The San Angelo Fat Stock Show gets under way next week. Dates for the show, the last on the spring show calendar, are March 11 through 15. The show opens Wednesday afternoon when judges start placing the Rambouillet and Delaine sheep. Both of these are adult shows. Hereford cattle will also be judged on Wednesday afternoon.

Fat lambs will be judged starting at 8:30 Thursday morning. Junior poultry will also be judged at 10:30 that morning. Thursday afternoon will be devoted to judging in the Junior open Rambouillet show, Junior Breeding Hereford cattle and Aberdeen-Angus cattle.

Friday morning the Junior Range Ewe Lamb show will get underway at 8:30 followed by the steer show at 10. The Junior Breeder Owned Rambouillet and Junior Delaine. Saturday morning the livestock judging contest gets underway at 8:00 and the sale of livestock at 10. Rodeos will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights; matinee performances Friday, Saturday and Sunday afternoon. Saturday night's performance will be dedicated to a number of surrounding towns including Sterling City.

Sterling County 4-H Club members who will exhibit at the San Angelo show and the livestock will show are: Mitsy Davis, 1 finewool and 1 crossbred lamb; Cecilia McDonald, 2 finewools, 2 crossbreds; Jeanie McDonald, 2 finewools, 1 crossbred; Carolyn Payne, 1 finewool and 1 crossbred; Jerry Payne, 2 finewools, 1 crossbred; LeRuth Reed, 2 finewools, 2 crossbreds; James Morgan, 2 finewools; Jimmy Flynt, 2 finewools; David Foster, 2 finewools, 1 crossbred; Temple Ann Foster, 2 finewools; Ann Hays, 1 finewool, 2 crossbreds; Helen Hays, 1 crossbred; Rosanne Foster, 2 finewools; Crisp Williams 2 crossbreds; Barbara Clark, 1 finewool; Jack Clark, 1 finewool. A total of 37 lambs will be shown by 16 exhibitors.

In the Junior Breeder-Owned Rambouillet show, Barbara Durham will show three ewes and 1 ram; Drew Durham will show 1 ewe. In the breeder-owned show, the boy or girl must actually own the sheep and the dams of all sheep they

show. L. F. and Clinton Hodges will also show their Rambouillet at San Angelo in the Adult Rambouillet breeders show on Wednesday.

The Sterling County 4-H Club represented by Barbara and Drew Durham won second place in the neatness award at the San Antonio show. The club received \$7.50 for their placing. The neatness award is based on keeping the pens and area around the pens clean, the state of condition of the feed troughs, water buckets and other equipment as well as cooperation with show officials by being ready for the judging when classes are called, cooperation and spirit shown the judge while showing, and sportsmanship.

Now is a good time to make a soil test of your garden or lawn plot if you intend to use fertilizer on it this year. A soil test costs just a dollar but often will save more than that in reduced fertilizer costs. Instead of guessing what is needed, you actually know the amounts and kind of fertilizer needed.

At this time of the year, the laboratory at A. & M. is receiving many samples from gardeners, farmers and others and it usually takes several weeks to get a return on a sample. To have the information at the time it is needed, samples should be submitted early. The soil does not change in the amount of nutrients it has and the sample is good at any time. However, after fertilizers have been used for a period of time, new tests should be made so that the added nutrients in the soil can be evaluated. For more details on the soil testing service, contact the county agent. He can supply the forms and more information about how to do it.

The Weather

Following a balmy spring-like existence, a westerly, blustery wind blew in both dust and sprinkles Wednesday afternoon. The wind worked around to the north and gave promise of colder weather—or a little more winter.

Livestock Market at Fort Worth

Easter Lamb Trade Brighter.

Fort Worth—Fat lamb prices climbed again Monday at Fort Worth and the advances of the past two weeks marked the first definite improvement for lambs since late last Fall. The rise in the market was apparently coming along just in time to make it a happy Easter season for folks with fat lambs.

Old crop fat lambs were strong to 50 cents higher and good and choice kinds sold from \$16.50 to \$18. New crop fat lambs sold at \$18 to \$19.50 when good and choice. Some fancy clipped lambs scaling 87 pounds drew \$18.50.

Feeder lambs ranged from \$15.50 to \$18. Canner ewes sold for \$8.50.

Cattle Open Slow and Weak. Spots 50c Lower

Cattle and calves were very slow and most classes exhibited some weakness. Clearance was incomplete well past the noon hour as salesmen resisted the lower offers.

Good and choice slaughter steers and yearlings ranged from \$25 to \$26.50, a few higher. Medium and plain butcher yearlings and steers cashed at \$17 to \$24.50. Fat cows sold from \$18 to \$19.50, a few young cows above that range. Cannery and cutters drew \$12 to \$18.50. Bulls ranged from \$18 to \$23.50.

Good and choice slaughter calves cashed at \$25 to \$28.50, a few higher and heavier weights usually from \$27.50 downward. Plain and medium butcher calves sold from \$22 to \$25, and cull and common sorts drew \$17 to \$21. Medium and good stocker steer calves cashed at \$27 to \$33, and heifer calves sold from \$30 downward. Stocker yearlings bulked at \$28 down, with feeder steers from \$25 down.

Hogs Open 25c Higher

Hogs were steady to 25c higher as choice hogs brought \$16.50 and \$16.75, heavier hogs sold from \$15.50 to \$16.25. Sows were unchanged at \$13 to \$14.

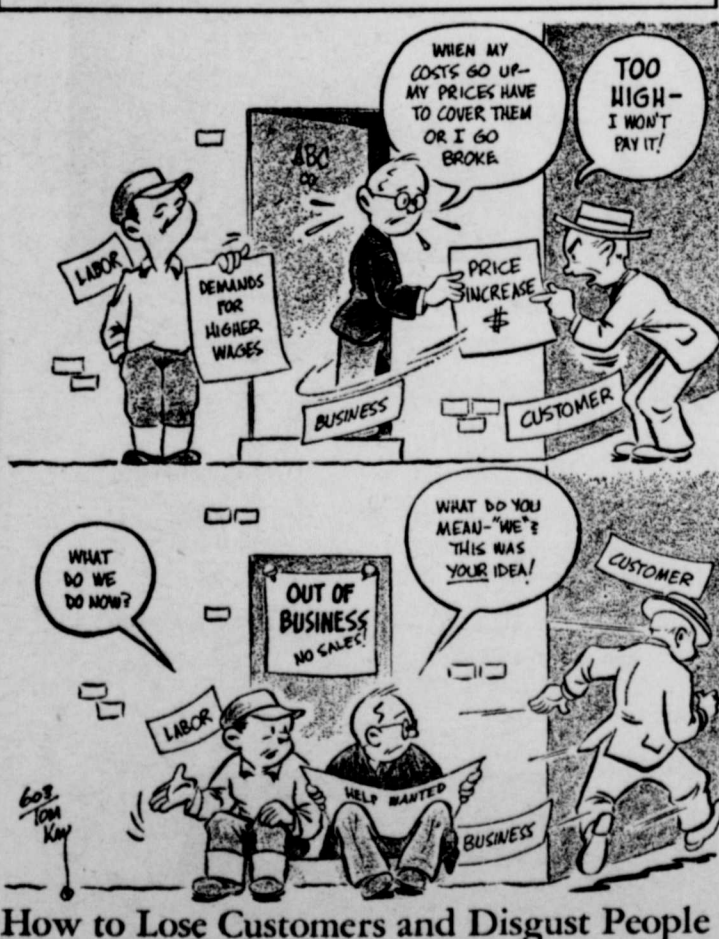

SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

"Persons receiving social security benefits can save themselves and us a great deal of inconvenience if they will report promptly when they go to work and expect to earn more than \$1200.00 in the calendar year," stated Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the social security district office at San Angelo, Texas.

"Most people know that if their earnings are in excess of \$1200.00 for the year that they will not be entitled to a benefit check for every month of the year," Ellington continued. "However, many folks are confused as to what to do when they don't know for sure on January 1 what their total earnings for the year will be. Sometimes they go on receiving their benefit checks all year without realizing that their earnings in the last part of the year may cause them to go over the \$1200.00 limit. When this happens they may have to refund part of the benefits they received."

North Concho River Soil Conservation

The board of supervisors passed some new rulings on the use of some of the district's equipment. With the purchase of a power take-off for their John Deere tractor, it can now be used for purposes other than just pitting. It can be used to pull mowers, shredders, the pitting plow, and for other uses for which it is capable. New rental rates were also set. The tractor is set for 50 cents per hour, pitting attachment 15 cents per hour, the shredder at 25c per hour, and the seeding attachment at 10 cents per hour. The equipment is located at Ewing McEntire's west of Sterling City.

R. L. James, a dirt contractor from Christoval, Texas, is now working in the county. He does all kinds of earth work and dozer work. If you plan on doing any earth work or dozing contact R.L. while he is working here. He is presently doing land levelling at Reynolds Foster's.

The County ASC committee has amended the County conservation handbook to include land levelling for irrigation. Anyone interested in this practice can now receive cost-sharing through the local ASC office.

Months of April and May are normally our highest rain fall months and are the best for resting rangeland. This deferment would give old plants and new seedlings a chance to get established, gain vigor and spread prior to the hot summer months and before grazing starts. If you plan on getting cost-share thru the ASC office the dates for beginning your deferment is: 6 months, April 1 thru May 30 and for 3 months is April 1 thru July 31. Signing up for deferred grazing must be done prior to the time you start your deferment. When you rest a pasture you are allowing nature's process to work for you.

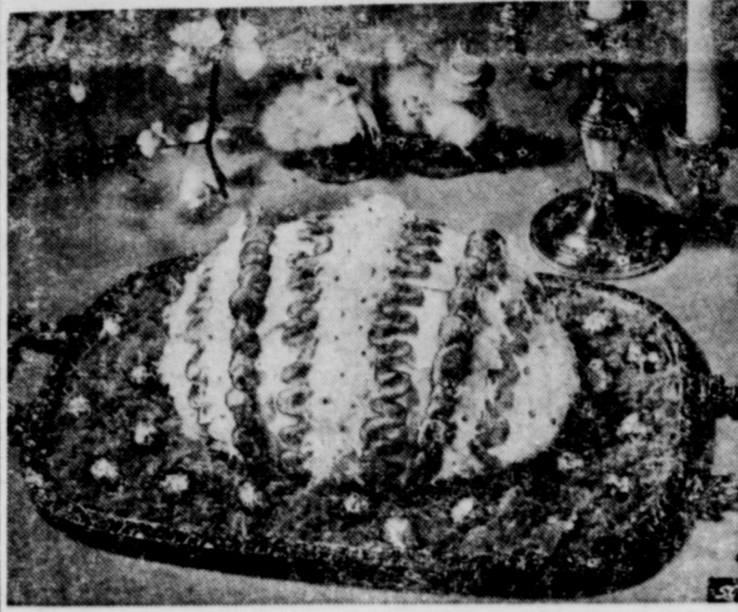

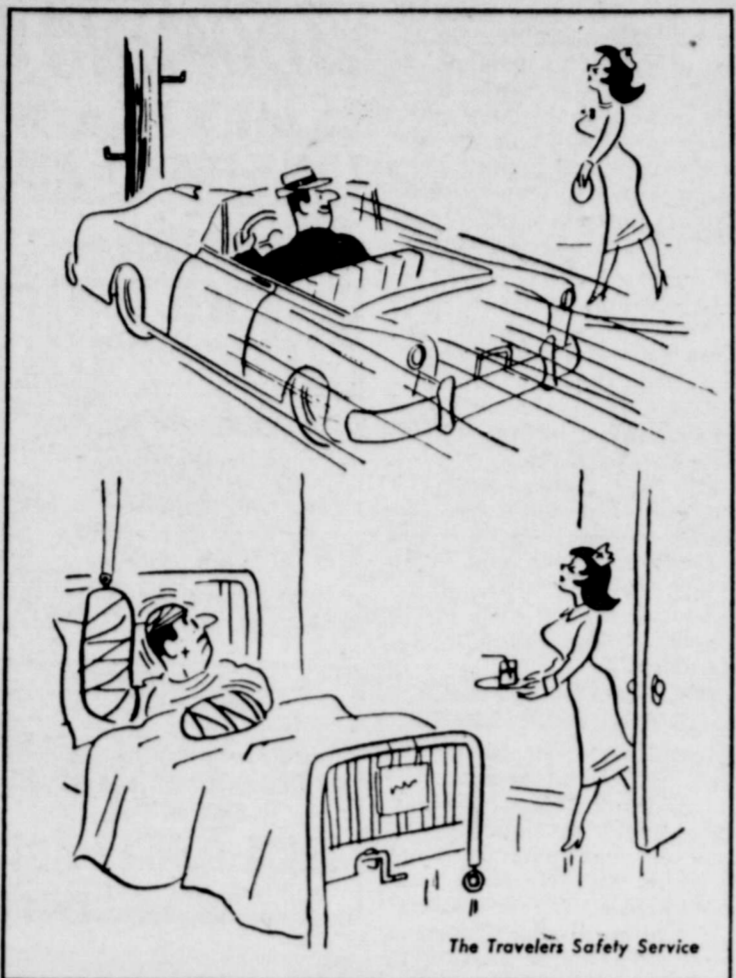

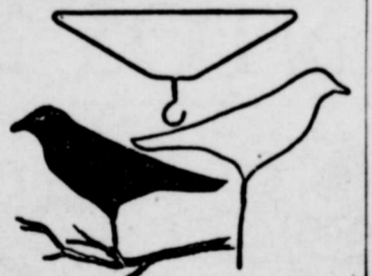

JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN

Soon the hunting season will be in full swing — so why not get in some live practice now — on crows. You can call 'em in to decoys — and decoys are cheap and easy to make. Just bend old wire coat hangers into crow-like silhouettes, as shown, and sew or staple black tar paper or cloth over them. The hook part of the hanger can be straightened, so it will stick into the ground, or in low trees.



If snow is on the ground, a good camouflage is an old sheet, worn Arab-style. Crows fly in close to this set-up, and never seem to know when they've had enough.

It's always pleasant to have something hot to drink while the guns cool off. An easier and better way than preparing coffee at home is to fill a Thermos vacuum bottle or two with boiling hot water. To make this energy-packed concoction, put into a double boiler a handful or so of two kinds of dry cereals, such as Bran-Flakes or Grape-Nuts. APRIL 15 IS DEADLINE FOR CAR INSPECTIONS

Captain R. M. Hammett of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Service, Department of Public Safety, advised motorists today that only 28% of the 469,911 vehicles registered in the 49 county Midland Region have been inspected and approved for the 1959 inspection period. Deadline for securing the new inspection stickers is April 15, 1959. As in previous years, it appears many drivers will be in for a long wait to get their vehicles checked. At the present time, most inspection stations are busy, but not rushed.

Of the 854 vehicles registered in Sterling County, only 166 have been inspected, and issued an approval sticker for the 1959 inspection period by the inspection station here.

Captain Hammett reminded motorists that the law prohibits inspections during inclement weather, thereby reducing the time for inspections. There will be no extension of time to have a vehicle inspected. Passenger cars are inspected for headlights, tail-lamps, stop lamps, reflectors, horn and windshield wipers. Commercial vehicles are inspected for the above plus other requirements as provided by law.

Anyone operating a motor vehicle after April 15, 1959 without displaying a 1959 inspection sticker will be operating in violation of the law and subject to a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

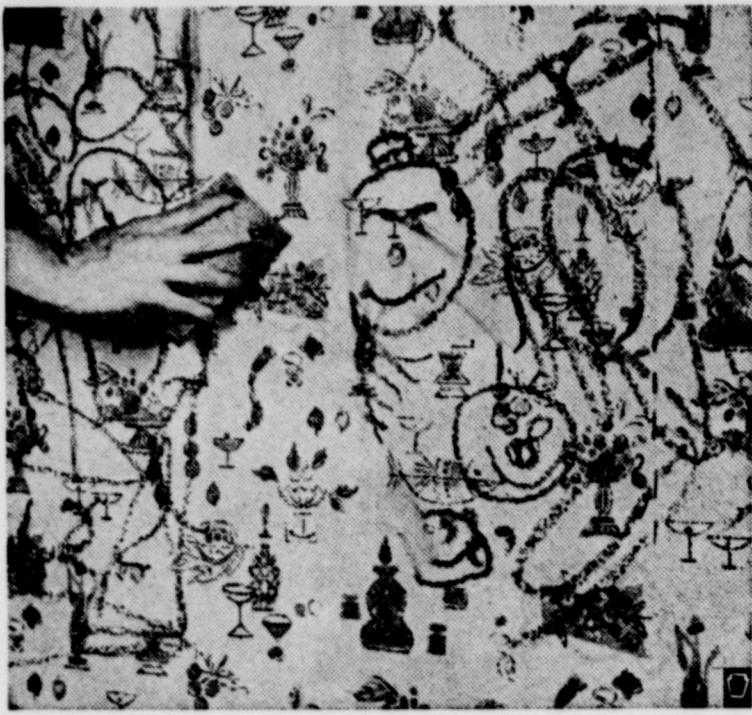

TEXAS CATTLE BARRED BY CALIFORNIA AND ARIZONA UNLESS DIPPED IN BHC

FORT WORTH—Two of the states which currently provide the largest outlets for Texas stocker cattle forbade shipments to them last week unless the cattle were first dipped in a benzine hexachloride solution. Cause of the embargoes by California and Arizona was an outbreak of scabies in some of the Plains States, including two known cases in the Texas Panhandle.

In order for Texas cattle to move to the states, they must be dipped under supervision of federal officials. Spraying of cattle is not acceptable.

Dr. L. R. Noyes, head of Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, said information pointed to the fact that only at Fort Worth and El Paso were dipping facilities available through which cattle could be cleared to these states.

At Fort Worth dipping vats have stood idle for 15 years until the present crisis developed. Most dipping vats in the state have been destroyed or filled up since dipping has been largely supplanted by spraying livestock for insect pests or disease. The vats were a hazard into which livestock or people could be injured, unless kept tightly covered.

It was considered possible that other states might embargo cattle from the infested states before the situation was cleaned up.

The Fort Worth Stockyards recharged their dipping vats immediately when word of California's action was received by Dr. Bruce A. Taylor, head of the inspection di-

vision here.

The dipping service was hailed by livestock shippers who have been sending thousands of cattle to feedlots in Arizona and California as a thing which could prevent a disastrous break in stocker cattle prices in the state.

Many buyers, who will be receiving cattle around March 1, reported they intend to ship cattle to Fort Worth for trans-shipment to western points.

Cattle arriving for the special stocker sale at the Fort Worth market on March 5 will be able to move without delay to any state.

California ranges received good rains last week and Los Angeles sources say they will need cattle quickly and many western buyers will attend the special sale in Fort Worth because of the dipping facilities here.

CATTLE MOSTLY FULLY STEADY, SUPPLY LIGHT

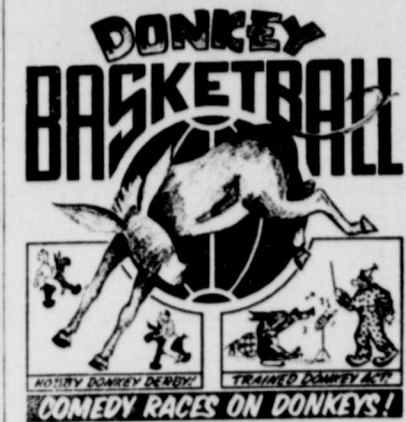
Most classes of cattle and calves cleared at steady prices at Fort Worth Monday. Trade on fed steers and yearlings was somewhat slow at the start, but clearance was made before the noon hour as the light supplies reported around the major marketing circle strengthened the salesman's arguments. Late sales of cows were inclined to be weak compared with the earlier rounds when shipper activity was at its peak.

Good and choice slaughter steers sold for \$25.50 to \$27.50, some 630-pound heifers sold at \$27.50 and some around 800-pound steers drew \$27.50. Mixed 810-pound steers and heifers sold at \$26.50. Plain and medium sorts sold from \$18 to \$25.

Fat cows sold from \$18.50 to \$21 and canners and cutters cashed at \$13 to \$18.50. Bulls drew \$18 to \$23.75. Good and choice slaughter calves ranged from \$25.50 to \$29.50 and plain and medium sorts sold from \$21 to \$25, and culls sold at \$17 to \$20.

Medium to good stocker steers calves drew \$28 to \$33 and a few around 200-pound choice calves sold to \$40. Heifer calves sold mostly from \$30 downward. Stocker steers yearlings of medium and slaughter goats sold at \$9.

Slaughter lambs and wooled feeder lambs were steady, but shorn feeder lambs were weak. Sheep and goats were scarce and steady. Good and choice shorn fat lambs cashed at \$16.50 to \$17.50, some 108 and 109-pound lambs up to \$17.50. Cull to medium lambs drew \$13 to \$16.

Stocker and feeder shorn lambs drew \$15.50 to \$16.50 and shearing type lambs ranged up to \$17.50. A few slaughter ewes drew \$8.50 and slaughter goats sold at \$9.

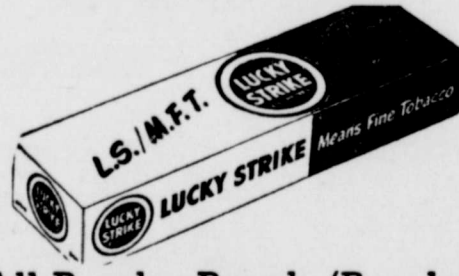
