





Schooltime Breakfast

Pancakes 2 cups prepared pancake and waffle mix 1-3/4 cups milk

Combine all ingredients. Mix with spoon or egg beater just until smooth. Bake on hot griddle or in lightly greased skillet, turning once. Do not stir batter between bakings. Serve with butter and warm Log Cabin Syrup. Makes about 20 four-inch pancakes.
