## Alpine Boy Killed in Accident Here Last Friday

John Landon Votaw, 18-year-old son of Reginald Votaw, co-manager of the Brewster County Motor Co., Alpine, was killed while hunting on his grandfather's ranch here last Friday. Young Votaw's body was found by his grandfather, Ed Bynum, late Friday afternoon about three-quarters of a mile from the ranch house, 10 miles from Sterling City. The boy, an Alpine football star, had apparently stumbled into a rut and his shotgun discharged into his face, the charge striking him near the right eye.

Mr. Bynum had gone looking for the boy about sundown when he did not return for supper.

His body was taken to the Nalley Pickle Funeral Home in Big Spring and later to the Livingston Funeral Home, Alpine for burial.

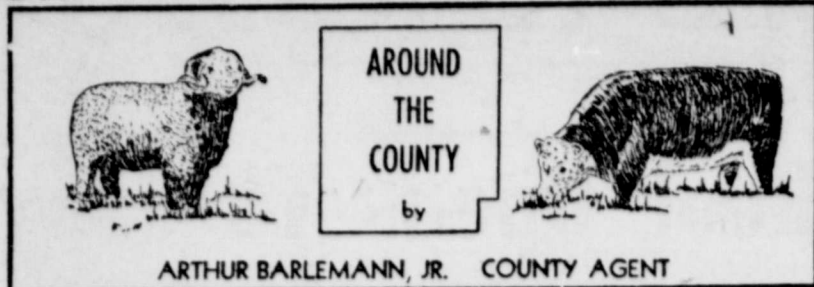
## Barbecue Given By the E.E. Barbees at Oil Well Site Saturday Night

The rig site of the Ashmun and Hilliard No. 1 Barbee oil well was the scene of a barbecue last Saturday night. E. E. Barbee and his family gave a barbecue for the friends, workers, oil people, etc. at the oil well on their land just over the Reagan County line from Sterling. Two hundred and fifty persons were served plates by the catering service of Fred Harris of San Angelo.

Ashmun & Hilliard has the lease where the well is located on a farmout from Cities Service Company. The well was first gauged for a flowing daily potential of 2,000 barrels. This week the well was put on a 1/4" choke. Production is from the Wichita-Albany sands at 6700 feet plus.

The Barbees came in from Paris and the Bill Barbees came in from Richardson for the barbecue.

Of interest to all sheep and wool producers in Texas is the July 1 lamb crop report. The crop is estimated at 2,709,000 which is 14% above last year's crop. This year's crop is still 7% below the 1947 to 1956 ten year average. The U.S. lamb crop is 7% above the ten-year average. Texas produces approximately 13% of the nation's lambs.

Lamb crop percentage, this was 81%, 2% above the previous high of 79% set in 1950 and 12% above the ten year average. Many Edwards Plateau ranches reported above 100% lamb crops due to the number of twins saved.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is constructing a unique facility in this country. The plant which will do research in wool processing is being constructed in California; it should be ready for operation early in 1959.

The plant will do research on improved methods of processing wool, new wool products, and treatment to make woolen garments easy to care for; also certain properties will be worked on in an attempt to improve them. This will include resistance to yellowing, shrinkage, permanent pleats, more rapid drying, and less need for pressing.

This plant is the first of its type in the country and is a part of U. S. Department of Agriculture's research division. It is an addition to the wool and mohair laboratory and could result in more and better uses for wool and more popularity for this fabric.

All county agricultural agents and county home demonstration agents in Extension Service District 7 will be attending a three day meeting in San Angelo next Wednesday through Friday. This district covers 22 counties in the Edwards Plateau extending from Real county on the southeast corner of the district to Sterling County on the northwest and from Taylor and Nolan Counties south to Bandera and Kendall County.

Agents will be brought up to date on changing conditions in their work by a team of specialists on the staff at A&M College. The specialist recently attended a similar meeting on a national scale in Washington, D. C.

Also, while in session the agents will judge about 125 record books submitted by 4-H club members in the district. At stake are many district awards and a chance at state and national awards.

David Durham's record book has been entered in the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association award contest. District winner will go to the state level for a chance at a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago in November. Clinton Hodges won the state contest several years ago.

Reynolds Lee Foster's record book and notebook on range management is entered in the Range Management contest sponsored by the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association. District winner will receive an engraved sterling belt buckle and be entered in the state contest. This contest consists of collecting

and mounting all the available species of grasses and range plants, identifying them, determining their grazing value, and habitats, and writing up an essay on the value of range management training.

Jim Gray, sheep and goat specialist for the Extension Service, was in the county last week two days to assist ranchers in sheep selection work. He worked on the Fowler and Ewing McEntire ranch and the Rufus, Reynolds, and Ross Foster ranches.

All the ewes on the ranches were classified into three groups according to their production potential. The rams were handled the same way. The blue group, which was the top group, of ewes and the same group of bucks will be pastured together. The second or red group will be done the same way as will the green or lower group.

The ewe lambs from the blue group will furnish an excellent source of replacements. The bottom group of ewes and bucks will

### Photos Help Choose Color For Painting

Don't guess and gamble when you repaint, reroof, or redecorate the exterior of your home in other ways, says Margaret Hargreaves, a leading California home color stylist.

If you can't afford the services of a professional color stylist, says Miss Hargreaves, try a number of color combinations on enlarged photographs of your house. Here are steps to follow for an exterior color scheme everyone will like:

1. Take—or have taken—a good photo of the house, and order at least a dozen 8 by 10-inch enlargements made on matt-surfaced paper.
2. Sit down under a good light with the photographs and a box of quality water colors and start thinking of colors you honestly like. Color one photo at a time.
3. Miss Hargreaves says good color stylists always start with the roof because this is a large, important color area, and provides a color "key" for the other components of the house. Since asphalt shingles are available in almost every color imaginable, you can "let yourself go." Keep in mind, however, that if your house is tall and boxy it will look better with a dark roof color. If it's small and low, a light color will make it seem bigger.
4. Choose any sidewall color that appeals to you, as long as it doesn't clash with the roof color. A good idea is to start on the first photo with a sharp color, and work toward softer shades as you go along. This will give you a range of contrasts.
5. Trim, windows, shutters, flower boxes, and doors are important color areas. Color stylists have found that trim and windows painted the same color as the roof can give unity to the color scheme. Doors, shutters and flower boxes are good spots to use sharp accent colors

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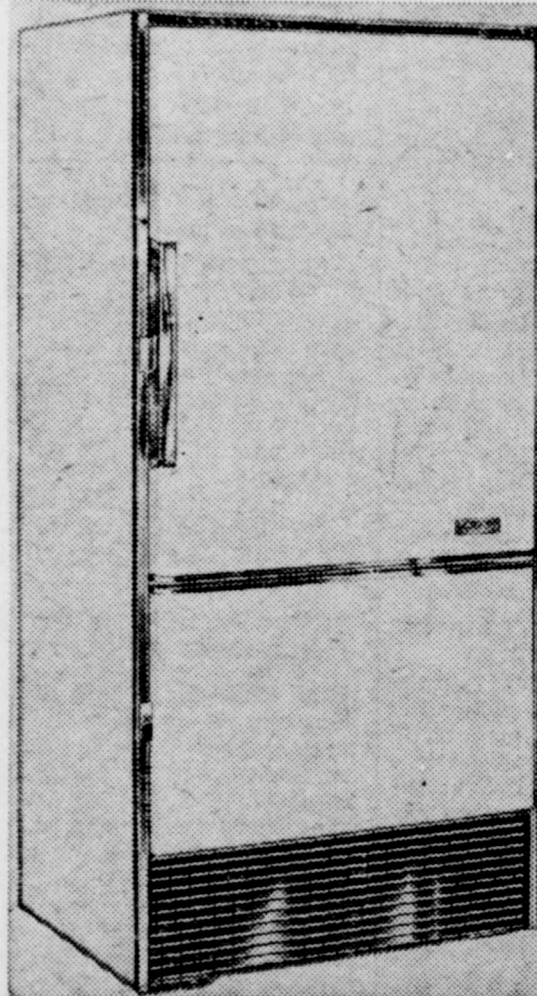

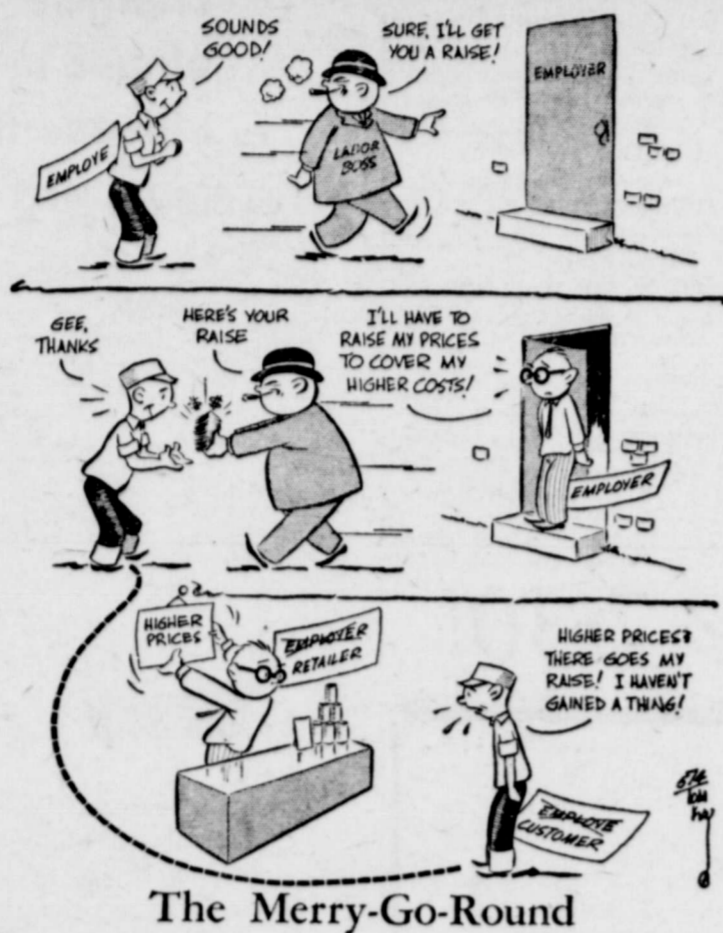

Along with Country Style Chicken, plan the oven meal to include a casserole of scalloped potatoes and a pan of rolls. Add a green vegetable, a citrus fruit salad and coconut layer cake for dessert. Dinner is served!

**Country Style Chicken**  
Makes 6 servings

Two 2 to 2-1/2 lb. frying chickens 1-1/2 teaspoons parsley flakes  
1-1/2 cups pancake mix 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder  
1/2 teaspoon onion salt

Clean chickens thoroughly; cut into pieces. Combine pancake mix and remaining ingredients in paper sack. Drop pieces of chicken into bag 2 or 3 at a time; shake well to coat evenly. Melt enough shortening to cover bottom of frying pan to 1/2-inch depth. Fry chicken in hot shortening, turning until golden brown on all sides. Place in baking dish in moderate oven (350° F.) about 1 hour or until tender.

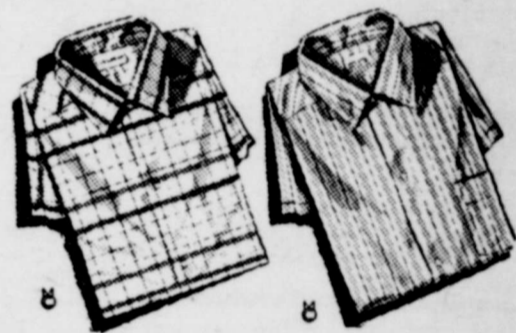
