Sterling County 4-H Club members have participated in one area stock show thus far with their fat lambs and will participate in another area show next week. Nine club members will exhibit 22 lambs in the Abilene Fat Stock Show, January 19 through 23.

Club members exhibiting lambs are Mitsy Davis, Larry Stewart, Jerry Payne, Carolyn Payne, Rosanne Foster, David Foster, LeRuth Reed, Cecilia McDonald and Jeanie McDonald. Lambs will leave here on Sunday for Abilene. They will be sifted Tuesday morning at 7:30 with the showing due to start at 9:00 that morning. Sale of lambs making the auction sale will take place at 11:00 Friday morning.

Two club members sold lambs in the auction at Odessa this past Saturday. Sale of lambs is limited to the first twenty lambs in each class.

David Foster sold his lamb for \$1.05 per pound while LeRuth Reed's lamb brought \$1.20 per pound. Due to the speed with which the lambs were sold and the usual noise around a sale, we failed to get the purchasers' names but they will be on the checks the exhibitors receive.

Tests at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Southwestern Range and Sheep Breeding Laboratory at Fort Wingate, New Mexico showed that heavier ewes produced heavier, faster-growing lambs than lightweight ewes. This held true regardless of breed.

In the four year test, ewes were grouped by weight. The lightest group averaged 65.4 pounds as yearlings and the heaviest, 92.7 pounds. The heaviest group with an average weight advantage of 26.3 pounds, produced lambs that averaged 1.29 pounds at birth and 10.5 pounds more at weaning.

Quicker profit should be possible from breeding flocks since culling could be done before breeding rather than after the ewe has produced a lamb. In addition, the bigger ewes would have more skin area to grow wool. The wool producer would then have to work on his wool in a culling program if he was attempting to produce a quality clip.

Prickly pear has long been the source of much discussion as a range plant and as livestock feed. Many cattlemen count it a saving in disguise in times of drouth while others fight it and eradicate it from their ranges. In Texas, many a cow has been fed prickly pear which has been burned to remove the spines.

Regardless of your feeling about the pear, recent chemical tests of green pear have shown an analysis that classifies it as a fair roughage. The parts usually consumed by livestock show the following analysis: crude protein—1.4 to 4.4%; digestible protein—0.5%; fat—1.55%; potash—3.04%; phosphoric acid—0.33%; crude fiber—8.65%; calcium—2.84% to 13.85%; nitrogen free extract—57.85%; and water—up to 85%.

Although considered a fair roughage on these tests, pear alone is not to be considered a maintenance ration or feed. At the Sonora Experiment Station, a daily feeding of 11.49 pounds of chopped, burned pear, 0.35 pounds of cottonseed meal, and 0.34 pounds of alfalfa hay proved a satisfactory emergency ration for ewes.

## MARCH OF DIMES COFFEE DAY NEXT SATURDAY AT CAFES

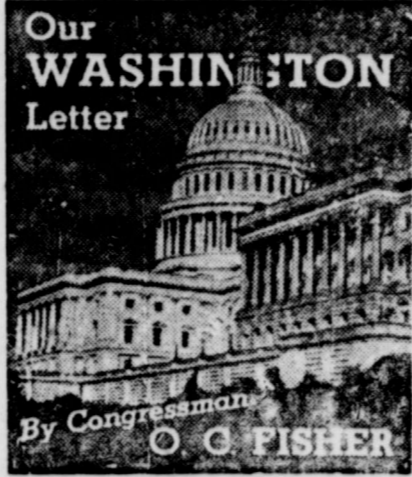

PLUGGING FOR A BALANCED budget, President Eisenhower delivered his annual State of the Union message last week to a joint session of the House and Senate. A special budget message will follow, spelling out the details.

Out of a membership of 436 there was a turn-over of 82 from the last election. Many of the new Members are self-styled liberals. This fact has given rise to concern by some observers, lest free-spending will be the order of the day. But the outlook for moderation improved at the beginning of the session when an attempt by the liberal bloc to emasculate the House Rules Committee was nipped in the bud by Speaker Sam Rayburn.

The Rules Committee is the "clearing-house" for bills that are programmed for House Floor action. And that committee has through the years saved the taxpayers many billions by refusing to clear ill-considered spending and other measures for debate. Most liberals are free-spenders.

While the Senate liberal bloc was causing some static by an attempt to curb the right of extended debate, the House organized with the minimum of rumbblings. Sam Rayburn ruled the roost and shamed the insurgents into silence by saying, "Look at the Republicans—how they are divided." Even the raucous civil-righters who had gloated over a House Elections Committee Report asking that Congressman-elect Dr. Dale Alford of Little Rock be refused a seat until an investigation of his election, which would take a year or two, could be made, appeared awed and subdued on the opening day and were forced to retreat.

THE SESSION had one novelty—a Congressman was sworn in from the 49th State of Alaska. And the stories keep going around about Texas losing its top spot in size. One of the speaks of the Alaskan (Alaska is more than twice the size of Texas) going to Texas and dying from claustrophobia! But Texans, seeking the best face-saving recourse available, are now saying: "Texas is still the largest UN-frozen state in the Union!"

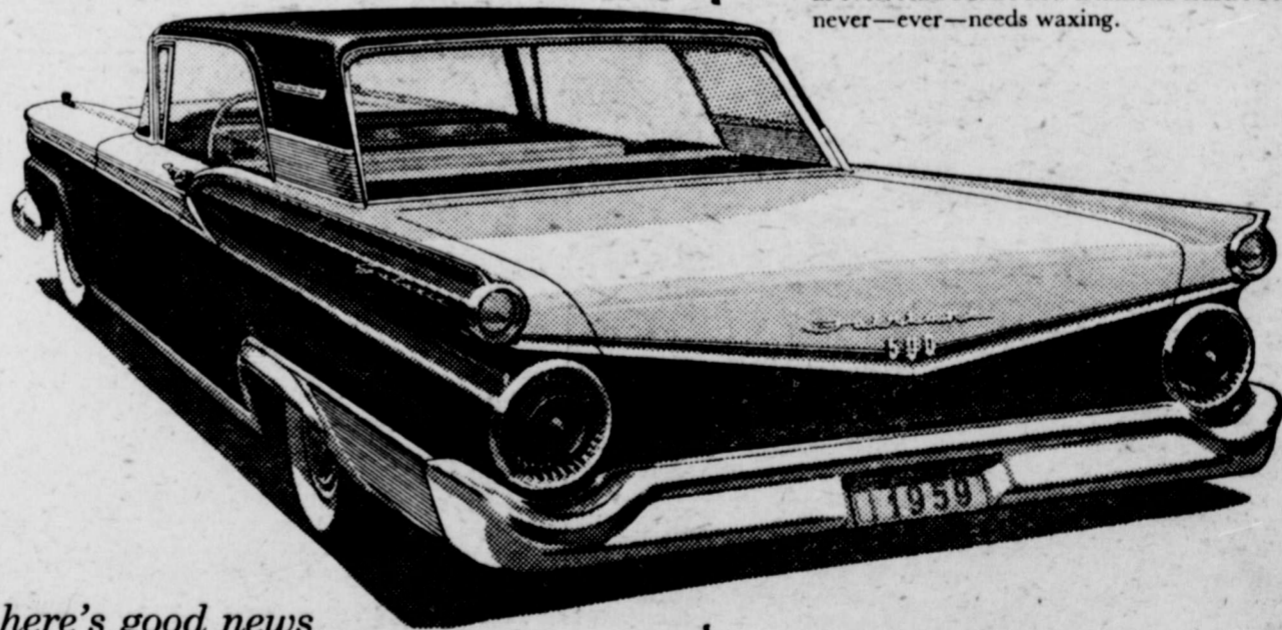

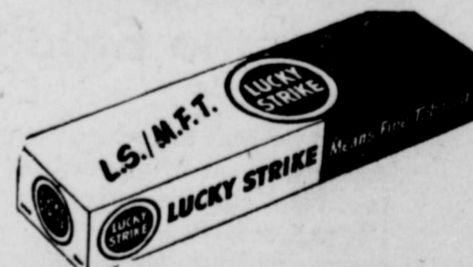
