

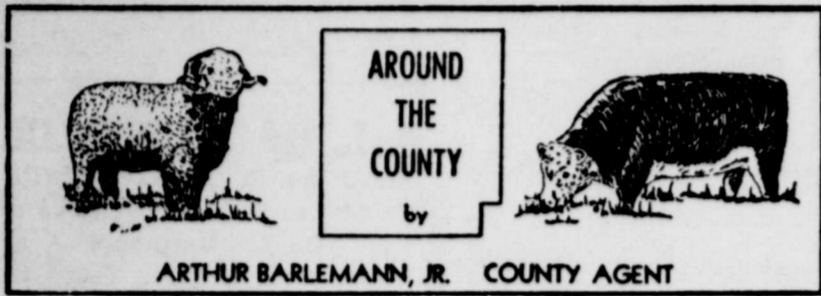

A series of six regional meetings of great importance to livestock producers in Texas is scheduled for late October and early November. Meetings are being sponsored by the Texas Animal Health Council to discuss changes in the state's multi-million dollar livestock industry. The Council is organized and composed of representatives from 32 livestock and farm organizations in Texas.

The meeting that livestockmen in this area would be interested in is scheduled for October 29 at 2:00 in the Scharbauer Hotel in Midland. Major topic will be the increasing buyer resistance to Texas cattle in many of the feeder states because of the incidence of Brucellosis. To remedy the situation it is going to be necessary that action be taken in regard to a Brucellosis control program among beef cattle-men similar to the one at work in the dairy industry. Ultimate aim is to have Texas declared free of Brucellosis so that cattle can be shipped any place in the United States by shippers, producers and others. There are many reports over the state that some states are refusing to accept Texas cattle and feeders are going to free states to buy feeder and stocker cattle.

Every livestock producer is invited to attend the meetings. It will be a half day session to discuss the recommendations of the council.

Another disease that is causing considerable loss to cattle men is leptospirosis. The disease is similar to Brucellosis in that the main loss or concern of producers is the loss of a calf crop; abortions usually occur in the last third of gestation although it may occur any time. Cattle usually recover from the disease however. Death loss will ordinarily run around 5%.

Symptoms of the disease are fever, loss of appetite, drop in milk production and anemia from the loss of blood. Full term calves may be dead or weak. All animals, regardless of age, may be infected. The disease has spread over the state in the last year and is now found in many areas. East Texas, south Texas, central Texas, and the high plains have reported the disease. During the last week there have been reports of the disease within 100 miles of Sterling City. Treatment for the disease consists of preventing the spread to uninfected animals. A vaccine is available from veterinarians and supply houses for about 35c per animal. At the present time it is good for six months only.

place has been lightly stocked for several years and is showing the effects of it now.

At a stop along the edge of a canyon we saw a good stand of better than half a dozen varieties of good grasses in full growth with a good seed crop on all. Some of those we found were Sideoats grama, hairy grama, little bluestem, silver bluestem, green sprangletop, and fall witchgrass, all warmseason grasses. Just about 100 yards further along Canada Wildrye was beginning to green up for winter grazing.

Ranges which have been deferred or where the stocking rate was reduced are making a fast comeback with the recent rains. On some of the areas where bitterweed was sprayed last spring there are fewer undesirable weeds. Good, live seed are available and ready to put out growth with proper conditions. The weather has cooperated the last few months; the next big step is proper management of the range to allow the grasses to get fully established.

Next week Monday through Friday is the week of state conference for all Extension Service personnel. Every county agricultural agent and assistant and all home demonstration agents and assistants will be meeting at College Station on the campus of Texas A. & M. College for their annual conference. More than 700 agents will be present.

Due to this, the county agent's office will be closed all next week. We'll be back on November 3, Monday.

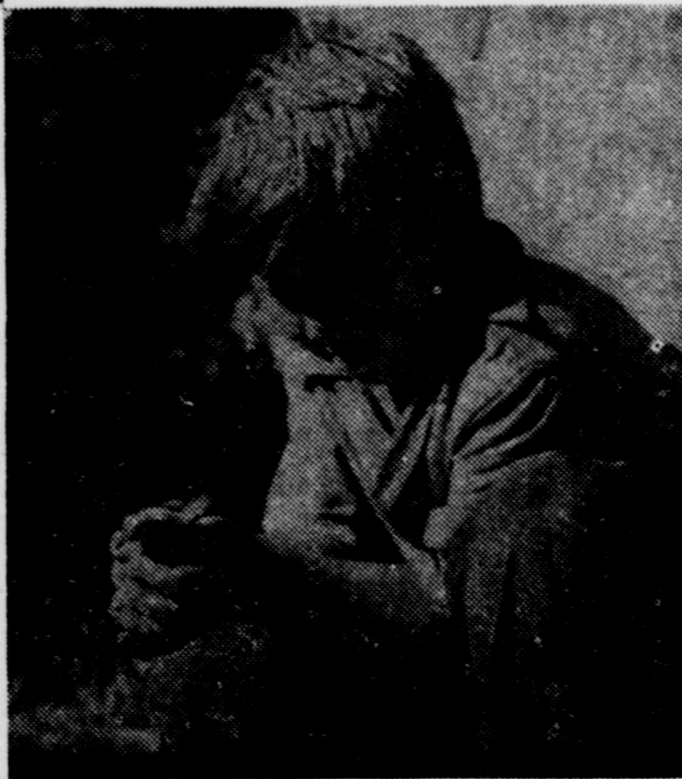
The idea, for instance, that "government should run such and such a business, a service, an institution." Even though it has been shown that the more things government runs, the less freedom there is for the individual.
