The San Angelo Stock Show last week concluded the spring stock show circuit for 4-H club members. Twenty-eight lambs, six registered Rambouillets, and three groups of commercial range ewe lambs were entered by Sterling County 4-H club members.

Club members who exhibited were as follows: Mitsy Davis, Clayton Stewart, Jerry and Carolyn Payne, Larry Miller, Reynolds Lee and David Foster, LeRuth Reed, Cecilia and Jeannie McDonald, Lynda Allen, Claudia Collins, Temple Ann Foster and David Durham.

Placings by Sterling County 4-H club members were as follows: 5th place heavy finewool lamb, Cecilia McDonald; 14th place light crossbred, Clayton Stewart; 25th place heavy crossbred, Jeannie McDonald; 11th place registered Rambouillet ewe lamb, David Durham. David also had 13th and 15th place two tooth Rambouillet bucks.

For the first time in a number of years, the show went off without a sandstorm or "West Texas rain." Rain fell during two days of the show but it was the real variety. Things were pretty messy and sloppy around the barns, sheep were damp and hard to card and trim but no one minded that—it was a welcome change to all concerned.

In the auction sale held on Saturday, sixty fat lambs were sold. They were selected from the various classes on the percentage of lambs shown in the class. Thus in the largest class more lambs were sold. Twenty-three lightweight finewool lambs, thirteen heavy finewools, eight light crossbreds, and sixteen heavy crossbreds were sold. Only one of the Sterling County 4-H club lambs, the fifth place finewool heavy lamb shown by Cecilia made the sale. It was purchased by Clayton Webster for seventy dollars. All the lambs were sold on the dollar basis rather than a pound basis. The other lambs were sold to packers. Lightweight lambs brought \$25.25 and heavy lambs \$20 per hundred.

Sterling County 4-H club members won the neatness award during the show. This award is fifteen dollars for the 4-H club or FFA chapter judged to have the neatest exhibit. Other factors considered are the appearance of the exhibitors in the show ring, their timeliness in being ready for the various classes, their compliance with the judges and managing instructions, and the appearance of the animals and equipment.

This year all troughs and water buckets were repainted and stenciled with the county name and the 4-H club emblem. A new sign was made for the club. In addition, each

4-H club member's sign was in a new frame made of cap molding and painted green. According to the judge's decision, the personal appearance of the club members was the deciding factor however. Congratulations to all the county exhibitors on your appearance, your sportsmanship and overall stability.

Now is the time to fertilize your fish pond. Fertilizer not only increases the amount of food for the fish but also helps to control the submerged mosses in the pond.

The same fertilizer recommended for crops should be used since the water in the pond will be deficient in the same nutrients as the soil over which it flows. In this area, the main deficiency is nitrogen. An application of 100 pounds of ammonium nitrate per surface acre of water should be applied now. Additional applications should be made later; applications should not be made during the hot summer months. Periodic checks are advised to determine when to put in more fertilizer. This is done by submerging the arm in the water to the elbow. If the thumb can be plainly seen, add more fertilizer. This should be about half the first application.

## County Polio Group Met Tuesday Morning

The Sterling County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis met Tuesday morning in the courthouse. Mrs. Martin C. Reed was named as chairman of the county group, replacing G. C. Murrell, who resigned. Mrs. Billy Ralph Bynum was named to the executive committee.

A total of \$250 was sent to national headquarters. 25 percent of money raised in the March of Dimes drive now goes to the medical aid division—helping those who already have polio and need treatment of any kind. Fifty percent of the balance goes to national headquarters and the remaining fifty percent stays in the county for any polio treatment—or projects needed.

## J. T. Davis' Will To Be Probated March 17

### LEAVES \$30,000 TO CHARITY

The will of J. T. Davis, filed here last week for probate action, made bequests of \$30,000 to charities. Otherwise extensive ranch properties and banking interests were left equally divided among relatives with two exceptions.

These provided for Jim Hinshaw, ranch foreman, and Flavy Davis, a nephew.

Hinshaw is to receive \$2,000 annually for 10 years and a reasonable salary as long as his services are needed by executors. Flavy Davis is to receive all of his uncle's shares in the First National Bank here.

Probate hearing has been set for March 17, Worth Durham, estate attorney, said.

The charitable bequests included \$10,000 for the Good Shepherd Episcopal Church of Austin, \$10,000 for the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, Inc., Austin and \$10,000 to Boys Ranch near Tankersley.

The late banker and ranchman provided in his will for payment of his just debts and names Flavy E. Davis of 2919 Ella E. Lane, Houston and R. T. Foster and H. L. Hildebrand of Sterling City executors. The will devises that these men shall "at their sole discretion, hold, liquidate and consolidate my estate for a period of five years," if that length of time is needed for distribution.

No estimate of the worth of the estate is made in the will. The Davis properties include a 55-section ranch in this county.

The will sets up 11 shares of equal value and bequeaths same as follows:

"(A) To my brother, Jack Davis of Little Rock, one share;

"(B) To my brother L. J. Davis, Dallas, one share;

"(C) To my brother, Jim N. Davis, of Crawford, Tex., one share;

"(D) To my sister, Mrs. Ella East, of Little Rock, one share.

"(E) To my sister, Mrs. Phebe East of Little Rock, one share;

"(F) To my sister-in-law, Mrs. Ollie Davis, of Marlin, one share;

"(G) To my nephew, Jim Stump of Tulsa, one share;

"(H) To my nephew, Bill Miller of Tulsa, one-half of one share;

"(I) To my niece, Kathryn McCaskil, of Malvern, Ark., one-half of one share;

"(J) To my nephew, Flavy E. Davis of Houston, one share;

"(K) To my cousin, William P. Davis of 600 Park St., Waco, one-half of one share;

"(L) To my cousin, Jack T. Davis of Waco, one half of one share,

"(M) To my cousin, Mary Davis Temple, of Waco, one share;

"They to take the same in fee simple forever; in the event that any of the above named beneficiaries should predecease me, then and in that event, the portion above bequeathed shall pass to the children or descendants of such deceased beneficiary equally per stirpes."

The will provides that in the event Hinshaw should die during the 10-year period, the bequest should cease and the balance thereof revert to the residuary estate.

THE HOUSE Voted last week to give Congress new, tighter controls over Federal spending. Backed by Hoover Commission approval, the bill provides that Congress shall put a limit each year on how much money each agency of the Government can spend. As it now is the Congress may appropriate \$300 million to build an aircraft carrier, and the money can then be spent in one, two, three years, to suit the Navy.

Thus, under this new proposal, the Defense Department would be required to justify each year how much money it intends to spend and Congress would set the limit. The Hoover Commission figured this reform would save a lot of money. I voted for the bill.

Speaking of the Hoover Commission, the total now runs a little over more than 75 percent approval on all the recommendations of that group.

TEXAS INDEPENDENCE DAY was celebrated in Washington just as it was all over the world where as many as half a dozen Texans could get together. Dr. Logan Wilson, president of Texas University, came to Washington to speak to the Texas ex-students and their guests.

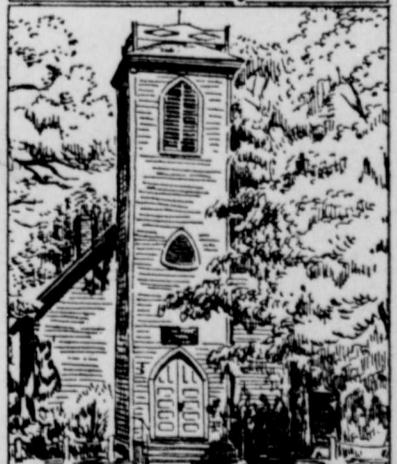
A Texas gem, a \$10 treasury warrant, dated June 19, 1863, was given to me recently. An original, it is drawn on the State Treasury, payable to to Wise County, or bearer, signed personally by C. R. Johns, State Comptroller.

ANOTHER TEXAS GEM, an old 1911 publication, entitled APACHE RELATIONS IN TEXAS, was recently given me by the author, Dr. Wm. Edward Dunn. Written while he was teaching at the University long out of print, this booklet is an authentic, documented history of Apache operations from 1718 to 1750.

While I am on the Apache subject, in response to a request I recently wrote a chapter for a book on the great frontier Indian battles. The subject assigned me was "The Battle of Bandera Pass." While that famous battle was between Texas Rangers under the great Captain Jack Hays and the Comanches, the site—about 12 miles north of Bandera—was the historic home of the Apache before his retreat westward after a disastrous defeat at the hands of Spanish troops at the same pass a hundred years earlier. That Bandera area is seething with frontier history, much of which has been preserved by the late and lamented J. Marvin Hunter.

#### Holiday Macaroons

1 1/4 cups Angel Flake Coconut; 1/2 cup finely cut dates or figs; 1/2 cup walnuts, cut; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 egg, well beaten; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine coconut, dates or figs, walnuts, sugar and salt; mix well. Add egg and vanilla and blend; let stand 5 minutes. Then drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove at once from baking sheet. Makes about 1 1/2 dozen macaroons.

### San Angelo Stock Show Results

Sterling FFA members took 25 fat lambs to the San Angelo Fat Stock Show. This show finishes the year's circuit.

Melvin Foster had a 13th place lightweight finewool and sold it in the sale Saturday for \$60.00 to Hemphill-Wells Co. This was a Fowler McEntire lamb.

Don McDonald placed his Copeland Bros. lamb 15th in the heavy finewool class. This is the lamb that was champion finewool at the County Show and won his class at the Abilene Show. There were 13 heavy lambs in the sale so Don did not make the sale.

Tony Allen won a fifth place in the range ewe lamb show. His three ewe lambs were Dayton Barrett breeding. The top ten groups of ewe lambs were shorn then scored on body confirmation and fleeces. Tony's ewes scored 168 out of a possible 180 points on body and 105 out of a possible 120 points on fleece for a total of 273 points out of a possible 300. The top group of ewes scored a total of 285.

In the livestock judging contest Saturday morning, the Sterling FFA team consisting of Don McDonald, Danny Stewart, Melvin Foster and Marvin Foster scored a total of 1233 points out of a possible 1500. Don McDonald was second overall high individual with a score of 433 out of a possible 500. The high individual, James Sweeten of Rock-springs, scored 446.

The first place team scored 1,264, 31 points above the Sterling team. Danny Stewart scored 416; Melvin Foster—384 and Marvin—379. The high team in cattle was Llano with 677. The Sterling team scored 661 in cattle. The high team in sheep was O'Donnel with 628. The Sterling group scored 572 in sheep.

The next livestock judging contest will be March 22 at San Angelo College. Then a contest at Sul Ross College on April 5 and at Texas Tech on April 26.
