LET'S TALK LIVESTOCK



STOCK CATTLE OPEN STRONG

FORT WORTH—Trade was very active on stocker and feeder classes of cattle and calves at Fort Worth Monday and prices were from fully steady to as much as 50 cents higher. There was a rather large representation of out-of-state buyers on hand, a factor which again lent strength to the bright prospects for the late Summer and Fall market for Texas cattle this year.

Last week agricultural economists in the cornbelt were warning farmers there against the trend toward "paying too much" for replacement cattle this Fall.

At the Corn Belt Livestock Feeders Association meeting in Chicago last week the fact cattle are in strong hands and ample feed and grass are available, was listed as a factor in the strong position of cattle growers. More than normal demand for replacements from grazing areas because cattlemen sold down in the drouth, was also expected, and prospects of big feed grain supplies due to sharp increases in grain sorghum acreage and improved corn growing conditions in the Western Cornbelt were cited as bullish factors.

Later than usual marketing of stockers and feeders was also predicted, since cattlemen will hold for added poundage.

These warnings to cornbelt stocker and feeder buyers about high priced replacement cattle found sympathetic endorsement among out-of-state buyers at Fort Worth Monday. But, as one buyer from the Hoosier State of Indiana put it, "We're in the cattle business, we need cattle and our farmers need cattle, supply and demand will adjust things sooner or later."

In the trade Monday good and choice stocker steer calves ranged from \$20 to \$24, the higher figure on some 517-pound steer calves, whose heifer mates cashed at \$21.50 and scaled over 100 pounds. Plainer stocker calves sold from \$14 to \$19, and stocker steer yearlings and feeder steers ranged mostly from \$21 down. Fleshy feeding heifers ranged from \$19.50 down. A few replacement cows sold from \$10 to \$14.

In the slaughter division good and choice fed cattle sold at the best prices since last Fall, as good and choice fed steers cashed at \$20 to \$28, the top for two loads of 950 pound fed steers from Oklahoma. Plain and medium butcher sorts cashed at \$13 to \$19.

Fat cows drew \$12 to \$15, and canners and cutters brought \$8 to \$12. Bulls cashed at \$10 to \$15. Good and choice fat calves sold

SLAUGHTER LAMBS, OLD EWES WEAKEN

A small supply of sheep and lambs cleared at steady to weaker prices at Fort Worth Monday. Slaughter lambs and slaughter ewes sold weak to 50 cents lower, and stocker and feeder classes were steady to strong.

Good and choice slaughter lambs cashed at \$20 to \$22.50, and cull to medium kinds sold from \$15 to \$20. Stocker and feeder lambs cashed at \$17 to \$19, some 65-pounder at \$19. Good, fat yearlings sold at \$18, and some older muttons sold at \$14.50 down.

Slaughter ewes cashed at \$6.50 to \$8.50. Some solid mouthed ewes sold as breeders around \$10 to \$11, and better young ewes were quoted to \$13 to \$15, with yearling ewes to \$18 or \$20. Aged bucks sold around \$5 to \$6 for slaughter.

HOGS OPEN ON BARELY STEADY LEVEL MONDAY

Choice butcher hogs topped at \$22.50 and \$22.75 at Fort Worth Monday, with top prices paid sparingly and the tone of the trade steady to a little easier. Medium to good butchers sold from \$18 to \$22. Packing sows cashed at \$17 to \$20.

LOCAL BUSINESS

No one can be blamed for stretching a dollar as far as it will go. However, it is difficult to understand the person who spends two dollars to stretch one.

Every community has a sizeable number of penny-conscious shoppers who will travel from 40 to 100 miles in search of a bargain. Such buying is usually unwise and wasteful. The cost of the trip is likely to run higher than any fancied savings. Also, a careful check of local stores would often reveal that a better price could be obtained here at home.

We can not question the loyalty or good intentions of local citizens who rush off to larger cities to make major purchases. They believe that they are practicing sound economics. And they may have some reason for their actions.

For, quite often our local people know more about the goods available in the metropolitan stores than they do about the goods in the stores here at home because of the extensive advertising originating in the larger trade centers.

Retail advertising from larger cities is constantly coming into every community in the form of catalogs, circulars and regional newspapers. When local merchants do not counter the out-of-town advertising, it is natural for some shoppers to believe that the goods and services they seek can not be obtained locally.

Despite the aggressiveness of distant competition, the local merchant has a distinct advertising advantage—the local newspaper. No advertising medium used by non-local retailers covers our trade area so thoroughly and at such low cost as your local newspaper.

Thus, before the local retailer becomes too critical of out-of-town shopping, he should ask himself if he has given his potential customers enough shopping information to keep them at home.

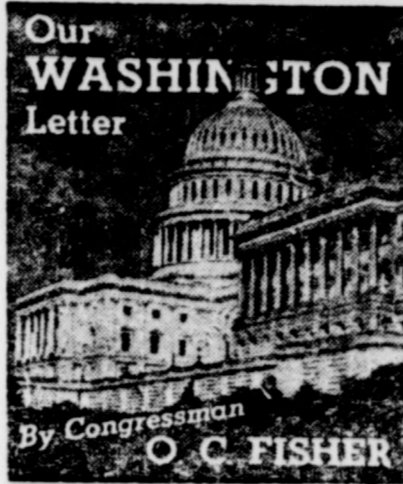

WHAT CAN BE DONE to improve the Supreme Court? This question has been asked by people everywhere in recent years, and a hundred suggestions have been advanced. Most of the proposals to improve the quality of the Nation's court of last resort deal with jurisdiction, limited terms, requirements for prior experience on the bench, etc.

Last week I introduced a resolution to improve the court in the future, and instead of treating the symptoms of the trouble I undertook to do something about the disease.

The disease springs from the political factors that so often enter into modern-day appointments. It happens too often that a President, regardless of how good his intentions may be, is influenced too much by political obligations, his own preconceived philosophy, the ideology of the appointee, his religion, his sectional interests, etc.

While the human element is inherent in all such appointments and always will be, the trouble has been that the considerations aside from real judicial qualifications too often control.

Take Chief Justice Warren as an example. He is undoubtedly a great man in many ways, an able administrator with strong convictions on many subjects. Yet many able critics who have studied his actions on the court find in his decisions a yen for carrying out his personal philosophies, his views of how things should be rather than what Congress has enacted or what the founding fathers wrote into the Constitution. In doing so he often resorts to works on sociology, etc. to support his judgment.

MY RESOLUTION would amend the Constitution by providing that the Supreme Courts of each of the 48 states would, in case of a vacancy on the U. S. Supreme Court, select on from their respective courts, who would join with the other 47 from the other states, and that committee of 48 would, by majority vote, choose a man to fill the vacancy.

It seems to me that this plan should eliminate most of the politics from the appointments in the

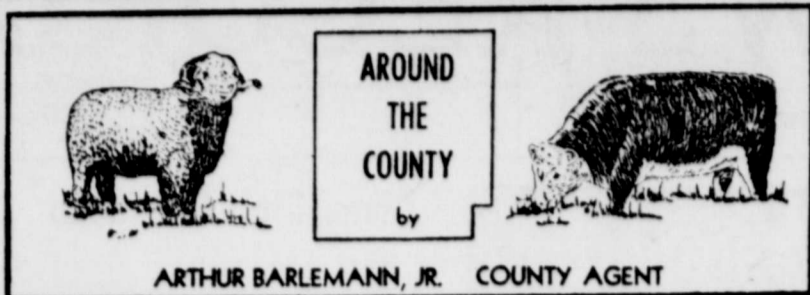

Don't forget that you have just six weeks to get your claim in the mail for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline. This applies to all gasoline used on the ranch or farm between July 1, 1956 and June 30, 1957.

By now all operators who filed claims last year should have received their blanks from the Director of Internal Revenue. If you have not received yours, write or come by my office and I will supply you with one.

As of yesterday, August 15, steers for the commercial baby beef show division of the San Angelo Fat Stock Show may be placed on feed. The commercial steer is a new division of the show in which all steers will be graded on a commercial basis. For several years, the State Fair at Dallas and the Houston show have included such a division.

Steers in this show are to be handled strictly as commercial just as they would be in a feedlot. However, they must be halter broken, trained to lead and fitted to show.

Earliest date they may be placed on feed is August 15 and the latest date is October 1. Only steers are eligible and they may be of any breed, purebred, grade, or crossbred.

Four-H club members note. Your records on all your demonstrations are due in my office on or before August 20. We must have them by then so county winners can be chosen and eligible records forwarded to the district office for consideration there.

Records are an important part of 4-H club work. It is on the basis of these records that the district, state, and national awards are made. Trips to National Club Congress in Chicago, to the National 4-H club conference in Washington, and many cash awards as well as college scholarships are based on records. Each club member is urged to keep a complete file of their records from each year's work so that they can compete for these awards in their later years. In most cases, at least three years of work are required before a member can compete for these awards.

Free Attraction Daily at State Fair

One of the world's most remarkable spectacles will be featured as a free attraction at the 1957 State Fair of Texas, October 5-20.

The mysterious rituals of the Aztecs and Mayans of ancient Mexico will be faithfully recreated by actual descendants of those long vanished races.

The Aztec-Mayan Spectacular will be presented twice daily on the Magnolia Stage, climaxed by the dangerous "ceremony of the flying pole."

This awe-inspiring ritual is performed by the "Birdmen of Teotihuacan." Dressed in feathered, birdlike costumes, these "flying Indians" climb to the top of a 100-foot pole. To the weird music of a flute and drum, the four fliers one by one go through an intricate dance on a tiny platform atop the pole.

They then leap into space, spinning head down, hanging by their heels from ropes wound around the pole. As they glide gracefully to earth, the ropes unwind in ever-widening circles.

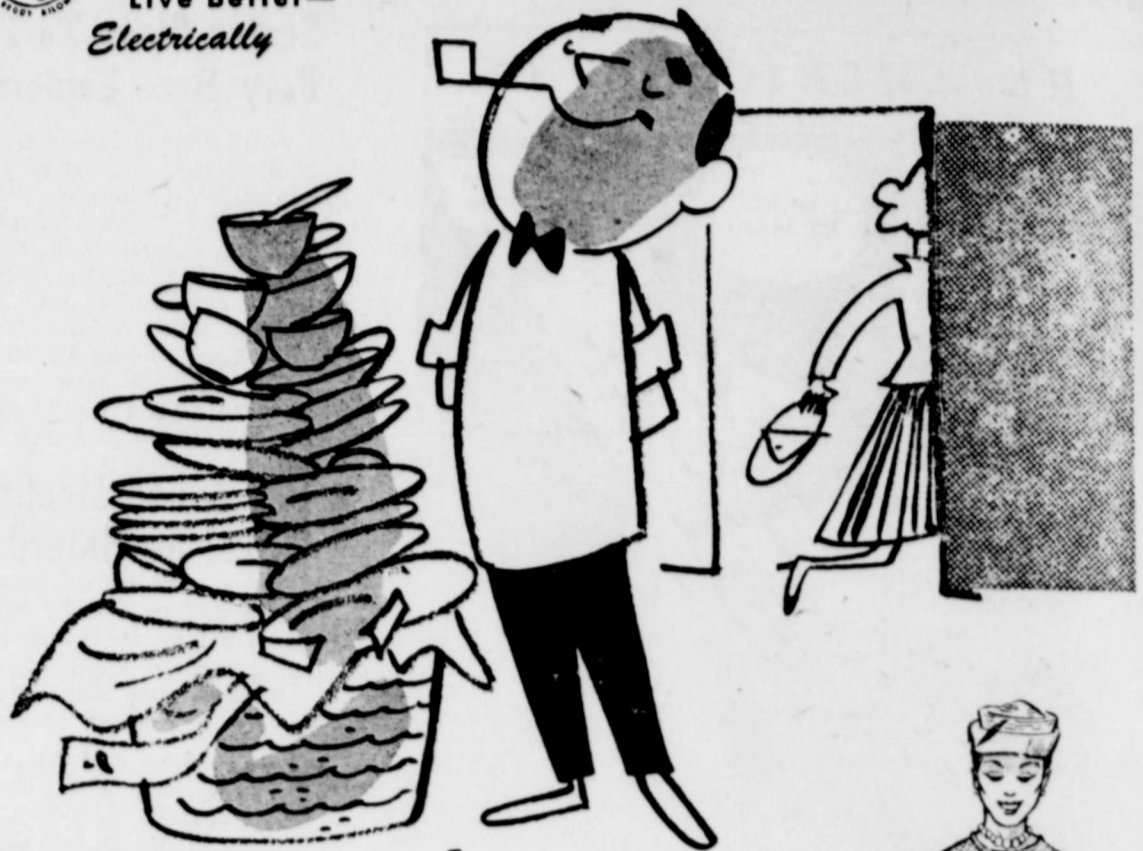
Seldom seen outside a few remote villages in the jungles of Mexico, the strange ceremonial of the flying pole is among the oldest of the surviving native rites of that country, dating from the times before the Spanish conquest. Fliers are trained from the age of 9 for this daring feat.

The colorful dances of the Aztec-Mayan Spectacular are performed by a troupe of 20, attired in authentic costumes. In addition to the daily appearances on the Magnolia Stage, they will be featured in 3 big free Cotton Bowl shows during the fair. The first will be on Mexico Day, October 7.

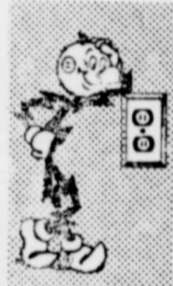

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62 (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48-a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Subsection (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Subsection except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957 at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment amending Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and this Amendment shall be published and the election held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

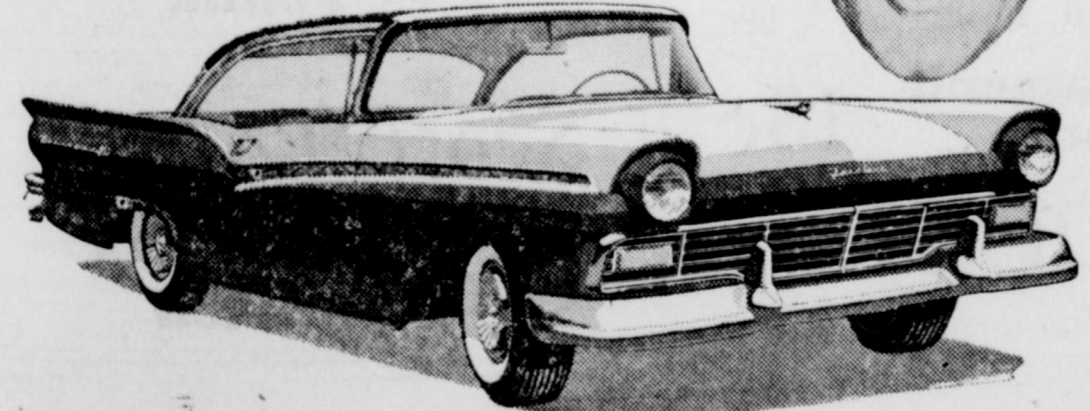

LOOKING for something different for a luncheon? Or for a light salad-and-dessert supper? Here's a "shake and make" pancake to serve with maple-blended syrup and butter—and for dessert, we suggest this Maple Nut Topping - yummy!



Buttermilk Pancakes

In a shaker, place 1 cup plus 2 tablespoons buttermilk, 1/4 teaspoon soda, 1 egg and 1 cup pancake mix. Add 1 tablespoon melted butter. Shake vigorously 10 to 15 times or until batter is fairly smooth. Some-what lumpy batter makes light fluffy pancakes. Makes 7 to 8 pancakes.

Maple Nut Topping
 1/4 cup butter or margarine; 1/3 cup firmly packed brown sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup sifted flour; 1/2 cup Log Cabin Syrup; 2/3 cup finely chopped nuts; 3 tablespoons hot water.

Cream butter, sugar, and salt. Add flour, syrup and nuts. Beat until well mixed. Then stir in hot water. Spread warm topping over coffee cake batter before baking or use as topping for pancakes. Makes 1 1/2 cups topping, or enough to cover two 9-inch square cakes or top of one 16x10-inch cake.

Coconut Crumb Crust

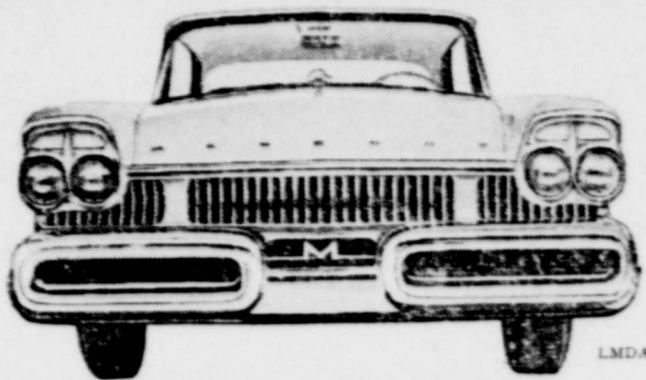

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 51a of the Constitution of Texas, so as to increase the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind and needy children and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Law, to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be determined by the Legislature to be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas for at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application, provided that the maximum payment per month from state funds shall not be more than Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per person, and provided further that no payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) shall be paid out of state funds to an individual until and unless such additional amounts are matched by the Federal Government.

(2) Needy blind persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are over the age of twenty-one (21) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any state-supported institution, while such inmate, or to any person who shall not have actually resided in Texas at least five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for such assistance and continuously for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

(3) Needy children who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas and are under the age of sixteen (16) years, provided that no such assistance shall be paid on account of any child over one (1) year old who has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding the application for such assistance, or on account of any child under the age of one (1) year whose mother has not continuously resided in Texas for one (1) year immediately preceding such application.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer

not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth, provided however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person shall never exceed the amount so expended out of federal funds, and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended out of state funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year.

The Legislature shall enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection.

Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning August 31, 1957 and ending August 31, 1959: Four Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,900,000) for Old Age Assistance, One Hundred, Seventy-Five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000) for Aid to the Blind, and Five Hundred, Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$525,000) for Aid to Dependent Children.

Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and other wise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations, and appropriations for these purposes.

Sec 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 5th day of November, 1957, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clauses:

FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT increasing the limit on the maximum monthly payment to needy aged persons from state funds from Twenty Dollars (\$20) per month to Twenty-five Dollars (\$25) per month subject to certain conditions for payment in excess of Twenty-one Dollars (\$21) per month and on the total yearly expenditure out of state funds for assistance to needy aged, needy blind, and needy children from Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year to Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) per year, and allocating and appropriating additional sums, supplementing current legislative appropriations, for payment of assistance grants."

Sec 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said Fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows:

"Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

"The Texas Water Development Board shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The Legislature of Texas, upon two-thirds (2/3) vote of the elected Members of each House, may authorize the Board to issue additional bonds in an amount not exceeding One Hundred Million Dollars (\$100,000,000). The bonds authorized herein or permitted to be authorized by the Legislature shall be called Texas Water Development Bonds, shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purpose set forth herein.

"All moneys received from the sale of State bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Water Development Fund to be administered (without further appropriation) by the Texas Water Development Board in such manner as prescribed by law.

"Such fund shall be used only for the purpose of aiding or making funds

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized under Article XVI, Section 55 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"While any of the bonds authorized by this provision or while any of the bonds that may be authorized by the Legislature under this provision, or any interest on any of such bonds, is outstanding and unpaid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount which is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1952 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1952, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds, except that such amount as may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, or after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"All bonds issued hereunder shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the 5th day of November, 1957, same being the 1st Tuesday after the 1st Monday in said November, 1957, at which election such ballot shall have precedence thereon, the following words:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of the proper appropriation made by law.

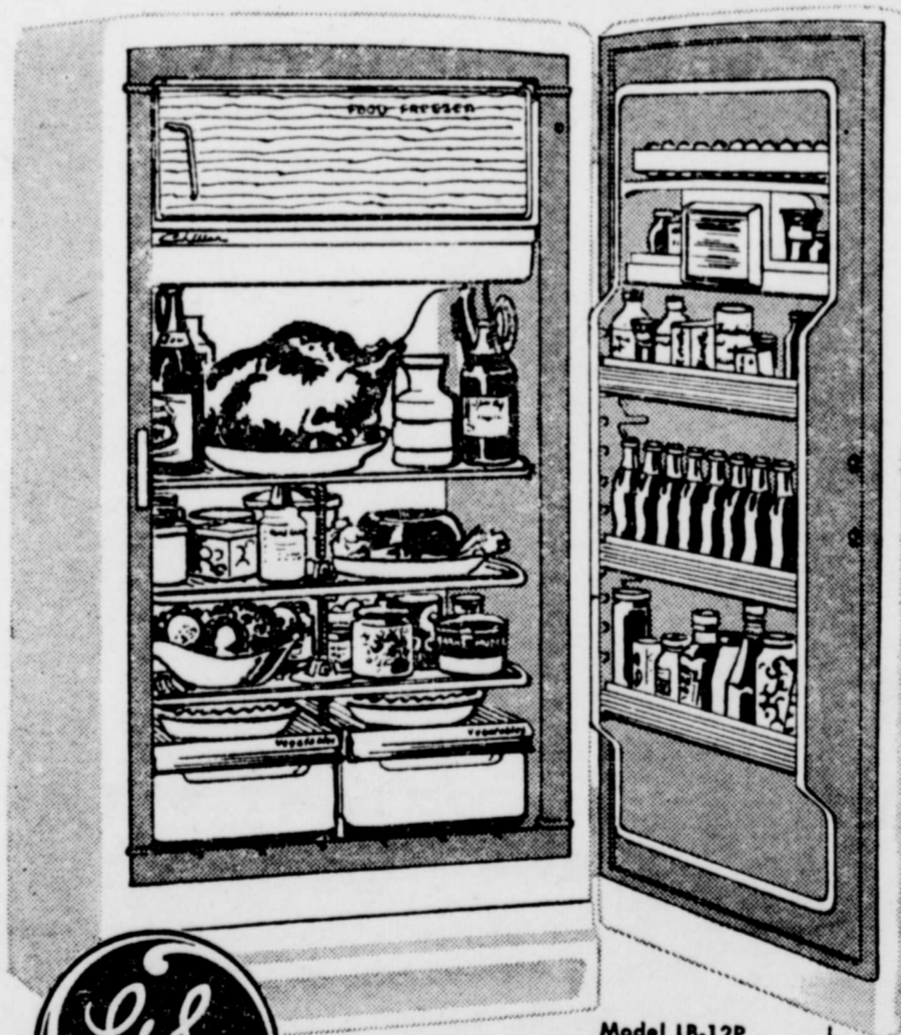
