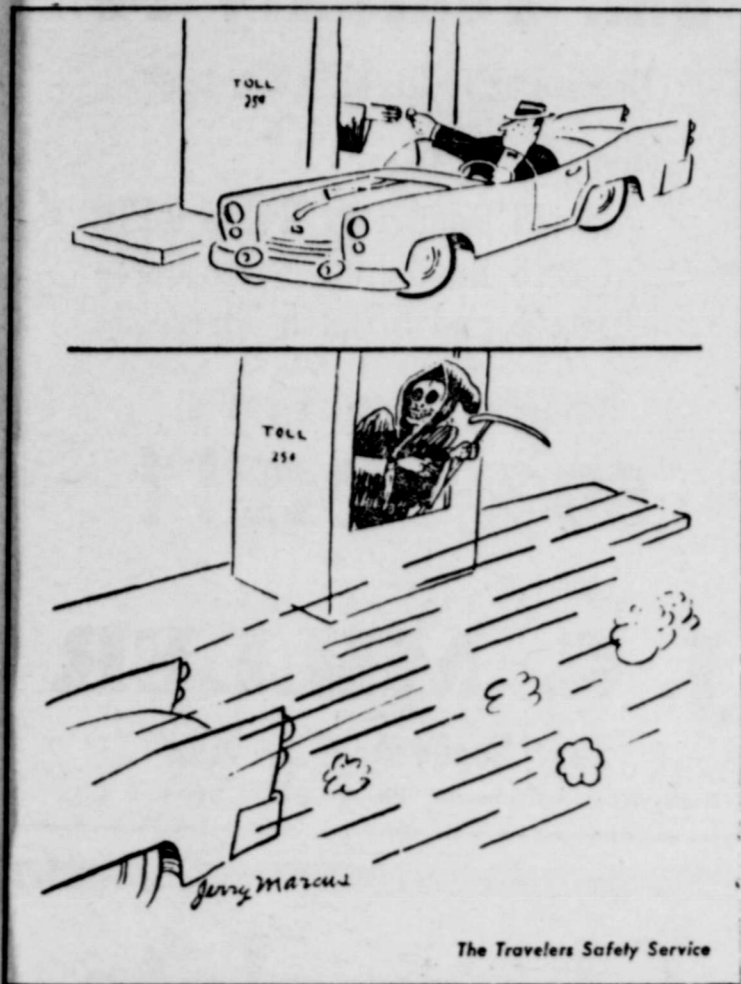

SENIORS SPONSORING ACROBATIC PROGRAM FEBRUARY 27 AT 2:30

Ya'll Come!

The Seniors are sponsoring The Coriells—acrobats in an assembly program at the high school February 27 at 2:30 p. m.

The Coriells will feature balancing, acrobatics and juggling acts. The program will cost 15c for grade school students, 25c for high school students and 35c for adults. Everybody in the community is invited to come up to the school and see the program.

The two men feature a variety of balancing and acrobatic routines as well as object juggling. Starting with the demonstration of the fundamentals of juggling, balancing and tumbling this team progresses to perform some of the most difficult juggling of hoops, balls, clubs and Roman battle axes. But not only do they juggle and pass various objects from partner to partner while standing upright they also juggle while upside down in a free head balance with both their hands and feet. One member juggling a pole 10 feet in length with his feet while maintaining a free head balance. Juggling is also performed while riding unicycles. A western touch is added to the program when rope spinning is introduced as a part of the act. Although born in the midwest and raised on circus lots, the trick roping in the act makes the cowboys themselves sit up and take notice. The trick and fancy rope manipulating is as expert as any cowhand's and various forms of jumping and skipping the rope while it is being spun and also includes the famous Texas skip. One member of the duo spins a "big loop" seventy-five feet in length while balancing on the shoulders of the other. A demonstration in advanced tumbling is performed in which cartwheels, round-offs, flip flaps and high aerial backs are demonstrated. Juggling and rope spinning are also demonstrated balanced on the roly-poly and the unicycle. Fun and laughter is also provided when the members of the audience are invited to participate in the act and to perform some of the more seemingly simple balancing feats.

A well-rounded variety program in physical education is brought to a thrilling finale when two of the most difficult feats in balancing and acrobatics are performed by the duo. One member of the team performs a slide-for-his-life down a ramp from a pedestal to the floor while balancing on his head on a roller skate. And finally, the seemingly impossible is performed; almost everyone has seen an acrobat walk on his hands—but one of the members of this team actually walks on his head while maintaining a free head balance. In fact, he is the only man in the world who can jump rope and walk up and down steps standing on his head. This team of acrobatic balancers has been featured on the You Asked for It and Ed Sullivan Television programs as well as other TV shows.

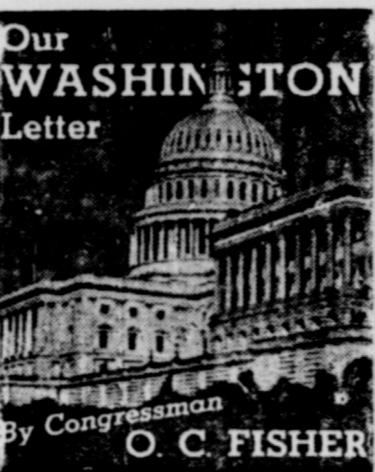

BATTLE LINES were closer drawn on labor and civil rights legislation last week as Administration and Democrat bills went into the hopper. Over in the Senate Massachusetts's Presidential hopeful, Senator John Kennedy reintroduced his labor bill which was approved by the Senate and defeated in the House last year. That was followed by a White House proposal. And so the lines took shape.

ACTUALLY, the Kennedy bill is a phony so far as meaningful labor legislation is concerned. It would weaken rather than improve the Taft-Hartley Act in its usefulness to control abuses and corruption. It smacks strongly of politics.

The Administration bill is a little better. It does attempt to deal with two evils which the racketeers sometimes exploit—the practice of organizational picketing and secondary boycotts. The Kennedy bill is silent on both subjects.

RIGHT NOW it looks like either no labor legislation in this session or a weak and meaningless measure using the trade name of "labor reform" to blot out racketeering and corruption.

ON THE CIVIL RIGHTS front, the politicians are flexing their muscles and limbering up for the battles ahead. Boiled down, it is a battle for the negro vote in 1960. Senator Lyndon Johnson got the jump on the Republicans by offering his own omnibus bill which appeals to reason and is acceptable to most moderates. Then up from the White House came another omnibus proposal promptly condemned by liberals for not having any jail-sending teeth in it.

Thus, the ultra liberals blow hot and cold. On the one hand they want no part of labor legislation that has any teeth in it, and on the other they will have no part of civil rights legislation sans tusks.

SPEAKING OF POLITICS, an attempt by a Chicago Congressman, Barrett O'Hara, to endear himself to the colored voters in his district backfired the other day. He promised a 14-year-old Negro a job as a page boy in the House. When the Negro showed up there was no job, no vacancy to be filled. The Chicago Democratic delegation in the House, including the Negro Congressman, Wm. Dawson, are reportedly burned up at O'Hara over the incident. They refused to join in attempt to bail O'Hara out, said he had no business bringing the boy to Washington and causing all the embarrassment.

Well, Congress—??

Friday, February 13. Friday the thirteenth is one of those days when many people feel that they had done better had they stayed in the dark corners of their room. But Year 1959 is loaded with them. Another one will roll around in March, just one month away. And November will still find another.

Friday, the thirteenth was considered no jinx by the San Antonio livestock show officials. It was chosen as the day to open their 10th annual exposition which is bigger than ever. The San Angelo Fat Stock Show also considered this date of Friday the thirteenth as no bad day. They, too, will have their show running on that "black day." Theirs falls in March, however. The San Angelo show will open on March 11 and close on the 15th.

Eighteen Sterling County 4-H Club boys and girls will exhibit in the San Angelo show in March. They will have 4 finewool lambs, 14 crossed lambs, and 5 head of breeder-owned Rambouilletlets on exhibit there.

Fat lamb exhibitors are—Mitsy Davis, Crisp Williams, Jimmy Flynt, Jerry and Carolyn Payne, Cecilia and Jaenle McDonald, James Morgan, Temple Ann Foster, Ann and Helen Hays, Rosanne Foster, Jack and Barbara Clark, Le-Ruth Reed, and David Foster. Drew and Barbara Durham will be the Rambouillet exhibitors.

According to a letter received from A. A. Melton, animal husbandman at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station unit at Balmorhea, the annual Beef Cattle Performance Field Day is scheduled for Saturday, February 28, at the Station. All ranchers are cordially invited to attend.

The morning will be devoted to looking over the bulls which have been on test this year and visiting. A barbecue will be served at noon by the Balmorhea FFA. A program is scheduled for the afternoon which should be of interest to all ranchers.

At the end of the fourth 28 day feeding and weighing period, 65 bulls on test gained an average of 2.6 pounds. One sire group of nine averaged

3.04 pounds, and two bulls in the group gained over 3.5 pounds. R. Prince Domino 8 who finished the 1951 test with a gain of 3.23 pounds is the sire of the group. He also sired the champion of the Concho Hereford Sale in San Angelo in January. R. Prince Domino 8 is now owned by Texas A&M. College.

Many of the bulls will be for sale. Down through the years of this test, it has been shown that the ability to gain is directly attributed to the sire. High gaining bulls of the past tests are now siring the high gaining groups.

Now is the time to cut your budwood or graftwood and store it if you plan to do any budding or topworking native pecan trees this spring.

Cut the wood from vigorous growth of last season. The wood should be one-half to three-fourths of an inch in thickness. Cut in 12 to 18 inch lengths and tie in bundles being sure to mark each bundle as to variety. Pack in moist peat moss, sawdust, shavings or some similar material and hold in cold storage at 34 to 40 degrees. This will keep it in good shape for next spring's use.

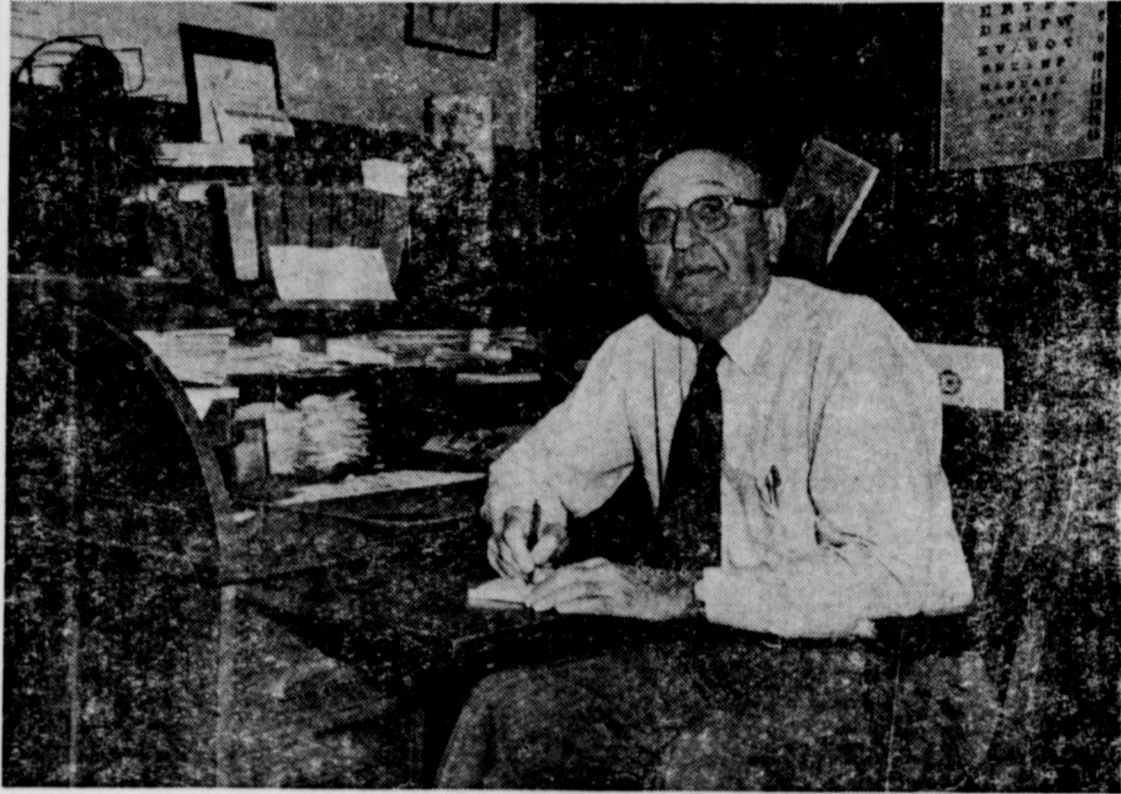

'Women Better Patients,' Says Family Doctor of Year



Dr. Lonnie A. Coffin, 68, of Farmington, Iowa, back at work after being named General Practitioner of the Year by the American Medical Association.

"Women are better patients than men," according to Dr. Lonnie A. Coffin, Family Doctor of the Year. "They'll do what you tell them, but men won't."
At 68, Dr. Coffin is a warm and happy man, busy with the health needs of more than 3,000 people in and around rural Farmington, Iowa. Enriched by 46 years of country doctoring, he is also a man who speaks his mind, a philosopher with concise and witty views on life. Here are a few of them:
On smoking: "It's undoubtedly bad for you. I gave it up after my coronary, and"—he stopped to light one of his six daily cigars—"I've given it up several times since then."

On health: "The work of the voluntary health agencies makes me confident about the future. The National Foundation, for instance, which helped us eight years ago when a polio epidemic hit Farmington [three of Dr. Coffin's four grandchildren were stricken], is now applying its March of Dimes funds to problems like arthritis and birth defects. That's good news, and good health."
On sickness: "If you're sick, do what you can to get well, but try not to worry about it. If you worry, you'll feel worse and so will everybody around you."
On being sick at night: "We all get sicker at night. That's

because we have more time to think about ourselves."
On drinking: "There are only certain people who should drink. Those who can both control it and afford it."
On fishing: "You can fish sitting down and I like that. If you catch something, fine. If you don't, exaggerate."
On being a doctor: "I try to take care of people no matter what the hour, no matter where they live, no matter who they are. Where or when they get sick is not their fault."
On being a doctor named "Coffin": "Well, it's true that's what they carry you off in, but the fact is my name hasn't scared off too many patients."

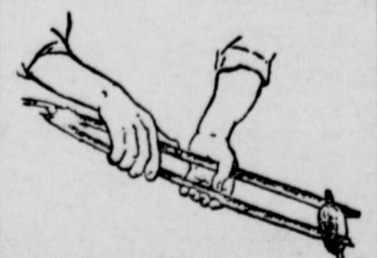
OUTDOOR COOKING MADE EASY

Crisp fall weather spells outdoor fun for me—and for about twenty-five million other sportsmen who love roaming woods and fields with hunting bows or guns. Fall weather spells family picnics, too. So, let's get out and enjoy it.
If you think outdoor cooking is for experts—or that it needs lots of pots and pans and stuff—let's see how easy it really can be! Our menu could be steak or lamb or pork chops, or chicken broilers, or fish. For vegetables, let's have buttered onions baked in foil, or butternut squash flavored with bacon and onion. Let's have baked potatoes with the top skin quartered and puffed open, adding a square of butter, a dash of salt, and perhaps a big spoonful of cottage cheese. Let's have a selection of those delicious modern instant beverages—and an easy and unusual dessert made right on the spot!

The only cooking pot we'll need is something to boil water in. Our small open fire is converted to a stove by a wire grid (such as from an old refrigerator) and a double layer of metal foil. Paper plates and cups save washing. All else we need is eating tools and a hearty appetite.

Wash medium sized potatoes and wrap individually in foil. Slice onions in half, put them together again with a pat of butter and seasoning in between, and wrap them in foil. Slice squash lengthwise, and put onion slices and a strip of bacon between. Foil wrap these, too.

Get the fire going early so you have a small but hot bed of glowing coals. The fire is in a U-shaped border of rocks, with the grid placed on top. An hour before dinner, put the vegetables in the ashes near the hot coals, turning them occasionally. If you've forgotten tongs, cut and bend a finger-sized green branch, as shown. Chicken broilers

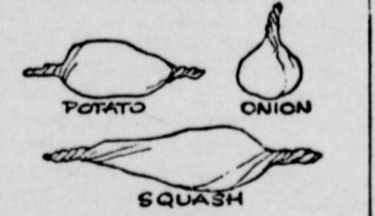


should cook slowly over hot coals (not flame) for half an hour or so. Turn and baste them often, and probe with a fork to be sure they are done. If the fire is right, they'll come out deliciously golden brown. Steaks and chops take a little less time.

For hamburgs, bacon and eggs, hot dogs, pancakes or fish, spread doubled foil over the grid and fry them on this. Why bother with a skillet?

SENIORS SPONSORING ACROBATIC PROGRAM FEBRUARY 27 AT 2:30

Ya'll Come!

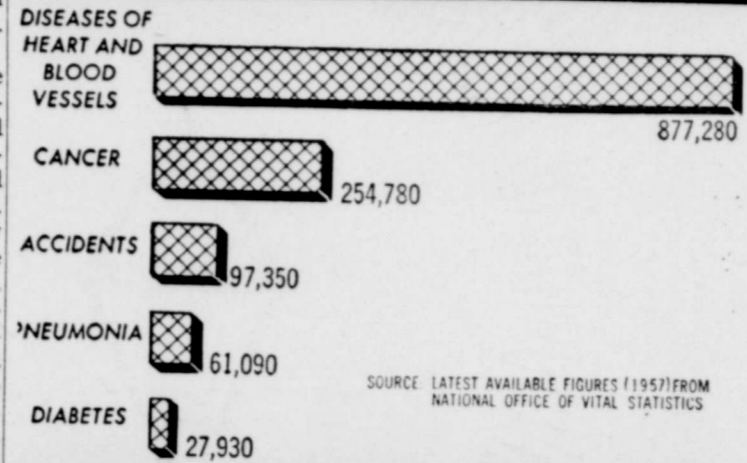
The Seniors are sponsoring The Coriells—acrobats in an assembly program at the high school February 27 at 2:30 p. m.

The Coriells will feature balancing, acrobatics and juggling acts. The program will cost 15c for grade school students, 25c for high school students and 35c for adults. Everybody in the community is invited to come up to the school and see the program.

The two men feature a variety of balancing and acrobatic routines as well as object juggling. Starting with the demonstration of the fundamentals of juggling, balancing and tumbling this team progresses to perform some of the most difficult juggling of hoops, balls, clubs and Roman battle axes. But not only do they juggle and pass various objects from partner to partner while standing upright, they also juggle while upside down in a free head balance, with both their hands and feet. One member juggling a pole 10 feet in length with his feet while maintaining a free head balance. Juggling is also performed while riding unicycles. A western touch is added to the program when rope spinning is introduced as a part of the act. Although born in the midwest and raised on circus lots, the trick roping in the act makes the cowboys themselves sit up and take notice. The trick and fancy rope manipulating is as expert as any cowhand's and various forms of jumping and skipping the rope while it is being spun and also includes the famous Texas skip. One member of the duo spins a "big loop" seventy-five feet in length while balancing on the shoulders of the other. A demonstration in advanced tumbling is performed in which cartwheels, round-offs, flip flaps and high aerial backs are demonstrated. Juggling and rope spinning are also demonstrated balanced on the roly-poly and the unicycle. Fun and laughter is also provided when the members of the audience are invited to participate in the act and to perform some of the more seemingly simple balancing feats. A well-rounded variety program in physical education is brought to a thrilling finale when two of the most difficult feats in balancing and acrobatics are performed by the duo. One member of the team performs a slide-for-his-life down a ramp from a pedestal to the floor while balancing on his head on a roller skate. And finally, the seemingly impossible is performed; almost everyone has seen an acrobat walk on his hands—but one of the members of this team actually walks on his head while maintaining a free head balance. In fact, he is the only man in the world who can jump rope and walk up and down steps standing on

HINTS FOR HOME HANDY-MEN

— by Joe Bates, Jr.

Magnets always seem to fascinate people. In addition to the familiar horse-shoe type, they now can be made in bars, rods, squares, discs, rings, and in other molded shapes in countless sizes and thicknesses. If the attracting sides of two flat magnetized metal discs, for ex-

ample, are brought near each other, they click together and cling with amazing force. Turn one of the discs over, and they repel each other with equal power.



A neighbor of mine used the magnetic principle to invent a magnetic knife and tool rack, which he gave me a model of more than ten years ago. The magnetic field is arranged on a bar nine inches or so long so that the power is equally distributed all along the bar. Its magnetism is so strong that it will hold securely knives, hammers, screw drivers, wrenches or other iron or steel tools. One thing that interests me is that the "Magnagrip" (as he calls it) seems to have lost no power at all in the past ten years. These models were so successful that the device now is sold in many stores. The manufacturer guarantees that it will hold its magnetism indefinitely!

Now, this "Magnagrip" (or "Magnabar", as some of them are called) has lots of uses for home handy-men. I bought several and screwed them into the wall, in a line, over my workbench. This tandem arrangement holds nearly all of my small tools neatly in a row, and in plain sight — easy to reach.

Just pick off the tool you want; use it — and lay it back in its place against the "Magnagrip". It stays there until you want it again. My wife saw this arrangement, and immediately got some for the kitchen. They come attractively enameled in white, to match kitchen equipment. One of hers holds a dozen or so of paring knives and spatulas. Another holds scissors, spoons and other tools. "Looks pretty; saves time, and is amazingly handy", she says. "Also, they make wonderful gifts, especially for people who 'have everything'."

Since I enjoy fishing, naturally I tie flies for the sport. The "Magnagrip" holds fish-hooks ready for use, and holds newly dressed flies while the lacquer dries. Firearm fanciers and other hobbyists find it ideal for holding small tools and disassembled parts, which otherwise could become lost or mislaid. I managed to buy a short "Magnagrip" and have this taped to a flashlight. Thus the flashlight clings wherever I want it, on any metal surface of my car. The idea is handy when changing a tire at night, or whenever one wants a light in a hurry.

Rich Chocolate, Tender Mint Flavor Gala Molded Dessert



"Superb" is the word for this truly marvelous frozen chocolate dessert with its green-tinted, peppermint-flavored center layer. No short-cut recipe is this, but your pride in the result will be worth every bit of time and care it costs you.

CHOCOLATE MINT CREAM

2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1 envelope (1 tablespoon) gelatin
1/4 cup cold water
1 1/4 cups milk, scalded

1/2 cup sugar
1/8 teaspoon salt
1 cup heavy cream
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
Peppermint extract to taste
Green coloring

Melt chocolate in top of double boiler. Combine gelatin and cold water in mixing bowl; mix well. Add scalded milk, sugar, and salt, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add cream. Pour 2 cups gelatin mixture slowly into melted chocolate, beating with rotary egg beater until blended. Then cook 5 minutes. Remove from boiling water and add vanilla. Chill chocolate mixture until slightly thickened. Place in bowl of ice and water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick. Pour 1/2 of chocolate mixture into large mold or individual molds and chill until firm. Place remaining chocolate mixture over lukewarm water until ready to mold.

To the plain gelatin mixture, add peppermint extract and green coloring. Chill until slightly thickened. Place in bowl of ice and water and whip with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick. Turn into mold over firm chocolate layer and chill until firm. Pour remaining chocolate mixture into mold. Chill until firm. Unmold. Serve plain or with whipped cream. Decorate with candies and chocolate leaves, if desired. Makes 6 servings.

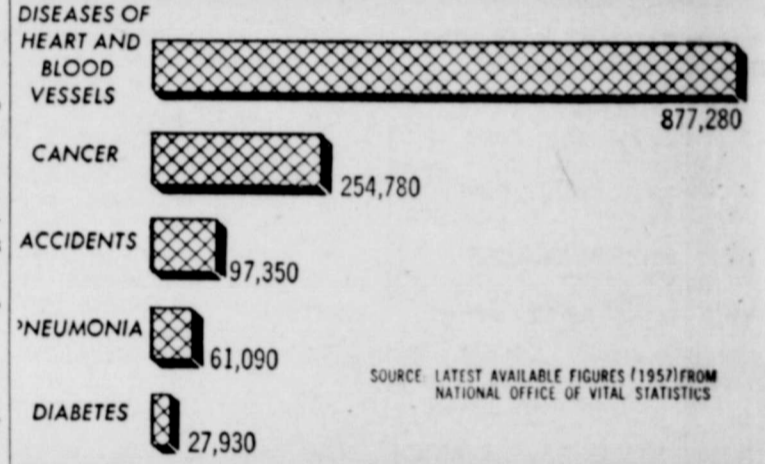

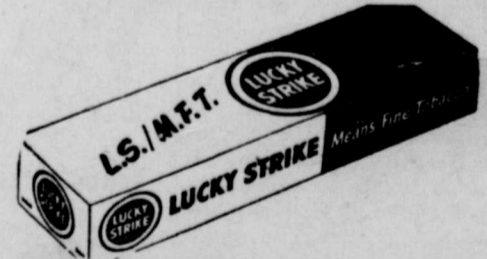
