AROUND THE COUNTY

Now is the time to fertilize your lawn if you want a nice looking, green lawn this year. The grass is beginning to green up a little and needs some plant food to help it along.

The plant food nutrient can be supplied the grass in the form of commercial fertilizer such as 16-20-0 which is a complete fertilizer or in the form of an organic fertilizer such as cottonseed meal. However, for the first shot to get the grass off to a good start by supplying both nitrogen and phosphorus, a complete fertilizer such as 16-20-0 is recommended. Apply the 16-20-0 at the rate of ten pounds per 1000 square feet. Follow the application with a thorough watering in order to get the fertilizer into solution and make it available to the grass.

During the summer months, additional fertilizer is recommended. In this area, ten pounds of ammonium sulfate every 4-6 weeks is a good one. It will keep the grass growing and give it a good green coloring. The ammonium sulfate will be released quickly and give the grass a quick growth. If you wish to spread out the growth period over more time and have a good even growth, substitute 15 pounds of cottonseed meal every 4 to 6 weeks in the place of the ammonium sulfate. Follow it with a thorough watering also.

Present indications are for an early lamb crop about the same size as last year according to the Crop and Livestock Reporting Board. Total lamb crop however will be slightly larger than last year due to a nine percent increase in breeding ewes kept. However the proportion of ewes lambing early this year is down from last year. Feed prospects for the lamb crop varied from fair to good on the eastern side of the Edwards Plateau and fair to poor on the western side of the plateau and Trans-Pecos region where rain is needed to bring on green feed for the lambs.

The number of early lambs in the other early lamb producing states is about the same as last year. In California, the situation is much the same as it is in this area; more rain is needed to bring on feed. Elsewhere prospects are favorable.

Texas was a dry state during the second week of March. According to the report issued last week by the Crop Reporting Board, only five of 122 stations in Texas reported at least one-half inch of rainfall during the 7 day period March 10 through 16. They were Greenville, Fort Worth, Kaufman, Tyler and Longview.

Unless conditions change in the near future, ranchers in Sterling County will not find it advisable to spray bitterweed. At the present time there is not enough moisture in the soil, the plant is not growing as well as it should to achieve the best kill, and the humidity has been too low as has the average temperatures.

Bitterweed is in all stages of growth in the county. Some of it is still coming up, some is putting on buds, and some has an occasional flower already opened. The many stages of growth of the plant will not be favorable for spraying.

Within the last five years, it has become evident that certain conditions must prevail before a good kill can be achieved. Temperature should be near 70; there must be ample moisture for the plant to be growing good; the hu-

midity should be high if at all possible. The recent weeks with the humidity in the 20 and 30 percent range is not conducive to good control. Also, the high winds would make spraying inadvisable.

There is still time for conditions to become favorable for spraying. Rain in the near future could give the plant a boost in growth and put moisture in the soil that is needed. The plants should be in the bud or very early bloom stage for best results. Once the petals on the flowers are fully formed, that flower will produce seed.

Last year's conditions were ideal for spraying. Results were very good in Sterling County and a good kill was achieved. The moisture being used by the plants was released to grow grass instead of being used by the bitterweed. Let us hope that those conditions soon come about again.

North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

Field checks made last week showed sorghum alnum plants beginning to put up green shoots. Winter kill appears to be low at this time. Where plants failed to survive the checks revealed that they were the young plants that came up in the fall and did not grow large enough to withstand the cold. Sorghum alnum is a good grazing plant. Reports from people who grazed livestock on it last year and during the winter state that their stock did very well. When planting sorghum alnum for grazing purposes several points should be kept in mind. Research and observational plantings point up the fact that it should be in rows for lasting benefits. Occasional cultivations should be made to keep the field clean and aeriate the soil. Grazing the plants too close resulted in high losses of plants. Stubble heights of 10"-15" inches is recommended to be left. Seeding at the rate of 2-4 pounds gave the best stands and grazing results.

Definition of seedling grasses—"boys" who are not old enough to do a "man's" work when it comes to providing abundant grazing.

A terracing contractor is now in the county. Anyone interested in terracing may contact the Soil Conservation personnel or go by Bill and Lee Reed's. Bill and Lee are starting to build terraces this week. Several diversion terraces have been staked by SCS personnel for the protection of the terrace systems. A diversion and several terraces have been staked on J. S. Cole's place. Construction will be started soon.

Our WASHINGTON Letter



A \$297 MILLION Federal Aid for airport development program was approved by the House last week. A similar bill approving \$465 million for that purpose previously passed the Senate. But the House figure was \$97 million above the amount requested by the President. The two versions will now be compromised.

Since the bill called for nearly a hundred million more than was requested, I voted against it. This bill, according to observers, may be a hint of spending policies in the Congress this year.

Actually, most of this money will be spent on a dozen airport facilities in the big metropolitan centers. And most of those cities are quite able to pay the costs themselves, with much less help from Uncle Sam. From concessions alone the big airports now make a lot of money.

This measure provides only incidentally for safety devices. That comes in other legislation. It would deal chiefly with aprons and runways for jets. It provides \$900,000 for Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Allotments to the states would be on a matching basis.

Last year the President vetoed a \$437 million similar authorization of Federal funds. And now that the Congress seems determined to provide \$97 million more in this bill than the Federal Aviation Agency says it needs, this one may run into another veto.

One thing is certain: The Congress can hardly hope to balance the budget this year if it insists on spending more money than the government agencies even request.

She was a member of the Baptist Church and the Eastern Star Chapter at Paint Rock.

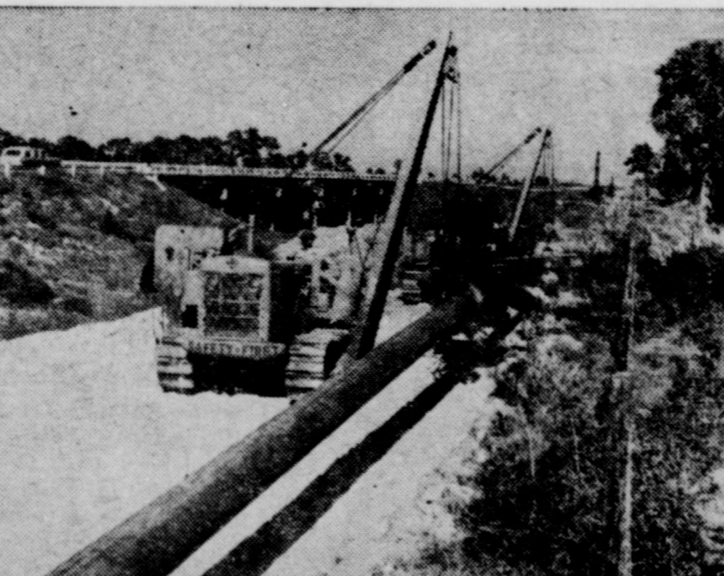
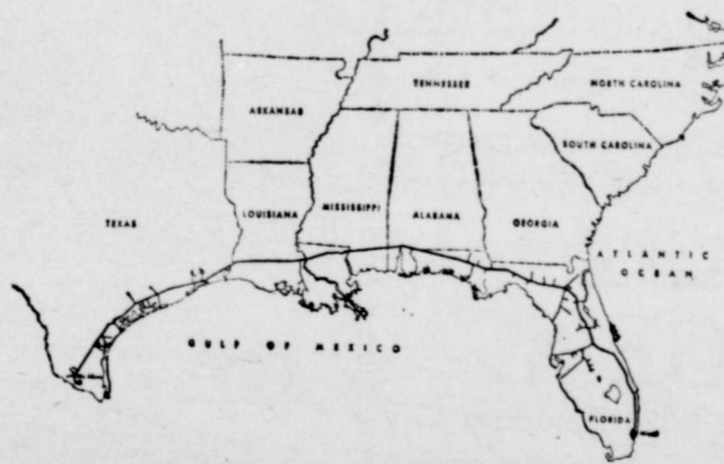

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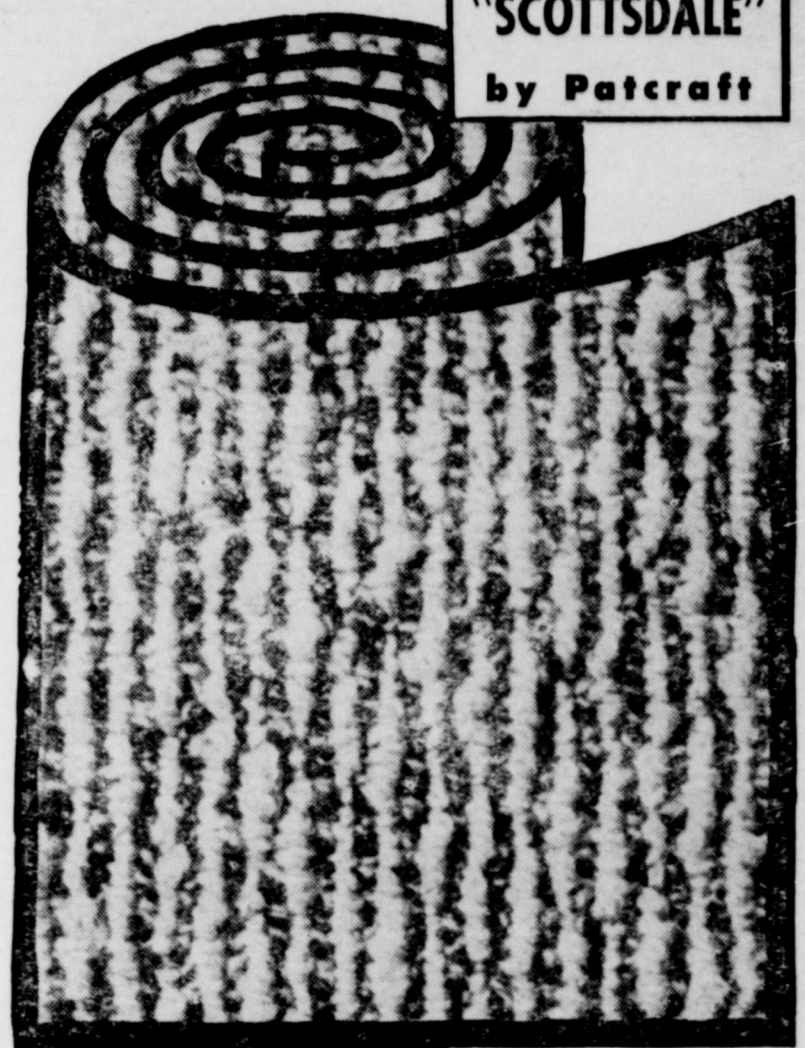
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SOCIAL SECURITY NOTES

"Persons receiving social security benefits can save themselves and us a great deal of inconvenience if they will report promptly when they go to work and expect to earn more than \$1200.00 in the calendar year," stated Floyd B. Ellington, manager of the social security district office at San Angelo, Texas.

"Most people know that if their earnings are in excess of \$1200.00 for the year that they will not be entitled to a benefit check for every month of the year," Ellington continued. "However, many folks

are confused as to what to do when they don't know for sure on January 1 what their total earnings for the year will be. Sometimes they go on receiving their benefit checks all year without realizing that their earnings in the last part of the year may cause them to go over the \$1200.00 limit. When this happens they may have to refund part of the benefits they received."

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
