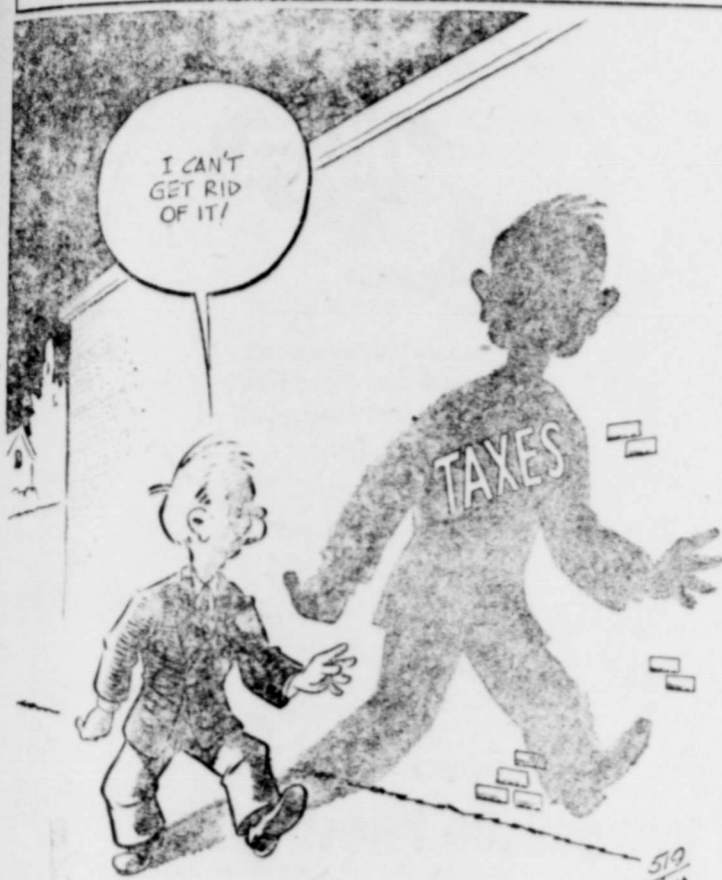

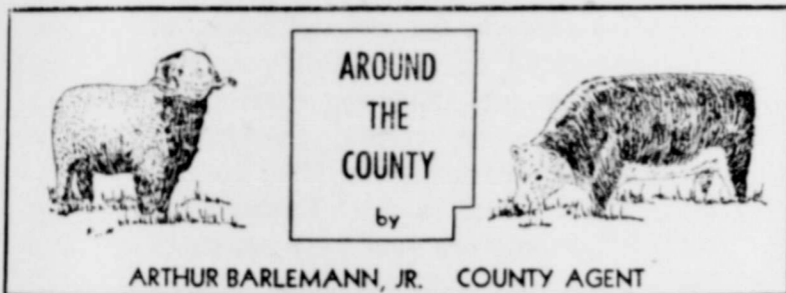

Date for the election of county committeemen for 1958 for the ASC committee has been set for September 3, according to Roxy Brock, county office manager. Ballots have been mailed to all known eligible voters. The ballots may be returned either by mail or in person to the county office. Those mailed in must be postmarked not later than September 9. Tabulating of the ballots will be done on September 12 by the tabulating committee.

Present county committee men are Ross Foster, William Foster and Clinton Hodges. Alternates are Foster Conger and Billy Ralph Bynum. In addition to those five whose names appear on the ballot, the following were also nominated by a nominating committee: Gene Alley, Forrest Foster, Alvie Cole, Perry Matthews and Charlie Drennan.

It makes no big difference how you vote but vote! That is one of the big privileges which we have in this country; we may not always vote for the winner but we do have the privilege of expressing our vote.

The claims for the refund of the three cent federal tax on gasoline used on the farm or ranch are due in the office of the district director of internal revenue on or before September 30. If you have not received your blank, there are still some available in the county agent's office. Also, if you are like some of the rest of us and put it away so you wouldn't lose it but now can't find it, we will be happy to furnish you with a blank.

File your return now and get it over with. You might forget it if you put it off to the last minute.

David Durham, 4-H club member, has just finished a nice shed for his registered Rambouillet ewes and rams. David built the shed out of some lumber from an old barn on the place. His cash outlay consisted of buying two pounds of nails and twelve sheets of galvanized roofing.

At the present time, David and his sister, Barbara, have ten ewes lambs and nine ram lambs in the pen that they are feeding for the show circuit. They have some very nice lambs that should do them some good.

You have been hearing a lot on the radio about the new egg law passed by the last Texas Legislature. The law has been called a grading law by some but in reality it is an egg labeling law.

Under the provisions of the law all eggs must meet the specifications of the grade claimed. The

farmer can sell his eggs under the name of fresh, jumbo, new laid or other words of such import regardless of the grade. The retailer however, cannot sell the eggs under that name unless they meet the specifications of a Grade A egg. Both the producer and the retailer can sell the eggs as graded if they meet the specifications of Grade A eggs. A license is not necessary to grade the eggs; the only requirement is that the eggs meet the standard for the grade claimed.

Retailers will have to have a license if he is selling eggs to consumers; producers who sell on grade will also have to have a license. There is no fee for the retailer's license. Simply write to the Texas Department of Agriculture, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas and request the application blank for the retailer's license. They will send the blank which must be completed and returned. Then the license will be sent out. All retailers must have this license by October 20, 1957 which is just about six weeks off. Send in your request now so you will have your license on time.

The State Department of Agriculture will be in charge of enforcing the law.

Probably some time during September or early October, the Extension Service and the department will sponsor and hold an egg grading school somewhere in the vicinity, probably San Angelo or Abilene. Anyone interested in attending will be urged to do so.

Texas can claim no firsts on their egg law. It is the 48th state to pass such a law.

Dove Season Opens Sunday at Noon

Dove season opens here at noon Sunday, September 1. Shooting will run through October 17, it was announced by the local game warden.

Hours allowed for shooting will be between noon and sunset. The daily bag limit is 10 and possession limit is ten, it was said.

Shotguns only may be used to kill doves, not larger than 10 gauge. Three shells only, including the one in the firing chamber, will be allowed.

New hunting licenses cost \$3.15 for people from 17 to 65. Over and under those ages, no licenses are needed. Except, that deer and turkey hunters must get an exemption license each year.

Fishing licenses, which expire on September 1, will cost \$2.15. The cost in past years was \$1.65.

Football Kick-Off Rally Tonight at 6:30 on River

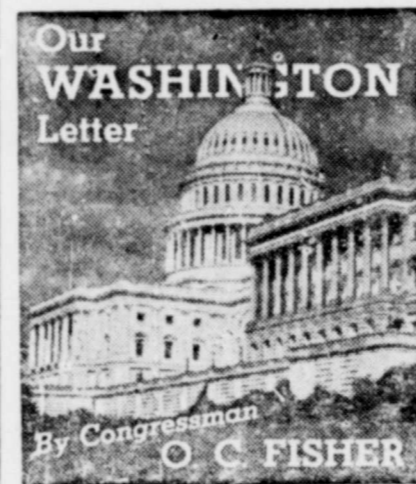
Boys, Pep Squadders, Families And Fans Invited

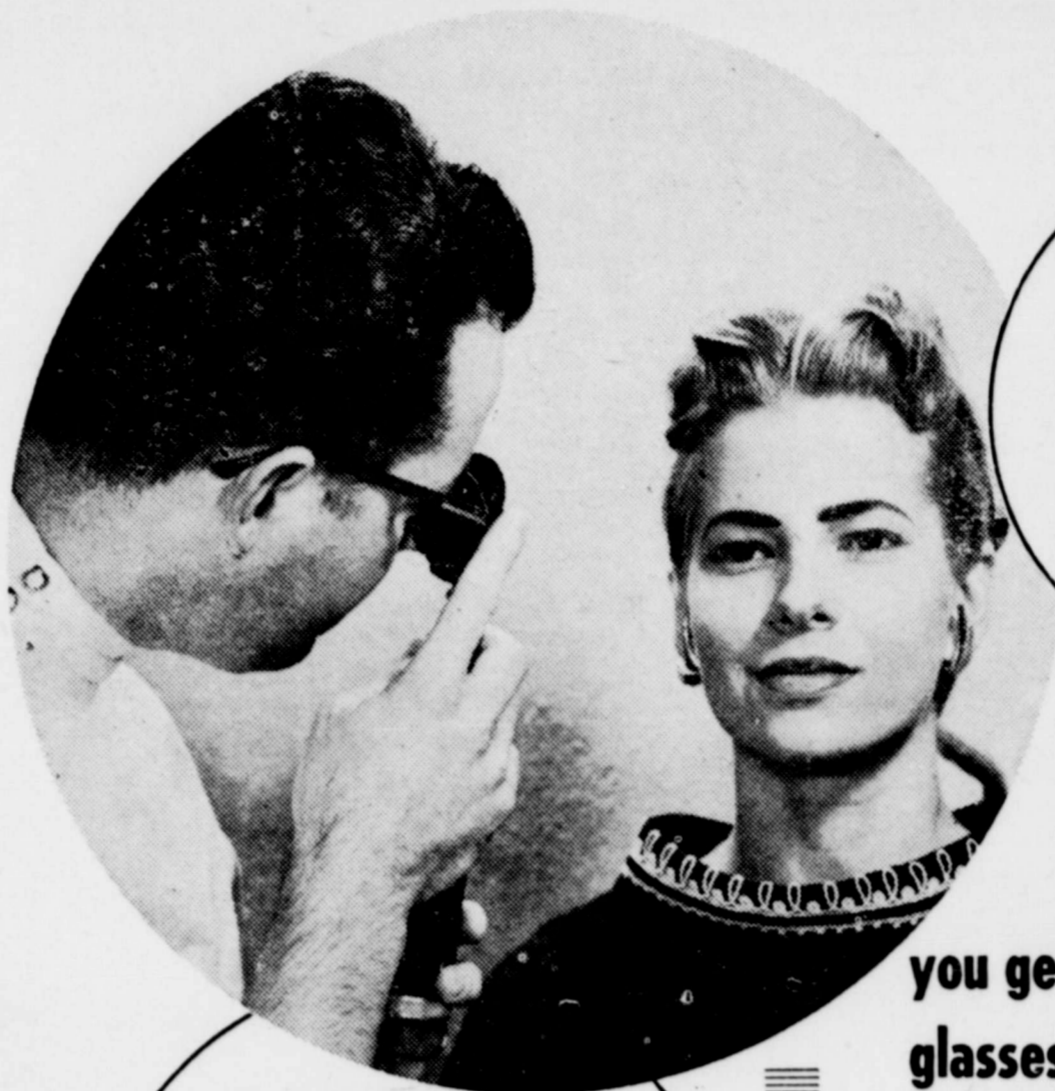

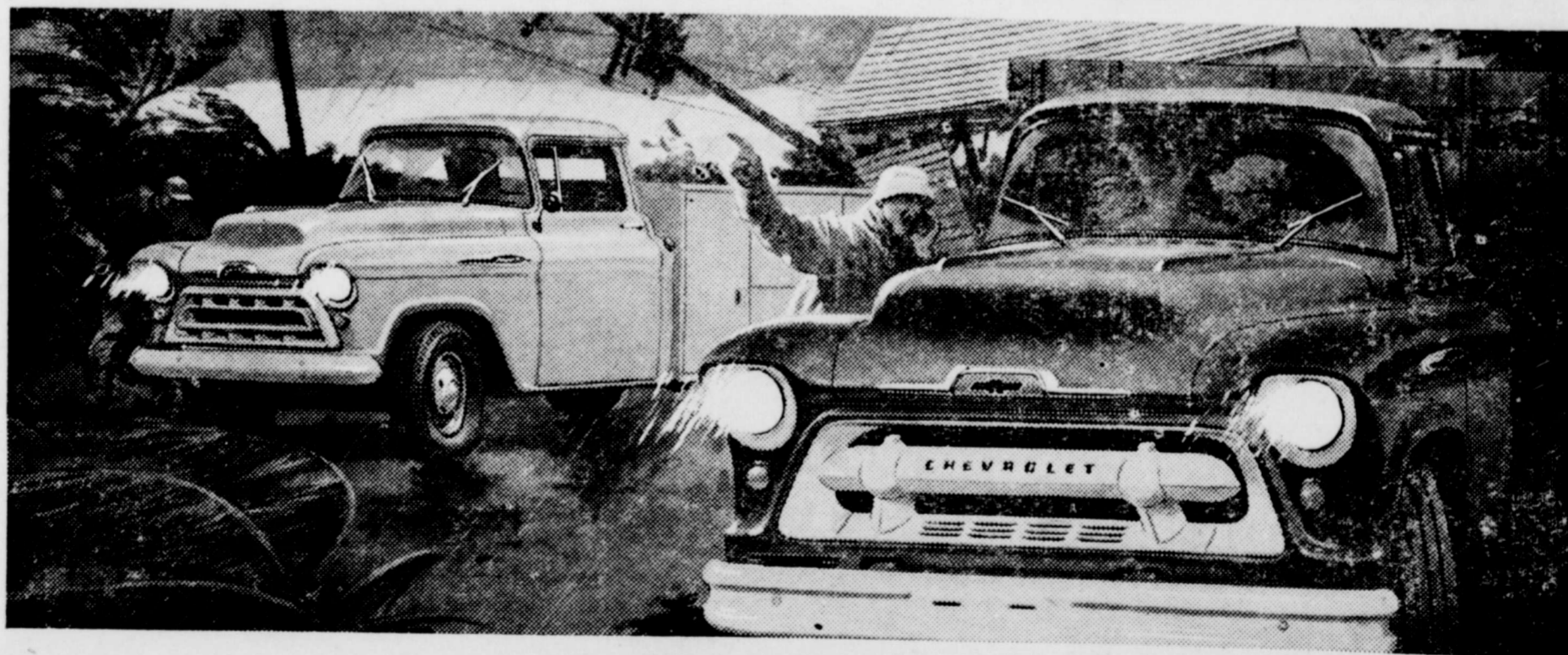

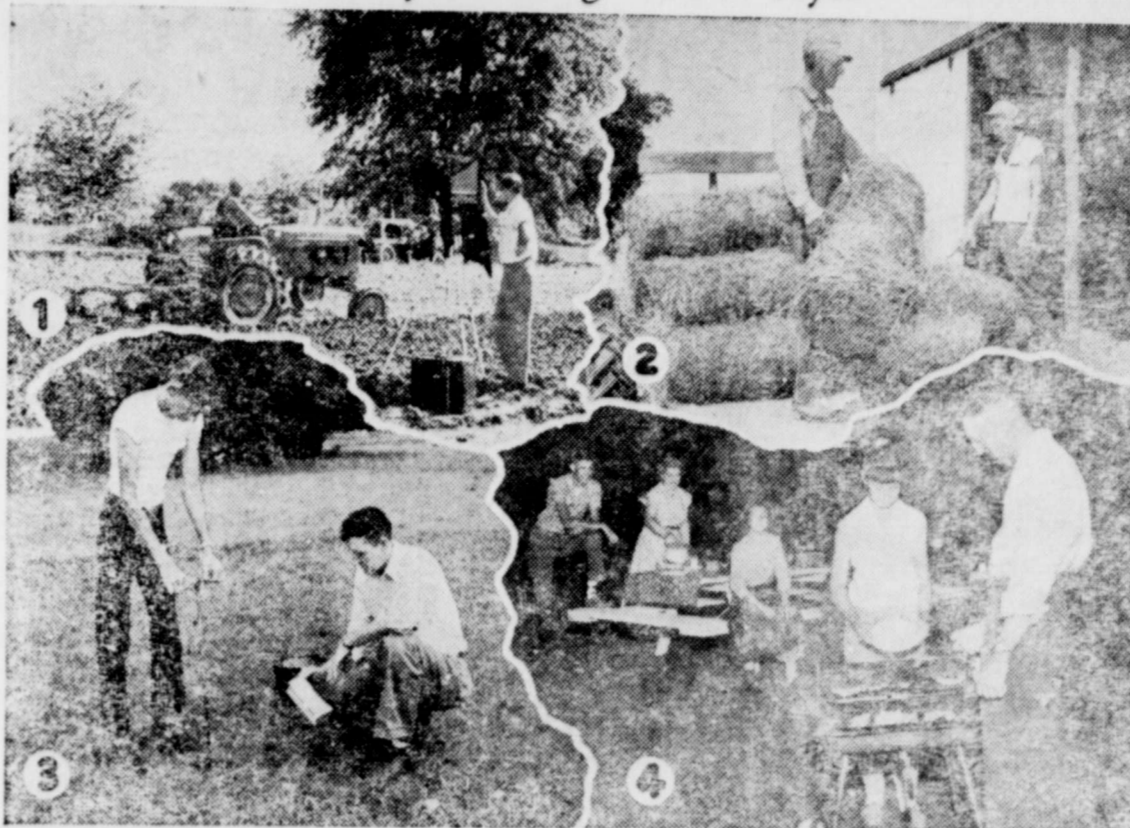

Family Farming - 1957 Style



The Merle Jones family farm located five miles east of Macon, Mo. typifies America's modern family farm. The scenes of the Jones family on their farm illustrate: (1) mechanized farming; (2) storing round bales of alfalfa; (3) taking a soil sample for a Future Farmers of America soil conservation project, and (4) an outdoor family barbecue.

A Missouri farm family shows that "family farming 1957 offers greater opportunities than ever for economic progress," scenes of the Merle Jones family and farm of Route #3, Macon, Mo., are typical of today's family farm—mechanized crop preparation and harvesting, soil conservation, 4-H and Future Farmers of America (FFA) activities and modern family living.

It is pointed out that the average American farm has steadily grown in acreage. But at the same time, the total number of farms is down from about 5.8 million ten years ago to 4.8 farms today. "What is too often overlooked, however, is that today's typical farm, though larger, is still a "family farm"—more so, in fact, than 25 years ago. With modern machines, the family handles more acres and more livestock with less outside help" according to Allis-Chalmers.

Proof that family farming has actually gained in importance is the fact that American family farms now operate 63 per cent of the nation's farm land, compared with 59 per cent only ten years ago. The Jones family farm "is basically a story of growing efficiency on the farm. Farmers have steadily boosted production per acre, per bushel, and per man hour—and their ability to

do so is a good thing for farming and for our nation as a whole".

The Jones family farm consists of 418 acres located five miles east of Macon. In addition to this acreage, Dick Jones, 19, also farms 120 acres nearby.

The Joneses are native to the Macon area and have lived on their present farm since 1942. Mr. and Mrs. Jones are active in community and church organizations and the Jones children—Dick, Linda Beth, 15 and Merlyn Sue, 11—are prominent in farm youth activities.

Dick was the Missouri FFA soil and water management award winner in 1955; president of the Macon county FFA chapter; president Macon county Junior Leaders; State 4-H field crop winner, and has received many other state and county awards in FFA and 4-H work.

Linda Beth recently was a Macon county 4-H winner in sewing and has been active for several years in the local 4-H club. Merlyn Sue, just starting her 4-H work, has already won local awards in food preparation.

"Like progress-minded farmers everywhere, the Joneses are joined in a family enterprise that is uniquely American," Allis-Chalmers said, "combining good business with good living on the farm."

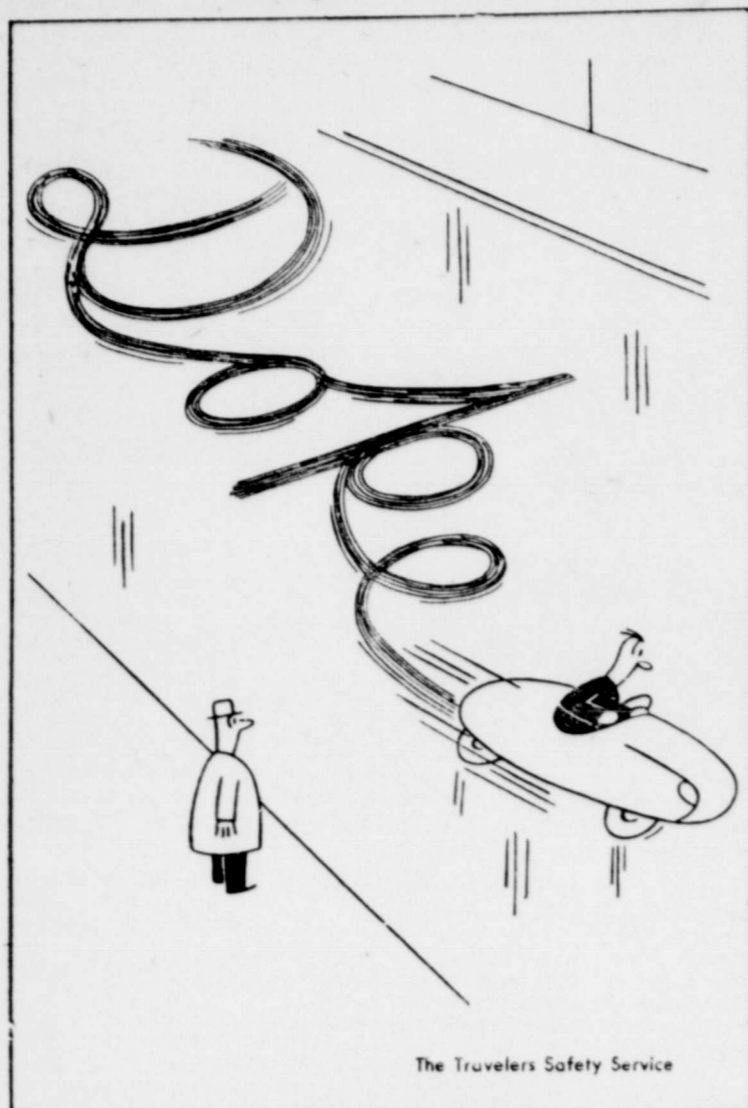

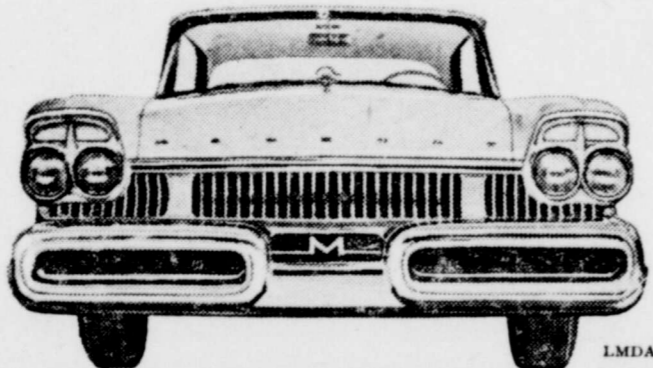

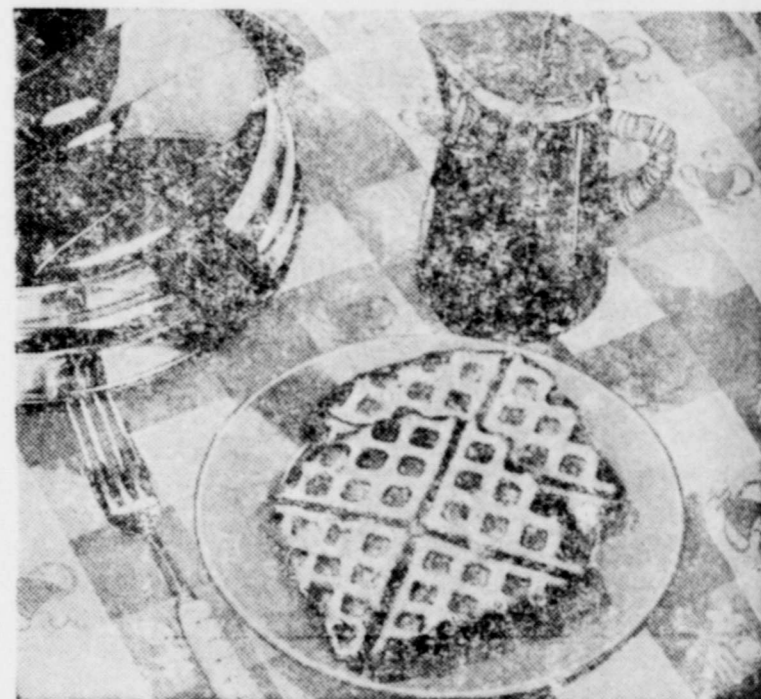

A SUMMER BREAKFAST

Late summer is a time for relaxation and leisurely meals, even at breakfast time. Cook and serve at the table with modern foods and appliances. Enjoy the conversation and these waffles on a cool porch or by an open window with the early morning breeze.

Checkered Waffles
2 cups sifted flour
3 teaspoons baking powder
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
2 tablespoons sugar
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 1/2 cups milk
1/4 cup MAZOLA Corn Oil

Mix and sift first four ingredients into a bowl. Combine slightly beaten eggs, milk and corn oil; add to dry ingredients; blend well. Bake in a hot waffle iron about 3 minutes, or until steaming ceases. Serve hot. Makes six waffles.

Scrambled eggs with sharp cheese creamed eggs with bits of bacon or ham, or creamed chicken and sliced tomatoes just off the vine go wonderfully well with these tender waffles. But if you are a butter and syrup fan when crisp waffles are on the menu, perhaps you'll like to blend the butter and syrup in this way.

MRS. GENE CARR ATTENDS SCHOOL LUNCHROOM WORKSHOP AT TECH IN JULY

The following was written by Mrs. Gene Carr, head of the Sterling City School lunchroom:

I attended the School Lunchroom Workshop held at Texas Tech at Lubbock from July 8 through July 12.

Around 30 ladies were in attendance from the different lunchrooms over a wide area. Classes were held for the instruction of the personnel according to their work in the lunchrooms and the size of the groups being fed.

Lectures were given by people from the different state departments concerned with the program; also by specialists from all phases of the work, with demonstrations of the use of commodities and other feeds.

Menus were stressed with each class required to cook and serve two meals that met the government requirements during the workshop. Information was given as to the amount of food required in lunchroom meals and the type of food to be used. It was especially stressed that meals be held within reach of as many students as possible, and that meals be prepared primarily for their nutritive value. The health of the student is to be the motive when planning the meals.

Contact, not only with the program, but with the many who made up the lunchroom personnel was very instructive and inspiring. An incentive to work for a better program in the coming year was realized.

Since the lunchroom program has become a definite part of the school program, it needs the full support and encouragement of the entire school personnel, as well as the support of the general public which we have always received but no program is above improvement. With the backing of those we serve, we plan to make our program a better one for the coming year. Time and forethought will be given to all phases of the work.

Having attended this workshop I feel that I will be more efficient

in serving you, also, in meeting the requirements as laid down by the government, both State and Federal.

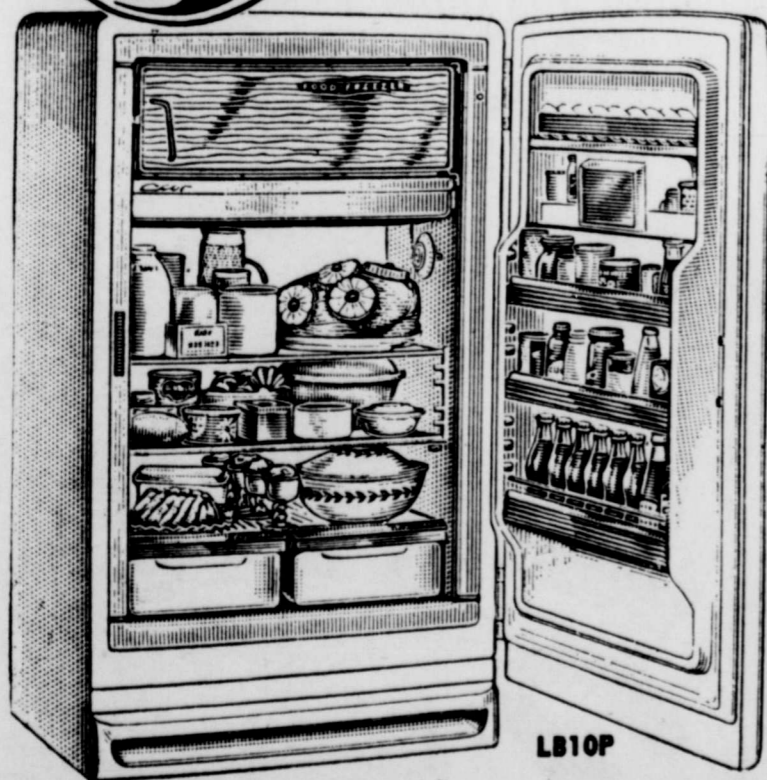

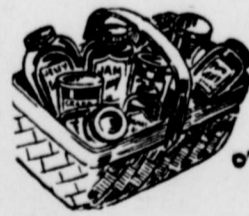
