Coupled with the chapel is the installation of a program distribution system which will allow those in bed to attend church services via radio. The system, including 550 pillow speakers. will have many uses in patient health education and patient entertainment as well.

Patient need for chapel facilities at McKnight is more acute now than it was in the days when patients could only stay six months, Bryant said. Some patients now at McKnight have been there six years. This is a long time to be separated from home, family and church ties, he continued.


