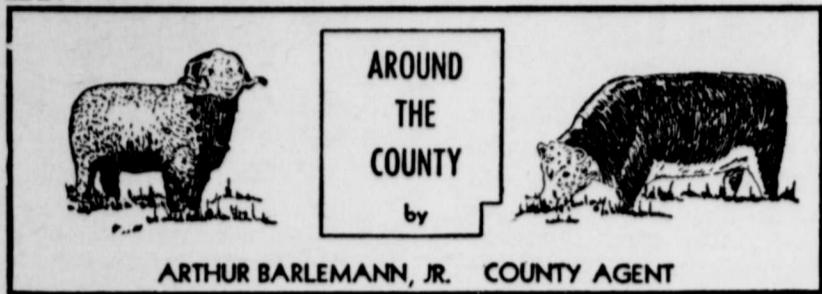

Don't forget to mail your claim for the refund of the federal tax on gasoline used in the ranch or farm operation. All claims must be mailed to the Director of Internal Revenue before September 30. Address of the director for this area of Texas is Dallas 1, Texas.

If you lost your blank or did not receive one, call or come by the county agent's office. We have a supply on hand. All operators who filed claims last year should have received a blank in the mail several months ago, but if you didn't, we can supply you with one.

Slim Owens was showing off a bobcat that had been hit by a car in front of his house on the Robert Lee road out on the divide. He found the cat, a full grown one, beside the road last Friday morning. Evidently it had been hit by a car early Friday morning sometime, as it was still warm when he found it.

This has been the first one reported in the county in some time. During the winter Forrest Foster trapped and shot 3 or 9 of them on his place but none of the critters had been reported as during damage for some months now. The one Slim had was a female and probably has a bunch of kittens some place.

Last week three foxes that came up around homes were killed in Sterling County. One killed by Gene Alley was taken to the laboratory in Austin where the head was examined and diagnosed as having rabies. The fox came up to the house just after Mrs. Alley had fed the dogs and cats and whipped the dogs and cats and took over their food. After the head was diagnosed as positive for rabies, several cats and a dog that did not have rabies shots in effect were destroyed. The Alleys took the head to Austin so they would know whether or not to dispose of the unvaccinated animal.

Riley King also shot a fox in his yard under identical circumstances but the dog had a valid rabies shot and was given a booster to increase immunity. Foster Conger also killed one on his place.

Just across the line in Tom Green County another fox attacked and is supposed to have bitten some horses on the Buddy Hall ranch.

This brings the total of suspected rabid fox killed in the county to better than 12 in the last ten months. Only two were sent to Austin for laboratory diagnosis during that time but both were rabid. Beside the one at the Alleys the other night, one on the William

Foster ranch last year attacked and bit 6 or 8 pecan pickers who had to take the shots.

While the two above animals were the only ones diagnosed, the rest were highly suspicious. Whenever a fox comes up to a house where dogs are present, it's a pretty good sign that he is rabid. Many of those killed, including the positive one the other night, were in good flesh with a good, shiny coat of hair. To be rabid, an animal need not be poor or thin, have rough hair, or be frothing at the mouth.

In the near future the Sterling County Game Management Association is going to undertake a predatory animal control program. This program will do much to cut down the incidence of rabies. It has worked very well in the control of eagles during the winter. When first started the eagle hunt program killed as many as 60 eagles. During the last few years they have killed from two to four per year. The varmint control program can help cut down the varmints in the same manner is every one will cooperate.

As soon as some desired information is available, the association, under the control of Clinton Hodges, president, and his directors, will call a county wide meeting to set the program in action.

FOOTBALL SEASON UNDERWAY HERE

Sterling Cops Opener With Knott 20-8

The Sterling City Eagles inaugurated the 1958 season with a win of 20-8 over the Knott Hillbillies last Friday night here in the Eagle stadium. The game was the first using the eight-man team, using the same rules as 11-man football.

Coach Diddle Young's boys are light this year, but the fastness and enthusiasm make equalizers, and the season may be a successful one for the locals. The Eagles are the defending district champs of last season.

Sterling kicked off as the game started last Friday night. The ball went out of bounds so it came back for a re-kick and a five-yard move-back for kicking out-of-bounds.

The Knott boys lost two yards on the first play from scrimmage and dropped back a yard or so on the next two plays—so they kicked on the 4th down. The Eagles fumbled the ball on their first play and the Knott team recovered. Knott, on the first play then picked up 5, but after four plays the ball went over to the Eagles. Sterling's lanky back—Alfred Chapple, picked up 5 yards on the first play from scrimmage, then two. Robert Quintana carried the pigskin over for a first down. Chapple dropped five yards on the first down and Quintana regained the lost five; then Chapple, on a handoff play nearly got a first, setting it up for Nathan Morris to push it over for a first. Alfred picked up 6 yards on the first try, and Quintana lugged the oval over for another first down—with goal to go. Nathan took the ball over for the first score of the night. The try for extra point failed.

Sterling kicked to Knott as the play resumed. Knott tried nobly to make a first but failed and as Knott kicked on the fourth, the first quarter ended.

Quintana picked up 3 yards on the first play, but Sterling then received a 5-yard penalty for delaying the game. Robert run the ball up for 10 yards and Nathan took the pigskin on over for another first down. The next first down was gained by Quintana and Morris, getting five yards apiece in two plays. With only the goal to go, Robert put the ball up to the two yard line and then pushed it over for a score; and then he added two more points by running the ball over for the extra points.

As play resumed Sterling boot-ed the ball to Knott. The Hillbillies fumbled and McCarty recovered for the Eagles. A long pass from Alfred to Jodie Green was called back because the locals were offside.

Sterling couldn't make a first, so they kicked on the fourth down. Knott couldn't gain either so they booted the ball back to the Eagles. Chapple returned the boot to the Knott 31 yard line. Bill Davis got a five yard gain, and THEN, yessir, Sterling lost the ball on a fumble up the field, but recovered and it was a ten yard gain anyway. Ster-drew a n offside penalty; lost the ball on downs and the half ended. Score at half time was 14-0.

As play commenced after the half Knott kicked to Sterling. Morris got four yards on the first try and Alfred picked up 8 for a first down for the locals. Quintana lost six yards on the first try; Morris carried the ball for ten yards and a no-gain try by Robert the ball went over to Knott. The Hillbillies passed, but Lewis Petmecky intercepted on the 38 yard line. Robert rushed for 3, Nathan made a no-gain play and Chapple took the oval over for a first down—right on the eight yard line. Nathan worked up five yards and Quintana went over for a T.D. The score was now 20-0. The play for extra point was no good.

TheEagles kicked off to Knott, and Knott started a touchdown drive. Dois Ray took the ball over for the Hillbillies only T.D. and he ran the ball over for the extra two points. Thus the score was 20-8 and the third quarter ended.

Knott fumbled on the first play and Jodie Green recovered for the locals. Chapple picked up 5 yards and Morris ran the ball 9, getting a first down for the Eagles. Robert Q. made a long gain but it was called back and Sterling got a 15

yard penalty for illegal use of the hands. Quintana ran the ball 15 and then on a pass play Knott intercepted to gain possession of the ball. They failed to make a first and the ball passed over the Sterling. The locals drew another 15 yard penalty for illegal use of the hands. A long pass—Chapple to Tony Allen, almost gave the locals a first in spite of the penalty, and then Alfred pushed it over for a first. Nathan pushed the ball forward for 7 yards, then Sterling fumbled and Knott recovered. Knott couldn't chalk up 10 yards in four tries so the ball went back to Sterling. Lewis Petmecky picked up a first on one try, but the final whistle then stopped all play. The score was 20-8 in favor of the locals, and another football season was inaugurated.

Experts Advise: Keep Food Freezer In Use, Don't Limit It to Storage

Food freezers are for use... not just for storage. If that sounds like nonsensical comment—check your freezer and see whether you have any year-old frozen vegetables stealing room from the current crop. Those whose freezers are ready to receive "new

use, or any other food that can be temporarily preserved for serving those days when unexpected guests arrive.

Here are some helpful freezer hints: If you have a garden and freeze vegetables harvested from it—ask for the type of seeds that produce varieties that freeze well. Vegetables should be harvested when slightly less

vegetables for old" can go to the head of the class—and we'll bet it won't be too crowded.

It's only natural, of course, to hold a few packages of food in reserve until something appears in the offering to fill the empty spaces. But, resist the temptation—serve that frozen beef roast and then plan to fill the space. What with? Well, what's wrong with unbaked pies and rolls? It doesn't have to be another roast, or even meat. What you're looking for are things, probably: in-season fruit and vegetables which can be frozen for out-of-season

mature than those selected for canning. Over-mature vegetables should not be frozen. Booklets from manufacturers from which you purchased your freezer or from State Experiment Stations will provide instructions on how to blanch and package vegetables, as well as other foods, for the freezer.

Be sure that you take care to wrap and package your freezer foods correctly. A poor package results in a poor product. Remember, your freezer cannot improve quality—it simply preserves the food it receives and prevents it from spoiling.

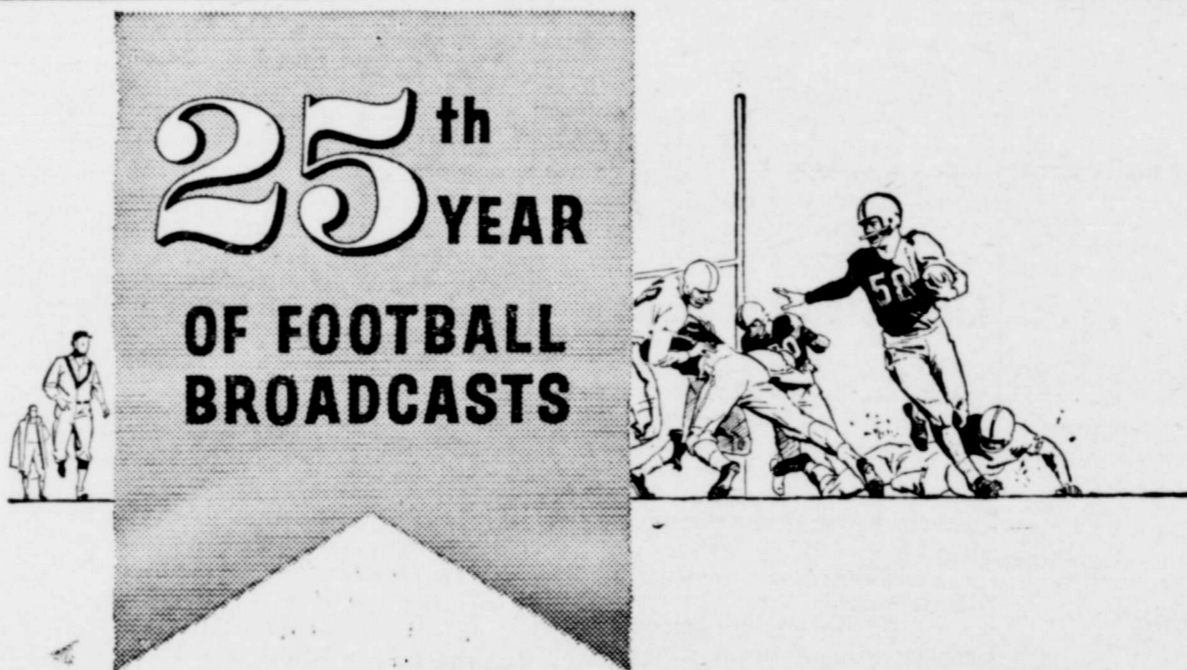

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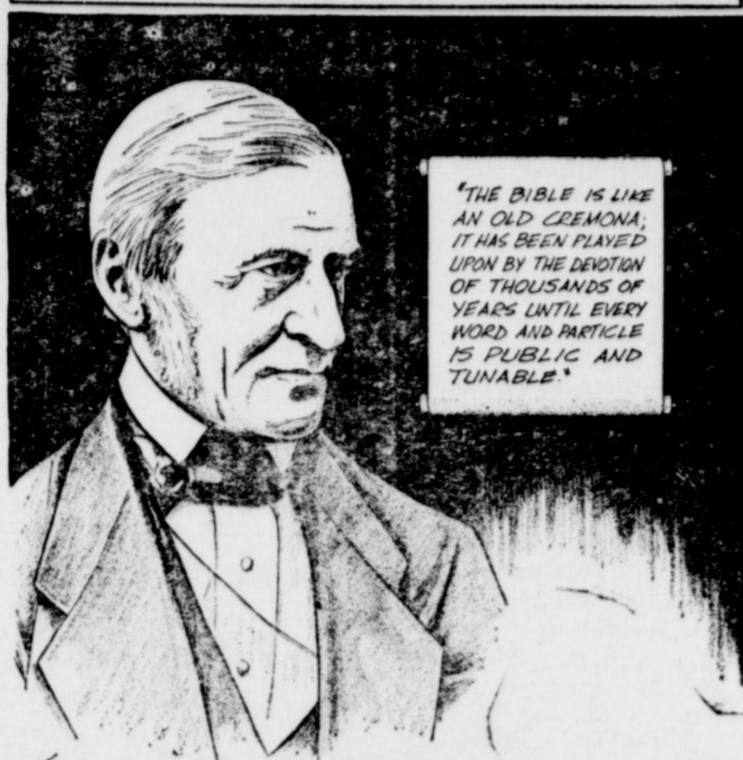

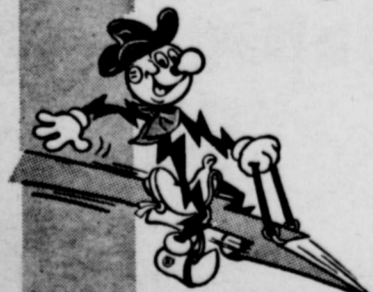

Rabies in Sterling County

There is a growing concern about rabies in the wildlife in this section of the country. Especially the fox and coon—which have increased in large numbers in the past several years.

During the past year there has been 3 or 4 positive heads which have been sent to the State Laboratory—and some 12 or 14 animals observed which were highly suspicious or having rabies based on their peculiar behavior.

This, of course, is not an epidemic nor an emergency, but it is possible to become so with such a large reservoir of susceptible animals. Also included are domestic animals and pets not protected by proper vaccination.

Rabies is not, as we used to think, a disease that was prevalent during the "dog days" or just during the hot months—we have it with us the year round.

The Wildlife and Game Management Association will have at a later date the opportunity of se-

curing poison bait in quantity for the purpose of destroying undesirable wildlife—by using it simultaneously over a wide area.

This program used with proper precautions and safeguards and with the public informed of the time of its use would be a great help—in reducing the hazard of rabies being spread to domestic animals and people.

I believe this is a worthwhile program and commend it to you for your thought and consideration.
