Rufus Foster Elected Mayor Tuesday

Lee Reed and Harvey Glass Named to Council

Rufus W. Foster was named new mayor of Sterling City in the election here Tuesday. Foster replaces Mayor John Walraven, who has been mayor since the city was incorporated. Foster received 60 of the write-in votes and Walraven 51. Foster had not campaigned for the office, in fact, had campaigned against himself, but was elected. The incumbent had not been seeking reelection. Walraven said he would serve if reelected, but he did not actually seek reelection. Thirteen of the write-in votes went to Foster S. Price, who was in no way a candidate for the office.

Lee Reed got 74 votes for councilman and Harvey Glass got 67. They will replace R. T. Caperton and Cecil Long, resigned, on the council. R. P. Brown and Hugh Harzke received 49 votes each in the write-in voting. Others receiving scattered votes were H.A. Chapple, Martin C. Reed, Foster S. Price, Marvin Churchill and Pat Boatler.

One hundred and twenty-seven votes were cast in Tuesday's election, or approximately one-half the total possible. No names had been certified for the ballot and no one actively wanted the offices. Other members of the city council are J. I. Cope, Horace Donalson and Fred Hodges.

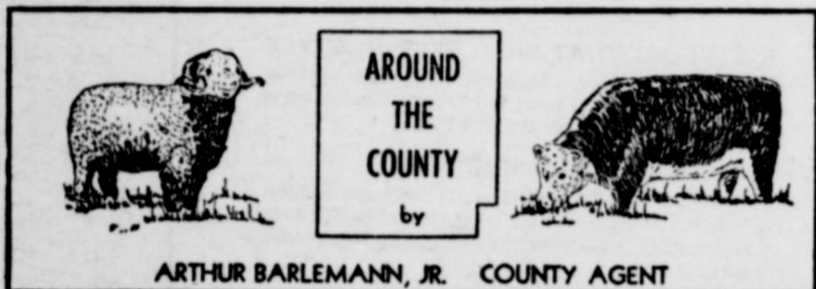

The warm days such as Tuesday and Wednesday are going to be ideal for the growth of the home lawn. Most of the Bermuda lawns are beginning to show green, especially the south side of a building where it had a little more protection.

With the lawn beginning to green up, the time is ripe for applying fertilizer to assure it of a good supply of nutrients for the spring season. A commercial fertilizer should be applied now as soon as the lawn shows evidence of beginning to grow.

There are a number of commercial fertilizer grades which may be used but one which usually gives very good results in the spring is ammonium sulphate. It contains about 21% nitrogen; mmonium nitrate contains 33% nitrate and is good. The biggest benefit from using the ammonium sulphate (or sulfate) is the fact that it does not burn the grass as badly as the nitrate. It contains less nitrogen and is cheaper also on the sack basis. The ammonium nitrate does have a tendency to burn if applied too heavily or if the grass happens to be a little damp and the fertilizer sticks to the grass leaves. Either one can be bought in the pellet form which is easier to apply.

Ammonium sulfate should be applied at the rate of 5 pounds to a 1,000 square feet of lawn space. Ammonium nitrate should be applied at the rate of 3 pounds per 1,000 square feet. Applications should be made every 30 to 40 days during the summer. Cottonseed meal may also be used at the rate of 15 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

The lawn should be well watered after each application so the fertilizer goes into solution and reaches grass roots. The next step is to have a good sharp lawnmower available.

There have been quite a few requests and calls regarding the large number of white grubs which are present in the lawn and garden. These grubs are the larvae of May beetles and are quite destructive to lawns and gardens.

They can be controlled by treating the area with chlordane, aldrin, dieldrin or heptachlor. Of these named, chlordane is the one which is easiest to buy in feed or seed or drug stores. It may be applied either as a dust or spray, depending on the equipment available for the

job. If used as a dust, chlordane should be applied to the area at the rate of 3/4 pound per 1,000 square feet. It may be mixed with the fertilizer and applied at the same time if desired. After the dust has been applied, water the lawn well so the dust will soak into the soil and get to the grubs.

If used as a spray, chlordane emulsion at the rate of 1 1/2 ounces (3 tablespoons) to 5 gallons of water is recommended. This should be applied at the rate of 25 gallons to 1,000 square feet.

None of the insecticides named are harmful to plants. They may be used in complete safety as far as plants are concerned.

Bitterweed is plentiful on Sterling County ranges this year. Always in good supply, it was spread by the high water following the hard rain in October which saw creeks and draws and the river higher than at any time since 1936.

A number of ranchers are going to do spraying to control the weed. There is too much of it on most places to make pulling feasible and the spray route is about the only way left. Throughout the last few years, ranchers have been doing spraying by means of turbine sprayers mounted on jeeps, and using 2,4-D as a killing agent. Fowler McEntire, Foster Conger, Tommy Foster, Finis Westbrook, Riley King, Charles Speck and others have had satisfactory results in the past. This year a group is working on buying 2,4-D cooperatively in large lots to save money. They are also working on a plan to have some aerial spraying done. Cost of the aerial spraying is going to be determined largely by the price they have to pay for the herbicide. Aerial application will cost about \$1.25 per acre which includes flagmen; it also includes the applicator's mixing equipment and hauling water.

For best results spray should be applied before the weed has reached the full flower stage. Ideal time is when the majority of it is in the bud and early flower stage with the majority of the seed germinated and up. Some experimental plots using different rates of herbicide and water will also be set up in the county utilizing both aerial equipment and ground equipment. More on that project will be reported later as the plans for the plots are completed.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



CHANCES FOR Statehood for Hawaii and Alaska this year appear, on the surface, to be good, but this appearance may be a delusion. With a lot of public support (Gallup says 64%) and statehood bills reported favorably in both the House and Senate, and with the endorsement of both major political parties, it looks like a cinch. Yet if I were guessing I would predict no statehood in 1958.

In the first place, statehood bills must clear the House Rules Committee before they can be programmed for debate. It happens that a majority of the members of the Rules Committee have in the past voted against statehood. Moreover, while giving lip service to the admissions, there seems to be a lack of enthusiasm on the part of the White House and congressional leaders. All added together this may mean Old Glory will remain like it is for at least another year.

STRONGEST OPPOSITION to statehood centers in the South, where fear is expressed that the two new states would weaken the southern position in the House and Senate, already pushed around and outnumbered on many vital issues. A Texan wrote me recently and

expressed it this way:
 "Off shore members would hold the balance of power in close votes. It would also mean more "Anti-South" votes in Congress. Why bring in members who have little in common with us in culture, tradition or heritage. . . Let us keep the Nation as it is."

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION was featured last week when a hundred Texas REA managers and Coop directors came to Washington in an annual get-together, attended by most of the Texans in Congress. From our immediate area came Mr. and Mrs. L. M. Stephens of Lometa, E. Babe Smith of Lampasas, Weldon Groves of Hamilton, Mr. and Mrs. Eleanor Gromatsky of Priddy, and Riggs Sheppard of Hondo. As of last July a total of 94.8 percent of the Nation's farms had electric service. That is a record we can all be proud of.

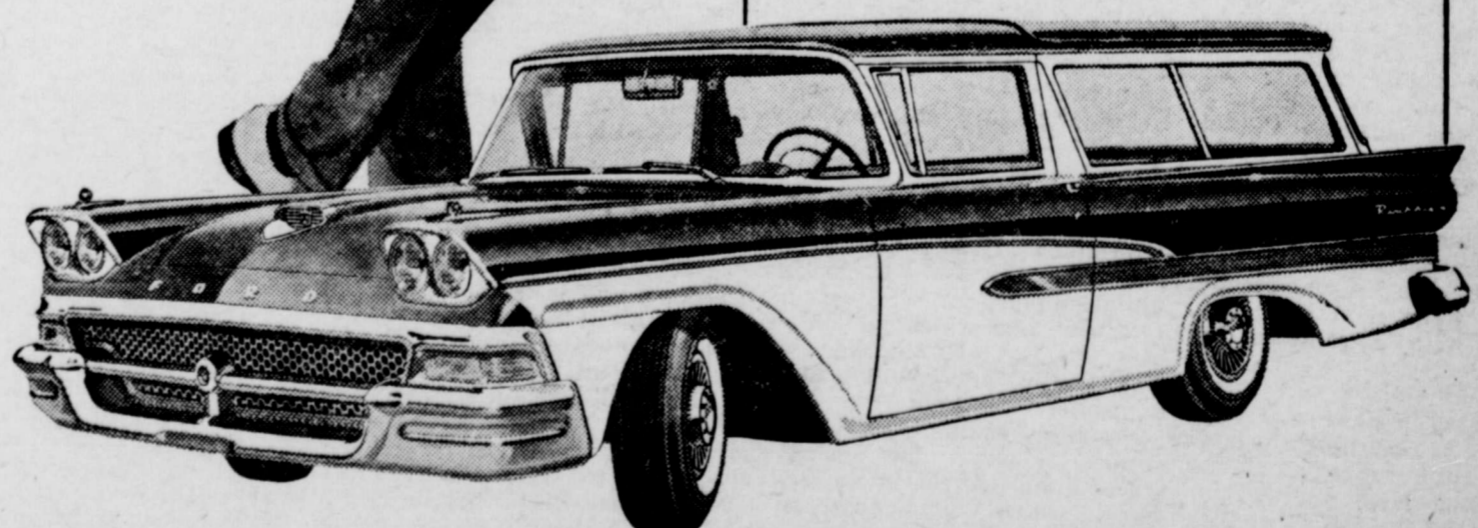

The tea table was covered with a Maderia cloth, centered with yellow and white flowers. White tapers in crystal holders flanked the flowers.

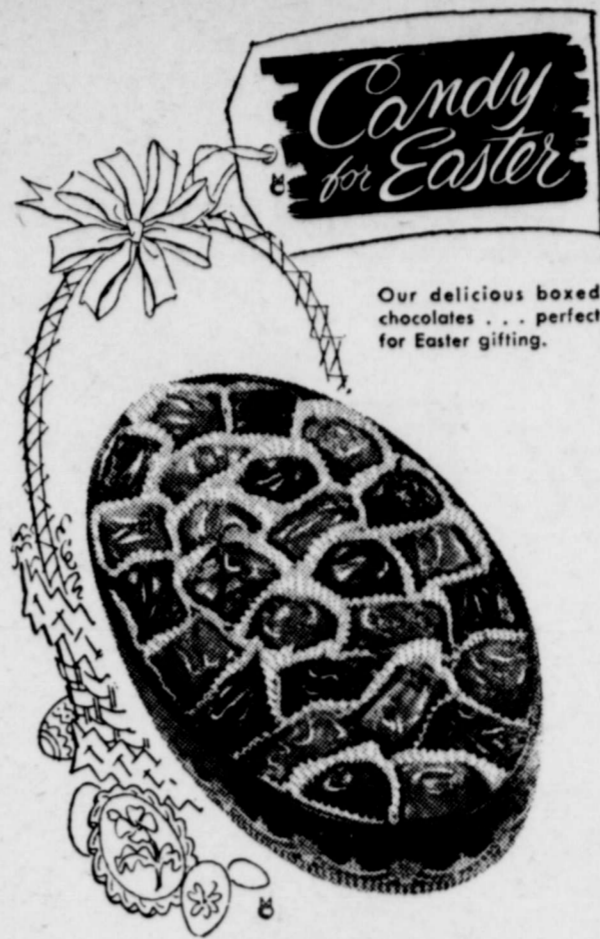
Flower arrangements of yellow and white, the honoree's chosen colors, were featured throughout the room.

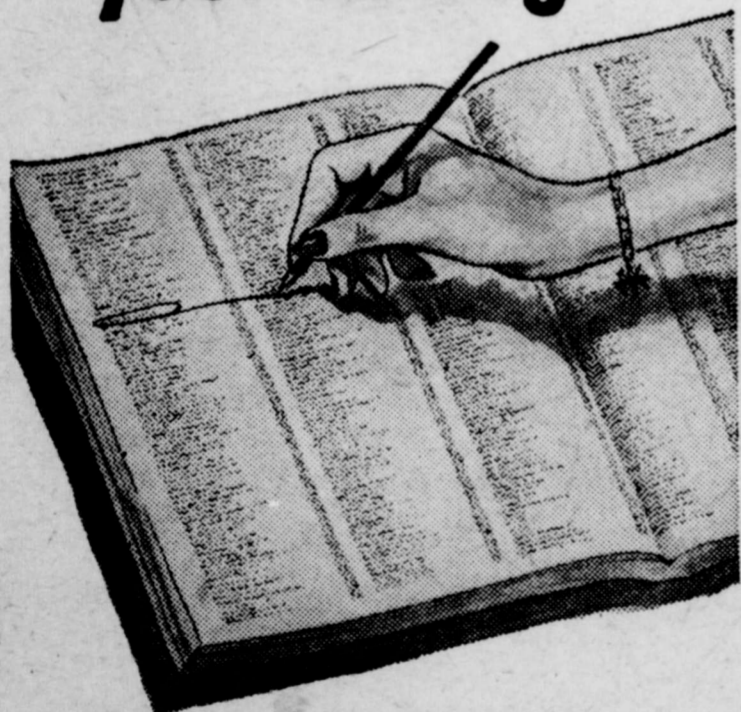

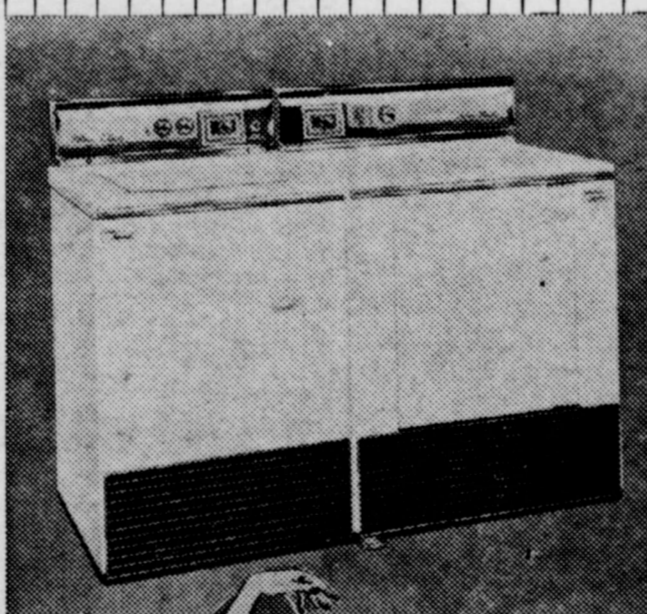

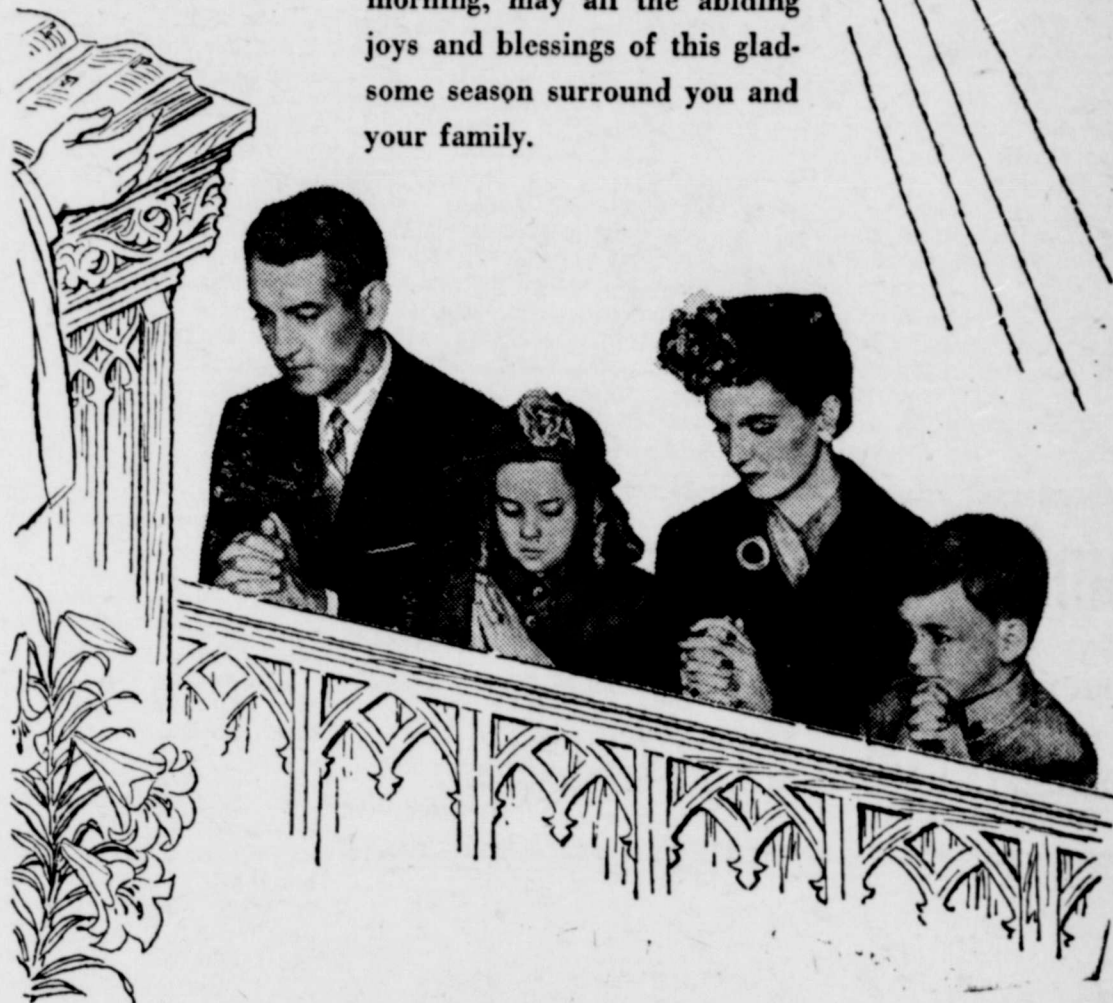
