Last October, 12 steers belonging to Lester, William and Bubba Foster were divided into two lots. One lot of six steers were given stilbestrol by means of ear implants; the other group did not receive the implants. The six steers receiving the implants weighed an average of 47 pounds more per animal than those that did not receive the implants.

Both groups of steers were run under the same conditions. They were running on an oat field at the time of implanting but were moved to the range when the oats played out during January due to the drought. The steers were weighed individually on October 24 when the test was begun and weighed again on May 5 when they were sold. Time of the test was 193 days.

During the 193 days, the implanted steers gained an average of .24 pound more per day than did the untreated ones. Average daily gain of the implanted steers was 1.78 pounds compared to an average of 1.58 for the control group. High daily gain on the implanted steers was 2.02 pounds and low was 1.47. The high daily gain on the control group was 1.84 pounds and low was 1.22 pounds daily.

The implants were furnished us by Charles Pfizer and Company, Inc. Had they been bought, cost would have been less than 25c per animal. Increased income per animal figured on the basis of 30c per pound amounted to an additional \$14.10 for the implanted animals over the control group.

The Experiment Station has found that implanted animals consistently outgain those not implanted. They have run a number of tests in the past and have one now at the Amarillo station. More knowledge of the actual results on a long time basis is needed before they will recommend to everyone.

On Wednesday of this week, no casebearer eggs were found on a number of trees looked over. It is getting late in the season for them to put in their appearance though even though the frost set the trees back.

Reports from San Angelo are that no eggs have been found there either but that some damage to the small nuts has been found. They are recommending that the trees be sprayed.

In view of the lateness of the season, I am going to recommend that you spray your trees now also. The bearers may have started their work in the very top of the tree where they cannot be found and to prevent the loss of the entire crop, short as it is here, the best thing to do is to spray now. Use 3 pounds of malathion per 100 gallons of water or 3 pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT. If you should add 6 pounds of wettable sulfur for mite control. The malathion will control the mites itself. For rosette, a nutritional disease, add two pounds of 36 percent zinc sulfate to each 100 gallons mix. It can be used with the DDT or malathion.

Also, there are some walnut caterpillars on some of the trees around town. The walnut caterpillar is black and orange caterpillar which feeds on the leaves of pecan trees; another characteristic is that of cleaning all the leaves off one branch before moving on to another. They can be controlled by spraying with either DDT or toxaphene. Use 2 teaspoons 50 percent wettable DDT powder or 4 teaspoons 25 percent emulsion per gallon of water. If you use toxaphene to control the

ECONOMY-minded forces in Congress received their most severe set-back of the year last week when the House passed a Senate-approved housing bill that will cost \$6 billion—about 90 percent of which will be subsidies which somebody is going to have to pay until the year 2000.

It was a Christmas-tree, bonanza bill with all the trimmings, aside from its good features which include extension of the FHA program.

Among other things, the measure authorizes 190,000 more high-cost public housing units, at a cost to the taxpayers of \$3.7 billion. Under this program the government builds housing units and then rents them to tenants for a fraction of the real rental value. It was disclosed the other day that over in Boston 353 firemen and policemen, with families, each earning more than \$5,000 per year, live in subsidized public housing projects there. The net average subsidy to each public housing unit throughout the country now amounts to \$40 per month. That is what is costs taxpayers, each month, for every public housing unit that is built—and it goes on for 40 years.

A Presidential veto is almost certain, in view of the President's repeated expression of interest in economy and a balanced budget. If a veto occurs, it will be sustained by the House.

## Veterinarian To Be Here Wednesday

Dr. Percy R. Turner, veterinarian from Water Valley, will be here in Sterling City for the annual spring rabies vaccination program on Wednesday, June 2 between 4 and 5:30 o'clock. All persons wishing to have their pets, dogs or cats, vaccinated for rabies should bring them to Dr. Turner on the west side of the courthouse between 4 and 5:30. There will be the usual charge for this service made by Dr. Turner, according to the county agent.

Rabies is one of the diseases for which science has devised no cure once an animal or person has the disease. Pets contact rabies from other domestic animals such as dogs or cats or wild animals such as the fox, skunk or coon. Once an animal has a case of rabies, there is no way to cure it. Death results within 10 days.

The vaccination or inoculation is the only preventative. The shots last for approximately 12 months. If your dog or cat received a shot last year in the spring, then it is time to renew its protection with another shot. This is the only way that you can protect your family and your community as well as your pet, so be sure to bring in your pets for their shots. The cost is cheap in the freedom gained from worrying about your pets and family should a rabid animal come around your place and attack your pets.

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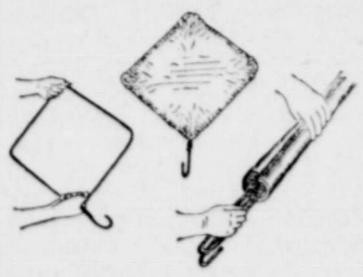
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Here's an idea for a folding frying pan — amazingly light and easy to carry. Fortunately, we don't need to buy one, because there are plenty around the house. Those of us who get tired of sandwiches on hunting and fishing trips will find that this suggestion can extend the menu considerably.



Pull a wire coat-hanger from its triangular shape into a square, as shown. Bend the hook down for a handle. Double a section of metal foil around the wire square, folding the remaining three sides under securely. Presto! — a very practical frying pan that takes up almost no room or weight in the hunting or fishing jacket. With foil removed, the outside half can be bent inward toward the handle for easy carrying, as the sketch shows. It's easy to bend it back into shape again.

If one wants to carry a roll of metal foil, this folded pan rim can be slipped inside the roll. Then we have extra foil for making cups and for other cooking jobs. If this seems cumbersome, just remove a sheet and fold it like a handkerchief.

While cooking, the food will depress the center of the foil a bit, so hot fat, cake batter, gravy and other liquids won't run off.

Arrange three or four flat rocks to support the pan, and build a small fire between them. When the fire is reduced to coals, we are ready to cook. Each person can make his own pan, and can use it as a plate. This, of course, is a good way to prepare bacon and eggs, meats, fish, pancakes and many other dishes. I humbly submit that these hot foods taste better than cold sandwiches!

Sportsmen know that compact instant beverages, such as coffee, tea and cocoa, are easiest to carry and quickest to prepare; in fact outdoor-minded people seem to have adopted these delicious powdered drinks as standard equipment. Many of us, however, don't realize that the same hot drink powders also are excellent in cooking.

Here's an idea for several kinds of hot breads that can be cooked on your foil frying pan on the trail:

Put half a cup or so of pancake mix in a sturdy plastic bag. Add a teaspoon of sugar and one of Nestle's "Quik" or of "EverReady" cocoa. Roll up the bag and carry it in your jacket until lunch time.

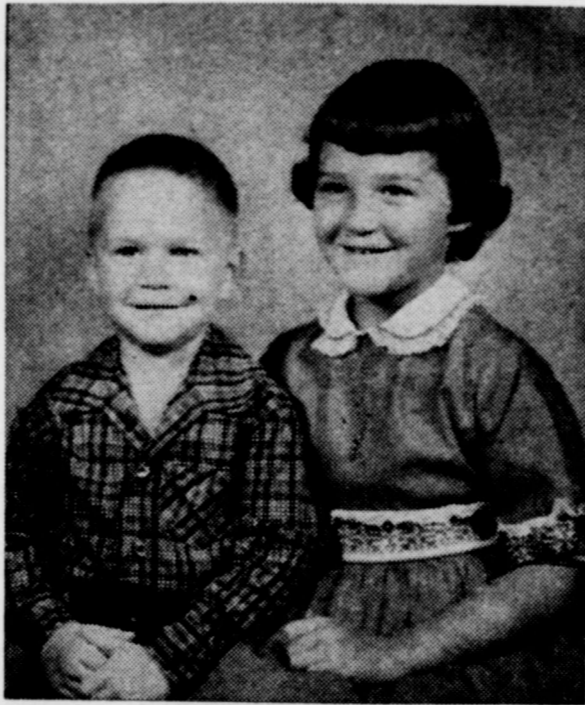
If you like your cakes only mildly sweet, leave out the sugar, because both "Quik" (a cocoa powder that mixes easily with cold milk) and "EverReady" cocoa have sugar already in them.

Now, while the fire is burning down to coals, dip a little water into the bag and massage it until the ingredients are smooth. Add enough water to make the batter pourable. Grease the foil with a strip of bacon and pour on some batter. When the batter stops bubbling on top, flip the cake over to brown the other side.

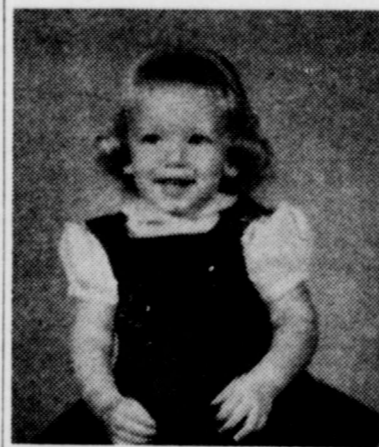


This is more of a dessert cake than a pancake. Among other variations, we can add a teaspoon or so of "Nescafe" instant coffee for a mocha flavor, or we can substitute it for the cocoa and have coffee cake. Many sportsmen like a dessert made (with or without the cocoa or coffee) by dropping some Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces into the batter on the pan. These sink into the batter, and can be turned with the cake. This kind of pancake reminds us of the famous "Toll House" Cookies. Pancakes usually taste dull without syrup, but these cakes don't need it. 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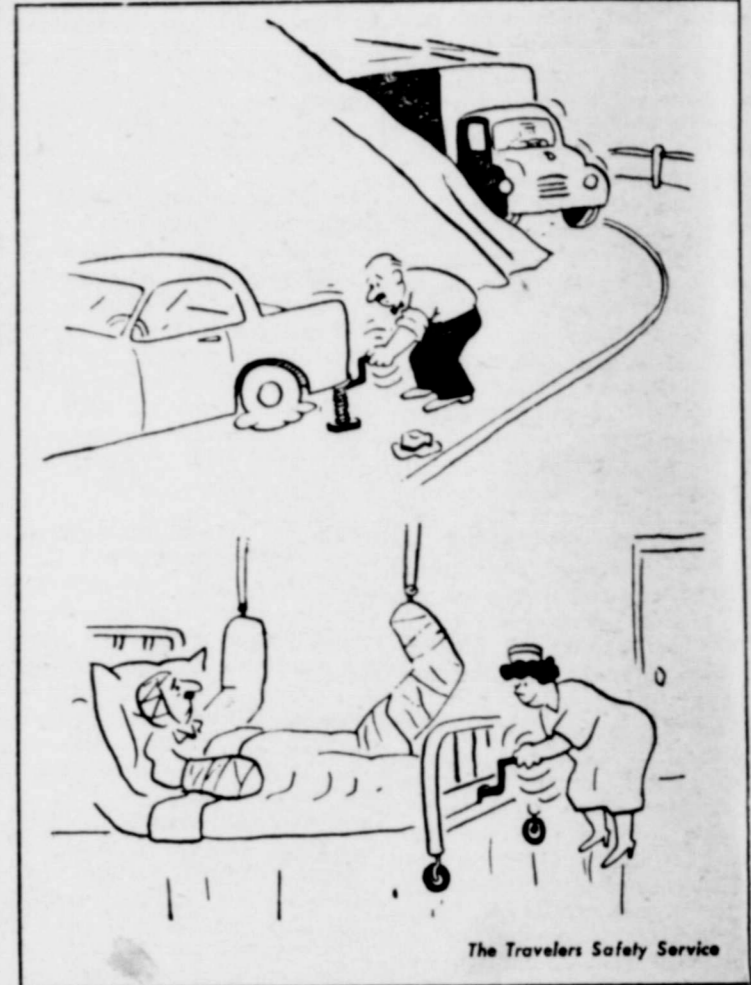

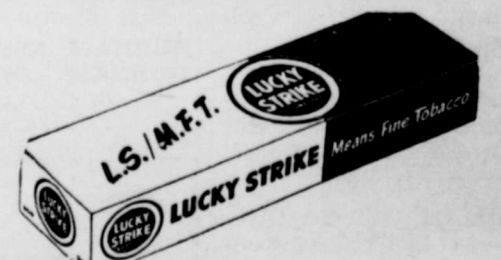
