Tuesday, April 15 is a red letter day for millions of taxpayers in the United States. That's the date that all income tax returns and payments are due in the office of the Director of Internal Revenue. Tax payers in this area are to send their completed returns to the Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas 1, Texas.

A shade tree which does well in West Texas is usually a prized possession but one of the trees that does fairly well here is also a source of irritation and a nuisance. The mulberry tree provides a good shade and they do fairly well in this section of the state but they are somewhat of an aggravation when the berries fall. This is especially true where they shade a driveway or sidewalk or a roof.

The fruiting mulberry can be kept from fruiting to a certain extent if sprayed with the following mixture: 2 tablespoons lead arsenate, 3 tablespoons hydrated lime, 3 tablespoons dry line sulphur, 3 gallons of water. The proportions of course can be changed according to the size of the trees and the number of trees to be sprayed. Trees should be sprayed when in bloom and while the flowers are 1-3 to 1-2 developed before pollination has taken place. They will probably have to be sprayed at least two or three times to get a good kill on the flowers. The tree will not be hurt by the spray; fertilization of the flowers is stopped and fruit is not developed. Secret of the spray is applying it at the right time each time a crop of flowers put out.

There are acres and acres of bit-terweed in Sterling county and all over West Texas this year as a result of the wet winter and spring. Too, the weed has been spread over a much wider area than usual due to the heavy rain which fell here in October. Seed were carried by the rivers and creeks and distributed over much country where it had not been found previously. The seed are heavy and whenever the water was slowed down by an obstruction, the seed settled out and now it is quite easy to find the high water marks by locating how far the weed has spread.

This year for the first time since 1949, aerial spray of the weed is going to be done by a number of the ranchers. For years, many Sterling county ranchers have been spraying using ground equipment such as the Buffalo Turbine sprayers and getting good kills. An advantage of the aerial spray over the ground equipment is the fact that it is so much faster. With the wind blowing as it usually does here, it is hard to get over much country with ground equipment. With an airplane, a large acreage can be covered when the weather is suitable. Most of the spraying will more than likely be done early in the morning or late in the evening when the wind has died down. A factor in the plane's favor this year is the fact that the mesquite has not started to leaf out yet. Most of the weed will need to be sprayed in the next couple of weeks and since the mesquite has not started out, it will not hinder the application of the herbicide.

Recommendations for both ground and air equipment call for the application of at least 3/4 pound of 2,4-D per acre. The amount of water used will depend on the equipment used; the plane will apply 4 gallons in most cases, more if the rancher desires it. Ground equipment should use that much and perhaps more.

Along these lines, the Extension Service and the Experiment Station and the Range Department of A&M College are going to set up some plots in Sterling County to determine the best method of application and amounts of water and herbicide to use. Plots to be sprayed by air will get varying amounts of herbicide, different amounts of water, and the use of some 2,4,5-T. Ground equipment will be used on another set of plots along the same lines to determine if there are advantages to the use of more herbicides, more water, and 2,4,5-T. Cooperating in the experiments

will be Garlyn Hoffman, formerly county agent here and now Extension Service Range Specialist; Bobby Joe Ragsdale, Associate Range Specialist; Dr. O. E. Sperry, Professor of Range and Forestry, A&M College; local ranchers cooperating will be Riley King, Fowler McEntire and Ewing McEntire. Alvin Miller of the Miller Dusting Service in San Angelo will do the flying for the plots, contributing his services and equipment free of any charge.

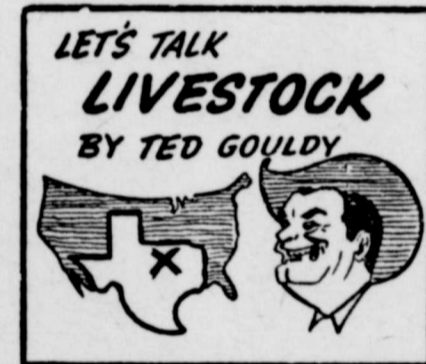

LIVESTOCK MARKETS SHOW STRENGTH. RUNS LIGHT

FORT WORTH—Farmers took to the fields in large numbers in the Southwest over the week-end, and the livestock numbers were sharply lower at Fort Worth Monday. Apparently similar conditions prevailed in many other parts of the country, since livestock reported around the 12 major markets of the country were down sharply in all species.

Twelve markets had some 20,000 fewer cattle and calves than a week earlier, and the offerings were about 14,000 under a year ago. Hogs reported were only 52,700, against 77,200 a week earlier and 64,000 a year ago. The decline in sheep receipts was a little smaller as 12 markets reported 29,100, against 36,600 last week and 34,400 one year ago.

All of these figures added up to a strong position for the sellers of livestock, and prices were fully steady to unevenly higher on all kinds.

CATTLE AND CALVES OPEN STRONG, SPOTS HIGHER

Fed beefs were again in very small supply at Fort Worth, and prices were strong to 50 cents higher on grainfeds. Cows were also strong, spots 25 to 50 cents above the low close last week. Bulls were steady. Slaughter calves were strong to 50 cents higher. Stockers were very active at stronger prices, some stocker yearlings scaling 548 pounds getting to \$30.

Good to low choice fed steers and yearlings drew \$25 to \$29.50, lower grades sold from \$17 to \$25. Fat cows drew \$17 to \$20.50, some cows from the Robertson Ranch in Stephens County at \$20.50 for the day's top of the class. Canners and cutters sold from \$13 to \$17. Bulls were reported at \$15 to \$20.50.

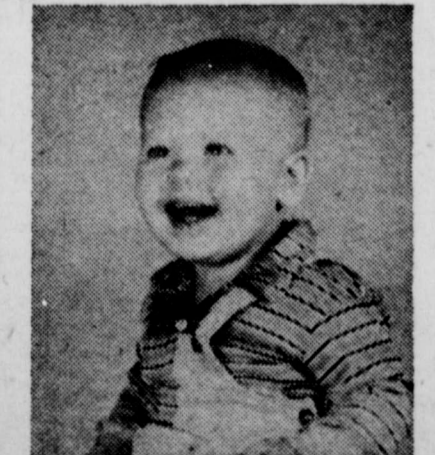

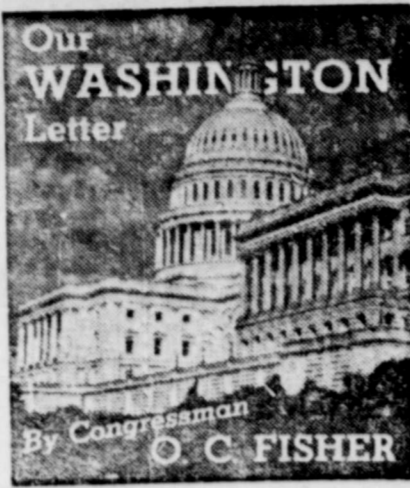

Baptist Church BAPTIST CHURCH ENTERS ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

The First Baptist Church of Sterling City is participating in the 1958 Texas Baptist Church Achievement Program, sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, pastor Billy Crews said this week.

Desired to stimulate interest in small church work, the program recognizes outstanding achievements by pastors and churches in areas of church, community and world improvement.

More than 335 Texas Baptist town and country churches participated in the program last year.

Each church participating in the program sets up goals for advancement in the three areas. An inventory questionnaire furnishes suggestions for projects, such as health education, community recreation, citizenship training, race relation studies and world missions. Individual churches, however, select their own projects for the program.

Winning pastors in each of the BGCT'S 17 districts receive a parchment scroll and the church a metal plaque which may be displayed in a prominent position outside the building.

Churches in the open country and in towns up to 2,500 population are eligible to enter the program. Approximately two-thirds of all Texas Baptist churches are classified as town and country congregations.

The program has been expanded this year to include all Spanish-speaking locations regardless of location.

Records and scrapbooks are under the direction of three special committees. The scrapbooks are the basis for judging the associational, district and statewide levels.

Darwin Farmer, direct missions associate for the BGCT, is in charge of the program. He said surveys among participating churches show the rate of baptisms nearly twice as high as the general average for all churches.

\$26 to \$28.50, while plain and medium grades sold from \$17.50 to \$25. Rannies sold from \$14 to \$17. Stocker steer calves of good grades sold from \$25 to \$30, and choice kinds were scarce. Good and choice stocker yearlings sold from \$25 to \$30.

**LAMBS FIND STRONG MARKET,
SPRINGERS SCARCE**

Old crop yearling lambs made up

more than three-quarters of the receipts at Fort Worth Monday and Spring lambs were a scant 20% of the run. Trade was active and prices strong from the start. The run again contained sizable numbers of medium and lower grades, which continued to sell exceptionally well.

Good and choice spring lambs sold at \$23.50 to \$24.50 and some cull to medium kinds sold from \$18 to \$23. Good and choice old crop shorn lambs with No. 1 or Fall shorn pelts cashed at \$21 to \$21.50, and

more recently shorn kinds sold from \$20 to \$21. A few lots of medium to fair stocker old crops sold from \$18 to \$19.

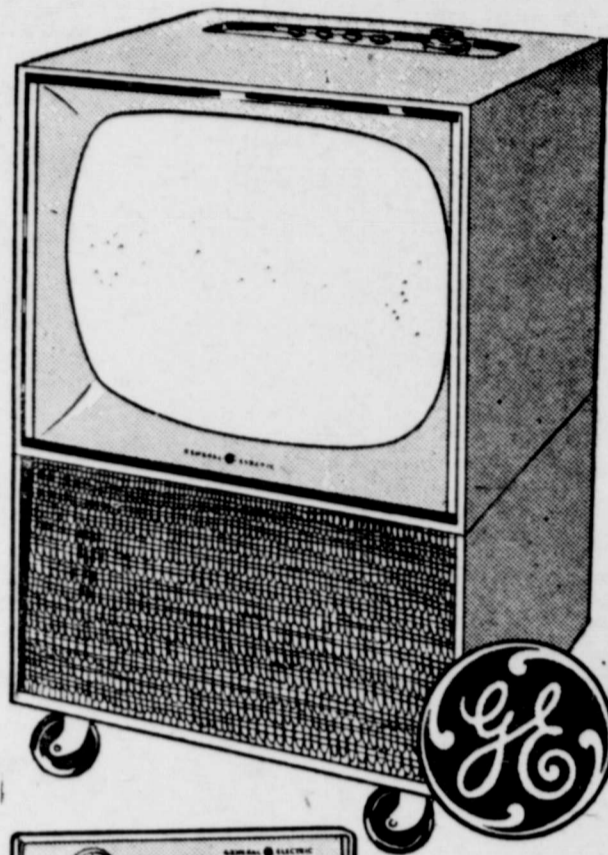

REASON FOR STRONG PRICES**

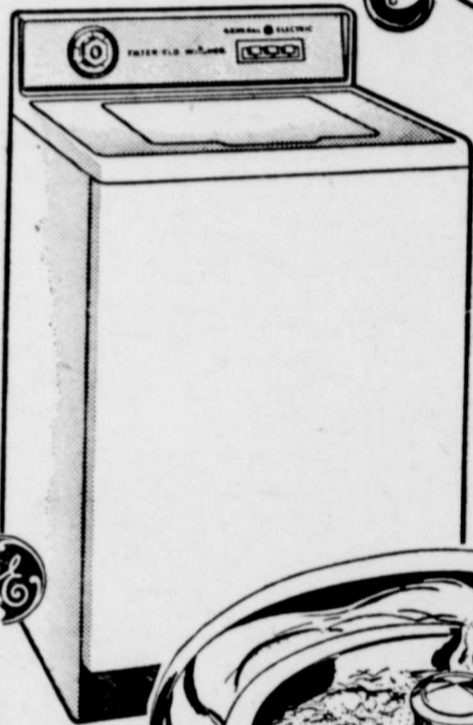
Livestock producers are currently getting highly satisfactory prices for their animals due to the sharp
