Simple Jig-Saw Solution



The caterpillars are still giving lots of trouble around the county, especially on the pecan trees. A particular type of caterpillar, the walnut caterpillar, is the one that is causing all the trouble.

The immature caterpillar is reddish brown with narrow yellowish lines extending the length of the body. When mature, it is nearly black in color with two grayish lines on the sides and two on the back. They have long, soft gray hairs.

The caterpillars do not form a web. Every three weeks they will molt or lose their skins and return to feed again, doing so until the next molt takes place.

When the infestation is heavy enough, they will completely defoliate a tree. Since the foliage is an important part of the feeding system of trees, this can result in damage to the tree or even death. Where there are just a few of the worms on a tree, the end of the branch with the worms on it can be cut off and burned. When the infestation becomes heavy, however, other measures must be taken. Most effective sprays are DDT, Toxaphene, or lead arsenate, but due to the poisonous nature of lead arsenate I would hesitate to recommend it. Two pounds of DDT or Toxaphene in 100 gallons of water will do the job.

Wool production in Texas is estimated at 44,461,000 pounds for 1959. This includes that wool already shorn and that to be shorn this fall. This estimate is 15% above the 1958 clip of 38,716,000 pounds but below the ten year average by 5%. Then year average is 46,921,000 pounds.

Fleece weights for 12 months is 8.6 and eight months fleeces is 5 pounds. Last average for 12 months wool was 8.3 pounds and 5.1 for the eight months wool.

The national wool crop is 5% above 1958 and 10% above the ten year average. National estimate is for 251,929,000 pounds. Average fleece weight nationally is 8.25 pounds.

Sheep producers will have the opportunity during September to vote on the question of continuing to finance a market development and advertising program for wool

and lamb. The voting will extend throughout the month of September according to present plans. Ballots will be mailed to producers September 1 and the producer will have until September 30 to return his ballot to the ASC office.

The advertising and development is financed by deductions from wool incentive payments. In effect since the 1955 marketing year, a favorable vote would continue the program three more years. Deductions could not exceed the present rate of one cent per pound on wool and five cents per hundred on lambs. The outcome of this referendum will have no effect on the wool act program which was extended three years last year. The development program is handled by the American Sheep Producers' Council. Wool and lamb products are advertised in magazines, newspapers, radio and television through proceeds from the program. Purpose is to increase the use of these products by the consumer.

Tranquilizers given to slaughter steers being hauled to market did not cut the shrink of steers shipped from Amarillo to Fort Worth in a recent test.

A group of 58 steers fed at the Bushland Station near Amarillo was used for the test. Twenty-eight steers received the tranquilizer, perphenazine, before shipment while 29 were used for a control. The steers were weighed individually before loading, were on the road 11 hours, were given feed and water immediately at the stockyards, and weighed individually 19 hours after arrival at the yards. Tranquilized steers lost 5.1% enroute, the control group 5.3%. Carcass yields varied only .1%. Neither difference was significant in this case.

An elderly San Antonio couple escaped serious injury when their car was demolished Monday in a head-on collision with a truck 14 miles south of Sterling City on Highway 87. Hospitalized in the Sterling County Hospital were Mr. and Mrs. Ira Clarence Evans, 65 and 60. They suffered cuts and bruises, but no broken bones. The truck driver, Jack Brewer of Wells, was slightly injured.

The accident occurred on a straight stretch of highway, Highway Patrolman J.A. Sikes on routine patrol, was behind the car and saw the dust raised by the accident. The car was heading north and the truck south.

The car's radiator was mangled around the motor, which was shoved into the frame. Both wheels were knocked off by the impact and the front windshield was shattered.

Sikes said Mrs. Evans was thrown from the vehicle onto the highway's center stripe.

Gasoline To Come In Variable Octane Amounts Soon

EL PASO NATURAL GAS PRODUCTS COMPANY TO INTRODUCE INNOVATION IN GAS SALES

El Paso, Texas—A revolutionary new concept of marketing motor fuels will be introduced to the motoring public of the Southwest in the near future by El Paso Natural Gas Products Company through its network of El Paso-Dixie service stations.

The new gasoline marketing system, called "Precision-Blending", will be designed to deliver to each individual car owner the exact amount of octane he needs to see his automobile perform at peak efficiency, according to company engineers and officials.

Coupled with the octane control system will be an accompanying sliding price scale which will allow customers to pay only for the octane their car requires, company spokesmen further pointed out.

The new Precision-Blending system will work like this:

The El Paso-Dixie stations will utilize a two pump system, one of which will dispense Dixie gasoline recommended for cars which do not require a premium grade fuel, and another pump which will deliver six different grades.

It is the development of this new blending pump plus the development of El Paso's new isotope-supplemented super-premium gasoline which has allowed creation of the Precision-Blending technique.

A selector switch on the pump will allow the attendant to deliver any of six blends of two fuels, from two underground tanks, each with a different octane rating and a corresponding price.

The new pump is a marvel of precise engineering and has already been approved by weights and measures departments of states where it will be used.

C. Blaine McNutt, marketing manager for El Paso Natural Gas Products Company, explained the new Precision-Blending system as an effort on the part of the company to adjust marketing techniques to the wide variety of fuel requirements of today's cars.

"The vast majority of oil refiners use the two-pump system, supplying their retailers with regular gasoline and a premium fuel," McNutt said. "The motorist whose octane requirements fall between these two must pay from two to four cents per gallon more for the premium fuel even though he doesn't need a gasoline of this quality to get maximum performance and

"Other motorists with late model cars of extra high compression do not receive complete satisfaction even from the premium gasoline. An even higher octane fuel is needed to meet the requirements of these cars."

"Therefore," McNutt added, "some refiners, including our company, have developed and marketed a third fuel, usually called super premium, to meet these new requirements . . . and here again the motorist must make a costly price jump in order to get satisfactory performance."

"The solution to this problem of 'misfit octane' and wasted money is to market a number of different fuels, and we feel that our new Precision-Blending process will offer the answer."

"The seven blends which we will offer will be of a gradually increased octane at a gradually increased price. With this wide choice, McNutt concluded, a motorist can choose exactly the gasoline that fits his octane requirements, and pay only for the quality he needs."

Preparation for renovation of El Paso-Dixie stations to the new system is currently underway with the first ones scheduled to start Precision-Blending deliveries to motorists in San Angelo and Sterling City on August 14. The Midland-Odessa-Big Spring area has already been converted.

The remainder of the El Paso-Dixie system throughout New Mexico, Arizona, and parts of Colorado and Utah, will be converted to Precision Blending by the first part of 1960.

Independence Day Recipes

Whether you are planning a picnic, patio party or what have you—here are some culinary "tips" that will fit in fine for your Fourth of July celebration. Try 'em!

Creamy Berry Sauce
(Makes about 2 cups of sauce for cake, cottage pudding or gingerbread)
½ cup (½ 15-oz. can) Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk

3 tablespoons lemon juice
1 cup sliced strawberries or fresh raspberries
Cold water


Combine sweetened condensed milk and lemon juice. Stir until mixture thickens. Add fruit. Blend well. Add water by tablespoonfuls until of desired consistency.

¾ cup light cream

Lemon-touched coconut ice cream served with a chilled fruit sauce will provide the perfect dessert for a hot night. Try this delicious and surprisingly inexpensive, frozen sweet with a simple sauce made from canned sweet cherries. And for something a bit different, press spoonfuls of slightly softened ice cream into a baked pie shell and freeze at least an hour. Cut in pie-shaped pieces and pass bowls of the cherry sauce and flaked coconut, toasted or plain.

Coconut Freeze

¾ cup evaporated milk
¾ cup granulated sugar
¼ cup light corn syrup
1 egg, well beaten
¼ cup lemon juice
2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
½ cup Angel Flake Coconut

Pour evaporated milk into freezing tray of refrigerator and chill until ice crystals form around the edges. Meanwhile, add sugar and corn syrup gradually to egg, beating thoroughly. Spoon milk into chilled bowl and beat rapidly until milk thickens and holds its shape. Beat in lemon juice, lemon rind, and egg mixture. Fold in coconut and freeze. Set control for coldest freezing temperature and freeze until firm—1 to 2 hours. Makes 4 to 6 servings.

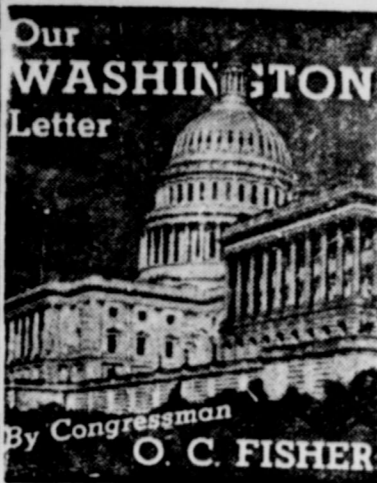

ALL Stoppers have been pulled out in the battle over a labor control bill in the House this week. The lines are drawn between those who want no legislation or virtually none and those who feel that as a result of disclosures by the McClelland committee some additional laws are needed to curb corruption and racketeering by irresponsible labor leaders.

The House has before it two choices: one, a bill reported by the House Labor committee, and two, a substitute bill by Congressman Lan-

drum of Georgia and Griffin of Michigan.

The committee bill is a pitifully weak and meaningless excuse for a labor bill. The substitute measure is a middle-of-the-road, fair and moderate bill. It will have the support of those who really want something done and who do not heed the Hoffa threats. It has my support. It would outlaw secondary boycotts, "hot cargo" contracts, blackmail and extortion picketing, etc. It would do nothing to hinder or interfere with legitimate activities of honest labor unions, and would in fact provide security and protection for the rights of union members.

But it will be a tough battle, with a sizeable amount of politics mixed in. Observers claim it will give an indication of the effect of CIO-COPE's activities in last Fall's election, following which COPE announced 221 of the 436 members of the House and 53 of the 98 Senators were beholden to them and their legislative desires.

TEXAS peanut growers won a victory when the De-

partment of Agriculture last week announced a revision of U.S. Standards for shelled Spanish peanuts and for shelled Virginia type peanuts. Many of us who represent peanut growers have been fighting for that concession for months, even years. Southwestern growers have been discriminated against for years. The new directive on grades is not all we wanted but reduces the discrimination.

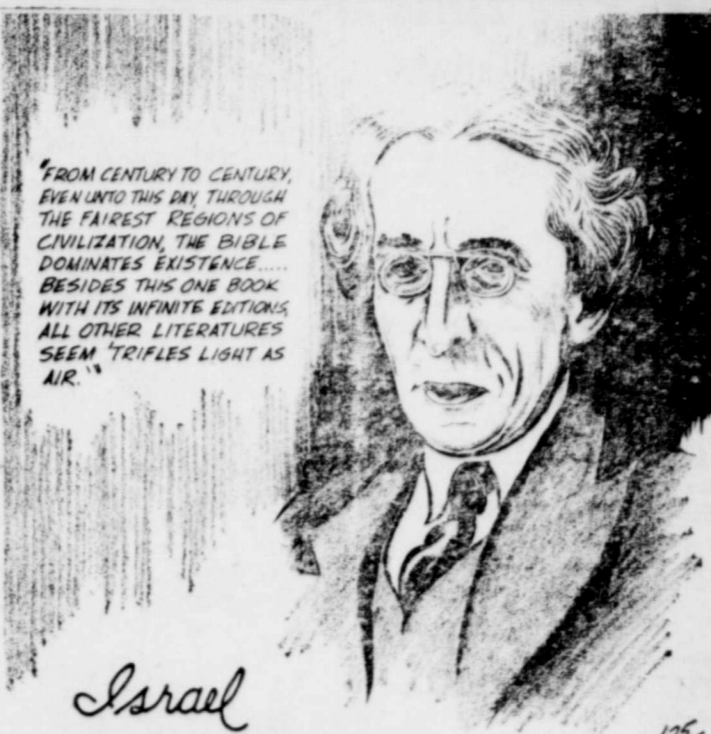

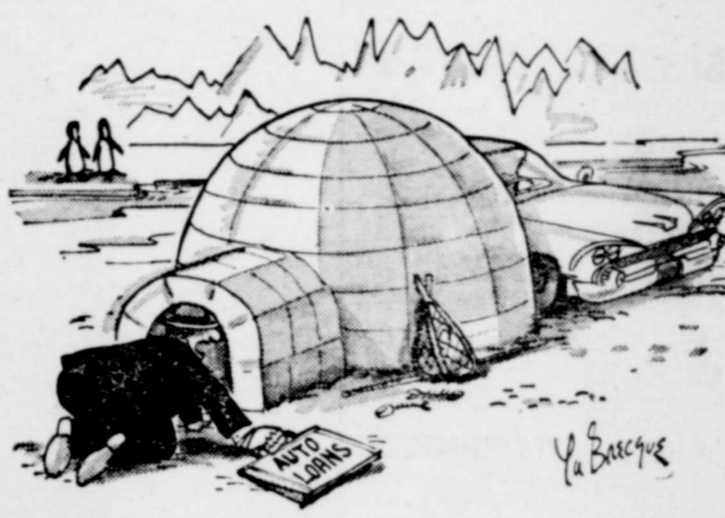
