AROUND THE COUNTY by

Welcome rain covered all sections of the county last week ending for a time the big threat of grass fires. Conditions previous to the rain were ideal for range fires; matches, cigarettes or lightning might well have touched off disastrous fires in any section of the county. The moisture should green up the grass and weeds for a while and erase fire threats until after the first killing frost.

During the weekend, the rainfall covered sections of the county which did not receive rain earlier in the week. Up until Friday night, the area from Sterling City east had received very little rain; Friday night rains up to three inches covered that section of the county. The moisture will help range conditions immensely. It may be a little late to provide much in the way of grazing but it will strengthen the grass. Roots will be stronger and will contain a better food supply for going into the winter; next spring the warm season grasses should emerge from their dormant season in a stronger, healthier condition. In addition the winter grasses will now have moisture to begin their growth. Much of the Texas wintergrass or needle grass as it is commonly called, remained green throughout the summer. It will now be in a condition to make good growth.

Friday, October 9, is the opening date of the big State Fair of Texas. The Pan American Exposition, the livestock show division of the fair, opens on Saturday, October 10, and concludes on October 18. During the Pan-American Exposition, cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, and horses will be on exhibit and judged on various days. All breeding classes of livestock including the junior breeding livestock owned by 4-H and FFA members will be judged. Local exhibitors in the Pan-American Exposition will be L. F. and Clinton Hodges. They are sending up their registered Rambouillet show flock, October 13. Tuesday, is the judging day for the Rambouillets.

Junior livestock exhibitors will take over the livestock portion of the fair on October 19 and continue through October 24. On display and competing for \$21,951 in prize

money will be fat lambs, steers, and hogs. The new \$2 million State Fair Livestock Coliseum will be put to use for the first time this year. This structure, just completed, will provide additional judging arenas and housing for livestock.

Two new Extension Service bulletins are now available in the office. **Texas Angora Goat Production** written by J. A. Gray, Extension sheep and goat specialist, contains much information on goat production. It covers the field of goat production from breeding to marketing for three types of goats; the ringlet lock type, the flat lock type and the web lock type.

The other new leaflet, **Vertical Integration in Texas Agriculture—Beef Cattle**, is devoted to the subject that is being discussed in newspapers, magazines, and radio programs pertaining to livestock and agriculture. It gives some of the advantages and disadvantages or cautions to be watched for in this vertical integration scheme of operations.

The Abilene Fat Stock Show has made some changes in their 1960 show. Thirty-five counties have been trimmed from the list of counties eligible to participate; sixty-three counties previously had been eligible but only 28 remain now. Sterling County remains one of those eligible to participate.

Also, two days were trimmed from the show calendar. Animals will be received on Sunday, shown on Monday and Tuesday and sold on Wednesday. Previously the auction sale had been held on Friday. Date for the 1960 show has been announced as January 24 through 27.

Wait a minute, Dad. How can you forget so quickly? You're not that old. Remember your first date? Remember the first time you fell in love? How you suffered!

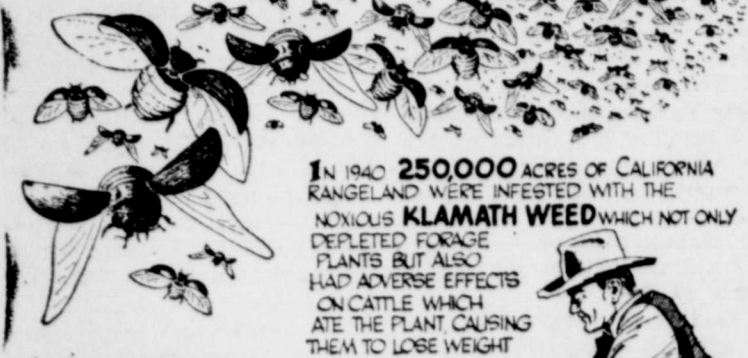

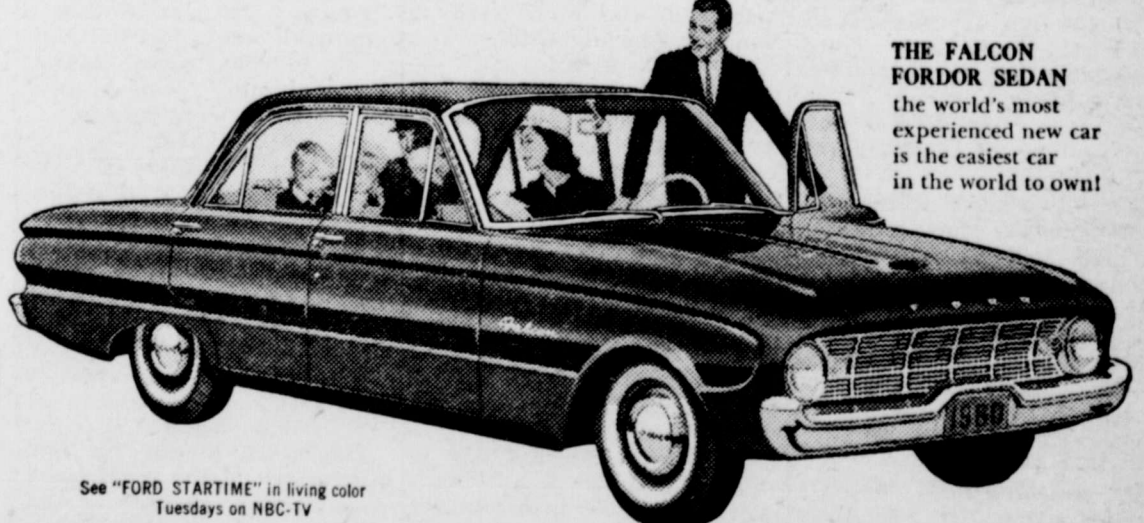

All claims must be submitted within ninety (90) days following conviction. If, upon conviction, a defendant confesses other thefts, no additional reward will be paid. **North Concho River Soil Conservation News Column**

The Great Plains Conservation Program has been set up and is now ready to be offered to local producers in Sterling County. Any landowner or operator of land in the county is eligible for cost share assistance under the program. Purpose of the program is to stabilize erosion and improve farming and ranching conditions thru cost-share assistance on permanent practices. Rate of cost share varies from 50 to 80 percent of carrying out the various practices. Applications for assistance or for more information on the program may be made with any of the local agriculture agencies in the county.

The quail population has increased to its highest level in many years. This is due to many factors, but primarily to better cover, food and protection. These factors are always essential to maintaining or improving wildlife conditions. Quail are abundant all over

this area. Having reached this high population level it will be well to have a good harvest of quail this year. Quail have a very high mortality rate. Also quail generally will not move far from their native nesting grounds and for this reason will soon over populate an area and will die off for lack of food or recover. This could very well happen in this area over the winter months ahead. Game management people are saying that a good harvest will not hurt the quail population as they may die off of natural causes.

Alvie Cole has just finished building an earthen dam on his ranch south of Sterling City. This tank will be used for watering livestock. Secondary purposes will be for erosion control and moisture conservation. Contractor is James Blanton of Hamlin, Texas. 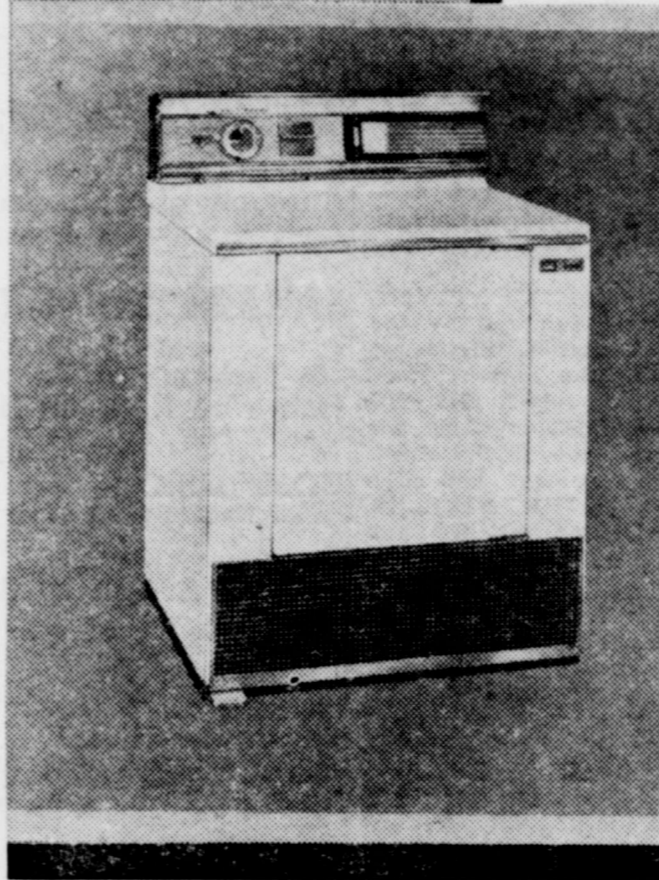

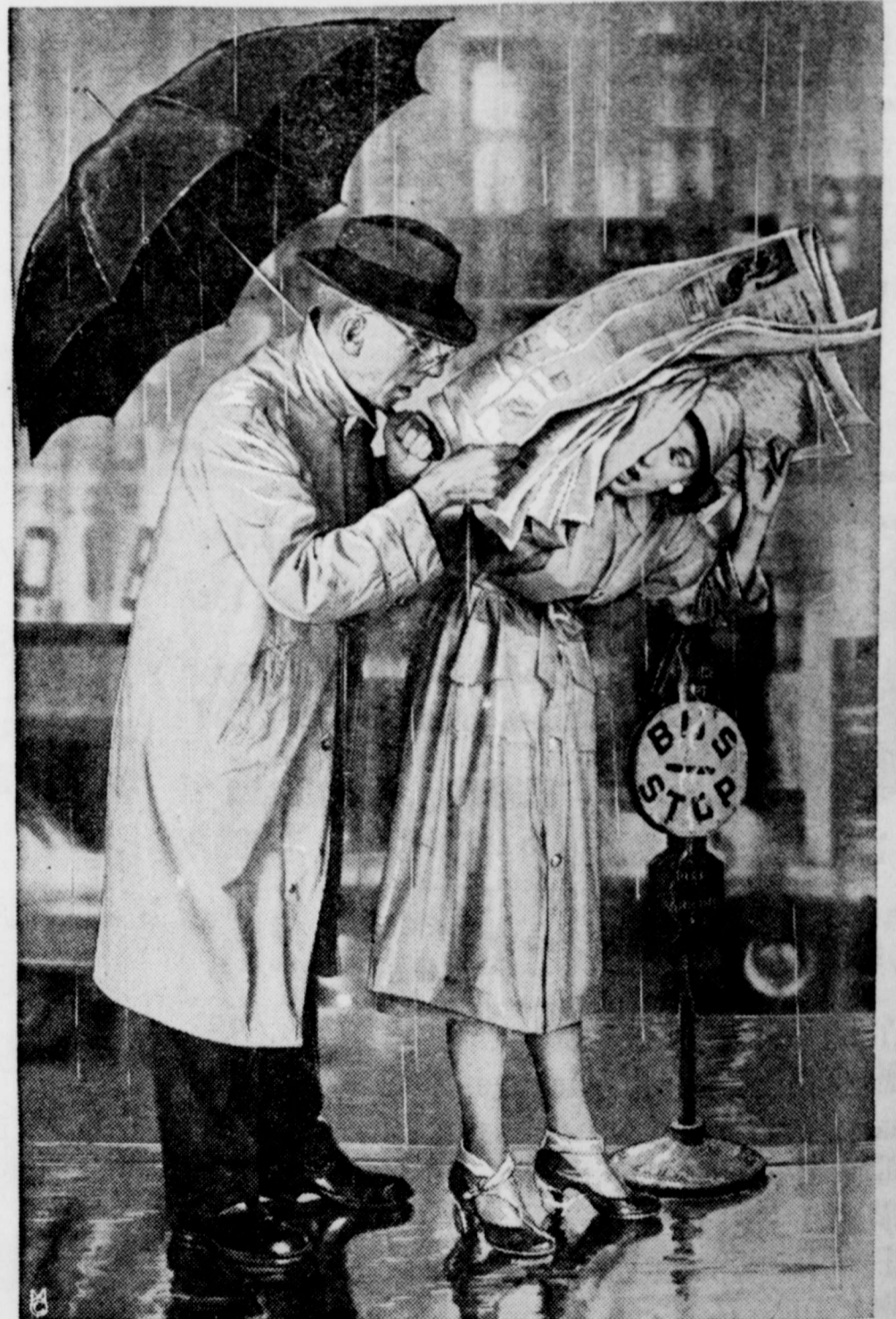
