Have Your Pets "Shot" Rabies Vaccination Clinic Here Today

There will be a rabies vaccination clinic here today, Friday, June 20, between the hours of 4:00 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian, will be on hand on the west side of the courthouse to immunize pets against rabies, according to Arthur Barlemann, Jr., county agent.

Already this year there have been four cases where foxes were suspected of being rabid. Because no humans were bitten, the heads were not sent out for a definite diagnosis. The foxes did come into the yards and attack pets in all cases however. This necessitated destroying pets that had not been immunized; in one case livestock was involved.

The annual immunization of all pets is the best insurance against rabies. Cost of the shot is nominal and the pet is protected for one year.

Where there are small children who play with the dogs and cats it is especially important that all pets be protected at all times. The series of shots that must be taken after exposure to a rabid animal are very unpleasant and can often be avoided if pets are immunized since most people are exposed after their pets have been bitten by a rabid fox or skunk or other wild animal.

CLAUDA COLLINS TO WORLD BAPTIST YOUTH CONFERENCE

Clauda Collins, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Collins, will leave Saturday from Dallas to attend the World Baptist Youth Conference at Toronto, Canada. The trip to the conference is being conducted by the Texas Baptist Student Department of Dallas.

The conference is held each five years, and this is the first time to be held in North America. The Conference itself lasts from June 27—July 2. The group will sightsee on the trip at Niagra Falls, New York City, Washington, D. C. and Ridgecrest, North Carolina. They will be back in Dallas July 15.

In 1949 the conference was held in Stockholm, Sweden and in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil in 1953.

Senate Candidate Wm. A. Blakley Visits Here

William A. Blakley, Democratic candidate for U. S. Senator, was a visitor in Sterling City on Tuesday morning as he took his campaign through the South Plains and Panhandle areas of Texas.

As he has done in hundreds of other Texas cities and towns, he talked to citizens on the streets, in stores, shops and business places. The conversations started with his now familiar self-introduction of "I'm Bill Blakley," and then the conversation turned to topics of the day and whatever was on the minds of those he met.

Because he had never before been a candidate for public office, Blakley was asked why he decided to offer himself for the Senate.

He told them: "I feel that I have enjoyed more blessings than any living man. I have been—and still am—blessed with good health. I was blessed by having poor parents and by having to work for a living. I have been blessed for 36 years with a wonderful wife.

"I want to be a part in leaving the same privileges—no more and no less—to our children."

"I have talked with a number of persons throughout the state and I believe that most people are concerned with constitutional government, sovereignty of the states and with the fact that their liberties are slipping away."

Following a tour of West Texas and the Panhandle he will return to his home in Dallas Friday night and will go to Anahuac Saturday for the White Heron annual fish fry that afternoon.

The 59-year old Blakley was born at Miami Station, Mo., while his parents were traveling to Oklahoma territory to homestead an 80-acre farm. At the age of 10 he was working for nearby farmers and four years later was a full-time cowhand. Subsequent to graduation from high school, Blakley taught himself from available books, and became a certified public accountant and a successful lawyer.

He is a Presbyterian, has been a Mason for many years and has gone through the Scottish Rite degrees and into the Mystic Shrine. Just recently, Blakley was named as a member of the board of the Texas Scottish Rite hospital for crippled children.

Blakley, owner of the old Bar S ranch in Reagan County, was accompanied by his campaign manager, Wick Fowler and a nephew of Wick's. Wick said the nephew was the chuck wagon foreman on this trip (he made arrangements for the meals so Blakley could keep shaking hands with people). Wick was the wagon boss and Blakley was "ridin' shotgun."

Sterling County campaign manager Worth B. Durham accompanied Blakley on his little tour of the local business houses. Bill wouldn't even take time for a cup of coffee. Wick Fowler said Blakley complained that if he too time to have a cup of coffee, he might miss being on the street shaking the hands

T.B. Patients Need Chapel

NORATADATAS HELPING TO RAISE FUNDS FOR MCKNIGHT ALL FAITH CHAPEL

Sanatorium, June 19—The Noratadata Club of Sterling City has joined the grass roots movement by private citizens over the state to help build the first chapel on any Texas state hospital ground. The All-Faith Chapel at McKnight State Tuberculosis Hospital, 26 miles from Sterling City is now two thirds complete.

General chairman of the fund raising committee is M.D. Bryant, prominent ranchman, oilman and former mayor of San Angelo.

Coupled with the chapel is the installation of a program distribution system which will allow those in bed to attend church services via radio. The system, including 550 pillow speakers, will have many uses in patient health education and patient entertainment as well.

Patient need for chapel facilities at McKnight is more acute now than it was in the days when patients could only stay six months, Bryant said. Some patients now at McKnight have been there six years. This is a long time to be separated from home, family and church ties, he continued.

Including the cost of the sound system, this is a \$75,000 project and \$25,000 is needed to complete the job, Bryant said. People in the area are working to complete fund raising by mid-August when the chapel will be finished.

North Concho River Soil Conservation News

Soil Conservation Service technicians designed and staked an irrigation reservoir for Ross Foster. Ross plans to use the reservoir to irrigate on an eleven acre field that has been leveled. Purpose of reservoirs are to store water pumped over an 18 to 24 hour period. This stored water can then be released and given a large volume whereby irrigation waterings are more efficient and beneficial.

William and Bubba Foster have just completed installation of a concrete irrigation pipeline on their irrigated field at Broome. The pipeline was installed to conserve water that is lost to seepage when using earthen ditches and to evaporation, prevent erosion, weed problems in ditches and to make waterings more efficient with less trouble.

Diversion terraces have been staked out and constructed on Hal Knight's ranch. W. Y. Bengel, Jr., William Foster home ranch and Roy Foster's place.

The diversion on Hal Knight's ranch was constructed to divert additional water into a stock tank. The remainder of the diversions are to help protect cropland from erosion by excess water from adjacent areas. Charles Allen, local SCS technician, assisted the land owners in planning, staking and checking the diversion for completion.

The public is invited to attend this service.

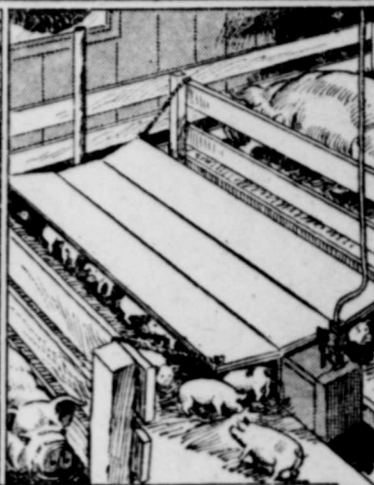

ANY HOPE for relief for our hard-pressed Texas oil industry at this session of Congress may have gone down the drain last week when the House voted against an amendment to the reciprocal trade extension bill, then being debated.

The amendment, in the form of a substitute bill, while by no means adequate in respect to oil would at least have provided a procedural remedy and a ray of hope for domestic industries plagued by excessive low-cost imports.

With drilling operations down 25 percent and producing wells allowed to operate only 8 days out of each month in Texas, the impact of ever-increasing imports is playing havoc with drilling contractors, independent oil operators, and with our state economy.

The bill which was approved offers little hope of relief to any domestic industry adversely affected by the dumping of competitive products on our markets. The reciprocal trade program, which is sound in theory, has drifted far afield from its proper purposes. The House-approved bill continues the program for five years and delegates to the State Department the right, without Congressional review, to reduce tariffs up to 25
