AROUND THE COUNTY

4-H Club members are getting lambs picked out and getting them ready to put on feed for the spring shows. During the first three days of this week four club members were helped in selecting lambs for feeding.

Diane Cole was helped in picking lambs from father Alvie Cole's lamb crop. This is Diane's first year to feed.

Bart and Jack Clark got lambs to feed out of their father's flock. Right now they have six lambs picked out and will pick out some more in a couple of weeks when some other lambs are worked again. They are also going to get some ewe lambs for the commercial ewe lamb class of the county show and the San Angelo show. Barbara and Jack have both fed for several years.

Tommy Foster has eight ewe lambs and five mutton lambs that he is going to feed. Tommy is another first year feeder. His lambs all came out of the R. T. Foster, Jr. lambs.

Main problem in selecting lambs for the feeders is finding blackface lambs that are small enough to start on feed. The finewool lambs are heavy but not as heavy as the blackfaces and not quite as much of a problem to find since there are more of them in the county. The majority of the blackface lambs in the county moved out in the spring at weights that were prohibitive then for the feeders to start with, so they are even heavier now.

There are several club members who are to be helped yet in selecting their lambs. They will be helped just as soon as the lambs can be found to select from. We like to use as many of the local lambs as is possible since the background of the lambs is known.

Several people in town have had trouble with grubs in their lawns. This is the common white grub, the larva stage of the well known May beetle or June bug as it is sometimes called.

The grubs will kill lawn grass by cutting off the roots just below the ground. On affected lawns, the grass can be peeled off these spots very easily. The grass dies and is usually the first sign of grub infestation.

Ordinarily chlordane is very effective as a grub control in lawns. However, Mrs. Bill Reed used chlordane twice on some and was not able to get control of the pests. Recommendations call for the use of chlordane either as a dust or a spray. If the dust is used use 10 ounces of 40% wettable chlordane per 1000 square feet of lawn. After dusting the lawn good with the chlordane water it well to get the insecticide into the ground where the grubs are working. If you prefer a spray, use the same proportions in 25 gallons of water. It is not necessary to water after the spray.

Dieldrin, another insecticide, is also recommended for grub control. The residual effect of dieldrin is longer than that of the chlordane and this is desirable in treating for grubs since those hatching after the insecticide has been applied will be killed. Use 4 ounces of dieldrin per 1000 square feet of lawn. Apply it either as the dust and water just as the chlordane or use it in 25 gallons of water per 1000 square feet.

Do not pull the dead grass; the deep roots should come or through and cover the bare spots.

Dieldrin has not been available locally but is supposed to be in stock as of this week by one of the local merchants.

How To freeze—How to

Cook—Frozen Feeds is the title of the Extension Service home economists nutritionists' bulletin on freezing and using frozen foods. This bulletin is the latest information for the lady who is interested in freezing some of the fresh produce when it is available from the home garden or is cheapest on the market. Fruits are covered also as well as are all the vegetables; in addition there are recipes for freezing miscellaneous foods such as butter, pecans, eggs, fish when the fishing is good, and ice cream. Breads, pies and cookies and cakes are also covered.

## City Water Really Is Cheaper FOR SUMMER RATES

In last week's paper we had a story about the city offering cheaper summer water rates. And everybody figured there was a cut rate on.

But in our story we went on and quoted the regular rates as the summer cut rates. ... But actually, the water is a lot cheaper until October 20 when the cut rates end.

Anyway, the first 5,000 gallons will cost the usual, but after the first 5,000 gallons, water will cost only 25c per thousand. And the rates went into effect July 20, said Mrs. Johnnie Donalson, city secretary.



A MODERN-DAY White Fleet idea is being seriously considered in Congress. The plan, spearheaded by LIFE Magazine, envisions the U.S. placing a half dozen mercy ships on the high seas round the world, laden with food for the hungry, medical facilities for the sick and injured, and technicians to help underprivileged people improve their lot.

The momentum of the idea (President Eisenhower endorsed it at a recent news conference) prompted Chairman Vinson of the House Armed Services Committee to appoint a sub-committee composed of myself and eight others, to investigate the feasibility of the proposal and make recommendations. I was named chairman of the committee.

It was 52 years ago that President Theodore Roosevelt sent 16 battleships on the historic cruise, called "The Great White Fleet." Fully armed and painted white, the cruise around the world was designed to impress people with the U.S. Naval power and the growth of our country, a sort of muscle-flexing operation.

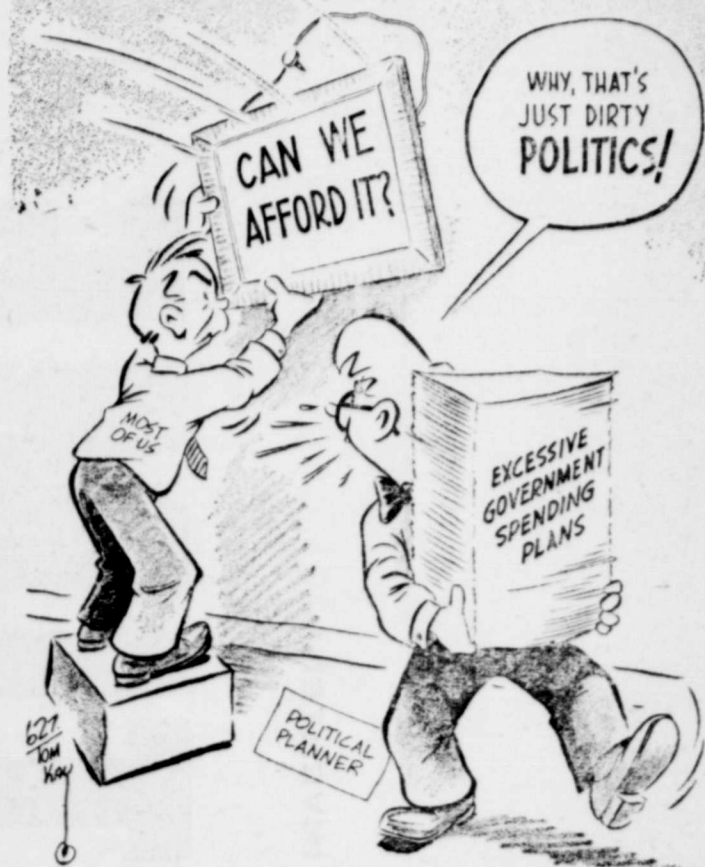
Now it is proposed to launch a new mission, a new Great White Fleet, unarmed, loaded with good will, doctors, technicians and nurses, which would carry mercy missions around the world, ready to put into harbors where emergencies develop and disasters occur—but always only on invitation. It would symbolize America as a nation with a soul, ready to help the unfortunate and relieve distress.

Tentatively, it is planned to finance such a venture by public subscriptions. Already a generous response of interest is coming in from all over the country.

As a sort of "trial run," a ship is presently being equipped with equipment and supplies, financed by voluntary contributions, to perform such a mission in the Far East. Called "Project Hope", the ship will be ready to sail perhaps next January.

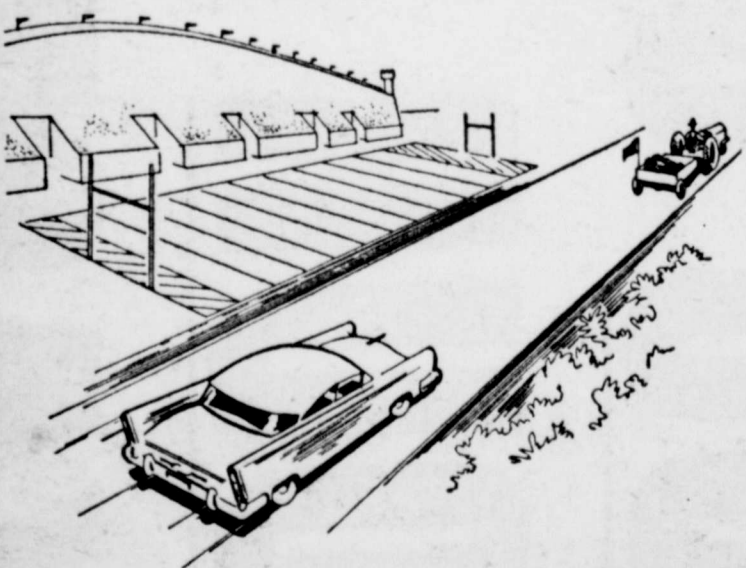
## Labor Day Holiday

## Can You Stop In Time?



It takes more than the distance between goal posts on a football field (100 yards) to stop a car traveling at 60 miles per hour under the best driving conditions, 4-H Club members point out. At 60 mph, a car travels 88 feet per second. There's not much "time" to come to a dead stop upon approaching a tractor or other slow-moving farm machinery.

"Highway safety is everyone's responsibility," 4-H leaders declare, and during the summer when traffic is at its peak the obligation becomes greater. The devastating fact that three out of four traffic fatalities occur in rural areas makes the 4-H Safety program the "number one crop" for nearly a million conscientious club members.

Statistics reveal that there are more teen-age drivers on the highways today than ever before.

It is also true that drivers under 20 years of age have a worse safety record than older drivers. So each 4-H boy and girl enrolled in the safety project is encouraged to become a "self-policing committee of one." These 4-H'ers make certain that the family car, truck, and tractor are in safe operating condition at all times.

For the past 15 years the 4-H Safety program has been supported nationally by General Motors, which among other things provides incentive awards for top ranking club members in each state. The awards consist of \$400 college scholarships, all-expense paid trips to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, medals of honor, and plaques. The program is under the direction of the Cooperative Extension Service, United States Department of Agriculture.

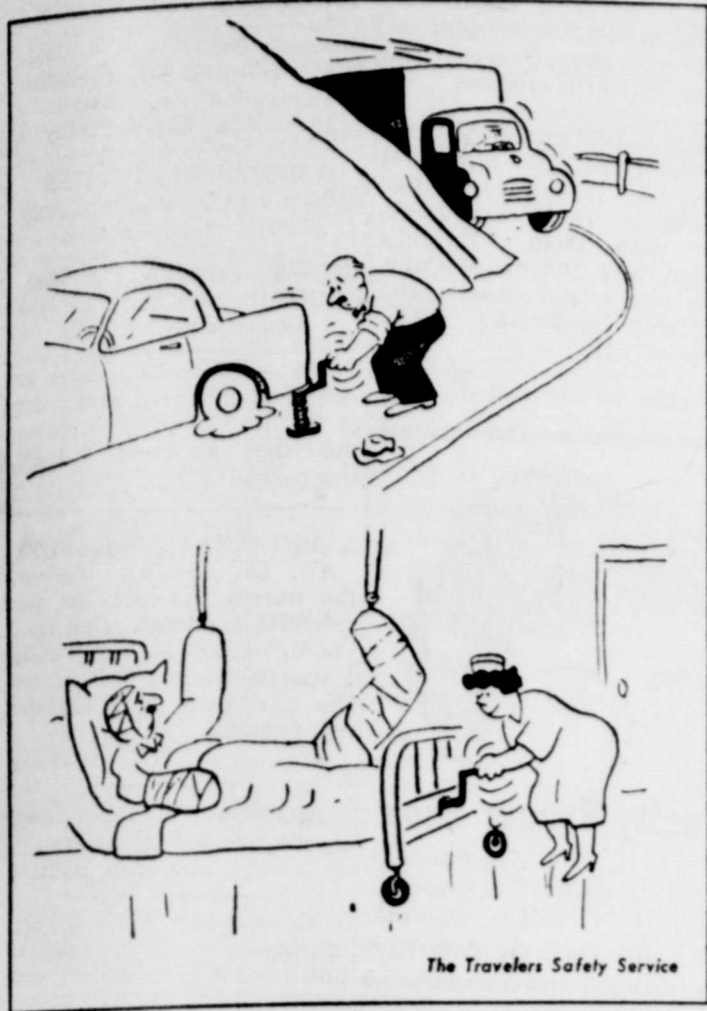

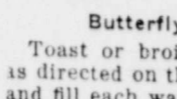

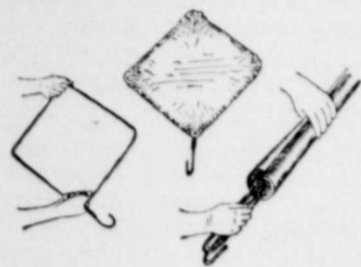

## JUST BETWEEN US SPORTSMEN

Here's an idea for a folding frying pan — amazingly light and easy to carry. Fortunately, we don't need to buy one, because there are plenty around the house. Those of us who get tired of sandwiches on hunting and fishing trips will find that this suggestion can extend the menu considerably.



Pull a wire coat-hanger from its triangular shape into a square, as shown. Bend the hook down for a handle. Double a section of metal foil around the wire square, folding the remaining three sides under securely. Presto! — a very practical frying pan that takes up almost no room or weight in the hunting or fishing jacket. With foil removed, the outside half can be bent inward toward the handle for easy carrying, as the sketch shows. It's easy to bend it back into shape again.

If one wants to carry a roll of metal foil, this folded pan rim can be slipped inside the roll. Then we have extra foil for making cups and for other cooking jobs. If this seems cumbersome, just remove a sheet and fold it like a handkerchief.

While cooking, the food will depress the center of the foil a bit, so hot fat, cake batter, gravy and other liquids won't run off.

Arrange three or four flat rocks to support the pan, and build a small fire between them. When the fire is reduced to coals, we are ready to cook. Each person can make his own pan, and can use it as a plate. This, of course, is a good way to prepare bacon and eggs, meats, fish, pancakes and many other dishes. I humbly submit that these hot foods taste better than cold sandwiches!

Sportsmen know that compact instant beverages, such as coffee, tea and cocoa, are easiest to carry and quickest to prepare; in fact outdoor-minded people seem to have adopted these delicious powdered drinks as standard equipment. Many of us, however, don't realize that the same hot drink powders also are excellent in cooking.

Here's an idea for several kinds of hot breads that can be cooked on your foil frying pan on the trail:

Put half a cup or so of pancake mix in a sturdy plastic bag. Add a teaspoon of sugar and one of Nestle's "Quik" or of "EverReady" cocoa. Roll up the bag and carry it in your jacket until lunch time.

If you like your cakes only mildly sweet, leave out the sugar, because both "Quik" (a cocoa powder that mixes easily with cold milk) and "EverReady" cocoa have sugar already in them.

Now, while the fire is burning down to coals, dip a little water into the bag and massage it until the ingredients are smooth. Add enough water to make the batter pourable. Grease the foil with a strip of bacon and pour on some batter. When the batter stops bubbling on top, flip the cake over to brown the other side.



This is more of a dessert cake than a pancake. Among other variations, we can add a teaspoon or so of "Nescafe" instant coffee for a mocha flavor, or we can substitute it for the cocoa and have coffee cake. Many sportsmen like a dessert made (with or without the cocoa or coffee) by dropping some Semi-Sweet Chocolate Pieces into the batter on the pan. These sink into the batter, and can be turned with the cake. This kind of pancake reminds us of the famous "Toll House" Cookies. Pancakes usually taste dull without syrup, but these cakes don't need it. **Emerald Melon Salad**  
1 package lime-flavored gelatin; 2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh mint leaves; 1 cup hot water; 1 cup cold water, 2 teaspoons lemon juice; 1½ cups melon balls or cubes.  
Combine gelatin and mint. Add hot water and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Let stand about 15 minutes, strain, and add cold water and lemon juice. Chill until slightly thickened. Then fold in melon. Pour into 1-quart mold or individual molds. Chill until firm. Unmold. For salad, serve on crisp lettuce with mayonnaise. Makes 6 servings.

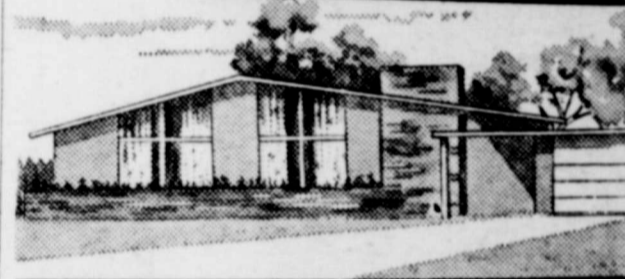
