This column is being written in Fort Collins, Colorado where the second week of the three week western regional extension summer school is beginning. By now the professors have assigned their work for the term and we all know pretty well what we are going to have to do the remainder of the session. Term papers, outside reading, and all reports are all assigned. The rest of the time will be consumed in going to class and getting all the reports in—on time, of course.

Classes meet for two hours each day and each one of us is taking two courses so the four hours of the morning are given over to the classes. A good part of the afternoons is spent in the library doing reading and research for the assigned reports. Fortunately, the instructors in the course have let it be known that they expect to see some of the assigned reading material show up in the reports—fortunately for us they told us before we turn in the reports and not after they grade them.

Colorado State University is located on the edge of Ft. Collins in the northern section of Colorado just 8 miles south of the Wyoming state line and 48 miles south of Cheyenne. Fort Collins, a town of about 14,000 people, is the county seat of Larimer County. The county is about three times the size of Sterling County and comprises 1,673,000 acres. A large part of the county lies in the Rocky Mountain National Forest and the Roosevelt National Forest. 192,512 acres is in farms while 512,188 acres is in pasture. There are 1521 farms of which 1234 have a little over 86,000 acres under irrigation. There is a wide variation in rainfall with the low being 14 inches and the high 40 inches. They produce a little over 86,000 acres under beef cattle and 150,000 head of sheep. Principal crops are 32,000 acres of alfalfa; 15,000 acres of corn; 12,000 acres of barley; 10,000 acres of winter wheat; 5,000 acres of sugar beets and lesser amounts of oats, beans, onions, and commercial vegetables. They also market 15,000 bushels of apples and 725,000 pounds of cherries annually, being the second largest county in cherry production in Colorado.

This is very beautiful country and the school is very beautiful itself. It is very well kept with nice buildings and dormitories. Like nearly all colleges, a building program is very much in evidence. New dormitories, classrooms and other buildings are being constructed.

Thus far it has not rained and a constant watering is going on to keep the campus lawns green. Much of the grass on the lawns is Kentucky bluegrass and other grasses of similar nature. None of the grass on the lawns is the old familiar bermuda or San Augustine we find at home.

Sterling County ranchers would be envious of the amount of hay harvested in this area annually. The first crop of the alfalfa is being baled now. I haven't found out just what the yield is but it is very high. Bales are just about as thick in the fields as gravel on a walk. Also, they are baling green oats for hay now. In addition, they mow the native grasses in the roadside ditches and bale it also. There is a very good market for hay in this area as the Longmont, Colorado area which is famous for its feed lots is just about 30 miles south of Fort Collins. The Longmont area feeds many thousands of

Our WASHINGTON Letter

A TOP-LEVEL tug of war is taking place over who the big spenders are, and it may turn out that the taxpayers will get a good break as a result.

Last fall President Eisenhower needed the Democrats by accusing them of extravagance with the taxpayer's money. Actually, the Republican record on that score had been nothing to write home about.

Now, with a lot of public alarm being felt on Capitol Hill about too much spending—and with an eye on the 1960 elections—leaders of both political parties have grabbed the economy torch and are doing some maneuvering in an attempt to get ahead of the parade.

Thus far the Democratic-controlled House has whacked the President's budget on appropriations rather substantially, and so has the Senate to some extent. But the liberal forces in the Democratic camp are pushing hard for some extravagant spending measures, with some initial successes noted.

Right recently Democratic leaders, perhaps smarting a bit from Republican goading and the dangers inherent in a free-spending label are being stamped on them as a political issue, are applying some brakes that may be a good omen for the taxpayers. Senator Lyndon Johnson is leading this drive, but he has some toughie liberal spending colleagues to placate in the Senate.

Here are a few spending-policy examples:

Early this year the budget requested \$200 million for a Federal-aid airport development program. The Senate promptly passed a \$465 million bill. The House scaled this down to \$297 million. A conference committee, apparently yielding to public demands for more economy and porbably to avoid a Presidential veto, has recently decided to settle for about the budget figure.

But not so with the mammoth housing bill. The President requested a modest \$1.5 billion. The Senate approved \$3.6 billion. The House went on a rampage and jumped it to \$6.1 billion. A conference committee has agreed on a compromise, with an over-all total of \$5.1 billion. (A \$100 million for Veteran's housing had in the meantime been taken out of the bill and passed separately.) If approved, the Housing bill may rate a Presidential veto.

SEVERAL OTHER non-essential spending bills, totaling several billions, dealing with such subjects as aid to education, depressed areas, community facilities, etc., are

Tony Allen, son of the Worth Allens of Sterling paid \$330 for a stud ram at the sale.

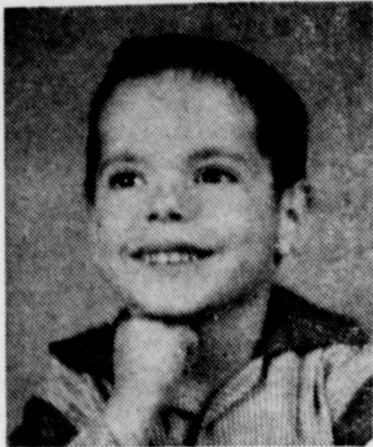
## C. C. McBRIDE NEW SERVICE MAN AT JOHNSON FORD
