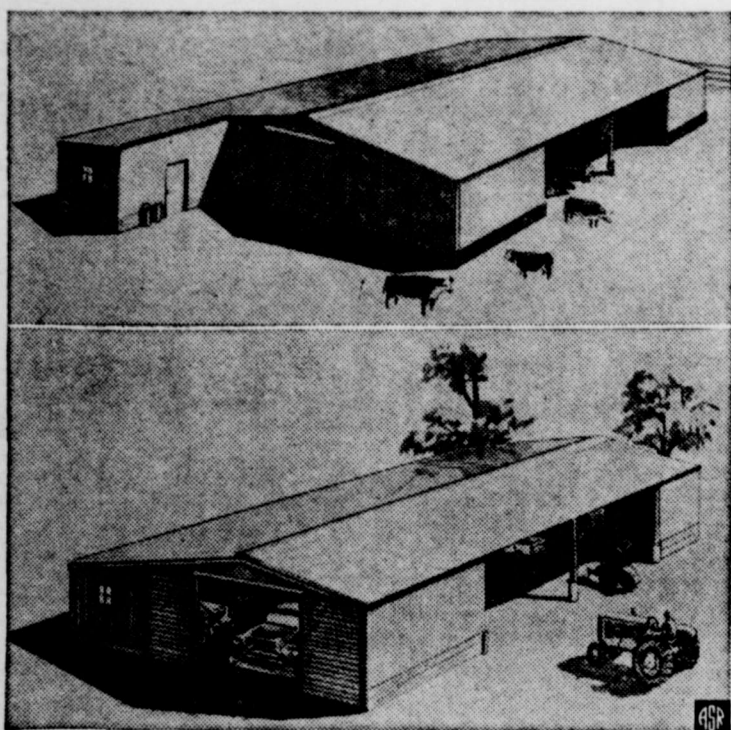
## PTA Next Thursday

## New Colored Steel Buildings Add "Luster" To Farmsteads



Farm buildings, like modern farm machinery, are now taking on a new bright appearance of color and design.

The recent introduction of low cost steel farm buildings in colors of blue, green, rose, bronze, gray and white have caused many farmers and their wives to take a long second look at the old shed. First reports indicate that buildings throughout the countryside have already started to break out in a rash of attractive colors.

One of the first buildings to be constructed, with blue walls and a rose roof, stopped traffic along the highway as people paused to take a closer look. Many of them were women who seemed to have a special gleam in their eye for this pleasant addition to the farmstead.

The new color coating, called Stran-Satin Color, is not a paint, but a protective coating of vinyl-aluminum that is said to be both durable and low in cost. Developed by Stran-Steel Corporation, it is applied to the galvanized steel panels at the factory, then shipped to the construction site for quick erection.

The company said that test samples had withstood rigorous continuous exposure tests with no deterioration of the finish coat, no loss of adhesion, and no corrosion of base metal. Also, it is said that the new color coating will not blister, peel, or crack.

Stran-Satin Color may be obtained on all Stran-Steel Stran-Master buildings, the all-steel pole building with "do-it-yourself" construction, and Rigid Frame buildings.

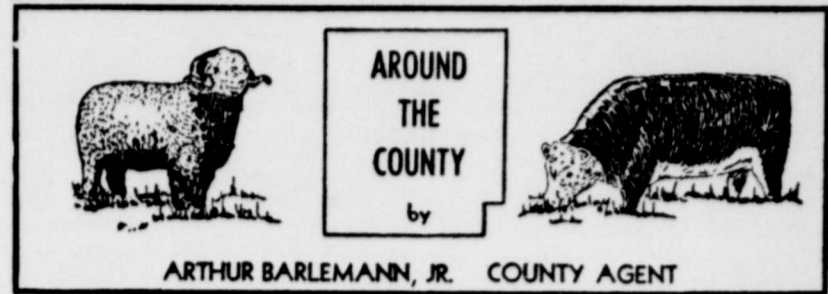

We have just received a supply of a pamphlet on rat and mice control with the anticoagulant materials such as Warfarin, Pival, and Fumarin. Entitled "Control Rats and Mice with Anticoagulants" the pamphlet gives direction for the use of prepared bait as well as how to mix your own. The directions for home mixing the bait is based on the "recipe" used by the rodent control service so well for many years. Concentrated warfarin and other anticoagulant materials are available from many drug and variety stores.

Anyone who would like a free copy of the pamphlet can have one by coming by the office or calling or dropping me a card to the office and one will be mailed to you. The coming of winter may bring on another infestation of both rats and mice around the home.

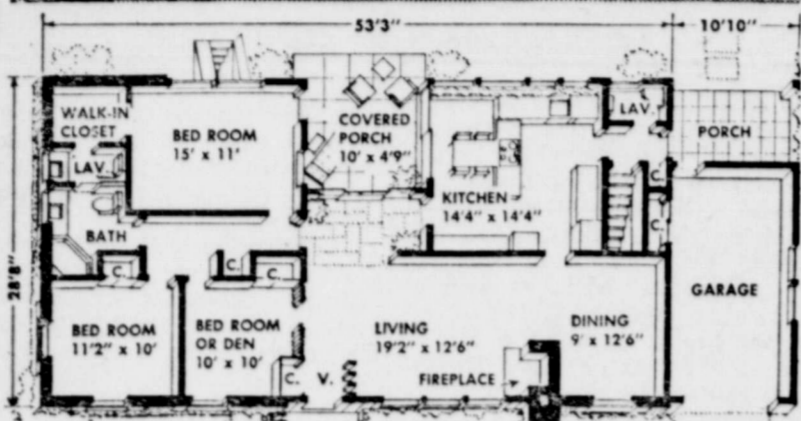

## Plan Loaded With Luxury Aimed to Keep Costs Low



A house that comes as close to offering luxury living at low cost as any ever designed is shown in this plan by architect Rudolph A. Matern, of Jamaica, N.Y.

It is compact and can be built on a small lot, yet it has such features for graceful living as two complete lavatories in addition to a complete bathroom, two porches, a 28-foot living-dining area, fireplace, separate entrance foyer, breakfast nook, and combination den-bedroom.

Outside, the house has that "solid citizen" look that makes a home welcome in any neighborhood. To enhance this appearance Matern designed a low, hip-style roof with a wide overhang. The deep green blend of asphalt shingles specified by the architect helps maintain the long, low look, yet gives the house the distinction of more exterior color.

Louver shutters of ponderosa pine flank windows and the entrance door. They add more outside color and help make the house seem bigger by accentuating the horizontal line. Painted in a color to harmonize with the roof, the shutters help unify the entire structure. These are stock pine shutters, avail-

able from building material dealers.

Comfort and convenience are stressed in the interior design. The large kitchen, for example is centered between the covered porch and a convenient lavatory that doubles as a "mud room" for children and pets.

Summer comfort has been provided for with a specification of thick mineral wool insulation in walls and ceiling. If the owners want central air conditioning, a 6-inch thickness of mineral wool would be installed in the ceiling, plus at least 3 inches in walls.

This extra insulation would, in effect, cost nothing, since the thick mineral wool makes it possible to install smaller cooling equipment. In addition, savings would be realized annually in the operation of both cooling and heating equipment.

Other features of the house include a walk-in closet that can double as a dressing room, a storage closet in the garage, and entrances to the basement from inside and outside.

**Thick Insulation for Cooling May Cost Not a Red Cent**

If you are planning to build a house with air conditioning, or to install a cooling system in an existing house, properly-installed insulation may not cost you a cent, says Andrew C. Lang, author of books about the home.

"It's a fact," says Lang, "that mineral wool insulation in thick enough amounts so efficiently keeps heat outside in summer that it's possible to install a smaller, lower-cost cooling system than you'd need without insulation or with just a little of it."

Often, Lang points out, the money you can save on a smaller central air conditioning system is at least as much as the complete cost of the insulation.

Adequate insulation also reduces the cost of operating the system. It can save as much as 40 percent annually on heating-fuel bills.

"The cash saving isn't the only value of insulation," Lang adds. "You get a bonus in comfort, since mineral wool keeps room temperatures at a more even level all year 'round and cuts chill drafts in winter."

Some "do's" and "don'ts" recommended by Lang for an air-conditioned house are:

Do insist on thick insulation. Recommendations for mineral wool are at least 6 inches in the ceiling, a minimum of 3 inches in walls, and 2 inches in floors over areas such as crawl spaces, attached garages, and porches.

Do insist on proper installation. A qualified contractor has the know-how and equipment to do the job right.

Do deal with a qualified air conditioning contractor who has a good reputation. His skill in installation is just as important as the brand of equipment he sells.

Don't forget the importance of shade and orientation of the house on its site. Trees, high fences, and awnings on the east and west sides of the house will help keep the house cool. If you're building a house, insist on wide overhangs on the south. Place the house on the lot so that broad sides face north and south, and large window areas are away from the late afternoon sun.

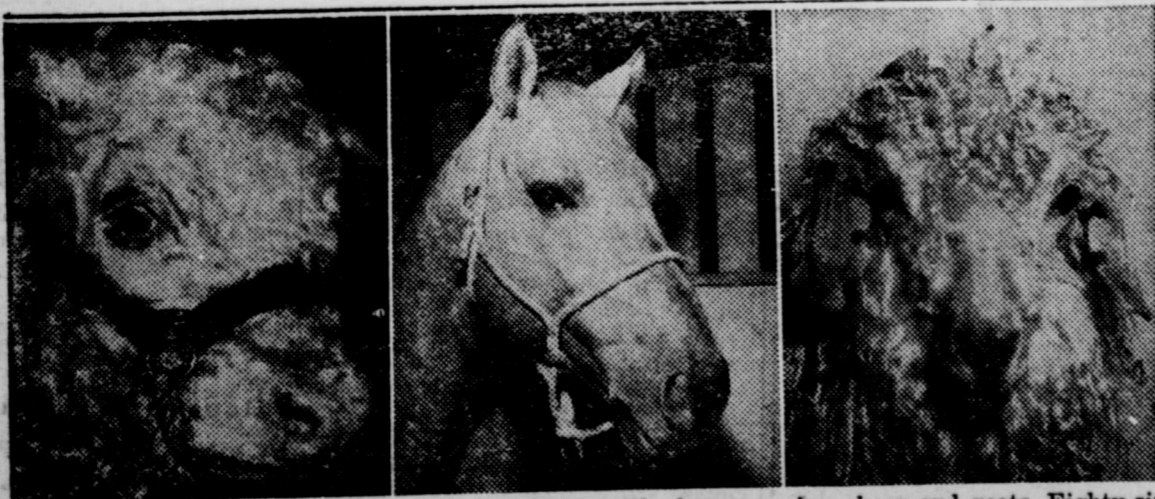
