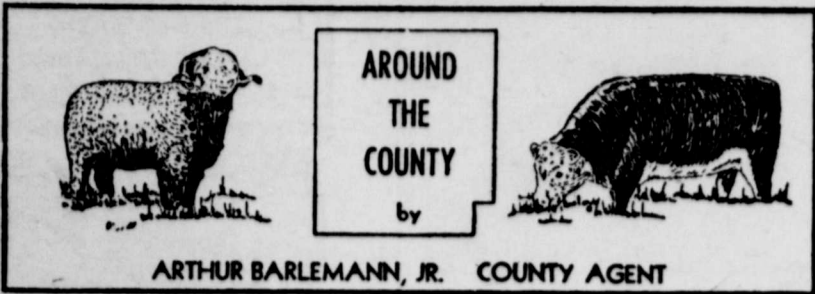

Thirty one dogs and cats were given shots for rabies last Friday afternoon by Dr. Percy Turner, veterinarian.

Monday afternoon Reynolds Foster killed a fox in their yard that came in on his own initiative and was chased by the dogs during the noon hour. By the time Reynolds got a gun and got in the yard, the fox had disappeared. After the storm one of the hands saw the fox on a light pole. The fox ran into a doghouse and when the hand approached the doghouse the fox came out to meet him in a vicious way. The man had an ax and ended the fox's career then and there with the ax. The fox was very poor and definitely sick which gives good indication that he was rabid. However, the carcass was burned and so no definite check can be made by a laboratory.

In such cases, the veterinarians usually advise giving dogs or other pets a booster shot if they have had a previous shot which is still in effect. For animals not having a shot which is still in effect, it is advised to either keep them locked up and under observation for as long as nine months or destroy them.

Garlyn Hoffman, Extension Range Specialist and former county agent of Sterling County was visiting here last week. We talked over the mesquite spraying situation here with him.

There are some worms that are defoliating the mesquite and the leaves are not in very good condition to start with. In view of this, Garlyn says that it would be best to withhold spraying. To get the best results, the tree must have good leaves that will take up the spray and translocate it to the root system where the killing action begins. Since the trees are not in good leaf, it would be unwise to spray now.

One commercial spray pilot has turned down 15,000 acres in an adjoining county because it is not in a condition where he could expect a good job. From the air he says it really shows the damage the worms are doing.

If the storm damaged some of your trees Monday afternoon in the big blow by tearing off limbs, take care of those places now before insects and disease have a chance to take over.

Remove the splintered remains of the branches by sawing them flush with the branch or trunk. Make your cuts just as close to the branch

or trunk where the limb was coming from as you can. Slope the cut so that the rain will fall off, not stand on the surface of the cut. Paint the surface with roofing tar thinned with just a little bit of kerosene. This will help keep out insects and help the tree heal over the cut.

Pecan casebearers have been taking a toll of nuts on trees around the county. This is true in many cases whether the trees were sprayed or not, and is true too, regardless of the insecticide used. Toxaphene, DDT or malathion—it seems the bearers got by it some way.

In some cases it rained within a few hours after the trees were sprayed. In other cases the spray evidently was applied either too late or too early. There is a big crop of the worms inside the small nuts now so the only solution is to watch for a new crop of eggs in a few days or week and spray again if you wish to save what nuts are left. Many nuts were probably knocked off trees by the high wind Monday. Spray recommendations now are the same as they were before. Three pounds of DDT in 100 gallons of water with 6 pounds of sulfur to cut down the aphid build up; or three pounds of 25% wettable malathion, or 5 pounds of 40% wettable toxaphene if you prefer toxaphene.

The 4-H club will hold its award barbecue Friday night June 27 in the City Park. Guests will be parents, the Stock Show Association members, and members of the commissioners court who sponsor and aid the Extension Service in the county. Special guests will be the lamb buyers, both local and out of town, at the past show and sale who bought 4-H club members lambs. Roy L. Huckabee, district agent for the Extension Service will present the awards and year pins. Ernest Williams of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association will present the sheep and goat medal.

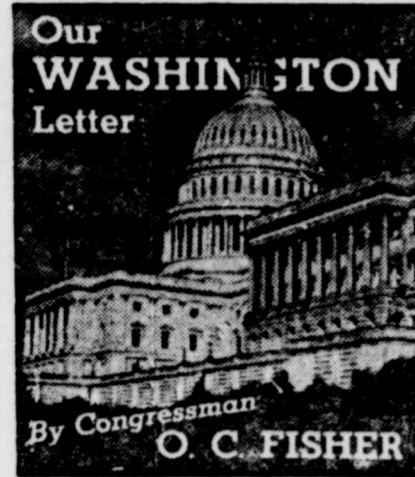

High Winds Damage Property Here Monday



ANOTHER TIDELANDS decision by the Supreme Court, all-important to Texas, will probably be made next fall. Briefs have been filed and the issue joined. The U. S. Attorney General filed a massive 425-page brief in the case the other day, contesting the Texas title to all submerged lands along our gulf coastline between the three mile and 10 1/2-mile limits seaward.

The importance of the outcome of this lawsuit, which is being defended by the Attorney General of Texas, is indicated by the fact that since the passage by the Congress of the tidelands legislation in 1953, and signed by President Eisenhower in keeping with his campaign promise, some \$75 million has been collected by Texas and placed in the school fund, from oil companies exploring and producing oil in the 10 1/2-mile zone.

The U. S. Attorney General is claiming that the law which confirms the title of Texas in the 10 1/2 mile area, is ambiguous, and all except the 3-mile area should be discarded as an invalid claim. He claims Texas gave up its rights when it joined the union. "Texas acts like the United States joined Texas instead of Texas joining the United States," he said.

The tidelands law of 1953 confirmed title in the coastal states to 3 miles seaward along their shores, and added: "Nothing in this section is to be construed as questioning or in any manner prejudicing any State's seaward boundary BEYOND three geographical miles if it was so provided by its Constitution or laws prior to or at the time such state became a member of the union, or if it has heretofore been approved by Congress."

Even the House committee report on the tidelands bill confirmed our rights stating: "Texas' boundary was fixed three marine leagues (10 1/2 miles) into the Gulf of Mexico at the time it was admitted to the Union in 1845 by the annexation agreement."

Moreover, that boundary extending 10 1/2 miles seaward was written into the law by the Congress of the

Hurricane Like Winds And Rains

High winds, reaching almost hurricane strength, did damage all over Sterling City Monday afternoon in the middle of the afternoon. Rains which gauged up to three and one half inches accompanied the winds. A small amount of hail was mixed in with the rain.

Three plate glass windows in the Lowe Hardware building caved in; Ray Lane's windmill blew over, the tower and all; Ollie Carper's windmill was all folded up; the tank (water) at the Col-Tex Station was blown off its tower; Leroy Butler's Gulf Station suffered cracked plate glass—all of them; one trailer was blown over and others were blown off blocks at the trailer courts; the pump house at W. L. Young's blew over; two small houses were unroofed; some of the lumber yard roofing was blown loose and up; the front of the Jack Weeks building tumbled down; trees all over town suffered—some blew completely down and others lost limbs; water got into just about everybody's house and business; the courthouse, hospital, etc. suffered from water soakings.

T.V. antennas were broken over or bent—one third of them in town seemed to be damaged.

Water from the torrential rains got the streets full of water and the Bodcaw draw flowed widely through town. The rains seemed to be falling horizontally. Some observers estimated had the rain fallen, they would have gotten five or more inches—but it just went on past their rain gauges.

Observers could see the rain going by and along with it were such things as leaves, small trees, small limbs, trash, boxes, etc. For over half an hour the storm raged on. Houses leaked that had never leaked before. Damage is unestimated but will run several thousand dollars from wind and water ruin.

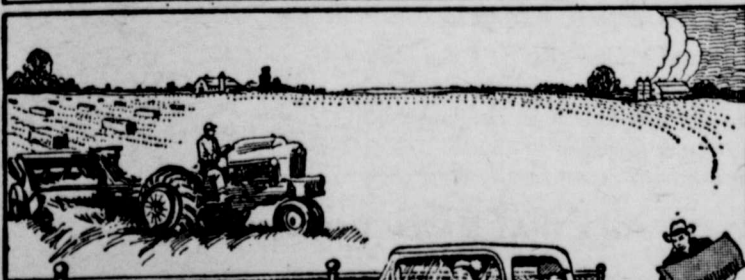

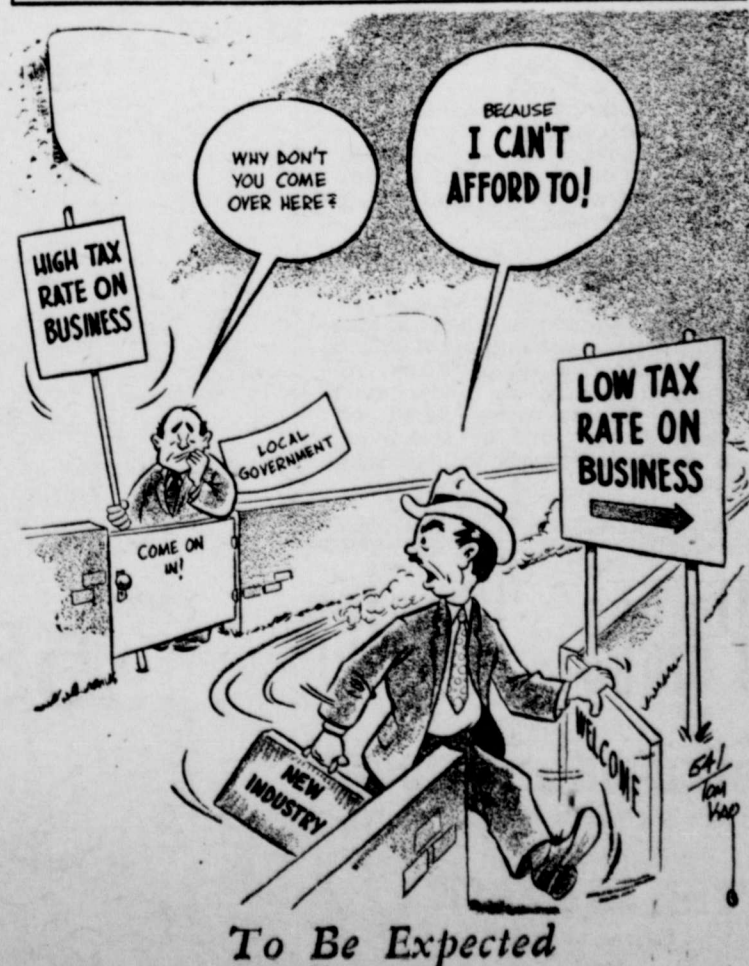

Dessert Treat - A Pleasure To Eat

Many a busy housewife will be delighted to have this easy "instant" recipe for a truly luscious dessert. Vanilla instant pudding is layered with crisp chocolate wafers in pretty stemmed glass dishes, then chilled and topped with whipped cream and shaved chocolate. We say "instant", because it takes very little longer than that to prepare when made with a "no-cook" pudding mix.

Black and White Pudding

- 2 cups cold milk
- 1 package Jell-O Vanilla Instant Pudding
- Chocolate wafers
- Sweetened whipped cream
- Unsweetened chocolate, shaved

Pour milk into mixing bowl. Add pudding mix and beat slowly with egg beater just until well mixed, about 1 minute. Do not overbeat; mixture will be thin. Layer at once in serving dishes with crisp chocolate wafers. Chill 15 minutes. Garnish with sweetened whipped cream and shaved unsweetened chocolate. Makes 4 servings.

Remodel or tear the old house down to the ground and build anew?

This is a problem faced by many owners of old, outdated houses, particularly farmers who can't move away to new locations, or families who don't want to leave the friendliness of a familiar neighborhood.

In the case of Dennis F. Haines, of Haven, Kans., the answer was remodeling, since the old house occupied the best site on his wheat farm and was in sound structural condition.

As the "before" and "after" photographs show, remodeling changed the awkward-looking house into a modern-looking home, giving greater comfort and more space, plus the conveniences of up-to-date living. The total cost was less than a third the price of a new house of comparative size.

Principal structural changes included removal of an upstairs wing, enclosing one front porch for a kitchen, and another porch for an office.

The house was given a complete new look by reroofing it with a deep shade of asphalt shingles to make it appear lower, and choosing a color for siding that harmonizes with the new roof.

Haines specified asphalt shingles, since they had given years of trouble free service on the old house and are available in a wide choice of colors.

downstairs rooms, new windows of ponderosa pine were installed all the way around the house. These are stock units consisting of a wide pane of fixed glass above modern hopper windows which open for ventilation. Windows upstairs were flanked with louver shutters of ponderosa pine to make them look bigger.

Other new features included a new heating plant, central air conditioning, a modern new kitchen, and complete interior redecorating.

The remodeling was designed by Arthur B. Campen of Peoria, Ill., modernization consultant and remodeling editor of Practical Builder magazine.
