Eagles Trim Water Valley 14-0

Play Forsan There Tonight

Coach W. L. Young's Sterling City Eagles started a comeback Friday night with a win of 14-0 over the Water Valley Wildcats. The Eagles had lost the week before to Garden City in the first conference game of the year.

PLAY FORSAN TONIGHT

The Sterling team journeys to Forsan tonight to play the Forsan Buffaloes in a conference tilt at 8 p.m. The Buffaloes have a good team this year and are expected to give the locals some trouble.

In last Friday night's game, the Water Valley boys kicked off. Alfred Chapple made a good return of the kick. Nathan Morris, on the first play, picked up five yards. On the next play Robert Quintana got 2 and the Eagles punted on the 3rd down. The Tom Green County boys failed to gain and when the Eagles took over again, they were without Chapple, Sterling back, who got a hurt knee while Water Valley was trying for a first.

On the first play for the Eagles Morris picked up four yards, and a pass from Quintana made a first down for the locals. Then Nathan Morris in two tries got another first down. Sterling fumbled and the Wildcats recovered. Water Valley connected and gained 25 yards on a pass play. Gates picked up 7 yards, then the Eagles held, and the ball passed over to the locals.

Quintana passed to Bill Davis for 5 yards as the first quarter ended. Quintana made a first down and a pass interference penalty gave the Eagles a first down. Then the locals lost the ball on downs, but the Wildcats fumbled and the ball went back to Sterling.

Quarterback Quintana took the oval over for the first touchdown of the evening and Morris went over for the extra two points, giving the Eagles an 8-point lead. Sterling kicked to Water Valley as play resumed. Water Valley got off a good pass play but then fumbled the ball and Sterling recovered. The Wildcats retaliated by intercepting a Sterling pass, but the half ended play at that point.

Sterling kicked off to the Wildcats when play started after the half. They couldn't gain a first and kicked on the fourth down. A Water Valley boy caught the ball and dropped it and Tony Allen covered it for the Eagles. Morris made a first down and then the Eagles slowed and lost the ball on downs to the Wildcats on their own four yard line. They fumbled and Sterling recovered. Morris took the pigskin over for the second score of the evening for the Eagles. The try for extra point was no good.

The Eagles kicked following the touchdown. The Wildcat's Jodie Weeks made a good return, in fact he was an outstanding player for them all evening. Nathan intercepted a Wildcat pass and the locals took over. They couldn't make a first and tried to kick but Petmecky fumbled and the ball went to the "Cats". They, too, couldn't gain a first and lost the ball on downs. Morris made two firsts on two tries for the locals but the power played out and Water Valley took over. The Wildcats fumbled and the Eagles had the ball. Petmecky made a quick first down which took the oval down to "goal to go". Petmecky made several good line gains as time ran out, ending the game.

Sterling had won 14-0.

Local Boy Wins State Range Award

College Station, October 30—Two 14 year old range experts have been named winners of the first statewide awards in the 4-H Range Result Demonstration program. They are Reynolds Lee Foster of Sterling County and Bill Jacoby of Crockett County.

According to the state 4-H club office release, each will receive a scholarship to the annual Range Camp which is held each summer. Donor for the scholarships is the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Association. In addition, the donor also provides medals for county winners and an engraved belt buckle for each district winner.

Objectives of the program are to give 4-H youth an understanding and appreciation of range management; to stimulate the use of proper range management practices now and in the future and to encourage closer working relationships in range management conservation between youth and adults.

Reynolds Lee is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Reynolds W. Foster and is completing his fourth year of 4-H club work. He is an outstanding lamb feeder and like Jacoby has enjoyed much success as a grass and range judge. In 1957 he was high individual in the district junior grass judging contest and was second in the county livestock judging contest. The county range team in 1958 was second in the district and seventh in the state. Reynolds was the fourth ranking individual in the North Concho S CD range plot classification contest in 1958.

He has exhibited fat lambs at Odessa, Abilene, San Angelo and San Antonio as well as the local show. He holds county awards in meat animal production, soil and water conservation and achievement and is the 1958 Gold Star boy for the county.

Reynolds says, "I feel that I am steadily learning more about my sheep and hope to continue to improve my record. Too, I have learned a great deal about grasses and range management. My entire family has enjoyed going with me to collect range plants. I hope that some day I can put my knowledge to use on my own ranch." A collection of 35 range plants, mostly grasses, along with important information on each is a part of his record book.

Young Foster's 4-H program is being supervised by Arthur Barlemann Jr., Sterling county agent. His local adult leaders are his father and Leslie Payne.

General Election Next Tuesday, Nov. 4

Next Tuesday, November 4 is general election day in Texas—and over the nation too—for that matter.

The usual voting places will be open in Sterling County. The one at the courthouse, Foster's ranchhouse, Humble ranchhouse, Bynum ranchhouse, and at Nick Reed's.

There are five columns for the candidates. The Democratic column has the full line of candidates and the Republican and Constitution parties have some candidates. The Independent and Write-In columns are blank with places to write in names of candidates.

Nine Amendments To Be Voted
There are nine amendments listed at the bottom of the ballot to be voted on.

The first one would give members of the state legislature salaries of \$7500 a year and have yearly sessions of the Senate and House. It also makes provision for the Lieutenant Governor and his family and the Speaker of the House and his family to live in the Capitol Building while holding office.

Proposition two would allow counties to set up retirement plans for officers and workers of the county.

Number three provides that vacancies in county judges and justice of the peace offices shall only be filled till the next general election.

Number four would let officials in State offices hold one office and run for another but would provide that all other office seekers resign if they are seeking another office—other than the one they hold—if there is more than one year left in their term of office.

Number five would allow home rule cities set up four year terms of office for their elective officers after a vote called for such.

Number six would provide pensions for retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the present retirement plan of Texas.

Number seven would allow the legislature power to authorize the payment of medical bills for old age pensioners, or the other pensioners of the state.

Number nine would allow Potter County and the city of Amarillo to form a hospital district for the purpose of having a city-county hospital.

GOOD RAINS THIS WEEK

Two Negroes Brutally Murder Shorty Canada Last Friday

Gandy's Route Man Here Killed On Highway in Early Morning

Two negroes, Roosevelt Wiley, 26, and Willie McDade, 16, knifed L.H. Shorty Canada to death last Friday morning on his run to Sterling City. He had been on the Gandy Creamery run up here for years and was called Shorty or Mr. Gandy by his friends here.

He was waved down to presumably help the two negroes and they assaulted him, tortured him, took \$900 of his personal money and then they drug him over the rail road tracks and finished him off, cutting his throat.

Burial was in San Angelo Monday, with services in the First Presbyterian Church.

The brutal killing was in the little corner of Coke County on highway 87 and the two self-confessed murderers will be tried there next month.

The two negroes had stolen a pickup in Odessa, driven toward San Angelo and was out of gas when they waved down Shorty's truck. He stopped to help and got killed for his stop. They drove the Gandy truck on to Big Spring, bought some clothes, and were apprehended in a jewelry store there about midday. They admitted the killing and showed officers where to find the body. They are in custody of Coke County sheriff Paul Good.

Shorty was a friendly, business-like little fellow with his route to Sterling and had many friends here. They all regret the manner of his passing and the wanton brutality of it. A number of local people attended the funeral rites in Angelo Monday. H. A. Chapple phoned in to Gandy's headquarters when the truck didn't come with the milk and other products that morning. The school kids had to drink water instead of the usual milk that day.

By early afternoon all people in town knew that something had happened to Shorty. The town was full of West Texas peace officers and when the body was found everyone knew—the worst.
