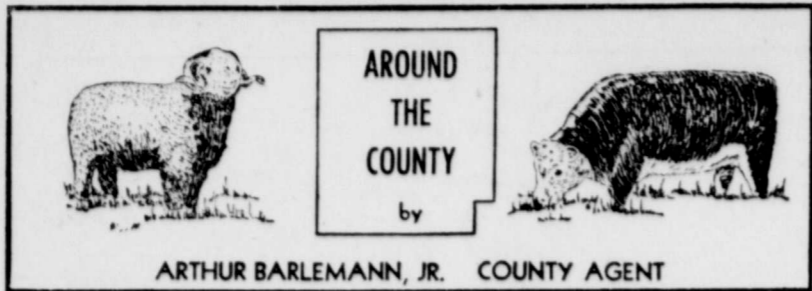

miles west of Kerrville. About 200 4-H boys and girls are expected at the camp along with home demonstration agents, county agents, and adult leaders from the 22 county area which makes up district 7.

Sterling County club members who are going to camp are Carolyn Payne, LeRuth Reed, Mike Williams and Reynolds Lee Foster. Mrs. Leslie Payne will go with the girls as adult leader while the county agent will try to keep up with the boys.

Carolyn and LeRuth were selected last week as official delegates and will have their expenses paid from the club fund. This is the first year that the girls have had a chance to go to camp. Adult leaders who made up the selection committee that chose Carolyn and LeRuth were Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Davis, Mr. and Mrs. Leslie Payne and Reynolds Lee Foster. Mike and Reynolds Lee are paying their own expenses to camp, but will be considered as official delegates of the club.

The spring rabies shot program for pets will be held in Sterling City on Monday, May 27, between the hours of 2:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. on the west side of the courthouse. Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian from Water Valley will again be in charge. He will also have distemper shots available if the owner wants them for his dog.

Price of the rabies shot is \$2.50 while the distemper shot costs \$10. The distemper shot gives the dog a lifetime immunity while the rabies shots are good for one year only. Dogs, and cats as well, that were

vaccinated last May need to have the shots again. Those that received the shots last December will not need them at this time as they are protected until next December.

I would like to urge each pet owner to have their animals given the shots for rabies in particular. Any pet six months old needs the shot. The shots are the cheapest form of insurance for your pet that is available. This is doubly true where children play with the animals.

There are still people in Mertzon and Christoval who are taking the shots themselves as a result of exposure to a rabid animal. These shots run in a series and are quite painful according to those having to take them. I have heard several people that have taken them in the past say that if rabies wasn't certain death, they had just about as soon have it as take the shots. Let's not have anyone take the shots this summer. Bring in your pets if they have not had theirs already. We have been fortunate in Sterling County as I know of no one who took the shots during the last year, while in Mertzon, Big Lake, Odessa, Midland, Christoval, and San Angelo a number of people have taken them. Cooperate in keeping Sterling City off the list of places where people are taking the shots. Get your pet vaccinated now; who knows when he will tangle with a rabid skunk or fox.

Farmers who have land in the conservation reserve of the ASC program are urged to secure their grass seed for planting as soon as possible. The market for the seed has increased considerably since it

started raining and the prices are not getting any lower as a result of the demand. You can plant sorghum alum or blue panic on the land without first establishing a litter crop. With moisture conditions what they are, the grass should be planted as soon as the land is dry enough. In a lot of cases, it is going to have to be cleaned up first; the weeds have really taken advantage of the moisture.

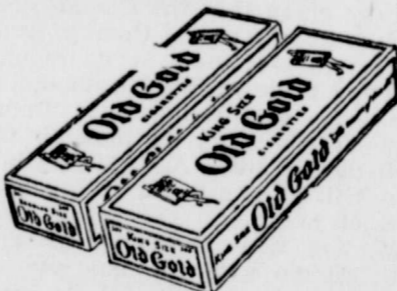
