Sterling Democratic By Big Margin Tuesday

No Amendment Carries In Sterling

Sterling County voters went to the polls Tuesday in the General Election and voted primarily in the Democratic column. They also turned down all nine of the amendments submitted. 168 votes were tallied for Price Daniel as governor to 18 for his Republican opponent Edwin Mayer.

For U.S. Senator, Ralph Yarborough chalked up only 160 votes to Republican Whittenburg's 24.

The Constitution party did not even scratch in the races.

Sterling voters almost approved the amendment on filling vacancies for judges and justice of the peace, but the vote was 88 against to 85 for. On the first amendment—that of having annual legislative sessions—voters rejected it 144 to 28.

Statewide all amendments were approved except the first two. The two rejected were those dealing with annual sessions of the legislature and the one for county pensions for employees.

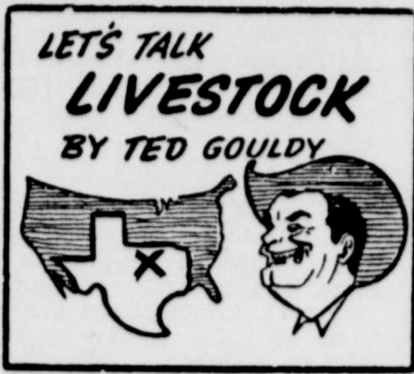
NEXT TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 11 IS HOLIDAY

LIGHT SUPPLIES BRING FIRM LIVESTOCK PRICES

FORT WORTH—Movement of all classes of livestock around the major marketing circle was light on the opening session this week and generally firm prices resulted. At Fort Worth there was a reduction in salable cattle and calves and a small increase in sheep. Swine numbers followed the national pattern.

Cattle and calves ruled mostly steady at Fort Worth Monday. Fat cows were again rather slow and bulls were steady to weak, but price changes were so narrow that the tone of the trade was about the only concrete evidence of any change. Stockers were active at firm prices with numerous farmer and rancher buyers in the alleys setting a fast pace. Packer calves and fed cattle moved at firm prices.

Good to choice yearlings and heifers sold from \$24 to \$27 and some good grade steers sold from \$25 downward. Common to medium steers and yearlings cashed at \$17 to \$23. Fat cows drew \$18 to \$20 and canners and cutters sold from \$12 to \$18. Bulls returned \$18 to \$23.

Medium to choice slaughter calves bulked at \$24 to \$26.30, a few odd head to \$27. Medium and plain butchers sold from \$18 to \$23 and cull sorts sold from \$13 to \$18. Stocker steer calves of good and choice grades cashed at \$27 to \$33, some Angus calves weighing 455 pounds at \$33 and numerous sales of steer calves were reported from \$30 to \$31.50. Heifer calves sold mainly from \$28 downward. Stocker steer yearlings ranged from \$22 to \$27 and a few stocker cows cashed at \$18 to \$20, and were medium or plain kinds.

HOGS RECOVER LAST WEEK'S LATE LOSSES

Hogs were unevenly 25 to 75 cents higher at Fort Worth Monday, mostly 50c higher. Sows were steady to 25c higher. Choice hogs ranged from \$19 to \$19.50 in most sales, with medium and good butchers from \$17.50 to \$18.50. Some heavies scaling over 280 pounds sold at the top of \$19.50 and reflected the full advance. Sows were reported from \$17 to \$17.25.

WOOLED LAMBS TOP AT \$22.50 IN FIRM TRADE

Sheep and lambs were steady at Fort Worth Monday. Good to choice slaughter lambs sold from \$21 to \$22.50 the higher figure on some 98-pound woolled lambs and some lambs with No. 2 pelts sold at \$22. Stocker and feeder lambs in the wool sold from \$20 to \$21, and shorn feeders ranged from \$20 downward.

Slaughter ewes sold from \$7 to \$8 and slaughter goats sold at \$8. Slaughter aged bucks sold for \$7. Yearling and older wethers were scarce.

FEED SURVEY COMMITTEE REPORT GETS INTENSE STUDY

The annual survey of the livestock situation by the Feed Survey Committee of the American Feed Manufacturer's Association was getting the attention of all segments of the livestock trade at Ft. Worth Monday.

Naturally the high percentage of "hits" which this committee of college and extension service experts has scored in the past, makes this report timely and important. The committee has been less than 2 percent wrong in the past.

They estimate 14% more hogs in the next 12 months, 10% more broilers, 3% more beef cattle, 5% more turkeys, 4% more sheep, 3% more laying chickens, 2% fewer dairy cows, 4% fewer horses and mules, 6% fewer other chickens raised for flock replacements.

The 1958-1959 rate of feeding grains, oilseed meals and other concentrates will be 130 million tons. Supplies of 186 million tons of these feedstuffs will be available. This is an excess of 44 percent.

1958's fall pig crop should be 15% above last year. 1959 Spring pig production should be up 14%.

Mrs. Roy Foster introduced Miss Hawkins, who is chairman of the Safety Division, FFWC.

The speaker warned the women to be aware of the driver under the influence of drugs, alcohol or simply emotional stress. The spoke of the state federation's hopes for uniform license laws, driver education in schools and more practical speed laws. She discussed the right of way at intersections.

Also injured were Hammond, Sloan's wife and stepson, and Miss Betty Eason of Odessa.

Re-indicted were Walter Carl Nast of Dallas, charged with swindling, and Anton Loyd Crawford of San Angelo, charged with second offense driving while intoxicated.

True bills also were returned against Arthur Donnell Taylor, 44, of Brady, and William Edward Tom of Leakey, both charged with second offense of driving while intoxicated, and W. B. Bennett, formerly of Sterling City, worthless checking.

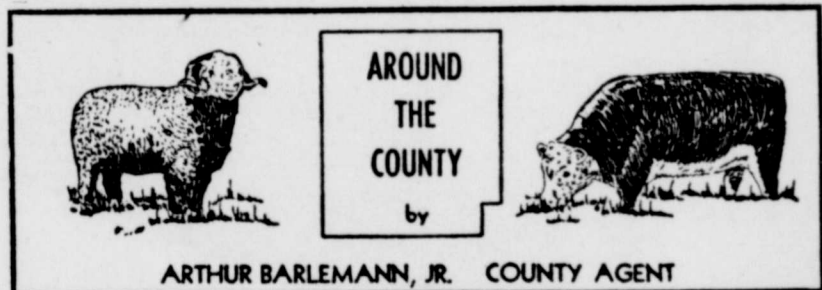

The head of a fox killed by Vernon Stewart at his place Friday night was sent to Austin for diagnosis by the rabies laboratory there. Monday the laboratory reported that the head was positive for rabies.

The fox came up Friday night shortly before midnight and attacked a dog at the Stewarts. When Mr. and Mrs. Stewart went out to see what the commotion was about the fox offered to attack them. Vernon killed the fox. Bill Green removed the head Saturday morning and sent it to San Angelo by Mrs. Stewart. The City Health Department in San Angelo packed the head and put it on the plane to Austin shortly afternoon Saturday.

The Health Department in San Angelo will pack the head in ice, package the entire thing, and put it on a plane for Austin for \$7.50. This is the only way a head can be sent to Austin unless someone will drive down as postal regulations will not accept them for shipment. They cannot be shipped by bus either.

This makes two positive heads sent in from Sterling County since August 31. A good many more have been suspected but have not been sent to Austin since no persons were involved or the person killing the fox did not see fit to send the head because no known damage was done. 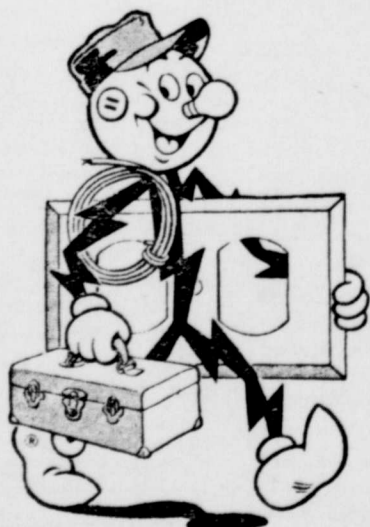

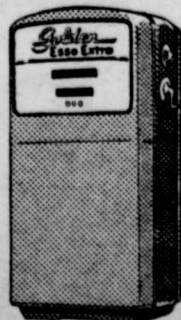

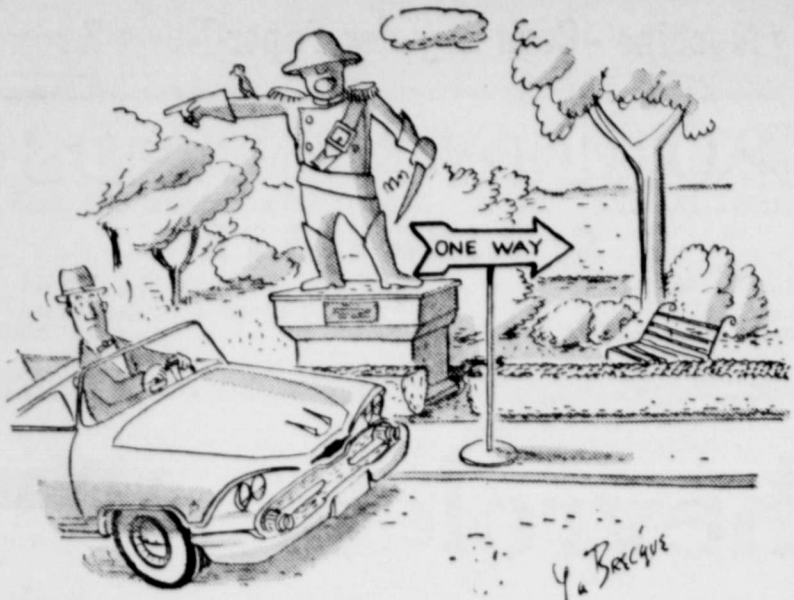

County Agent's Column

couple of weeks; Jeff Davis killed one and a number of others have been seen right around town.

If a dog or cat has been inoculated for rabies and is bitten by a rabid animal, veterinarians advise giving a booster shot. If an animal has not been inoculated and is bitten, about the only thing to be done is destroy the animal as treatment is not effective.

Within the last 12 months no less than 24 foxes have been killed that were suspected of being rabid. The only positive way of knowing is to send the head to Austin but an animal's behavior is a good indication. Whenever a wild animal such as a fox or skunk comes around humans or dogs and offers to fight and often does whip all comers, something is wrong. Everyone of the two dozen has done just that. It has occurred in all sections of the county, no one section being the center.

During the first 27 days of September, the state lab diagnosed 23 positive cases in Texas. Eight were dogs, five fox, three skunk, one cat and six bats.

E. G. Pope of the Fish and Wildlife Service's Predatory Animal control division, will be in Sterling County for a meeting next Tuesday November 11. The meeting is set for 400 p.m. at the old Lester Foster ranch house just east of Ster-

ling City on highway 87.

Mr. Pope will explain how to bait for the foxes, skunks, and coons which are carrying so much of the rabies. Pope says that many baits will be lost due to the large number of rats and mice in the country now and special precautions must be taken to get effective use of the bait.

It is nearly time for fall program of vaccinating pets for rabies and testing family milk cows for Bangs and TB. We are in the process of making arrangements with a veterinarian to provide this service as has been the practice in the past.

Presently we hope to have this set up for the week of November 17-21. More information will be put in the paper and in addition, ranchers who have tested cows in the past will receive letters and cards to be returned. The veterinarian will be in town for several hours to take care of all dogs and other pets that owners want vaccinated. All pets that were given rabies shots last fall now need another as the shots are effective for 12 months. Those given shots in the spring do not require one now.

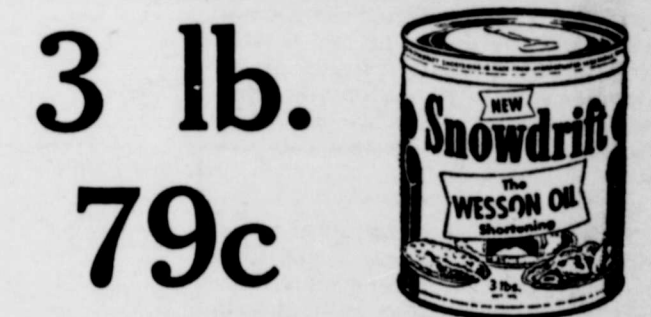
