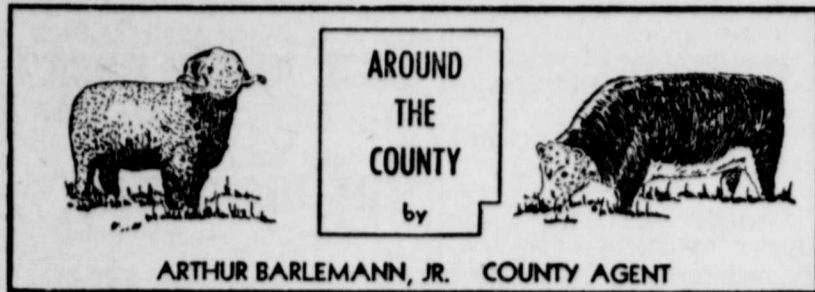

A 4-H club range judging team from Sterling County composed of Clayton Stewart, Reynolds Lee Foster, David Durham and Jerry Payne placed second in the range judging contest held at San Angelo Saturday. This was the district elimination contest for all 4-H club contests in a 22 county area. These 22 counties comprise Extension Service District Seven. Contestants from the district were competing for the purpose of deciding which teams would compete in the state 4-H club contests to be held on the campus of A&M College on June 10, 11 and 12.

Since the first two teams in each contest from each of the 12 Extension Service Districts compete in the state contest, the Sterling County 4-H club team will be one of the representatives of this area. First place team was the team from the Schleicher county club at Eldorado.

The Eleventh Annual Ram Sale sponsored by the Texas Purebred Sheep Breeders Association will be held at Brownwood next week. The sale starts with the ram classification and stud selection on Thursday, May 1, and the wool (all breed) show. Friday is given over to the wool improvement and shearing demonstration to be put on that morning by the Extension Service. That afternoon medium wool breeds will be sold. This includes Suffolks, Hampshires, Shropshires, Southdowns, Columbias, Corriedales and Montadales. Saturday morning a 4-H and FFA wool judging contest will be held. At noon Saturday, the sale of fine-wool breeds, Rambouillets and Delaines, will get underway.

Several Sterling County breeders have consigned rams to the sale. David Durham has consigned six of his registered Rambouillet rams to the sale. These are some of the rams that he had in his show string this past season. They were shown at Odessa, San Antonio and San Angelo as well as the county show. The rams were a part of his 4-H club project.

Clinton and L. F. Hodges have consigned a number of rams to the sale. These, too, are some good Rambouillets.

Bubba and William Foster have several Suffolk bucks consigned to the medium wool sale on Friday. These are some bucks they have raised and good prospects for some one looking for blackface bucks.

Last Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Dr. O. E. Sperry, professor in the range department at A&M College and a member of the Experiment station staff, was in the county to help in setting up some plots of bitterweed and do some experimental spraying on them. The wind and the rain on Thursday slowed down operations but in spite of it, plots were done using a conventional spray plane as well as a helicopter.

Different rates of 2,4-D, a herbicide used for weed control, were tried. Plots of approximately ten acres were done using first one-half pound, then one pound, and finally one and one-half pounds each per acre. They were done with the helicopter and the plane, this week they are being duplicated using a cattle sprayer with a new type of nozzle. The air plots were done on the Ewing and Fowler McEntire ranch; the ground equipment or cattle sprayer is being used on the Riley King ranch. In addition, experimental plots using 2,4,5-T, brush killer, with the 2,4-D will be done with the sprayer. A new chemical, MCPA, will also be used to see if it has any future as a bitterweed killer.

This work is a cooperative project of the Agricultural Extension Service and the Agricultural Experiment Station; however, without the help of local ranchers it would not be possible. We appreciate very much the help of Fowler and Ewing McEntire, Riley King, Gene Alley, William Foster, Foster Conger, and a great many others who helped at various times with the work. Conditions were ideal, the plant was in good growing condition with an ample supply of mois-

North Concho River Soil Conservation News

A conservation field day including a root plowing demonstration, reseeding work on dryland and irrigated land, and land levelling, will be held at the West Texas Boys Ranch near Tankersley, Saturday, April 26. The field day is being sponsored jointly by your North Concho River SCD and the Eldorado Divide SCD. A free barbecue is being served by the XQZ ranch. Everyone is invited to observe the conservation work that will be carried out on Boys Ranch. Starting time is 10 a.m.

Anyone who desires to have a seed analysis run on any type seed may secure address and prices by contacting your local Soil Conservation Service office or the County ASC office. Seed may be sent direct to: E. O. Brown Seed Testing Lab., P.O. Box 435, San Antonio 11, Texas.

All cultivated fields, old fields turned out, and rangeland to be reseeded should be planted as soon as possible or as soil conditions will permit. We now have good moisture for large seeded grasses such as sorghum alnum. But small seed grasses like blue panic needs to be put in the ground now so that the next rains we have will sprout the seeds and give them a chance to get established before the hot summer months. In fields established to grass last year, light cultivations should be made to hold down weed growth, aeriate the soil, and turn loose extra amounts of nitrogen. This is very important on blue panic fields as they soon become sod-bound and will not produce and soon the stand of grass will die out.

Half Inch Rain

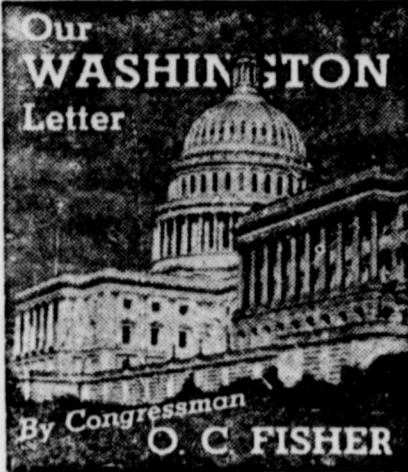
HALF INCH RAIN SUNDAY MORNING EARLY

ture and it is hoped that in the next few months as the tests are observed that something really concrete will come out of the tests. This is the first time in many years that growth conditions have been good.

TAXES, RECESSION, Defense reorganization, and cherry blossoms all shared major attention in Washington this past week.

Former President Harry Truman came forth with the simplest of all anti-recession solutions—he told a House committee to just cut taxes by \$5 billion and increase federal spending by that amount! When asked whether this might lead to a cut in the purchasing power of the dollar, the former President replied that such matters "are Greek to me."

Well, Mr. Truman's views may be as good as those of the next man, maybe a little better. But these Utopian remedies that people propose are never quite as simple and as effective as they seem.

A resolution which I introduced authorizing the Engineers to make a flood survey study of the short San Felipe flood area at Del Rio, was delayed by President Eisenhower's veto of the \$1.7 billion omnibus public works bill last week. My resolution was incorporated by the House committee in the omnibus bill, and was approved by the House and later by the Senate. We are making an effort to get re-approval before this session ends.

DEFENSE Reorganization is in the forefront on Capitol Hill. Our committee on Armed Services has just begun full-dress hearings. As a guest of Houston Harte of San Angelo, I attended an Editor's luncheon the other day where President Eisenhower spoke rather effectively, I thought, in support of his plan. It is a controversial subject, or at least some phases are, and an acceptable bill will require a lot of study and compromise.

ON THE TAX front, observers here are saying the reduction drive has cooled off a bit following the Easter recess. They say a lot of people are getting worried about a huge deficit and another possible increase in the public debt. Annual interest payments on the debt now run about \$8 billion.

CHERRY BLOSSOMS along the Potomac's tidal basin, like bluebonnets along the roads and highways of Texas, are at the very peak of their glory right now. Betwixt the two of them, give me the bluebonnets. They look better, smell better, the last longer, and they mean more. And very properly, you see them only in Texas.

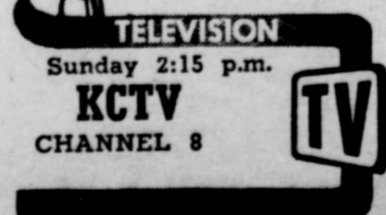

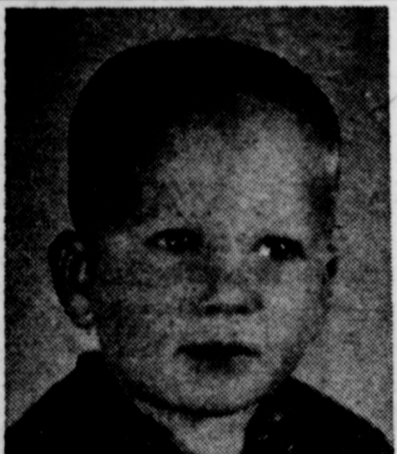

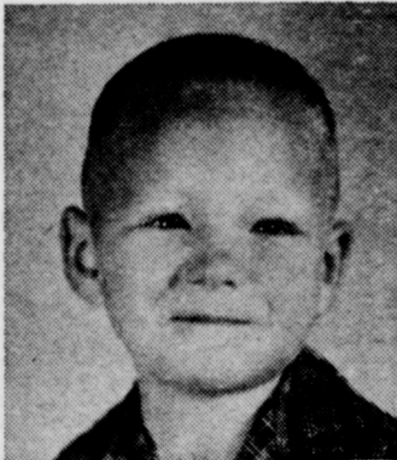

General Telephone Company Offers Wage Increase

The General Telephone Company of the Southwest has offered to make several improvements in the provisions of their present contract with the Communications Workers of America union, it was announced today by Mark Cooper, director of public relations. Certain of these improvements would result in increases of wages to employees in amounts ranging to 14c per hour. The wage schedule further provides that employees who would be receiving smaller amounts of increases would, during the year, receive additional wage increases by automatic progression which would average approximately 7%. This when applied to the present average hourly rate, amounts to approximately 10c per hour additional. The company feels that its wage offer gives full consideration to all aspects of the present economic situation, said Mr. Cooper.

"In our judgment any increase in cost of operation is a calculated risk and must be handled with discretion." We realize, however, he continued, that the responsibility to our employees and the effect of bargaining must be considered in the everyday cost of doing business. As a result, we feel that a reasonable wage increase, even in the face of the present economic situation, is justified.

"The offer which we have made is reasonable", said the public relations director.
