Funeral Services for Claude Collins, 84, Held Here Wednesday Morning

Funeral services for pioneer rancher Claude Collins, 84, were held here on Wednesday morning at ten o'clock in the First Baptist Church. Burial followed in the Montvale Cemetery. The Lowe Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Pallbearers were Dr. W. J. Swann, Roy Foster, H. L. Hildebrand, Hal Knight, Lee Augustine, S. M. Bailey, Herbert Cope, Lee R. Reed, Charley Drennan, J. S. Cole, Rufus Foster and Tom Humble.

Mr. Collins born in McLennan County on March 13, 1875 had been a resident of Sterling for over 50 years. He was a pioneer rancher of this area and had ranched extensively in Texas through the years and for the past decade owned and operated a ranch near Vaughan, New Mexico, also.

Mr. Collins died at his Hackberry ranch northwest of town here Monday shortly after noon, while watching shearing operations. He just fell over in a faint and was dead in a few minutes.

Active in Baptist Church Work

Mr. Collins had always been active in the Baptist Church and played a big part in the growth of such. Through the long years he had served as in just about every post of the church and was one of the most substantial givers. At various times through the years he had been a deacon, he had served as chairman of the board of deacons, he had served as Sunday School superintendent, teacher of the men's Bible class, and was the chairman of the building committee when the Baptist edifice was built.

He had served on the board of directors of the Baptist Hospital in San Angelo (now the Shannon), had served as a director of the Texas Sheep & Goat Raisers Assn. and the Western Reserve Life Insurance Co., had served on the Sterling City school board and as president, and at the time of his death was still a director of the First National Bank here.

Through the years he was active in the Lions Club, the WOW, and in the Masons. He had served on the board as a member of the group that established the community center in Sterling City. For years he would loan promising boys and girls money with which to further their education. During the war he was a heavy buyer of war bonds, always wanting Sterling to meet its quota along that line.

His policy of business life was one of expansion and alson caution, and he was successful in his business.

Starting out a \$30 a month cowboy in 1908, Collins gave credit for his successes to God—said he could claim no credit at all for himself. As he was the oldest of ten children of T. J. and Allie Collins, he had to work during his early childhood and suggested in later life that there might be less juvenile delinquency nowadays if the children had to work as he did in his early days. "There was no time for mischief then" he once said.

Mr. Collins attended school in the old San Angelo junior-high school on Magdalen St. He moved with his family to Cleburne in 1894. He was married to Miss Ella Reeves in Cleburne in 1899, and they moved to San Angelo in 1903.

Mrs. Collins died in 1938 and Mr. Collins and Eleanor Young of Abilene were married in 1940.

Survivors include the wife, two daughters, Mrs. Elliott Mendenhall of Dallas, and Claudia (a this year's senior graduate here); and two sons, Claude Jr. of San Angelo and Corwin of Sterling City; three brothers, Tom Collins of Sterling City, O. D. Collins of



San Angelo and the Rev. Lester Collins of Houston; one sister Mrs. Bert F. Walker of Fort Worth; and four grandchildren and three great-children.

On display were the linen shower gifts that had been given to the hospital by friends during the week—which was National Hospital Week.

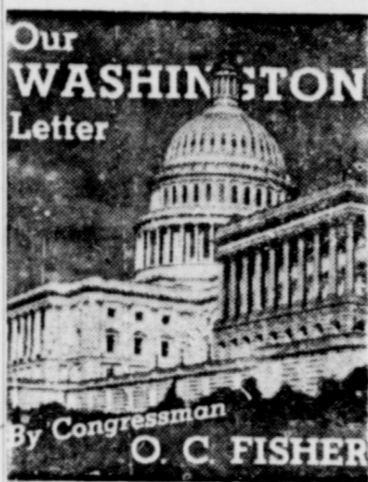
The brochure listing the board members, commissioners' courts, hospital history, staff and other pertinent facts was given to all callers.

OUTCOME OF Labor Department regulations, proposed by Secretary of Labor Mitchell, remain in doubt, with indications that if put into effect they will be overhauled and watered down. A rumor that the proposed regulations are to be scrapped was denied last week when I asked the Department about it.

Mounting opposition from all over the country to the Secretary's effort to impose minimum wages, housing standards, and other controls never authorized by Congress, has been effective thus far, with the ultimate outcome still uncertain.

TWO MONTHS ago I joined with 40 other Congressmen in a protest march on the Labor Department, where I and three or four other spokesmen for the group aired our objections to Secretary Mitchell. Secretary of Agriculture reportedly was displeased by the Labor Department plans, and Vice President Nixon was said to be dubious. Thus the White House got into the picture, and final action may depend upon what the President thinks about it. In the meantime, the Attorney General is considering the legality of the regulations as drafted.

The Sterling County 4-H Club Range Judging Team composed of Clayton Stewart, Jimmy Flynt, David Durham and Reynolds Lee Foster was fourth in the annual range judging contest for 4-H Club teams and FFA teams at San Angelo Saturday. The contest is sponsored by the North Concho River Soil Conservation District and the San Angelo College on the farm the college owns on the North Concho Lake. Each county or chapter was allowed only one team in the contest regardless of age.

The Sterling County team won first place in the plant identification phase of the contest. They were required to identify 40 plants in this phase of the contest. Reynolds Lee Foster was high point man in this division with a total of 87½ points out of a possible 100 while David was third with 85 points.

Reynolds Lee was fourth high in the range plot placings section of the contest. In this section, they are required to rate four plots in 1-2-3-4 order and check their reasons for doing so.

Darrell Flynt took the four boys down for the contest since we were tied up and could not get off to take them down. I certainly appreciate his help.

relationship to the U.S. to be held soon, will sound out voter sentiment there on (1) independence, (2) continued Commonwealth status, or (3) statehood. Regardless of the outcome, the Congress will have the last word.

since they are usually thought of as having the responsibility of making a living for a family. But, the results hold true for girls as well.

It is worth \$40 a day for a boy to finish high school. He may expect to earn \$33,000 more in his lifetime as a result of graduating from high school.

Each \$4,000 spent on a college education can be expected to return itself 18 times or return a cash value of \$72,000. Each day spent in college is worth 072 to the boy according to the figures.

More and more fields are opening up to the young people but all require education. However, an education itself does not mean that the cash returns will come without work. It is the potential for those who work and make use of their education. There are many ways for a boy or girl to get a higher education now. Many institutions have plans where they provide jobs for deserving boys and girls; individuals often set up funds for this purpose as do many large corporations and firms. It is not necessary to have the entire sum required to complete school if they will work and take advantage of the many opportunities.

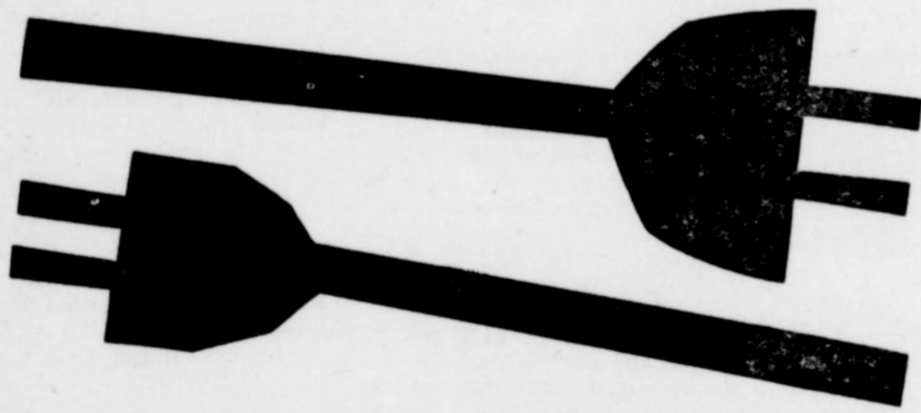

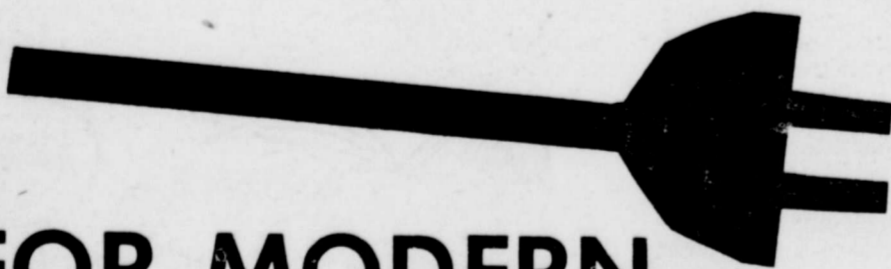
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North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column

Your District Board of Supervisors sponsored a range judging contest last Saturday at the San Angelo College Wildlife area at the North Concho Lake. Teams from this area were entered with about thirty-five boys and girls competing for top honors. The Sterling County team came out very good. They placed 4th in overall team competition. Individually Reynolds Lee Foster won first in plant identification; David Durham was third and the Sterling team won 1st place in this event. Top team was Sonora, followed by Ozona, Eldorado and Sterling.

This was the second year for this contest to be held. It is to be an annual event. The District Supervisors believe it is a wonderful opportunity to train the young boys and girls in range management. They are tomorrow's leaders and managers of our land.

Rains have given the grasses a big boost during the last two weeks. Vegetation began very slow this year due to dry conditions and low soil temperature. The last two to three weeks warm weather and moisture have kicked grasses off to a good start. Resting now will permit young seedlings and older plants to become well established. Old plants will regain vigor and spread to bare areas.

The most important practice available to a rancher is Proper Use. This means balancing livestock numbers with available forage to maintain adequate cover and litter on the ground. A good rule of thumb is to graze so as to take about half of the year's current growth. The critical period is from November until the following March. During this period warm season grasses are dormant and do not grow. Allowance must be made in stocking pastures to insure against taking too much of the old growth before grasses green up the following spring. Any other practice carried out should be followed by proper use. Improvement from brush control, reseeding work or deferred grazing will not last long unless it is followed up by proper use. This is strictly a management practice and is the ranchers best and cheapest way of maintaining and improving his grassland.

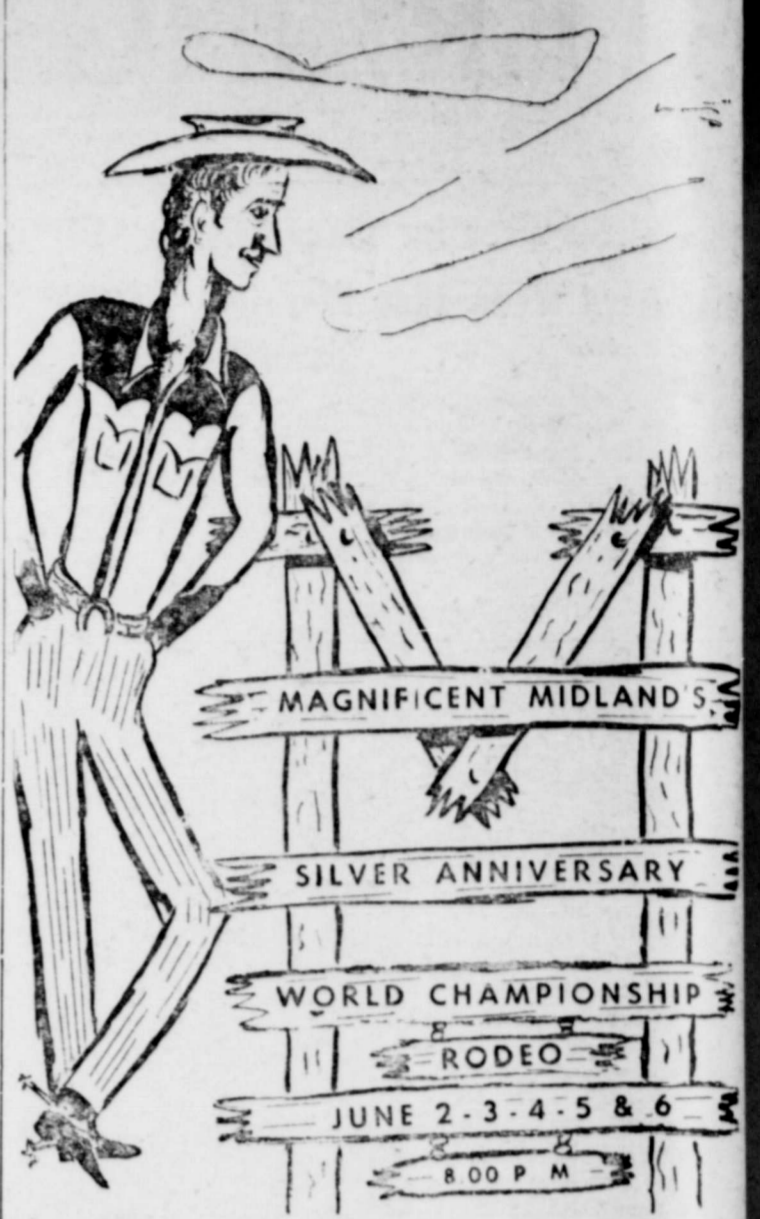

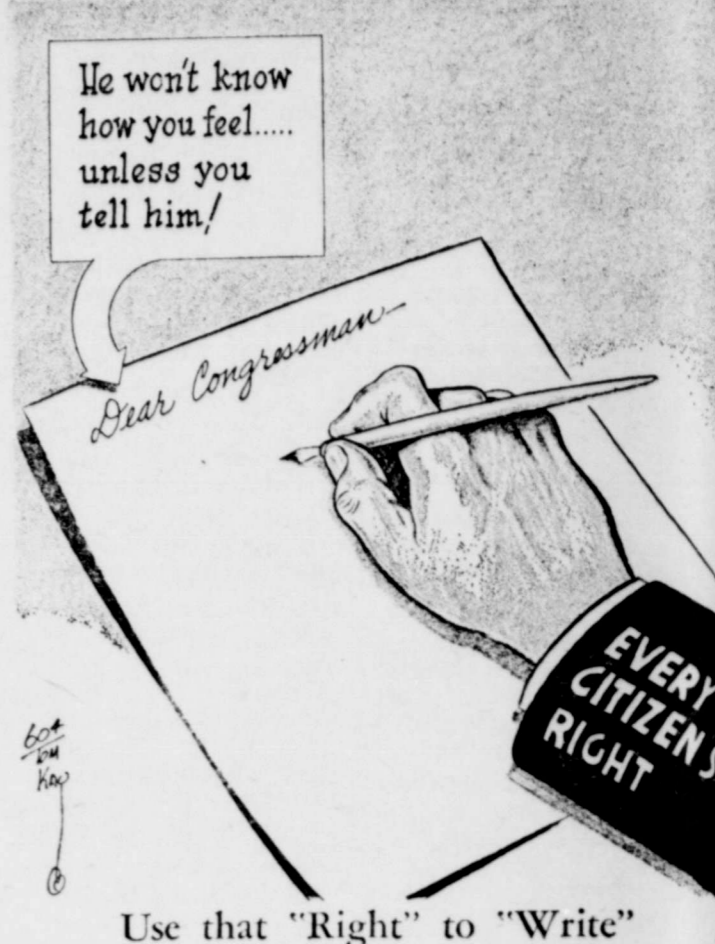
