County Agent's Column

The coming of the new year means the beginning of the spring livestock show circuit for those who participate in this endeavor. Odessa ends 1957 and begins 1958 with their Sand Hills Hereford and Quarter Horse show. Dates for the show are December 31, 1957—January 4, 1958, both dates inclusive.

4-H Club members who have entries in the Odessa show are Mitty Davis, Jerry and Carolyn Payne, Cecilia McDonald, LeRuth Reed and Lee Foster. They will have fat lambs. David Durham will exhibit in the registered Rambouillet show there.

Both lambs and registered Rambouillets will be judged on Tuesday, starting at 8:00 a.m. Fat steers, Herefords only allowed in this show, will be judged that afternoon. Wednesday and Thursday are given over to judging quarter-horses. Friday is devoted to registered Hereford cattle judging. The auction sale of lambs and steers is to be held Saturday morning, January 4. The show concludes with the registered Hereford auction sale Saturday afternoon.

The Odessa show is unique in Texas. It is the only show that confines the show to certain breeds. Hereford cattle, finewool sheep and quarterhorses are all that they will accept as entries. Their reason? The three breeds of animals specified made their section of the country. With a little help from oil wells, that is.

Cattle lice usually cause their worst damage during the winter months when the cow's long, thick hair provides the lice with lots of protection. Lice rob cattle of their ability to produce meat and milk efficiently. However, it is not necessary to sit idly by and let the lice feed on your cattle and gradually sap them of their vitality and production.

Lice on cattle can be controlled by spraying with toxaphene, lindane, methoxychlor, or rotenone. Cattle going to slaughter should not be sprayed with toxaphene however within four weeks of slaughter.

Feel like you have more than ever to keep you busy now? You are probably justified if you do feel that way. The present agricultural worker—farmer or rancher—feeds or supports almost 21 persons here in the United States and abroad; in 1920 he supported 8.27 persons.

During 1956 nearly one person in 11 left the farm or ranch. That made 1956 one of the largest years in record as far as decrease in farm population is concerned. During the last 7 years, the farm population has dropped 4.7 million people. Much of the 1956 decline was due to older people leaving the farm due to becoming eligible for social security.

 A sturdy platform to hold a clothes dryer above a washer solves a space problem in small laundry rooms. If both appliances have front openings and controls, the platform is built directly above the washer, using 3/4 inch plywood for the top, and legs made out of pipe or by 2 x 4 lumber.

PROTECT CAR DOORS
 Removable wood "bumpers" installed on the walls of concrete garages will save scratches on paint and chrome of car doors. Bumpers can be made of 1 by 2-inch or 1 by 4-inch lumber and hung by cords at a height where car door will strike them when opened.

PLIERS STAR DRILL AID
 A pair of vise-grip pliers is an efficient and knuckle-saving aid when drilling holes in concrete with a star drill. The pliers hold the drill firmly, make turning it easier, and keep hands away from possible misses with the hammer.

INSULATION SAVES FUEL
 Studies at the University of Illinois have shown that thick mineral wool insulation can save as much as 40 percent per year on heating bills and reduce operating costs of air conditioning by as much as 67 percent.

VINEGAR SLOWS PLASTER
 Vinegar added to water when mixing plaster of Paris will keep the mixture from hardening too quickly.

BANDS MAKE ACID BRUSH
 A long-lasting soldering acid brush can be made quickly from a few rubber bands pinched together with a piece of sheet metal bent around them for a handle.

ANGLED NAILS FIRMER
 Nails driven in at an angle will have greater holding power. When more than one nail is used in a line, they should be slanted in opposite directions.

DAMPEN SANDPAPER
 Sandpaper will last longer, work better, and resist cracking if the paper back is dampened slightly.

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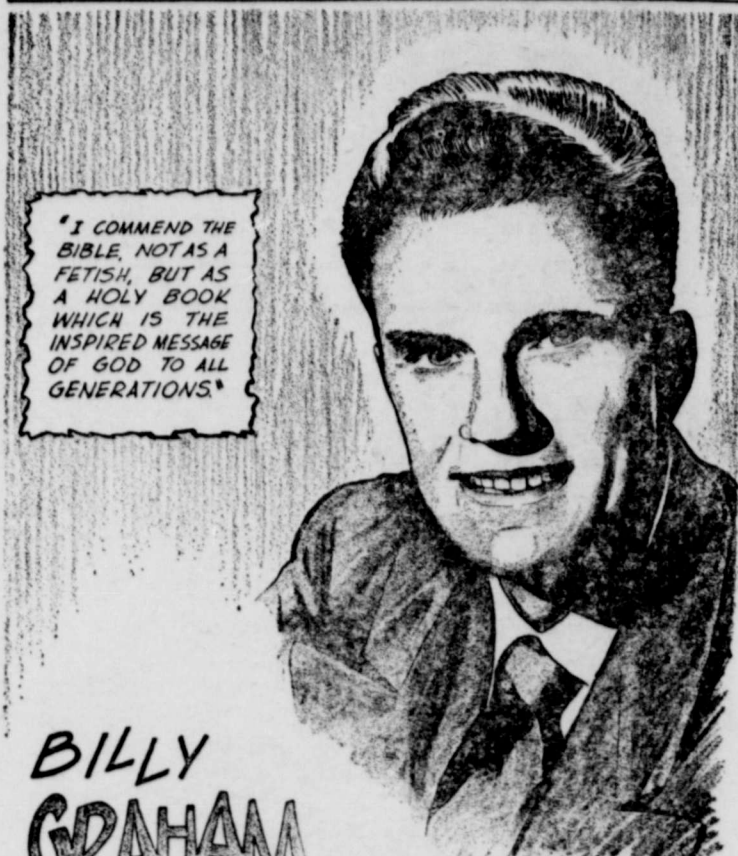

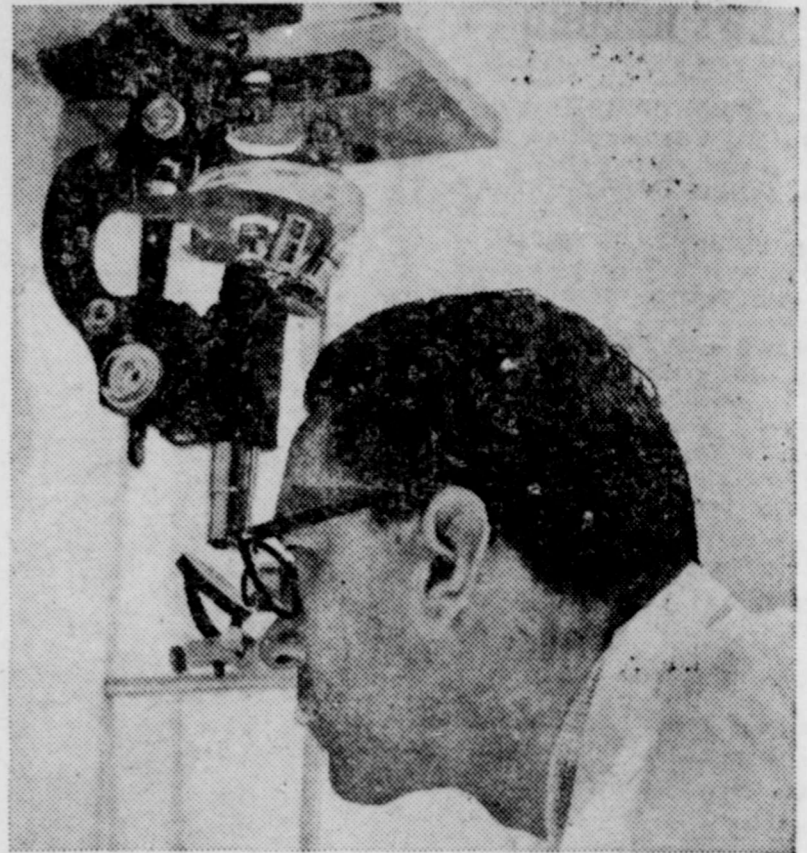
