## AROUND THE COUNTY

ARTHUR BARLEMANN, JR. COUNTY AGENT

The Game Management Association barbecue attracted about one hundred guests and members on Tuesday evening of this week. A good program was enjoyed by the crowd.

Leo Merrill, range technologist at the Sonora Experiment Station, made a short talk on handling livestock and wildlife on the range. He gave some of the results of his investigations at the Sonora station where different stocking rates on pasture carrying cattle, sheep, goats and deer in various combinations and separately have been underway for several years.

Henry Burkett, game warden from San Angelo in charge of this area of the state, gave a short explanation of the mandatory game law and the new trespass law which goes into effect in October. On that date, game wardens will no longer have jurisdiction in the enforcement of the trespass laws. Such enforcement shall be by other state and county law officers.

The game and fish commission group brought with them a short film on the decline of wildlife and how it can be changed in West Texas.

New officers elected for the association and the Eagle Hunt are Dayton Barrett, president; Neal J. Reed, vice-president; Billy Nelson McClellan, treasurer; and the county agent, secretary. The first three officials will appoint two others to serve as directors and the executive committee of the group.

Last year's officials were Clinton Hodges, president; Dayton Barrett, vice-president; Neal J. Reed, treasurer; Jim Hinshaw and William Foster, directors.

Results of the balloting in the County ASC election of county committeemen have just been announced by Edie Roy Braswell, office manager. The three elected committeemen are Billy Ralph Bynum, chairman; I. W. Terry, vice-chairman; and Reynolds Foster, member.

The rattlesnake situation in Sterling County as in nearly every other area of the state is pretty bad at the present time. Numerous rattlesnakes are being killed in every area of the county every day and popular night sport for

some is driving up and down the roads and killing them along the roads. There has been one report of 34 being killed in one night along the Colorado City road.

Chesley McDonald probably holds the record right now though for the most killed at one time and place. While rounding up some stock one lay one of the horses was struck at by a good sized rattler. The rattler missed and crawled in a hole. When dug out and killed, it was noticed that the snake was quite large. When cut open, 24 little rattlers emerged, fully equipped for business, and striking. Like many other snakes, rattlers start life in an egg. Unlike many others, however, the eggs hatch with-in the female and the young are borne alive rather than by hatching out on the outside.

There are four poisonous snakes in Texas; the rattlesnake, copperhead and water moccasin, all belonging to the pit viper family, and the coral snake which belongs to the cobra-like family. Venom of the pit vipers is called hemotoxic since it acts on the blood system of the victim breaking down the blood cells, blood vessels and heart action. The venom of the coral snake is called neurotoxic since it acts on the nerves and causes respiratory failure. Because of its small fangs, the coral snake must bite, hold on and chew.

There are many methods of identifying the coral snake but one of the simplest is this old rhyme: "Red touch yellow, kill a fellow." Several other snakes are red, yellow and black but the coral is only one on which the yellow ring and the red ring always touch.

If you'd like the Extension Service pamphlet, **Poisonous Snakes in Texas**, we'll be glad to send you a copy. It gives some hints on the identification of the four poisonous snakes in full color, how to tell if they are poisonous or not by the tooth marks, and first aid for snake bite victims. Everyone should know the steps to be taken for snake bite. With snakes as plentiful as they are now, it might come in handy.

## RAIN EARLY THURSDAY

CONGRESS is about to close shop. And it's a good thing. Good for the Congress and good for the county. After 8 months of wrangling, maneuvering and legislating, you see signs of irritation and stringy nerves.

The shenanigans of Senator Wayne Morse cannot be explained that easily, however. When Senator Johnson the other day obtained unanimous consent of the Senate to debate the over-debated housing bill that had been vetoed, before voting on the issue of overriding the veto, Morse got his feelings hurt real bad because he was not notified in advance that unanimous consent would be requested. He was not there, and when he found out about it he declared "parliamentary war" on the Senate in general and the Senate leadership in particular.

Anything for headlines. Now Morse is using every dilatory tactic in the books to delay the business of the Senate, and thereby delay the recess if he can. At least that is the view of observers.

SPEAKING of the veto of the housing bill, it will be recalled that Congress has approved two omnibus housing bills. The President objected to the first one because it was very inflationary, with many nonessential and expensive items in it. Then Congress passed another one, almost equally objectionable, and he vetoed it. It begins to look like some of the lawmakers would rather have a veto than a reasonable bill to meet essential needs of FHA mortgage insurance and other necessary items.

But surely the Congress will not quit without meeting its obligations to the country in that respect. The Senate upheld the second veto.

The President also vetoed the public works appropriation because of his objection to 67 new starts for which money was provided—projects which had not been cleared by the Bureau of the budget as is ordinarily required. In defiance of the President, and inviting another veto, the House committee then approved a second one without meeting any of the President's objections.

And so it goes. At the time this is written a lot remains to be done in order to quit before the Soviet dictator gets to town. And the leadership is determined to clear out before Nikita arrives on the 15th.
