In last week's column I gave some information on the Great Plains Conservation Program under which Sterling County has just been designated.

The County ASC office will NOT handle the payments under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Payments will be handled by the Soil Conservation Service.

All claims for the refund of the federal gasoline tax on gasoline used for farming purposes must be submitted before September 30, 1959.

Those persons who have filed claims previously have already received the application forms from the Internal Revenue office.

A new bulletin on creep feeding beef calves has just been released by the Extension Service beef cattle department.

The rains of the past weeks may bring trouble to the sheep raiser in the form of bluetongue.

Bluetongue is a virus disease of sheep. Symptoms are fever, depression, loss of appetite, and a general run down condition as a result.

Death loss is usually not high, about 15%, but the resultant run down condition and loss of flesh, break in the staple of the wool, and shedding of the entire fleece due to fever are the most common results of bluetongue.

There is a vaccine on the market which may be used. It is available from any distributor of veterinary remedies with full directions as to use.

They played the Texas National Guard and downed them in the seven o'clock game.

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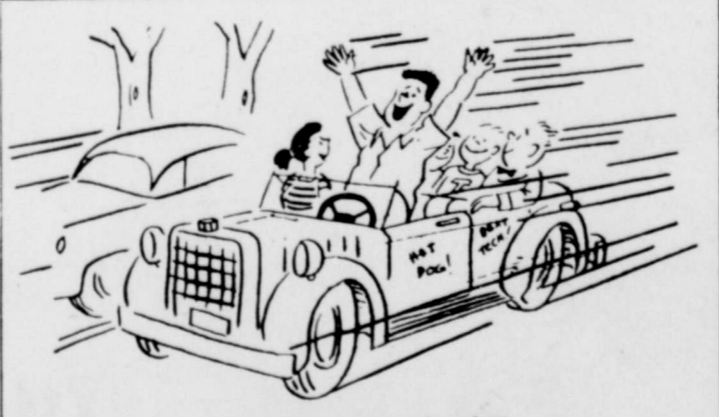
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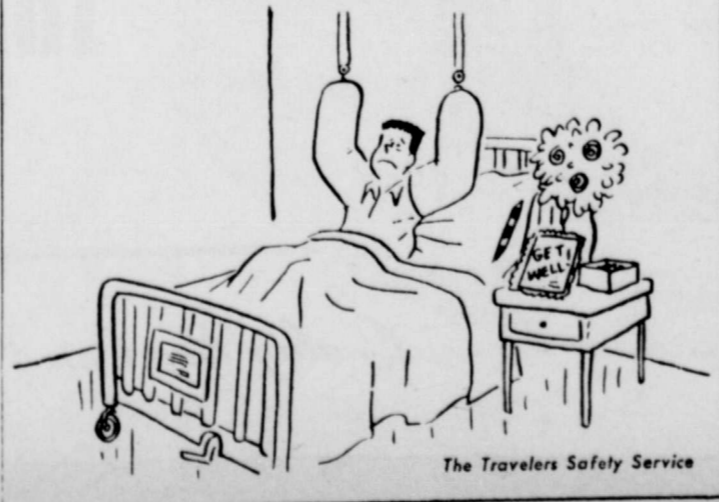

The census will reveal the total population, broken down by age groups, sex, national origin, etc. And the census of agriculture will give the number of farms, total value of land and buildings, farms with tractors, farms with electricity, etc.

The 1950 census covered those subjects in our own 21st district the total population was 268,894, including 80,055 households.

There were 18,801 farms (and ranches), and there were 10,905 tractors in use 10 years ago. REA served 87.5% of all farms and ranches then.

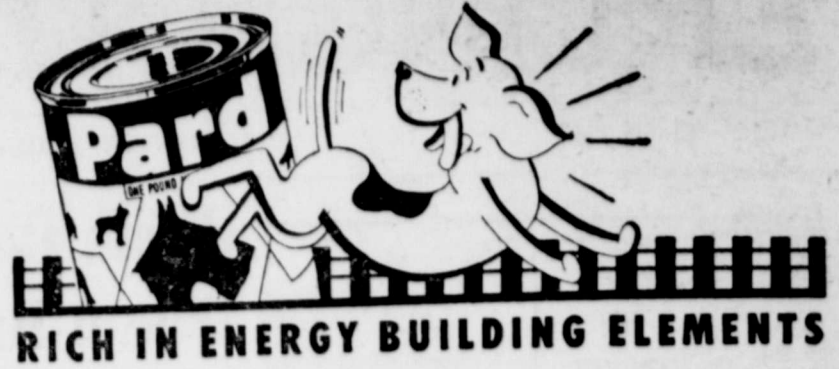
The next census will contain information covering all of those as well as other subjects. 1960 will be a busy year for the census takers.

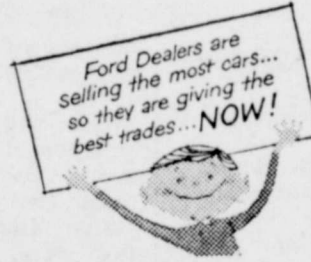

is 21 and then let him "decide for himself."
4. Avoid the use of the word "wrong." It may develop a guilt complex. This will condition him to believe later, when he is arrested for stealing a car, that society is against him and he is being persecuted.
5. Pick up everything he leaves lying around--books, shoes, clothes. Do everything for him so that he will be experienced in throwing all the responsibility on others.
6. Let him read any printed matter he can get his hands on. Be careful that the silverware and drinking glasses are sterilized, but let his mind feast on garbage.
7. Quarrel frequently in the presence of your children. In this way they will not be too shocked when the home is broken up later.
8. Give a child all the spending money he wants. Never let him earn his own. Why should he have things as tough as you had them?
9. Satisfy his craving for food, drink and comfort. See

that every sensual desire is gratified. Denial may lead to harmful frustration.

10. Take his part against neighbors, teachers, policemen. They are all prejudiced against your child.

When he gets into real trouble, apologize for yourself by saying, "I never could do anything with him."

12. Prepare for a life of lasting grief. You will be likely to have it. Alas.

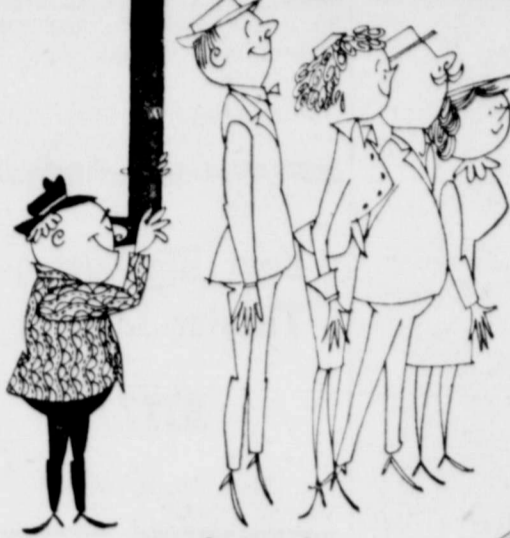

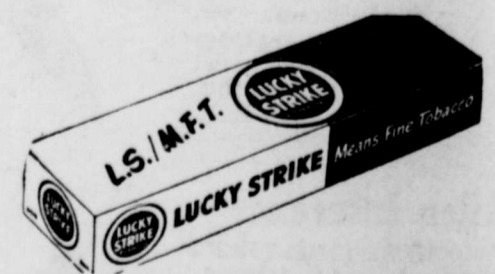
