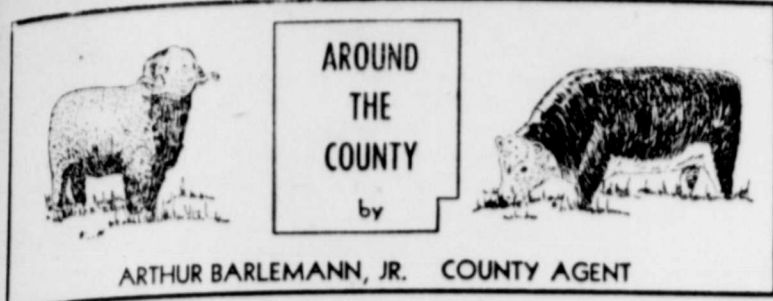

The time is here for 4-H Club members to begin thinking about their projects for next year. In order to get the most out of 4-H club work, each member should have a demonstration or project. The size of the project is not the thing that counts; it's the training that the boy or girl gets from having the project whether it is lambs or calves or just a home garden, an electric project or range improvement project.

Club members who are going to feed lambs will be busy the next few weeks getting lambs to put on feed for the local and area shows. The show season starts next year with the Odessa show which opens the last week in December, just a few days after Christmas.

San Angelo show officials have announced a number of changes in their show for 1958. Some classes have been discontinued, new ones added and some rules changed.

A new class in the San Angelo show which has attracted quite a deal of interest is the new range ewe lamb class. This class will be made up of groups of three ewe lambs fed by one boy or girl. The lambs must be of finewool breeding carrying finewool (64s and up) and having no permanent teeth visible. The can not be registered nor can they be subject to registration.

The judging of this class will be done in the following manner. The judge will select the top ten groups of three lambs in the wool. These lambs will be sheared with the show furnishing the crews. The exhibitor however will be required to tie and prepare his three fleeces. The fleeces will then be scored on the basis of preparation, uniformity of fineness, staple length, shrinkage, and general quality of the wool. Basis for scoring the shorn lambs will be size, conformation, open faces, and other factors that are taken into consideration when selecting breeding ewes. Scores made in each classification will then be added to get the total score for the group.

Prize money set up for this class is quite good. First prize will be \$250, second \$200, and graduated on down through 15th place which will be \$10.

Also, in the sheep division, a breeder owned class has been set up in the Junior Rambouillet division. The other class in this division will consist of animals which are not owned by the exhibitor.

In the beef cattle division, the milk fed steer class has been dropped from the show. In its place will be a commercial steer class. Calves in this class cannot be placed on feed earlier than August 15 nor later than October 1. They may be purebred, grade, or crossbred and

any other breed. They will be classified on the basis of market slaughter grades by a packer buyer. Grades will be prime, choice, good, and medium. All animals grading below medium will be sifted.

Points will be awarded on the basis of three points for prime, two points for choice, and one point for good. Prize money will be paid on the basis of points. The value of each point will be determined by dividing the amount of money set up for the class by the number of points awarded in the class. The show hopes to set up \$1500 for the commercial steer show.

Agriculture—the production of food and fiber—is now the biggest business in the United States on the basis of investment per worker required. Investment per worker has now reached an all time high of \$15,000. This is compared with the investment per worker in industry which is \$13,000. The increased investment per worker in agriculture represents an increase of 450 per cent in the last 15 years. At the same time wages for farm workers have increased 300%.

On the other hand the amount of the consumer dollar the farmer or rancher receives has decreased. Presently, the producer get 9c out of each dollar the consumer spends for food. This is a drop of 9c in the last 5 years.

Along with the increased investment, the number of people on the land has decreased. Presently 13 out of each 100 people live on the farm or ranch. This means that these 13 persons are producing for 87 who are employed off-the-farm. In 1930 more than 40% of the people produced for the remaining 60% who lived off-the-farm.

The decrease in the number of people on the farm and ranch has brought about the increased investment required. More machinery is needed, time saving equipment is necessary, and along with that, more know-how of the technique of stepping up production to get the most out of each acre.

LONG OVERDUE re-survey work on the Colorado river and its tributaries will get underway late this year by the Corps of Engineers as a result of some funds for that purpose included in a current appropriation bill.

I appeared before the Appropriations committee two months ago and made an appeal for some money to begin this and other survey work, including not only the Colorado but also the Nueces, the Guadalupe and other streams and their tributaries. Money included in the House bill was retained in the measure by the Senate.

THE ENGINEERS INFORM ME this work will require at least two years to complete. It will, on the Colorado, include a study of the need and feasibility of flood control projects on the main Colorado and on such tributaries as the San Saba, Llano, Pedernales, Pecan Bayou and all others that create flood problems of any magnitude.

The Chief of Engineers has informed me that under established policies there will be no survey work of just individual streams such as the San Saba or the Pedernales or the Llano. The plan calls for a comprehensive survey of the entire Colorado River and all tributaries.

IN THE MEANTIME the Reclamation Bureau is intensifying its study of the water situation in Texas. Harry Burleigh, the Reclamation engineer for Texas, is doing special work in Washington now, studying detailed plans for water conservation on Texas streams. Senator Lyndon Johnson is plugging for this program.

Among other speakers to address the convention, Senator Kennedy of Massachusetts and Edgar A. Richie, Minister of Canada, were heard.

City Council Sets Date For Water System Bids

BIDS TO BE OPENED ON JULY 30

The Sterling City Council met at the City Hall Monday and Tuesday nights and passed ordinances on a number of matters relating to the city waterworks program.

Ordinances were passed to issue the \$80,000 bonds (each) in the tax bonds and revenue bonds for the construction of the system. The bonds of the revenue issue are to carry 5½% interest rate and the tax bonds will carry 5¼% interest.

The council approved the advertising of bids for a test well, water and, the distributing system, and also a 50,000 gallon elevated water tank. Bids will be received until July 30 and then opened and read.

All the city council members were present, including Mayor John Walraven, Cecil Long, J. I. Cope, R.T. Caperton, Fred Hodges, and Horace Donaldson. Others present included city secretary Virgie Garrett, Ransom Galloway, Hugh Dickson and Jack Douthit and C. W. Smith.

A proposed map of the system, as drawn up by consulting engineer Hugh Dickson, was approved by the group. Main lines through town will be eight and six inches, and fire plugs are to be placed strategically for fire insurance reduction. Some of the distributive system is of course, subject to change as the work progresses, subject to the best interests of the city.

Ordinance Setting Water Rates

The council passed an ordinance setting water rates for the system. The first 3,000 gallons were set at \$3.50. The next 2,000 gallons price was set at 75c per thousand gallons. The next 5,000 gallons price was set at 50c per thousand gallons and all over 10,000 gallons was set at 40c per thousand gallons.

Customers would be charged a \$25 tie-on fee, and pay for the connection expense from the main to the house or property itself. All bills shall have to be paid by the 10th of the month following or be disconnected. Should a customer be disconnected, a \$1 service charge would be made to have service restored.

FEEDER CATTLE HIGHER, TRADE DISPLAYS STRENGTH

FT. WORTH—Northern markets Monday reported a paucity of stocker and feeder cattle and calves, and a higher market for finished beefs. At Fort Worth more than half the cattle and calves were stockers and feeders and they sold on a strong to 50 cents higher market on the basis of the good news from the north.

Numerous loads of fleshy feeder steers and yearlings sold in the \$20 to \$21.75 bracket, well above last week's values on such cattle. A few good calves sold from \$20 to \$23, and choice kinds were lacking.

In the slaughter department, practically no mature steers were shown and other cattle and calves returned steady prices. Some sales of bulls and canner and cutter cows were unevenly higher.

Good and low choice yearlings and heifers drew \$19 to \$22.50 with medium and lower grades at \$12 to \$19. Fat cows cashed at \$12.50 to \$14.50, while canners and cutters drew \$9 to \$12.50. Bulls cashed at \$12 to \$16.50.

Good and choice fat calves sold from \$19 to \$22, and plain and medium sorts sold from \$14 to \$18.50. Culls sold around \$10 to \$13. Medium and good stocker steer calves sold from \$19 to \$23, and good to choice feeder steers and yearlings cashed at \$18.50 to \$21.75, some 800-pounders at the higher figure. A few stocker cows were reported from \$10 to \$14.

SHEEP AND LAMBS MOVED AT STRONGER PRICES

Price quotations on Fort Worth Monday on sheep and lambs were practically identical with those of last week, however, quality considered the sales were fully steady to somewhat stronger.

Good to choice slaughter Spring lambs cashed at \$20 to \$22 while cull to medium sorts sold from \$12 to \$14. Good slaughter yearlings sold from \$16 to \$17, and cull to medium yearlings drew \$12 to \$15. Stocker lambs sold from \$17 downward.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$6.50 to \$7.50. Old bucks cashed at \$5 to \$5.50. Aged wethers sold from \$13 downward. A few stocker yearling ewes sold from \$15 to \$17.50, and some older stocker ewes drew \$8 to \$14 according to age and quality.

HOGS TOP AT \$21 CLOSER SORTING NOTED

Choice butcher hogs opened 25 to mostly 50 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday, despite the fact that prices on hogs at most northern points were lower for the day. The top hogs are being more closely sorted here and at other major markets these days, indicating that some of the top echelon in packing circles are putting pressure on the purchasing department to buy the meat-types a little better.

At Fort Worth Monday, major packers were meeting the bids of shippers and small packers on the closely sorted "meat" hogs as all interests paid \$12. Medium to good hogs sold from \$16.50 to \$20.50. Sows cashed at \$15 to \$17.50 and stags at \$12 down.

HEREFORD JUDGING STAFF COMPLETED FOR JULY 19th

Four widely known cattlemen have been selected for judges of the stocker and feeder sale of commercial Herefords and whitefaces at Fort Worth July 19. 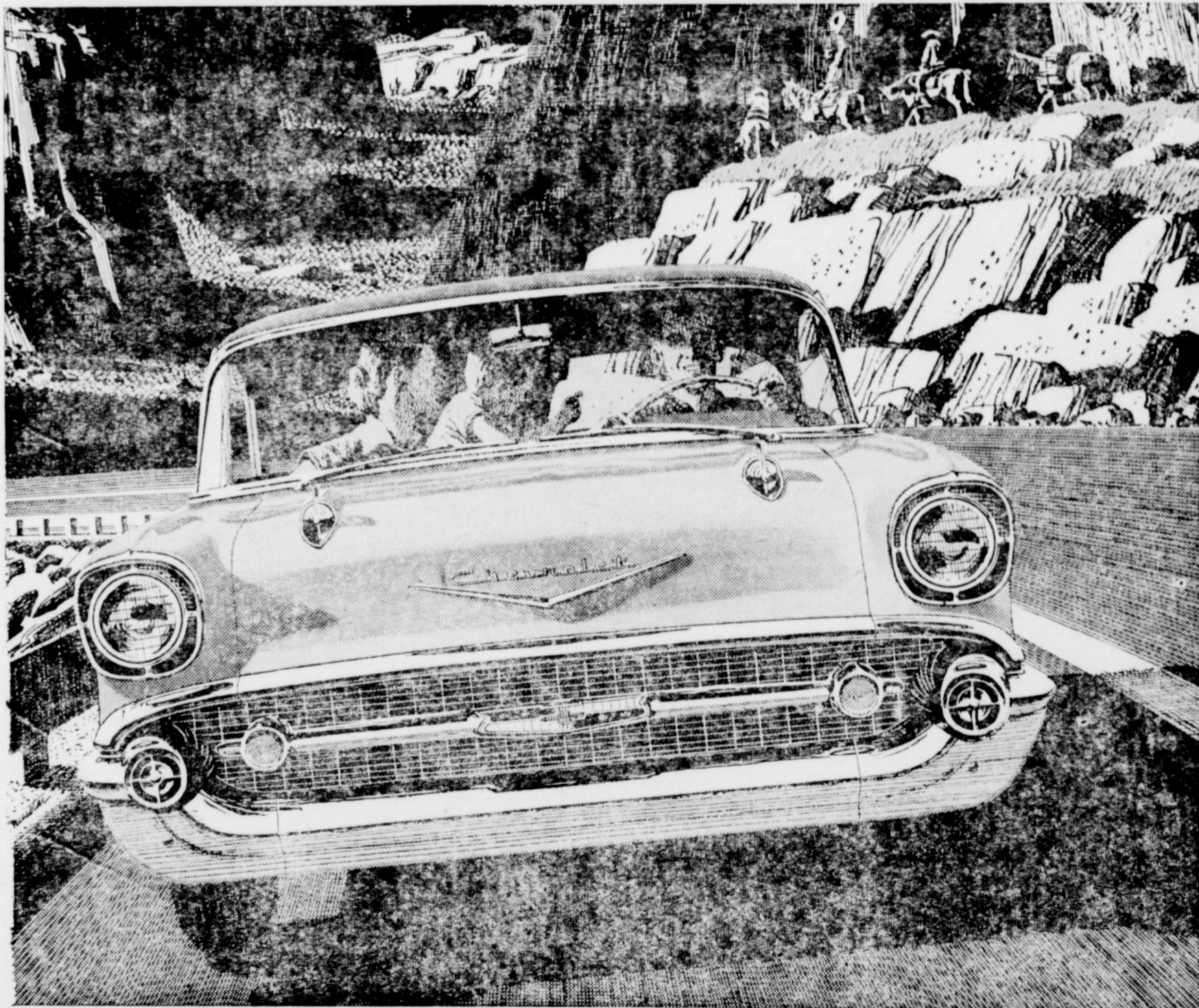

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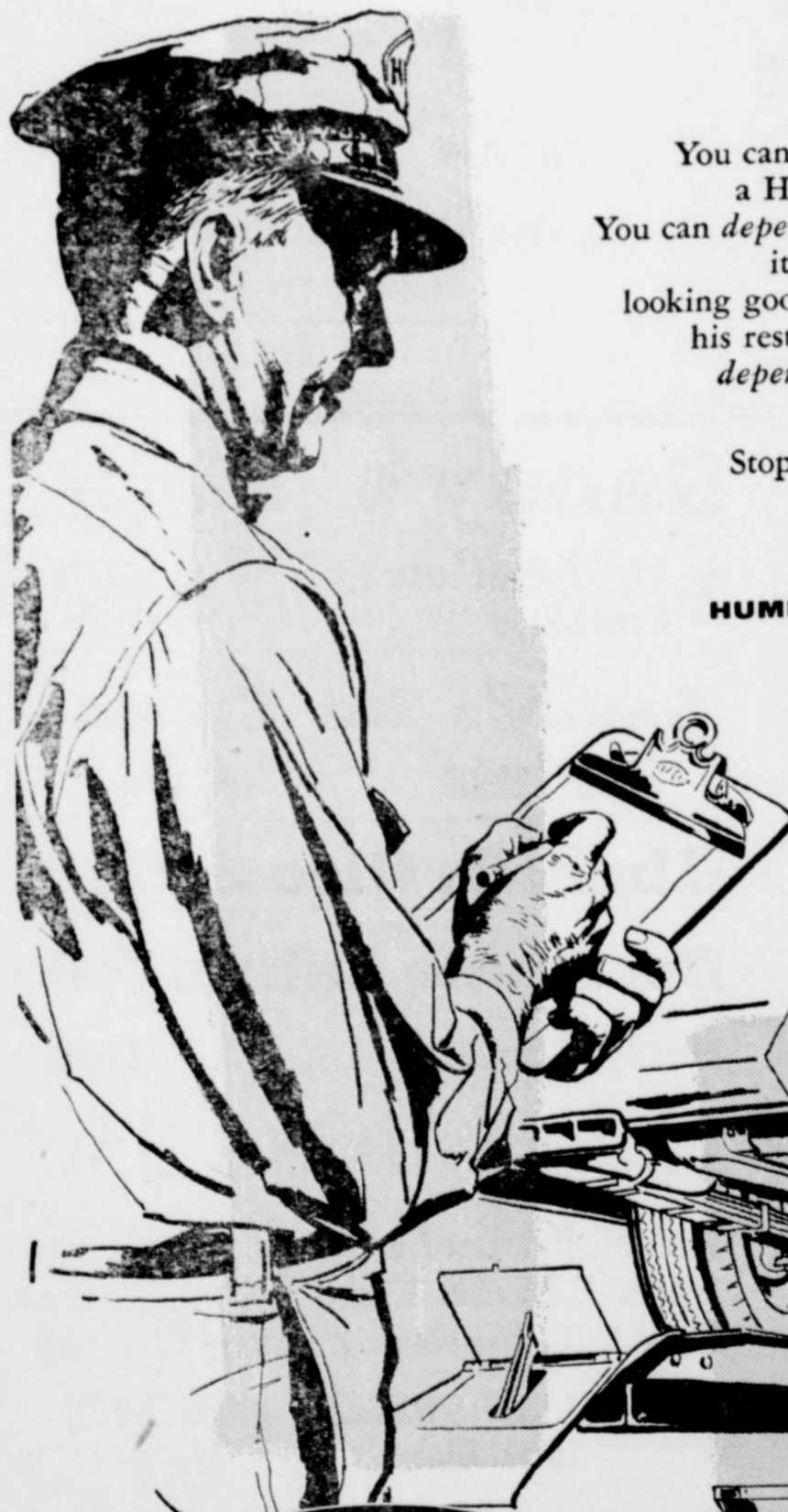
