





Holiday Macaroons

11/2 cups Angel Flake Coconut; 1/2 cup finely cut dates or figs; 1/2 cup walnuts, cut; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/8 teaspoon salt; 1 egg, well beaten; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla.

Combine coconut, dates or figs, walnuts, sugar and salt; mix well. Add egg and vanilla and blend; let stand 5 minutes. Then drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350°F.) 15 minutes, or until golden brown. Remove at once from baking sheet. Makes about 11/2 dozen macaroons.




