The auction sale of lambs and steers is to be held Saturday morning, January 4. The show concludes with the registered Hereford auction sale Saturday afternoon.

The Odessa show is unique in Texas. It is the only show that confines the show to certain breeds. Hereford cattle, finewool sheep and quarterhorses are all that they will accept as entries. 

Roy Carter's Sister Dies



Sometimes there's another approach...

Ordinarily you'd see a user of the microscope looking down. March of Dimes scientists use the microscope upside down to study the growth of viruses used in research on new drugs. Techniques adapted to the particular needs of medical investigations have brought us to the brink of a tremendous era in fighting disease and providing freedom from pain.

March of Dimes research on viruses and cells will be greatly expanded in the future, so that "leads" which promise hope may be tracked down by scores of determined scientists.
